The purpose of this communication is to share important information about upcoming gypsy moth aerial spraying that will be taking place in your community within the next few weeks.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, in coordination with local governments and property owners, will soon begin an aerial treatment program to control the gypsy moth in your community. Your local gypsy moth suppression coordinator (a city or county employee or a volunteer) has supplied the DNR with your name and address and has specifically requested that you receive the information in this letter.

Aerial spraying could begin as early as the week of May 7. Counties where specific parcels of land will be treated include: Adams, Brown Dane, Door, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Sauk, and Waushara. Spraying will start in the southern portion of the state and spread northward. Spraying typically is done in the morning beginning at dawn, but it is possible afternoon or evening spraying may also occur. You, as well as area residents, may see yellow airplanes flying low any day of the week including weekends, and pilots will continue to apply the material for as long as the weather will allow that day.

The goal of the DNR's Suppression Program is to safely control the gypsy moth, an insect that defoliates and can kill trees. When the population of gypsy moths rises to high numbers, it can also cause allergic reactions and contribute to asthma in sensitive individuals.

Spray planes are guided using a Global Positioning System (GPS) in order to ensure an area is treated as accurately as possible. The spray material used will be either the bacterial insecticide Bacillus thuringiensis var. kurstaki (Btk) or the viral insecticide Gypchek. Included with this letter is information on the spray material that will be used on the treatment area near you. The spray materials are not harmful to the vast majority of the public. Some individuals who are immune-compromised or who have severe allergies may wish to avoid areas to be sprayed on the day spraying occurs or to stay inside and avoid exposure until the spray dries (about 20 minutes after application). The material sprayed will come down as a fine mist and will stick to surfaces. Anyone who happens to be outside when spraying takes place can avoid having contact with the spray by wearing a hat and a jacket or slicker or using an umbrella. Washing the exposed skin or clothing with soap and water is all that is required to remove the spray material.

It is possible your agency/organization will receive calls from members of the public who will have questions about why airplanes are in your area. Material included with this letter will allow you and your staff to provide accurate information and to guide the caller to resources that will address their concerns.

The DNR's Suppression Program is relatively small this year, and once spraying begins, the work should be completed fairly quickly. Because spraying is contingent on a number of factors, such as the weather and the development of the gypsy moth caterpillar in a particular area, it is not possible in this letter to provide specific dates and times when your area will be treated. But you have a number of options for receiving the latest information.



If you want to know when spraying is taking place, you can call the free Gypsy Moth Information Line at 800-642-6684 (800-642-MOTH). The line is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Information Line will be regularly updated starting the week of May 7 and will be updated daily once spraying begins.

You also have the option to sign up for e-mail notification of spraying at this Internet page: http://dnr.wi.gov/org/land/forestry/fh/GM/spray_areas/index.htm. An e-mail will be sent out whenever the Gypsy Moth Information Line is updated. You will continue to receive e-mails while spraying is taking place, until the end of the suppression spray program in late May or June. Or you can unsubscribe at any time.



- At the request of landowners and communities, to reduce outbreak populations below the level at which they can cause heavy defoliation
- Administer federal cost sharing funds for aerial spray treatments as available
- Provide technical information about the gypsy moth
- Introduce natural enemies (e.g., wasps and fungi)
- Reduced cost of aerial spraying (lowered price based on large acreage contracted by the state)
- Up to 50% reimbursement for the cost of spraying and preparatory administrative costs as available from the federal government

Suppression spraying was first conducted in 2001 in Appleton and Brookfield. program peaked in 2004 with 51,250 acres treated. That spring, populations dropped dramatically due a combination of weather, introduced diseases and suppression spraying. In 2006, only 1,502 acres were treated and populations remained low.

Approximately 1,237 acres are scheduled in eight counties: Adams (207 acres at 4 sites), Brown (141 acres at 5 sites), Dane (538 acres at 8 sites), Door (149 acres at 2 sites), Fond du Lac (25 acres at 1 site), Green Lake (23 acres at 1 site), Sauk (75 acres at 2 sites), Waushara (79 acres at 1 site).

A single aerial application of the microbial insecticide Btk. Gypchek, a viral insecticide specific to gypsy moth caterpillars, will be applied where endangered or threatened moths or butterflies are present.

It is weather dependent, but generally starts by middle to late May in southern Wisconsin; later further north. Caterpillars are targeted when they are less than ½ inch long and when leaves on host trees are less than half size.

- At least 50% of the ground is covered by trees, and at least 50% of the trees present are preferred hosts (such as oak, aspen, and birch)
- At least 20 acres in size
- At least 500 gypsy moth egg masses per acre in residential areas

No, the DNR gypsy moth suppression program is voluntary. Anyone residing in a proposed spray block can request to have their property and a buffer zone excluded from treatment if an objection is filed prior to the county deadline.






- Native to Europe and Asia
- Introduced to North America in 1869 near Boston
- Now infests Maine south to North Carolina and northwest through Wisconsin
- Eastern Wisconsin is generally, and in some cases, highly infested and counties are under quarantine
- Caterpillars feed on leaves of up to 500 species of trees and shrubs, favoring oak
- Capable of defoliating several million acres in the United States each year
- Defoliated trees grow a new set of leaves, but are weakened and may be killed by othe pests

The first defoliation occurred in Wisconsin in 1999. Approximately 65,000 acres were defoliated in 2003, primarily in Marinette, Portage, and Waupaca counties. Gypsy mot populations have been low since 2004.

- Expense to homeowners of removing and replacing dead trees
- Potential decline in property values from tree loss
- Allergic reactions to caterpillar hair
- Nuisance of having thousands of caterpillars in the backyard
- Inspections and treatments for nursery and Christmas tree growers, timber interests, a paper companies shipping materials to non-infested areas
- Lost tourism dollars
- Environmental damage
- Caterpillars emerge in mid-May to early June and begin feeding
- Stop feeding and pupate, forming a cocoon-like shell in late June to mid-July
- Adult moths emerge from pupae, mate and die in mid-July to early August
- Eggs over-winter, protected in a blanket of hair from the female moth
- Each female lays an average of 600 eggs
- Gypsy moths thrive in many habitats because they are not picky eaters
- Because they're not native to North America, they have few natural enemies
- Egg masses are often deposited on man-made objects and moved into new areas
- Reduce gypsy moth populations and help prevent defoliation
- Facilitate cost sharing for the suppression treatments
- Slow the spread of the gypsy moth in the western part of the state
- Eradicate isolated populations in the western part of the state

Gypsy moth caterpillars feed on tree leaves. The most efficient and effective way to apply products to the tree canopy is by airplane. Aerial application uses less than a gallon of pesticide per acre, puts it in the tree canopy where the insects feed, and is far less expensive per acre than ground-based pesticide application.

Professional pilots who fly the pesticide spray planes are licensed and certified by the Federal Aviation Administration. They are also licensed and certified by the State of Wisconsin as commercial pesticide applicators. Wisconsin also accepts applicator licensing and certification from qualified states.


Businesses that provide aerial application of pesticides are also licensed by the State of Wisconsin. The companies that were awarded the spray contracts for the Gypsy Moth Program meet all of Wisconsin's strict requirements as pesticide applicators and as application businesses.


- Spray planes require special flight training
- The planes carry global positioning systems (GPS) for computercontrolled spraying precision
- While the spray planes are flying, they are monitored by observers in planes flown by pilots with the Wisconsin DNR

In recent years, public concern has increased about the possible use of spray planes as instruments of terrorism. The pilots and the Wisconsin Cooperative Gypsy Moth Program are aware of this concern and take extra precautions during gypsy moth treatments including:

- An established chain of custody from the product manufacturers to Wisconsin for all of the biological pesticides
- Securing pesticides according to the current pesticide law
- Identification requirements and restricted access to planes
- On-site security
- Notification of local law enforcement, local officials and local media
- Planes are secured or disabled when not in use

Bacillus thuringiensis var. kurstaki

Bacterial insecticide

Btk is grown from soil bacteria that occur naturally worldwide. It is cultured by fermenting grains and potatoes with fish or corn meal, similar to brewing beer. The final product contains 90% water, the leftover growth medium, carbohydrates, inert ingredients approved as food additives, and the active ingredient.

The active ingredient is a toxic protein produced by bacteria when the product is fermented. The protein destroys the caterpillar's gut, causing the insect to stop feeding and also allowing bacteria to infect it. The caterpillar typically dies within a few days.

Different strains of Bt affect different species of insects. The kurstaki strain affects the caterpillars of moths and butterflies that ingest it. Not all species of caterpillar are affected by Btk but gypsy moth, tent caterpillars, and Karner blue butterflies are all susceptible. We do not use Btk where we know there are Karner blue butterflies or other threatened or endangered species of moths and butterflies that could be harmed. Numerous studies have documented no serious harm to humans, pets, wild animals, birds or fish. As a commonsense precaution, people with compromised immune systems or those with chemical sensitivities or allergies should avoid exposure.

Btk is applied at the rate of 3/4 gallon per acre.

Most effective if applied when gypsy moth caterpillars have hatched and begun feeding, usually mid-May in southern Wisconsin through early June further north.

In 2007, Btk is proposed to be applied to roughly 950 acres in four Wisconsin counties as part of the DNR Suppression Program. Those counties are: Adams, Brown, Dane, Door, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Sauk, and Waushara.

- Breaks down in sunlight within days
- Highly effective; around 90% mortality of gypsy moth caterpillars in treated areas
- Generally harmless to people, animals, and insects other than caterpillars
- Readily available

RESOLUTION 56-07

DECLARING SAUK COUNTY'S SUPPORT OF A MORATORIUM ON ESTABLISHING OFF RESERVATION CASINO GAMBLING IN BELOIT, WISCONSIN

WHEREAS, the St. Croix and Bad River Bands of the Lake Superior Chippewa have partnered together and are seeking an off-reservation casino in Beloit, Wisconsin; and,

WHEREAS, the casino would be located more than 300 miles form their respective reservations in northwestern Wisconsin; and,

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Indian Affairs is required to measure the net economic impact of any off reservation casino to all Native Americans within the same marketplace; and,

WHEREAS, Section 4.7 of BIA's Environmental Impact Statement on the proposed Beloit Casino state that: "...the impact of competition on revenues of nearby tribal casino should not be discounted and could potentially be significant. This could translate to significant impacts to the abilities of competing tribes to provide government services to their members"; and,

WHEREAS, the Ho-Chunk Nation would experience a negative fiscal impact of \$32.7 million in addition to the loss of tens of millions of dollars in revenue and hundreds of jobs, many of those jobs being located in Sauk County; and,

WHEREAS, the Beloit Casino will further saturate an already saturated gaming economy in and around the Beloit area where there are currently 27 gaming facilities offering 33,240 slot and video machines and almost 1,130 table games within a 200 mile radius of the proposed Beloit Casino; and,

WHEREAS, the United States Department of the Interior is currently developing new regulations that will affect the processing of requests for new off reservation gambling casinos, and your undersigned Committee does believe that a moratorium should be adopted until the adoption of these new regulations to ensure that any application for off reservation casino gaming receives an appropriate level of scrutiny.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that Sauk County supports a moratorium on establishment of off-reservation casino gaming in Beloit, Wisconsin until such time as the Federal Government has promulgated new regulations concerning the establishment of new off reservation casino gaming facilities; and,

Recommendation: The four (4) bids for food product are relatively close. These bids represent the cost of all the food items used in the Dietary Dept. Using these cost figures we have an average food cost of about \$17,600 per month. There is a difference of \$546 between the high and low bids.

My recommendation of Sysco Foods is based on location to some degree. It is the only Sauk Co. vendor and is a strong company. It has the capability of delivering items quickly and meeting our requirements. This requirement would have to be drafted into our agreement if awarded to them. Verbally, they have agreed to respond positively to our orders and indicated that they have employees in the Reedsburg area who could make a delivery of small items to us as needed. We are also looking for quality without substituting and charging a higher price.

My recommendation is also based on Sysco Foods being a Sauk Co. vendor that pays taxes in our County. They are part of the tax base that shares in the cost of meeting our financial needs. With such a small difference in cost, I believe that consideration should be given to Sysco Foods.

- * With the exception of Part B pricing, per minute rate shall increase by 3% on the contract anniversary date to partially cover therapist wage inflation.

A review of the most common services provided to Medicare B patients reveals that costs will be very similar between the two companies. The noticable difference in price appears with patients who are not covered by Medicare B. Those services are all billed on a per minute basis and Synertx's rate is \$.27 cent per minute higher. In 2006, approximately 70% of the services were provided to patients who were covered by Medicare A. Using 2006 information, we expect that 171,000 minutes of physical and speech therapy will be provided to Medicare A patients in 2007. Aegis will charge us \$167,580 for that service. Synertx will charge us \$213,750 for the same number of minutes. The revenue we will receive from Medicare A will not change based on the expenses we incur.

Our past experience with Aegis Therapies has put us under a Medicare/Medicaid review whereas Synertx claims that they are not under a Medicare/Medicaid review in any of their locations.

Medicare reported that after reviewing the fourth quarter of 2006, we have a denial rate of 55%. Synertx claims that their denial rate is less than 1% of billings.

EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR CONTINUATION OF RAIL SERVICE
THROUGH THE BADGER ARMY AMMUNITION PLANT AND
FOR PRESERVATION OF A CONTIGUOUS RAIL CORRIDOR SERVING
THE SAUK PRAIRIE COMMUNITIES AND SUPPORT FOR A TRAIL ALONG
THE EXISTING RAIL ALIGNMENT THROUGH THE VILLAGES OF
SAUK CITY AND PRAIRIE DU SAC AND EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR
THE CONTINUATION OF RAIL SERVICE TO SAUK COUNTY

WHEREAS, continuation of active rail service is vital to the Sauk County economy, and economic development in the County is dependent upon rail freight service; and,

WHEREAS, Sauk County has consistently supported the continuation of rail service and the preservation of rail alignments where it is no longer feasible to continue active rail service; and,

WHEREAS, the uncertain future of energy sources makes rail a vital option for the future transportation needs of Sauk County; and,

WHEREAS, Sauk County has frequently been requested to state its position on the future of rail service through the Badger Army Ammunition Plant, the former railroad bridge at Sauk City, and a variety of other issues that are currently under study and consideration; and,

WHEREAS, the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac are desirous of converting the current unused rail line through the villages to a trail and the villages have also expressed concern regarding the return of active rail service through the center of the villages; and,

WHEREAS, the rail line through the Badger Army Ammunition Plant completes a through link between the mainline running from Madison to Reedsburg and State of Wisconsin owned right-of-way from Mazomanie to the Sauk Prairie community, and this link could become vital if the bridge at Merrimac was removed from service for whatever reason; and,

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee does believe it is imperative to maintain the option of future rail service to the Sauk Prairie communities as well as northern Sauk County; and,

WHEREAS, the reconstruction of U.S. Highway 12 presents an ideal time to consider the future alignment of rail to permit this through route to exist and that future rail service remains a viable option for the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that Sauk County hereby expresses its support for the following concepts:

Sauk County desires to go on record as supporting the preservation of the option of through rail service through Badger and around the edge of the Sauk Prairie communities that links the current mainline between Madison and Reedsburg through Merrimac and Baraboo and State of Wisconsin owned right-of-way running between Mazomanie to the Sauk Prairie communities; and,

B. Sauk County encourages the acquisition by WisDOT of the rail line through Badger as a rail easement over WDNR land, but is opposed to the transfer of this rail line from public ownership, and is opposed to the storage of rail cars at Badger or along this right-of-way,

or use of any rail facilities in Badger that are incompatible with the conservation vision for the property and the Badger Reuse Plan, with the expectation that the rail right-of-way will be utilized for the current and potential through transit of trains; and,

- C. Sauk County believes that the existing rail line through the Villages of Prairie du Sac and Sauk City is not the ideal location for a railroad right-of-way in the event that the bridge at Merrimac needs to be removed from service for some period of time, or it is otherwise desirable to return rail service to the Sauk Prairie area, and Sauk County urges that provisions be made to provide for a rail relocation as part of the Highway 12 bypass around the Villages or that some other plan for preservation of a contiguous line connecting northern Sauk County to State owned right-of-way be made as part of this planning process consistent with the comprehensive master plan of the Villages of Prairie du Sac, Sauk City and the Town of Prairie du Sac; and,
- D. Sauk County supports the creation of a trail through the Sauk Prairie communities on the current railroad right-of-way, with the retention of the right-of-way through the villages until such time that an alternate right-of-way is located around the Sauk Prairie communities, so as not to jeopardize the future of rail service to the Sauk Prairie area or through the Sauk Prairie area to northern Sauk County; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Sauk County makes the general statement that it supports the continuation of rail service to Sauk County where it currently exists and declares that continued rail service is vital to the communities of Baraboo, North Freedom, Rock Springs, Reedsburg and Spring Green and every effort needs to be made to ensure there is no disruption of this service in the future.
