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Resolution to Accept Department of Health Services Grant, Authorize the Creation of a Full-time Dementia Care/Independent Living Specialist Position and a Part-time Independent Living Coordinator Position and to Amend the 2023 Budget

Resolution offered by the Aging and Disability Resource Governing Committee, Finance Committee, and Personnel & Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Sauk County Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) was awarded the Independent Living Supports Pilot Grant from The State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services. This new program, awarded to 12 ADRCs and utilizes American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to assist individuals, who do not qualify for a Long-Term Care Program. The Pilot program allows participants income of up to 300% of federal poverty level, and assets are not considered. Recipients of the program will receive up to \$7,200 of home services for one year, bringing a total of \$2,008,800 into the county to be spent on supportive services for 279 participants. The grant officially begins March 1, 2023. Participant enrollment will begin June 2023 and will run to February 28, 2024, the grant ends March 1, 2025.

Staff will work one on one with participants developing a care plan, checking in during the period of the grant and work with the participant toward the end of their year of participation to consider private pay of future services, until they transition to a Long Term Care Program.

Currently the ADRC's Dementia Care Specialist (DCS) works half-time. The DCS hours will be expanded to full-time over the next two years of the grant. As the grant gains participants, the ADRC will hire another part-time staff for a portion of the grant period.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that effective immediately, the Dementia Care Specialist be reclassified to full-time to enable added job duties to coordinate the grant; and, the ADRC may hire a part-time Independent Living Specialist Supervision Coordinator when participation enrollment increased beyond the DCS staff full-time capacity caseload.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 2023 budget be amended to appropriate \$241,056.00 for the pilot grant budget. No levy is required.

Resolution to create the ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee.

Resolution offered by the Executive & Legislative Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Sauk County Rules of the Board for the 2022-2024 term, Rule VI. N. 4., requires that "E&L Committee shall begin review the County Board Rules in September of odd years for consideration for presentation at the October County Board Meeting." Over the years Sauk County has a developed a comprehensive set of Rules of the Board. To have a thorough review of the existing Rules of the Board, it is being proposed that an ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee be approved by the County Board. The ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee shall review the existing Rules of the Board and make recommendations for changes (if any), to the Executive and Legislative Committee at their regularly scheduled September Committee meeting. Upon filing their recommendations with the Executive & Legislative, the adhoc Rules of the Board Review Committee shall disband.

The ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee shall consist of five County Board Supervisors. The Supervisors to be appointed the ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee Supervisors Fordham, Eberl, Carver, McAuliffe, and McCumber. The Committee may call upon Department Heads and other staff to complete their assigned duties.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee is hereby created and may call upon Department Heads and staff for assistance in completing the duties of the Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee shall consist of Supervisors Fordham, Eberl, Carver, McAuliffe, and McCumber; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the ad-hoc Rules of the Board Review Committee is charged with the duty to review the current Sauk County Rules of the Board and make recommendations to the Executive and Legislative Committee no later than their regularly scheduled September meeting.

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Resolution to Authorizing the County to Enter Into the Settlement Agreements with Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Walgreen Co., Walmart, Inc., CVS Health Corporation and CVS Pharmacy, Inc., Agree to the Terms of the Addendum to the MOU Allocating Settlement Proceeds, and Authorize Entry Into the MOU with the Attorney General

Resolution offered by the Executive & Legislative Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: the County Board of Supervisors previously authorized the County to enter into an engagement agreement with von Briesen & Roper, s.c., Crueger Dickinson LLC and Simmons Hanly Conroy LLC (the "Law Firms") to pursue litigation against certain manufacturers, distributors, and retailers of opioid pharmaceuticals (the "Opioid Defendants") in an effort to hold the Opioid Defendants financially responsible for the County's expenditure of vast money and resources to combat the opioid epidemic. On behalf of the County, the Law Firms filed a lawsuit against the Opioid Defendants. The Law Firms filed similar lawsuits on behalf of 66 other Wisconsin counties and all Wisconsin cases were coordinated with thousands of other lawsuits filed against the same or substantially similar parties as the Opioid Defendants in the Northern District of Ohio, captioned In re: Opioid Litigation, MDL 2804 (the "Litigation"). four (4) additional Wisconsin counties (Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth) hired separate counsel and joined the Litigation.

Since the inception of the Litigation, the Law Firms have coordinated with counsel from around the country (including counsel for Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth Counties) to prepare the County's case for trial and engage in extensive settlement discussions with the Opioid Defendants. the settlement discussions with Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., Allergan Finance, LLC, Walgreen Co., Walmart, Inc., CVS Health Corporation and CVS Pharmacy, Inc.. (the "Settling Defendants") resulted in a tentative agreement as to settlement terms pending agreement from the County and other plaintiffs involved in the Litigation. Copies of the various settlement agreements relating to the Settling Defendants (collectively "Settlement Agreements") representing the terms of the tentative settlement agreements with the Settling Defendants have been provided with this Resolution. The Settlement Agreements provide, among other things, for the payment of certain sums to Participating Subdivisions (as defined in the Settlement Agreements) upon the occurrence of certain events detailed in the Settlement Agreements.

The County is a Participating Subdivision in the Settlement Agreements and has the opportunity to participate in the benefits associated with the Settlement Agreement provided the County (a) approves the Settlement Agreements; (b) approves the Memorandum of Understanding allocating proceeds from the Settlement Agreements among the various Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution (the "Allocation MOU"); (c) approves the Memorandum of Understanding with the Wisconsin Attorney General regarding allocation of settlement proceeds, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution (the "AG MOU"); and (d) the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance approves the terms of the Settlement Agreements and the AG MOU. 2021 Wisconsin Act 57 created Section 165.12 of the Wisconsin Statutes relating to the settlement of all or part of the Litigation. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance is required to approve the Settlement Agreements and the AG MOU. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the proceeds from any settlement of all or part of the Litigation are distributed 70% to local governments in Wisconsin that are parties to the Litigation and 30% to the State. Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4)(b)2. provides the proceeds from the Settlement Agreement must be deposited in a segregated account (the "Opioid

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100 101 Abatement Account") and may be expended only for approved uses for opioid abatement as provided in the Settlement Agreements. Wis. Stat. § 165.12(7) bars claims from any Wisconsin local government against the Opioid Defendants filed after June 1, 2021. The Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance is not statutorily authorized or required to approve the allocation of proceeds of the Settlement Agreements among Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions.

The Law Firms have engaged in extensive discussions with counsel for all other Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions resulting in the proposed Allocation MOU, which is an agreement between all of the entities identified in the Allocation MOU as to how the proceeds payable to those entities under the Settlement Agreements will be allocated. The proposed Addendum to the MOU ("Addendum") provided with this Resolution provides for allocation of settlement proceeds among the Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions according to the same percentages as that provided in the previously-approved MOU allocating the settlement proceeds of the settlements involving McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceuitca, Inc.. Further information on the essential terms of the Settlement Agreements, the deadlines related to the effective dates of the Settlement Agreements, the ramifications associated with the County's refusal to enter into the Settlement Agreements, the form of the Addendum, the form of the AG MOU, and an overview of the process for finalizing the Settlement Agreements may be found at https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/. The County, by this Resolution, shall deposit the proceeds of the Settlement Agreements consistent with the terms of this Resolution and Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4)(b).

Pursuant to the County's engagement agreement with the Law Firms, the County shall pay up to an amount equal to 25% of the proceeds from successful resolution of all or part of the Litigation, whether through settlement or otherwise, plus the Law Firms' costs and disbursements, to the Law Firms as compensation for the Law Firms' efforts in the Litigation and any settlement. The Law Firms anticipate making application to the national fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements seeking payment, in whole or part, of the fees, costs, and disbursements owed the Law Firms pursuant to the engagement agreement with the County. It is anticipated the amount of any award from the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements will be insufficient to satisfy the County's obligations under the engagement agreement with the Law Firms. The County, by this Resolution, and pursuant to the authority granted the County in the applicable Order emanating from the Litigation in relation to the Settlement Agreements and payment of attorney fees, shall authorize and direct the escrow agent responsible for the receipt and distribution of the proceeds from the Settlement Agreements to establish an account for the purpose of segregating funds to pay the fees, costs, and disbursements of the Law Firms owed by the County (the "Attorney Fees Account") in order to fund a local "backstop" for payment of the fees, costs, and disbursements of the Law Firms. In no event shall payments to the Law Firms out of the Attorney Fees Account and the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements exceed an amount equal to 25% of the amounts allocated to the County in the Addendum. The intent of this Resolution is to authorize the County to enter into the Settlement Agreements, the Addendum, and the AG MOU, establish the County's Opioid Abatement Account, and establish the Attorney Fees Account. The County, by this Resolution, shall authorize the County's Administrator to finalize and execute any escrow agreement and other document or agreement necessary to effectuate the Settlement Agreements and the other agreements referenced herein.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the County Board of Supervisors hereby approves:

 The execution of the Settlement Agreements and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Administrator or designee to execute same.

- 2. The final negotiation and execution of the Addendum in form substantially similar to that presented with this Resolution and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Administrator or designee to execute same upon finalization provided the percentage share identified as allocated to the County is substantially similar to that identified in the Addendum provided to the Board with this Resolution.
- 3. The final negotiation and execution of the AG MOU in form substantially similar to that presented with this Resolution and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Administrator or designee to execute same.
- 4. The execution by the Administrator or designee of any additional documents or agreements for the receipt and disbursement of the proceeds of the Settlement Agreements as referenced in the Addendum.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, all proceeds from the Settlement Agreements not otherwise directed to the Attorney Fees Account shall be deposited in the County's Opioid Abatement Account. The Opioid Abatement Account shall be administered consistent with the terms of this Resolution, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4), and the Settlement Agreements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County hereby authorizes the establishment of an account separate and distinct from any account containing funds allocated or allocable to the County which shall be referred to by the County as the "Attorney Fees Account." An escrow agent shall deposit a sum equal to up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the County's proceeds from the Settlement Agreements into the Attorney Fees Account. If the payments to the County are not enough to fully fund the Attorney Fees Account as provided herein because such payments are made over time, the Attorney Fees Account shall be funded by placing up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the proceeds from the Settlement Agreements attributable to Local Governments (as that term is defined in the Allocation MOU) into the Attorney Fees Account for each payment. Funds in the Attorney Fees Account shall be utilized to pay the fees, costs, and disbursements owed to the Law Firms pursuant to the engagement agreement between the County and the Law Firms provided, however, the Law Firms shall receive no more than that to which they are entitled under their fee contract when considering the amounts paid the Law Firms from the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements and allocable to the County. The Law Firms may make application for payment from the Attorney Fees Account at any time and the County shall cooperate with the Law Firms in executing any documents necessary for the escrow agent to make payments out of the Attorney Fees Account.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all actions heretofore taken by the Board of Supervisors and other appropriate public officers and agents of the County with respect to the matters contemplated under this Resolution are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

ADDENDUM TO WISCONSIN LOCAL GOVERNMENT MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

WHEREAS, the Local Governments entered into the MOU for purposes of memorializing their agreement surrounding, among other things, allocation of the proceeds of the settlements with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho- McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc.;

WHEREAS, the settlement discussions with Walgreens, Walmart, CVS, Teva, and Allergan resulted in tentative agreements as to settlement terms ("Settlement Agreements") pending agreement from the State of Wisconsin, the Local Governments and other parties involved in the Litigation; and

WHEREAS, the Local Governments intend this Addendum to the MOU to effectuate the terms of the Settlement Agreements and allocate the proceeds of the Settlement Agreements to each of the Local Governments in the same manner and same percentages as set forth in the MOU and Exhibit A thereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Local Governments enter into this Addendum to the MOU upon the terms described herein.

- 1. The Local Governments ratify, confirm and agree in all respects to the MOU. By this Addendum, the Local Governments agree that any and all proceeds of the Settlement Agreements defined herein shall be distributed, allocated and otherwise disposed of in the same manner as set forth in the MOU and Exhibit A thereto.
- 2. Nothing in this MOU is intended to alter or change any Local Government's right to pursue its own claim. Rather, the intent of this MOU is to provide a mechanism for the receipt and expenditure of Opioid Funds.
- 3. This MOU may be executed in counterparts. Electronic signatures shall in all respects be considered valid and binding.

WISCONSIN STATE-LOCAL GOVERNMENT MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FOR THE ALLOCATION OF OPIOID SETTLEMENT PROCEEDS

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin ("State"), its communities, and their people have been harmed by misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance committed by certain entities that engage in or have engaged in the manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution or dispensing of an opioid analgesic, specifically related to the covered conduct by Defendants *In re: Opioid Litigation*, MDL 2804 pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio ("Litigation");

WHEREAS, certain Wisconsin local governments identified on the attached Exhibit A ("Local Governments"), through their counsel, and the State of Wisconsin, through its Attorney General, are separately engaged in investigations, litigation, and settlement discussions seeking to hold the Defendants in the Litigation accountable for the damage caused by their misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance;

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin and the Local Governments share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of the misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance described above throughout the State of Wisconsin and in its local communities;

WHEREAS, the settlement discussions with Walgreens, Walmart, CVS, Teva, and Allergan ("Settling Defendants") resulted in tentative agreements as to settlement terms ("Settlement Agreements") pending agreement from the State of Wisconsin, the Local Governments and other parties involved in the Litigation;

WHEREAS, while the Local Governments and the State recognize that the sums which may be available from the aforementioned Settlement Agreements will likely be insufficient to fully abate the public health crisis caused by the Opioid epidemic, they share a common interest in dedicating the most resources possible to the abatement effort;

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin enacted Wis. Stat. § 165.12 which provides for an allocation of opioid settlement proceeds;

WHEREAS, the State and the Local Governments intend this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") to effectuate the terms of future Settlement Agreements arising out of the Litigation in a manner consistent with Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2); and

WHEREAS, this MOU does <u>not</u> supersede or alter any previously agreed upon MOU between the State and Local Governments related to the Litigation.

NOW, THEREFORE, the State and the Local Governments, enter into this MOU upon the terms described herein.

1. As used in this MOU, the term "Opioid Settlement Proceeds" shall mean all funds allocated by a Settlement Agreement ("Settlement Payments") to the State or Local

Governments for purposes of opioid remediation activities, as well as any repayment of those funds and any interest or investment earnings that may accrue as those funds are temporarily held before being expended on opioid remediation strategies. "Opioid Settlement Proceeds" do <u>not</u> include the "Additional Restitution Amount" (also known as additional remediation, or any other fund, proceed, or amount paid to States who did not utilize outside counsel), reimbursement of the United States Government, or separate funds identified in Settlement Agreements as direct or indirect compensation for a Party's litigation fees, expenses, and/or costs.

- 2. The Settlement Administrator shall directly distribute the Opioid Settlement Proceeds to the State and to Local Governments in such proportions and for such uses as set forth in this MOU.
- 3. Opioid Settlement Proceeds shall be allocated as follows: (i) 30% to the State of Wisconsin ("State Share"); and (ii) 70% to Local Governments ("LG Share"). Opioid Settlement Proceeds shall not be considered funds of the State or any Local Government unless and until such time as each annual distribution is made.
- 4. 100% of the "Additional Restitution Amount" shall be paid to the State and deposited with the Department of Health Services.
- 5. Except for Opioid Settlement Funds expended in payment of attorney fees as provided in Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6), all Opioid Settlement Proceeds, regardless of allocation, and the entire "Additional Restitution Amount," shall, consistent with Wis. Stat. § 165.12(3) and (4), and except as provided in Wis. Stat. § 165.12(5), be utilized only for purposes identified as approved uses for abatement in a Settlement Agreement.
- 6. If any portion of the LG Share is used for the payment of owed attorney fees as authorized under Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6), the Local Governments shall report to the Attorney General and the Joint Committee on Finance the amount of the payment(s) and provide the contract(s) under which the attorney fees are purportedly owed.
 - Notwithstanding any limitations or characterization of funds herein to the contrary, any payments for attorneys' fees and expenses may only be paid for out of the owing Local Governments' share.
- 7. The parties agree to comply with the terms of the Settlement Agreements, including but not limited to (a) a requirement that a certain percentage of the Settlement Payment be spent on remediation, and (b) that at least 70% of a Settlement Payment be used solely for future Opioid Remediation as defined by the Settlement Agreements.
- 8. The LG Share shall be paid to each Local Government by the Settlement Administrator based on the allocation created and agreed to by the Local Governments which assigns each Local Government a percentage share of the LG Share, less any applicable attorney fees as authorized under Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6) and referenced above.

- 9. Nothing in this MOU is intended to alter or change any Local Government's right to pursue its own claim. Rather, the intent of this MOU is to provide a mechanism for the receipt and expenditure of Opioid Settlement Proceeds. Notwithstanding the foregoing, only Local Governments who are Participating Subdivisions under a Settlement Agreement, and who agree to the terms of this MOU may directly receive Opioid Settlement Proceeds.
- 10. Notwithstanding any limitations or characterization of funds herein to the contrary, any payments for Local Government attorney's fees and expenses may be applied only to the LG Share or any Local Government share of the LG Share. The State shall have no responsibility for payment of attorneys' fees or litigation expenses.
- 11. The parties understand that the United States may claim a portion of the Opioid Settlement Proceeds for Medicaid reimbursement. The parties agree that, to the extent a claim for Medicaid reimbursement is made, the parties shall bear the liability for the reimbursement on a pro rata basis based upon the particular claims made by the United States related to the Medicaid reimbursement. The parties agree to meet, confer, and cooperate in good faith concerning the allocation of any such liability.
- 12. The Attorney General may extend this MOU to apply to future settlements with other entities who engage in or have engaged in the manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution or dispensing of an opioid analgesic, specifically related to the covered conduct by Defendants in the Litigation. To exercise this option, the Attorney General shall send written notice to counsel for the Local Governments. The Local Governments shall have 30 days from the date of the notice to express in writing any objection(s) to the extension of the MOU to the settlement(s). If any Local Government objects to the extension of the MOU to the settlement(s), it shall not be extended.

BACKGROUND: Sauk and Dane County have partnered to construct a bridge over the Wisconsin River that will link the Great Sauk State Trail (GSST) to the Walking Iron Trail. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation is offering grants for infrastructure related projects with a focus on alternative transportation methods, specifically including trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other forms of transportation. The Village of Sauk City recognizes that WisDOT reimburses project sponsors for the federal share up to 80% of the approved TAP project costs, up to the limit of the federal award amount. As a condition of applying for the TAP grant Sauk County and Dane County are responsible for the local match and any nonparticipating costs for this project. The Village of Sauk City, based in Sauk and Dane Counties, providing the 20% of local match dollars, has approved the Village Administrator to apply for the TAP grant.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that they support the Village of Sauk City in their application for a TAP grant; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Sauk County, along with Dane County, agrees to be responsible for the required 20% local match funds and non-participating costs.

Resolution to Authorize Participation in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Programs for Snowmobile Trails, ATV/UTV Trails and Off-Highway Motorcycle Events

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring and developing lands for public motorized trail and event use and these public motorized trails and events are eligible for grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). These programs fund 100% of the cost for the acquisition, development, insurance and maintenance of public trails and events. Funding for the programs comes from registration fees, a portion of tax on gasoline and user fees. Grant applications must be submitted by the local governing body to the DNR.

The development, maintenance, grooming and event planning of the snowmobile, all-terrain vehicles/utility task vehicles (ATV/UTV) and off-highway motorcycle (OHM) trails is managed through contracts with the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. and Driftless Dual Sport Riders, attached as Appendix A, Appendix B and Appendix C, respectively.

There are currently 215.5 miles of funded snowmobile trail in Sauk County, funded at \$300 per mile, with the grant program totaling \$64,650. Currently, there are approximately 0.59 miles of ATV/UTV trail in Sauk County, funded at \$800 per mile for summer use and \$300 per mile for winter use, with the grant program totaling \$649. There are no designated OHM trails in Sauk County, however, the OHM club annually hosts a riding event at an estimated cost of \$1,925.

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department (LRE) is primarily responsible for the financial administration of the grant programs. Other responsibilities include trail inspections, maintaining and updated contract with each club or association, applying for grant funding and verifying that all written and verbal permission from all landowners is obtained. Sauk County's existing liability insurance policy protects Sauk County's interest in providing snowmobile, ATV/UTV and OHM trails and events.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Parks Operations Coordinator and the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Director, under the discretion of the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Committee, be authorized to submit an application on behalf of the above mentioned clubs to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for any financial aid that may be available, submit reimbursement claims along with supporting documentation within proper timeframe of project completion dates, sign and submit documents and take necessary action to undertake, direct and complete the approved projects.

As part of the Master Plan process for White Mound County Park, public sentiment was to pursue updates to the equestrian campground. As part of the LRE budget, \$304,355 of ARPA funds were included for the design, engineering and reconstruction of the area.

Parkitecture + Planning, LLC was contracted to design and engineer the improvements. The project was released for bids, with three (3) bids received by the deadline and evaluated against the criteria in the Request for Bids. A complete list of bids received is attached as Exhibit A.

To reduce the financial impact, LRE staff will complete some of the improvements, which includes installation of highlines, signs, campsite markers, fire rings and picnic tables, contracting a well driller, assembly and installation of a mechanical building, construction of an enclosure fence and site restoration.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that a contract for equestrian campground improvements be awarded to Judd Excavating, LLC for said improvements in the amount of \$221,830, and the County Administrator is authorized to enter into an Agreement with Judd Excavating, LLC for equestrian campground improvements.

BACKGROUND: The Multi-Discharge Variance (MDV) program for phosphorus extends the timeline for Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (WPDES) permitted facilities complying with low-level phosphorus limits. In exchange, facilities commit to step reductions of phosphorus within their effluent and provide funding to address nonpoint sources of phosphorus from farm fields or other natural areas through the implementation of practices designed to improve water quality. Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department can assist in the implementation of these practices.

In December 2022, the department submitted the paperwork necessary to participate in the MDV program and accept funding per Sauk County Resolution No. 108-2022. Actual funding amounts did not become available until January 1, 2023. The original MDV funding amount was anticipated to be \$22,951; however, finalized funding amounts are now \$139,095.12.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to authorize the Director of Land Resources and Environment to accept multi-discharge variance funding and to:

- Submit watershed plans, annual reports, and other documentation required by the MDV Program to the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and
- Enter into cost-sharing agreement with landowners/operators to install best management practices utilizing MDV funding.

BACKGROUND: Sauk County owns and maintains over 196 miles of fiber optic network cable and conduit throughout the county. There are approximately 420 vaults along the fiber route. At each vault is tracer wire and a marking post identify the Sauk County vault location. The tracer wire follows the fiber to allow locating services to mark the county's fiber when a ticket is generated through Digger's Hotline. The tracing wire and vault markers are original to the fiber networks 2005 installation. Modern marking poles and connection points are needed to ensure a strong locating connection at each of the county's vault. Sauk County wrote a request for bid for the labor to install new marking posts and test stations at each of the county's approximate 420 vault locations. Sauk County will directly purchase the parts needed for each test station and vault marker and provide to the contractor chosen to install. The original budgeted for the projects was \$100,000.00. American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds are planned to be used to complete the project. When the materials (\$48,000.00) and labor (\$117,600.00) bids came in, the total needed to complete the project is \$165,600. Building Services is asking to also amend the current 2023 Building Services Capital Outlay budget to add \$65,600 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars planned to the current budget of \$100,000.
