RESOLUTION NO. 35 - 06

ESTABLISHING THE MIRROR LAKE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

WHEREAS, erosion, sediment and nutrient runoff entering Mirror Lake have degraded water quality and had a detrimental impact on county residents and visitors to the lake; and,

WHEREAS, the Mirror Lake Association has undertaken various efforts to improve the water quality of the lake and its value as a recreational resource for county residents and visitors; and,

WHEREAS, after considerable study and evaluation, the Lake Association has determined that the most effective method to address the degradation of this important resource would be through the establishment of a lake management district with the authority to plan and carry out rehabilitation efforts; and,

WHEREAS, the Association has circulated petitions to landowners around the lake and obtained signatures in support of the establishment of an inland lake district from over 75 percent of the landowners included within the proposed district; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Delton, Town of Dellona and the Village of Lake Delton, all of which have land included within the proposed district boundaries, have passed resolutions in support of the establishment of this district; and,

WHEREAS, the establishment of this district could create an important partner to assist the efforts of the Land Conservation Department to address the runoff pollution problems found within the watershed through the current active Dell Creek Priority Watershed Project; and,

WHEREAS, the Mirror Lake Association has petitioned the County Board to establish an inland lake management district and provided all of the necessary justifications, signatures and resolutions in support of this district; and,

WHEREAS, the Land Conservation Committee has examined the petition and found the petition to be complete, has found the establishment of an inland lake management district to be a necessary means of promoting public health, comfort and welfare and has found that such a district will benefit the lands included within the district.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that a public inland lake district around Mirror Lake, hereby be established pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 33.24, with the boundaries as shown on the attached map and as described in the attached legal description, as amended from the original petition, such district to be named the Mirror Lake Management District;



However, this project will cost significantly more than that which was originally anticipated in the 2006 budget appropriation of \$669,930, due to significant increases in material costs, fuel costs, engineering costs and project scope and complexity. WHEREAS, oversight of the County's revenues streams is extremely important, including the budgeting of these revenues, adoption of user fees and charges for services, and management of accounts receivable and collections.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the attached financial policy, 1-06 Revenues and Accounts Receivable, be and hereby is adopted.

Fiscal Note: This policy will provide guidance to the decision process used by the County Board and department managers in governing and administering County finances.

Information Systems Note: No impact.

Revenues and Accounts Receivable

Policy

Sauk County shall strive to maximize revenues and their collection in order to minimize the need for property tax levy.

Policy Authorization

-Resolution ??-06,, 2006

Procedure

Revenues:

- 1. One-Time Revenues: To the extent feasible, one-time revenues shall be applied toward one-time expenditures; they shall not be used to finance ongoing programs.
- 2. Discretionary Revenues: Unless otherwise stated explicitly by the Board, the County shall not earmark discretionary revenues for specific purposes. This will preserve the ability of the Board to determine the best use of available revenues to meet changing service requirements.
- 3. Highly Variable Revenues: Highly variable revenues shall be budgeted conservatively and relied upon only to the extent that their receipt can be reasonably confirmed and known. Historical actual receipts, as well as recent communications and data, shall be used in projections of unpredictable revenues.
- 4. Acceptance of Outside Funding: Acceptance of outside funding that obligates the County to additional expense, either cash or efforts, will be scrutinized. The County may reduce the level of service provided when reductions in outside funding, particularly from the State or Federal government, are realized.
- 5. Revenue Projections: Revenue projections will be created and monitored to assure that actual and anticipated revenues are consistent with budgeted amounts. Variances from projections may require additional action to ensure that essential programs and services are maintained. New revenue sources or revenues received in excess of anticipated amounts may not be spent without authorization consistent with financial policies. Revenue shortfalls shall be examined for the cause of the shortfall and corrective action shall be taken as appropriate.
- 6. Revenues will generally be recorded in the department responsible for their collection.
- 7. Diversification of Revenues: The County shall strive to diversify its revenues in order to maintain needed services during periods of declining economic activity. The County shall actively investigate opportunities to implement user fees as appropriate to pay for services rendered.
- 8. Payments must be made in United States dollars.

Effective xx/xx/06 Replaces NEW

User Fees or Charges for Services:

- 1. The County may charge the direct beneficiaries of County services to fully or partially offset the cost of providing those services based on costs incurred, comparative studies of other public and private entities, and other public policy considerations such as public health and safety or ability to pay. It is not always the intent of the County to recover the full cost of a service, such as indirect costs including payroll processing, accounting services, computer usage and other central administrative services. Reasons for not attempting to recover full cost include the need to regulate demand, the desire to subsidize a certain service, and the promotion of other public policy goals. Other considerations in fee or charge development may include ability to pay, identifiable benefits, discouraging waste, and the cost of collection and administration. Fee structures should be simple so that they are easily understood and leave as small a margin as possible for subjective interpretations.
- 2. Costs to provide a service will be recalculated periodically, and fee adjustments may be considered accordingly. Charges and fees will be reviewed annually to determine a) if the fee is still needed, b) if the fee is carrying out the public policy for which it was created, c) if the fee is comparable to other units of government or private entities, and d) if there are any services that are being provided without charge for which a fee should be charged.
- 3. Fee or charge creation, modification, or termination must be authorized by action of the County Board, so long as this action does not depart from federal or state authorization or mandate.

Accounts Receivable and Bad Debts: Note: Each County department should develop accounts receivable procedures based on their particular circumstances and overriding state and federal regulations. These procedures should be approved by the department's oversight committee. However, compliance with the following Sauk County general procedures should be followed at a minimum.

1. Sufficient data about the customer should be collected prior to service delivery to aid in collection actions if needed. Subject to any limitations of privacy or other laws, and depending on the type of service delivered, this data may include:

Full name of person / entity receiving service

Mailing address

Physical address

Phone number(s)

E-mail address

Taxpayer Identification Number / Social Security Number

Drivers license / identification number

Date of birth

Alternate payor information / secondary insurance(s)

2. Departments should utilize computerized billing systems and pre-established prices. Unless part of a department-specific integrated computer system, departments should use the County's central accounting system. Procedures should be developed by which all data necessary to issue a complete billing is forwarded to the person(s) responsible for issuing the billing. Invoices should be issued as soon as possible after delivery of good or service. Whenever practical only prenumbered, sequential invoices should be issued to prevent duplicate invoicing. Billings should be reviewed for accuracy prior to their issuance.

- 3. Upon payment, prenumbered, sequential receipts should be issued to the extent practical. Deposits of cash and checks should be made promptly and in accordance with Financial Policy 3-97, Cash Handling. The prenumbered receipts should be accounted for periodically.
- 4. All accounts receivable shall be recorded in a manner to permit analysis of the aging of receivables (e.g., <30 days, 30 to 60 days, etc.). This aging should be reviewed at least monthly. Aged receivable balances shall also be presented monthly to oversight committees, and quarterly to the Finance Committee.
- 5. Pursuant to Sauk County Code of Ordinances 30.06, and unless otherwise provided by law, the County may retain overpayments of \$2.00 or less, unless a refund is specifically requested in writing, and may also waive underpayments of not more than \$2.00.
- 6. Departments should develop collection policies specifying the action to be taken when accounts receivable become past due. Oversight committees should approve these policies. These policies should specify the age threshold and materiality of a delinquency at which each collection effort will be pursued. In developing these thresholds, departments should consider the cost of collection efforts; overriding state and federal laws; at what point further services should be discontinued unless required by law, ordinance or resolution; and at what point services should be subsequently reinstated if the accounts are made current (see Sauk County Example Department Collection Policy). Departments should also remember that the longer a receivable remains unpaid, the less likely it will collected. Contacts made with delinquent customers should be recorded on a contact log to aid in collection efforts (see Sauk County Example Contact Log).
- 7. Interest and penalties on past due accounts may be appropriate, depending on the type of revenue and the authority under which it was created. Department policies should specify the policy for interest and penalty charges.
- 8. County responses to delinquent accounts may include:

Phone contact

Written correspondence, potentially certified or registered mail Suspension of future services on credit until accounts are made current Suspension of all future services until accounts are made current Development of payment plans

Certification of the account to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue's Tax Refund Intercept Program

Through the Sauk County Corporation Counsel office, engagement of collection agency services

Through the Sauk County Corporation Counsel office, filing of small claims actions Through the Sauk County Corporation Counsel office, filing of probate claims

9. For departments that are considered proprietary funds, an allowance for doubtful accounts should be established based on the historical percentage of receivables that have been uncollectible. This should be updated at least annually, and material changes should be reported to the oversight committee. When an account is deemed uncollectible, the balance should be written off in a timely manner, generally no longer than one year after the provision of service. Any write-offs must be approved by the oversight committee. A yearly report of all departments' writeoffs shall be made to the County Board.

CREATING CAMPUS LIVING AND LEARNING CENTER DEVELOPMENT AND BUILDING COMMITTEE AND ESTABLISHING A FRAMEWORK FOR PROCEEDING WITH THE DEVELOPMENT OF A RESIDENCE HALL/LEARNING CENTER AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-BARABOO/SAUK COUNTY COLLEGE

WHEREAS, in 1966, the County of Sauk and the City of Baraboo jointly purchased certain real property that was improved and developed on a cooperative basis to become the University of Wisconsin-Baraboo/Sauk County College; and,

WHEREAS, in 1969, the County of Sauk and the City of Baraboo created the University of Wisconsin-Baraboo/Sauk County Campus Commission to oversee the County and City's interest in the Campus; and,

WHEREAS, the University of Wisconsin-Baraboo/Sauk County College has become an important asset to the people of Sauk County and the City of Baraboo providing an important educational asset for adults desiring higher education in the area; and,

WHEREAS, in 1995, the County of Sauk and the City of Baraboo adopted an intergovernmental agreement providing for a framework for the operation of the Campus Commission and approved new bylaws for the Commission; and,

WHEREAS, in 1974, the Friends of the Campus, Inc., was incorporated as an educational and charitable organization with the power to receive and disburse gifts and grants for campus purposes, and to support the Campus in providing higher education to the community; and,

WHEREAS, over the years, the joint owners, the Friends of the Campus, Inc., and the University of Wisconsin System have worked cooperatively to ensure the provision of higher education to the community, and have worked jointly to develop the Campus, most recently, in 1995 with the construction of the John and Murrel Lange Center and a comprehensive remodeling project that dramatically improved the Campus; and,

WHEREAS, it has been determined that it would be a tremendous enhancement to the Campus to be able to offer a residence hall and learning center for students so that students could live and attend school on Campus, and it would make the University of Wisconsin-Baraboo/Sauk County more convenient to Sauk County residents from outside the Baraboo area, and provide a tremendous enhancement to the educational experience for any students interested in a residential college experience; and,

WHEREAS, the joint owners, the County of Sauk and the City of Baraboo, are desirous of enhancing the Campus and accepting the ownership of this building as part of the campus, with the understanding that tax levy dollars shall not be utilized to either construct this facility or support its ongoing operations; and,

WHEREAS, residence halls have been developed at the University of Wisconsin-Richland and University of Wisconsin-Marathon County, and both have had positive and profitable experiences with building and operating residence halls; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Baraboo is supportive of this project provided that it is completed at no cost to the City, and the County of Sauk is willing to provide \$100,000 in planning and design development funding, and is willing to assist in financing arrangements such as lease back bonds or some other vehicle, provided such financing shall not be pledged by the full faith and credit of the County, and the County shall have no obligation to repay said financing, and the financial projections for the residence hall indicate that the residence hall shall be a profitable enterprise; and,

WHEREAS, at this point, the County has appropriated the \$100,000 in planning and design development funding, and it is necessary to develop a framework for the ongoing study, design and development of residence hall, while it is understood that any subsequent building will be subject to the approval of the joint owners; and,

WHEREAS, it is desirable to have a Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee appointed that is representative of the joint owners, the University, the Friends of the Campus, the community and the students to report to the Campus Commission and oversee the design, development, planning and construction of the residence hall and learning center; and,

WHEREAS, it is understood that prior to the issuance of bonds, any retention of consultants, engineers or architects, or the issuance of any contract for construction, the joint owners will be required to approve the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that a Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee is hereby created to consist of one individual appointed by the County, one individual appointed by the City, the Dean of the Campus, one faculty member and one student appointed pursuant to procedures established by the University, one member of the Friends of the Campus Foundation, and one member of the community appointed by the mutual agreement of the Sauk County Board Chairperson and the Mayor of the City of Baraboo; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee shall report to the University of Wisconsin-Baraboo/Sauk County Campus Commission and, as requested, to the joint owners, on all matters pertaining to the development of the Living and Learning Center, and said Committee shall early in its work make a recommendation for ownership of the Living Learning Center; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee is expressly authorized to conduct a competitive selection for an architect and/or any other consultants necessary to begin the planning and development of the residence hall as well as preparing any necessary construction documents to prepare for construction of the residence hall; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee is authorized to advise and work directly with the joint owners, the University, the Friends of the Campus, Inc., and any other agency or entity in planning and development of this project, and in particular, the Special Committee shall work directly with the County of Sauk and the Friends of the Campus, Inc., on financial projections and the issuance of lease back bonds; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee shall provide regular, monthly updates to the Campus Commission and shall report directly to the joint owners upon request whenever it is deemed necessary by the owners; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the contract with any architect to begin development, and any contract for construction shall be approved by the Campus Commission, the County Board of Supervisors and the City Common Council prior to any further action, and the issuance of the lease back bonds shall be subject to the approval of the County Board of Supervisors; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the initial funds shall be released to the budget of the Campus Commission budget to be spent on design, development, planning and other preparatory planning as determined necessary by the Living and Learning Center Development and Building Committee; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Controller shall be responsible for monitoring the expenditure of funds, and ensuring that the funds appropriated are used for the purposes for which they were appropriated, and is expressly authorized to audit any accounts, and report any concerns directly to the Campus Commission; and,

Fiscal Note: The 2006 Sauk County budget appropriates \$100,000 of General Fund balance for planning and design development.

Funding for construction is not specifically identified at this time. It is hoped that the Campus Commission will be able to secure significant grants and donations. The Special Committee will work with Sauk County and the Friends of the Campus, Inc. to pursue additional funding that may be needed. This additional funding may include the issuance of lease back bonds. It is the intent that repayment of these bonds shall be made from net income generated from operation of the facility. It is further intended that property taxes shall not be needed for ongoing operations or future capital maintenance or improvements.

An intergovernmental agreement between Sauk County, the City of Baraboo, the University, and the Friends of the Campus will need to be developed to define the relationship between these entities relative to the Living and Learning Center. Items of agreement shall include ownership of the facility, management of the facility, funding responsibilities for construction, funding responsibilities for ongoing operations, a plan for funding future capital maintenance and improvements, and a plan in the case that a positive operating net income is not realized.
