RESOLUTION # 61-2026

Resolution to Terminate a Property Maintenance Management Agreement with the City of Baraboo for the Baraboo - Sauk County Campus

Resolution Offered by the Executive and Legislative Committee and Public Works and Infrastructure Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: With the scaling back of the UW-Platteville to the Thomas C. Pleger Science Building and the Aural M. Umhoefer Building, responsibilities for general maintenance of the remaining facilities were transferred to the UW Campus Commission. The Sauk County Board of Supervisors authorized the County Administrator in Resolution 39-2024 to include \$390,000 of general fund balance within the 2025 and 2026 Budget to assist in maintenance of the facilities. This assistance was to ensure that UW-Platteville remained on the campus to continue to provide educational opportunities for existing and future students.

The County to assist in covering the costs associated with these additional maintenance/operational responsibilities included \$390,000 in the 2025 Budget. Through the course of the first year, the County found that expenses to maintain the facilities far exceeded the original estimate. The 2026 Budget was adopted by the County Board included additional funding. \$428,187 in fund balance was included to continue efforts in this budget year. Despite the assistance, UW-Platteville announced their withdrawal in October 2025, with final classes being set for Spring 2026.

Parallel to these funding decisions, in order to further define the respective responsibilities of the County and the City, regarding maintenance and additional funding, a Property Maintenance Management Agreement has been created and accepted by the Campus Commission. A copy of the agreement is attached as Exhibit A.

Given the circumstances at the campus, with UW-Platteville ceasing operations; the authorization by the County Board to only provide additional funding for the 2025 and 2026 budget cycles; and the creation of a campus redevelopment plan with implementation timeline, the arrangement between the City and County needs to be re-evaluated. As such, notice was provided to the City of Baraboo on August 3, 2026. A copy of the notice is attached as Exhibit B. As the County considers its financial position heading into the 2027 budget, the County would need to terminate the existing agreement and work with the city and the Campus Commission to determine the future of operations and maintenance at the campus.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, who met in regular session, hereby approves the termination of the property maintenance and management agreement with the City of Baraboo for the Baraboo-Sauk County Campus; and

EXHIBIT A
CAMPUS PROPERTY MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT
AGREEMENT

Agreement between Sauk County ("County") and the City of Baraboo ("City") as follows:

WHEREAS, The County and City jointly own as tenants in common, the real estate, buildings, and other improvements generally recognized as the UW-Platteville Baraboo-Sauk County Campus ("Campus"), as described in the 1995 Intergovernmental Agreement between the City and County; and

WHEREAS, the University of Wisconsin – Platteville has reduced their use of Campus facilities, leaving vacant buildings and outdoor spaces for the County and City to manage; and

WHEREAS, the County has voluntarily agreed to assume services related to the maintenance of the Campus at its own expense, during the term of this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the County and City make this Agreement to define responsibilities between the parties with respect to maintenance of the Campus that have not previously been under the jurisdiction of the County and City.

NOW, THEREFORE, based on the good and valuable consideration stated herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

1. **Duties of County:** County shall provide the following services, related to the management of the Campus property:
 - A. Provide all routine property maintenance services such as:
 1. lawn care;
 2. landscaping;
 3. snow plowing;
 4. minor repairs, which are not complex and that restore a building item to a functional state by use of readily available parts focusing on minor replacement of worn-out or damaged building components through simple fixes;
 5. janitorial services; and
 6. use of County network to check HVAC controls and program doors and other building functions remotely.
 - B. Identify Capital improvements, which include the permanent alteration or upgrade to the property that enhances the property's value, its useful life, or adapts it for a new use, and recommend them to the Campus Commission for inclusion in their Capital Improvement Plan.
 - C. Provide the UW Baraboo-Sauk County Campus Commission (Commission) with monthly financial reports, which detail any long-term lease revenue received, staffing-related expenditures, and routine property maintenance expenditures.
 - D. Manage all Campus-use Lease Agreements of longer than fourteen (14) consecutive days. All leases of campus facilities of more than fourteen days shall be negotiated by the County and City Administrators or their designees and require approval of the Campus Commission.
 1. Rental fees for long-term leases shall reimburse the County for associated expenses incurred, which shall be set through the fee schedule.
 2. Remaining fees associated with the short-term rental of space shall be provided to the County as per Section 3 of this agreement.
2. **Duties of the City:**
 - A. Manage all short-term property rentals of 14 days or less through the City's Parks, Recreation, and Forestry Department. All damage deposits and rental fees shall be accounted for through the City's Finance Director/Campus Commission Fiscal Agent, reported monthly to the Campus Commission.

EXHIBIT A

1. Rental fees shall reimburse the City for associated expenses incurred, which shall be set through the fee schedule.
 2. Remaining fees associated with the short-term rental of space shall be provided to the County as per Section 3 of this agreement.
 - B. Provide part-time staff assistance in the opening/closing of buildings rented through the short-term rental system when opening, closing, or supervision is needed to cover weekends or other instances when County "flex-time" is not possible or would trigger overtime pay.
 - C. The short-term rental policy, damage deposit policy, and rates shall be reviewed and approved annually by the Campus Commission.
3. **Revenues:**
- A. Revenue from leases shall be used to reimburse the County for the routine property management expenses, as identified in this agreement. Payment shall be made to the County quarterly.
 - B. At the end of any fiscal year, should lease/rental income exceed the County's routine property management expenses, the excess shall be transferred to the Commission's capital improvement fund.
4. **Terms:**
- A. The Term of this agreement shall be from January 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025. This agreement will automatically renew for three (3) consecutive one (1) year terms. The City of Baraboo and Sauk County each have the option to opt out of this agreement, with a minimum of 90 days' notice before the end of the term.
5. **Notices.** Any legal notices required by this Agreement shall be made in writing to the address specified below:

- Nothing contained in this section shall be construed to restrict the transmission of routine communications between representatives of the parties.
6. **Insurance.** During the term of this Agreement, County and City shall maintain the following insurance:
1. Property insurance shall be maintained by the Campus Commission, to include coverage for buildings, personal property, and property in the open; at appropriate limits as set by the Campus Commission.
 2. Both the City and the County shall maintain insurance for the type and amount specified below to ensure that whether a claim arises against the City for its oversight through the rental program for the property or against the County for oversight through property maintenance related items, sufficient insurance is available to handle all claims.

EXHIBIT A

Worker's Compensation:

- a. Coverage A: Limits – Statutory
- b. Coverage B: Employer's Liability Limits
- c. Bodily Injury by Accident - \$100,000 each accident minimum
- d. Bodily Injury by Disease - \$100,000 each employee minimum
- e. Bodily Injury by Disease - \$500,000 policy limit minimum

Comprehensive General Liability Limits: \$1,000,000 bodily injury and \$1,000,000 property damage.

Automobile Liability Insurance, with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 for each person and \$1,000,000 for each accident.

Certificates of insurance are required for all policies. The Certificates of General and Automobile Liability Insurance must name the County as an additional insured on the policy and must require that a thirty (30) day cancellation notice be given to the County. An updated copy of the Certificate must be provided anytime a change is made to any policy.

- 7. **Subcontractors.** It is understood and agreed that the City and the County may contract with subcontractors who are not employees of County to complete some of the services performed hereunder. County shall remain responsible for all work completed and for all obligations under this Agreement, despite the fact that as a matter of law, subcontractors may also incur liability. The City and the County shall insure that all of its subcontractors comply with all requirements of this Agreement. Additionally, all subcontractors shall have insurance of the same types and in the same amounts required of County by this Agreement with the same provisions for naming the City and County as an additional insured and the same provisions for cancellation notice.
- 8. **Delay in Performance.** Neither party shall be considered in default of this Agreement for delays in performance caused by circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the nonperforming party. For purposes of this Agreement, such circumstances include, but are not limited to, abnormal weather conditions, floods, earthquakes, fire, epidemics, war, riots, and other civil disturbances, strikes, lockouts, work slowdowns, and other labor disturbances, sabotage, judicial restraint, and delay in or inability to procure permits, licenses or authorizations from any local, state or federal agency for any of the supplies, materials, accesses, or services required to be provided by either party under this Agreement. The nonperforming party shall be granted a reasonable extension of time for any delay in its performance caused by any such circumstances.
- 9. **Governing Law, Jurisdiction and Venue.** This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin. The parties hereby irrevocably submit to the jurisdiction of the state courts of the State of Wisconsin for the purpose of any suit, action or other proceeding arising out of or based upon this Agreement. The parties further agree that the venue for any legal proceedings related to this Agreement shall be Sauk County, Wisconsin.
- 10. **Survival.** The warranties, representations and covenants of this Agreement shall survive completion of the Services under this agreement or any termination of this Agreement.
- 11. **Waiver.** A waiver by either of the parties of any breach of this Agreement shall be in writing. Such a waiver shall not affect the waiving party's rights with respect to any other or further breach.
- 12. **Severability.** The invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement or the occurrence of any event rendering any portion or provision of this Agreement void shall in no way affect the validity or enforceability of any other portion or provision of this Agreement. Any void provision shall be deemed as severed from this Agreement and the balance of this Agreement shall be construed and enforced as if it did not contain the portion or provision held to be void. The provisions of this Article shall not prevent this entire Agreement from being void should a provision which is of the essence of this Agreement be determined void.

EXHIBIT A

12. **Integration.** This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the parties. It supersedes all prior and contemporaneous communications, representations, and agreements, whether oral or written, relating to the subject matter of this Agreement. Nothing in this contract, however, supersedes any prior Agreement, including the 1995 Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) and the duties cited therein for the City and County to act as tenants in common and contribute on an equal basis toward the approved annual budget. Any contributions over and above the approved annual budget, whether cash, capital equipment or improvements, or in-kind services, by either party, shall be treated as separate from the IGA.
13. **Assignment.** Neither party shall assign any rights or duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party and the Commission.
14. **Successors and Assigns.** The parties each bind themselves and their successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and, in the case of a partnership, the partners, to the other party to this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and partners of such other party in respect to all provisions of this Agreement.
15. **No Construction Against Either Party.** This Agreement is the product of negotiations between the parties and was either reached with the advice of legal counsel or the opportunity to obtain legal counsel and shall not be construed against either party.
16. **Multiple Originals.** This Agreement may be executed in multiple originals, each of which, together shall constitute a single agreement.
17. **Statutory Protections.** It is agreed by the parties that nothing in this Agreement, including but not limited to indemnification and hold harmless clauses, shall in any way constitute a waiver on the part of the City and County of any immunity, liability limitation or other protection available to the City and County under any applicable statute or other law. To the extent that any provision of this Agreement is found by any court of competent jurisdiction to conflict with any such legal protection, then whichever protections, either statutory or within the Agreement provide a greater benefit to the City and County shall apply unless the City and County elects otherwise.
18. **Open Records Law Compliance.** County and City understand and agrees that the provisions of the Wisconsin Open Records Law and other laws relating to public records apply to records kept by County and City. County and City agree to fully comply with such laws, and to cooperate with one another in its compliance with such laws. Cooperation shall include, but not be limited to, the provision of records, or copies of records to County or others upon the request of county. Compliance and cooperation of either party shall be at its sole cost and expense.
19. **Amendment.** No amendment of this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by all of the parties.
20. **Equal Employment Opportunity.** Should the County also have similar language under this section? Both the City and County hereby affirms their support of affirmative action and that it abides by the provisions of the "Equal Opportunity Clause" of Section 202 of Executive Order 11216 and other applicable laws and regulations. The City and County affirms their policies to recruit and hire employees without regard to race, age, color, religion, sex, sexual preference/orientation, marital status, citizen status, national origin or ancestry, presence of a disability or status as a veteran, including a veteran of the Vietnam era, membership in the national guard or reserve components of the military of the United States, political affiliation, or any other legally protected status. It is Contractor's policy to treat employees equally with respect to compensation, advancement, promotions, transfers and all other terms and conditions of employment. The City and County both, further affirm their completion of applicable governmental employer information reports including the EEO-1 and VETS-100 reports, and maintenance of a current Affirmative Action Plan as required by Federal regulations.
21. **Time of the Essence.** Except as otherwise specifically stated herein, time is of the essence with respect to all provisions of this contract that specify a time for performance.

Dear Administrator Young,

I hope you are doing well. I am reaching out regarding the existing Campus Property Maintenance/Management Agreement between Sauk County and the City of Baraboo. After reviewing our current budget situation, and the responsibilities outlined in the agreement, Sauk County has reached a point where its authority to continue funding at the service level defined in the agreement has been fully exhausted.

The two-year resolution adopted by the County Board to cover certain costs associated with UW-Platteville's presence on the campus has now expired. With the university no longer operating on the site, the underlying conditions that justified that temporary funding commitment have essentially been dissolved, leaving the County without any of the supplemental support that previously helped sustain the current maintenance structure.

Given these constraints, we believe it is both timely and necessary for the County and the City to revisit the terms of the agreement – particularly those related to the routine property maintenance services, short-term rental reimbursements, continued ask by organizations for long-term leases, and the overall cost-sharing expectations. The agreement does allow either party to opt out with appropriate notice, and although that is not our preferred path, we must acknowledge that termination may become necessary if we cannot reach a mutually acceptable agreement.

With that in mind, we respectfully request a conversation at your earliest convenience to discuss potential renegotiation. Particularly, with the need to propose, review, and adopt a campus budget at the upcoming commission meeting on August 20th. Our goal remains to work collaboratively as co-owners of the campus and to identify a sustainable approach that reflects both parties' fiscal realities while preserving essential property maintenance services.

Please let us know a few dates and times that work for you, and we will gladly coordinate. We appreciate your partnership and look forward to discussing a productive and fiscally responsible path forward.

Resolution to Establish the 2027 and 2028 Health Insurance Program for Sauk County.

Resolution offered by the Finance, Personnel and Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

The employee health insurance program currently consists of two plan design options (HMO and POS) which are offered to eligible employees. Currently the financial responsibility is 88 percent of the least expensive plan option for single or family coverage for category 1 benefits and 67.5 percent of the least expensive plan option for single or family coverage for category 2 benefits.

Sauk County's medical renewal was actively marketed to all major regional carriers. Dean Health Plan was the only carrier that provided a competitive renewal quote. The County Administrator and Human Resources Director reviewed plan design options for 2027 and determined changes be made to move closer in line with the market while not losing the competitiveness of the plan designs currently offered.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to establish the health insurance program for Sauk County, offering the following changes to its current plan design:

- Add a High-Deductible Health Plan (HDHP) partnered with a Health Savings Account (HSA).
 - Deductibles \$2,000 (single) / \$4,000 (family)
 - Sauk County will contribute \$1,500 for a single plan and \$3,000 for a family plan in 2027. Employees can choose to contribute additional money up to the IRS limits. 2028 contributions have not yet been determined.
- Align Point of Service (POS) plan copays to match the HMO plan.
- Increase HMO and POS plan deductibles to \$750 (single) / \$1,500 (family) and out of pocket maximums to \$2,000 (single) / \$4,000 (family).
- Change the county's contributions to medical plans
 - Category 1 from 88 percent to 87 percent
 - Category 2 from 67.5 percent to 67 percent

The county will be financially responsible for 87 percent (for category 1 benefits) and 67 percent (for category 2 benefits) of the total premiums for the HMO plan and HDHP. The County's financial responsibility for the POS plan shall be limited to 87 percent of the HMO plan for single or family coverage for category 1 benefits and 67 percent of the HMO plan for single or family coverage for category 2 benefits.

Dean's renewal includes guarantees into 2028 with a 15.9% rate cap.

ORDINANCE AMENDMENT # 7-2026**

Ordinance to amend the Sauk County Zoning Code to enact an 18-month moratorium on receipt of applications and the granting of all zoning permits or approvals for the siting or placement of data centers.

Ordinance offered by the Land Resources and Extension Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: This ordinance is enacted pursuant to the authority granted by the Wisconsin Statutes, including, but not limited to, Wis. Stat. § 59.69(4). The purpose of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the residents of Sauk County. In the interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance will be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of the public health, safety, convenience, and general welfare, and will be liberally construed in favor of the County and will not be construed to be a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by Wis. Stats. and possessed by the County.

This ordinance is further intended to control or lessen congestion in the rights-of-way; to secure safely from fire, panic, and other dangers; to promote adequate light and air; to manage growth and the impact of land development; to encourage protection of ground and surface water and other natural resources; to preserve productive farmland; to preserve the County's rural character; to prevent overcrowding of land; to preserve, protect, and promote property values; to promote high quality and lasting community design; to clearly present land development opportunities and the review process; and to facilitate adequate provision of transportation, water, sewerage, educational institutions, parks, and other public facilities. The ordinance is also purposed with following the Sauk County Land and Water Resource Management Plan and Farmland Preservation Plan. The ordinance is adopted to implement the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan; and incorporate any comprehensive plans adopted by townships subject to County Zoning authority.

Notwithstanding any other provision in the Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance, there shall be a moratorium on the receipt of applications and the granting of all zoning permits or approvals for the siting, placement, or construction of data centers. For the purposes of this ordinance, a data center is any facility housed in one or more structures with the primary use of storage, management, processing, and/or transmission of digital data, and housing computer and/or network equipment, systems, servers, appliances and other air handlers, power generators, water cooling and storage facilities, utility substations, and other associated utility infrastructure to support sustained operations. It may also contain accessory office uses necessary to monitor and manage sustained operations. This moratorium is to allow Sauk County time to fully explore, analyze, and research the possible environmental, economic, public health, safety, and general welfare effects of data centers, establish consistent zoning and regulatory standards to be applied, and allow data centers to be addressed as part of the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan. The moratorium shall be in effect for a period of eighteen (18) months from the date this ordinance is published (*i.e.* its effective date) or until the County Board adopts amendments to this ordinance or rescinds this moratorium. The moratorium enacted is not intended to be, and does not, constitute a "development moratorium" as that term is defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.1002(1)(b).

Due to the comprehensive rewrite and reenactment of the Sauk County Zoning Code, there are two versions of the Zoning Code in effect. The Sauk County Zoning Code existing prior

to the reenactment will remain in effect for one year in any town that was subject to the prior ordinance, or the new ordinance is adopted by that town via a resolution, whichever is sooner. This moratorium is to be enacted in both the Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance amended on March 21, 2017, pursuant to Ord. No. 3-17 and the reenacted Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance amended on September 15, 2026, pursuant to Ord. No. 8-26.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. This ordinance will establish a moratorium to allow Sauk County time to fully explore, analyze, and research the possible environmental, economic, public health, safety, and general welfare effects of data centers and to develop reasonable zoning and regulatory standards to be applied to data centers consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.

Section 4. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69(4), Sauk County enacts a moratorium on the receipt of applications for and the granting of all zoning permits for the siting, placement, or construction of data centers. The moratorium shall be in effect for a period of 18 months from (effective date of the ordinance) or until it is rescinded, whichever is earlier.

Section 5. For the purposes of this ordinance, a data center is any facility housed in one or more structures with the primary use of storage, management, processing, and/or transmission of digital data, and housing computer and/or network equipment, systems, servers, appliances and other air handlers, power generators, water cooling and storage facilities, utility substations, and other associated utility infrastructure to support sustained operations. It may also contain accessory office uses necessary to monitor and manage sustained operations.

Section 6 This ordinance will enact a moratorium for the Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance adopted on March 21, 2017 pursuant to Ord. No. 3-17 and the reenacted Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance adopted September 15, 2026, pursuant to Ord. No. 8-26.

Section 7. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Ordinance to repeal and reenact a comprehensive rewrite of the Sauk County Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance, and to Amend Section 20.07(3), Chapter 20 Uniform Citation Ordinance

Ordinance offered by the Land Resources and Extension Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: This ordinance is enacted pursuant to the authority granted by the Wisconsin Statutes, including, but not limited to, Wis. Stat. § 59.69, 59.691, 59.693, 59.694, 59.696, 59.697, 59.698, 59.70, 66.1001, and Chapters 91, 236, and 823. The purpose of the ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the residents of Sauk County. In the interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance will be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of the public health, safety, convenience, and general welfare, and will be liberally construed in favor of the County and will not be construed to be a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by Wis. Stats. and possessed by the County.

This ordinance is further intended to control or lessen congestion in the rights-of-way; to secure safely from fire, panic, and other dangers; to promote adequate light and air; to manage growth and the impact of land development; to encourage protection of ground and surface water and other natural resources; to preserve productive farmland; to preserve the County's rural character; to prevent overcrowding of land; to preserve, protect, and promote property values; to promote high quality and lasting community design; to clearly present land development opportunities and the review process; and to facilitate adequate provision of transportation, water, sewerage, educational institutions, parks, and other public facilities. This ordinance is also purposed with following the Sauk County Land and Water Resource Management Plan and Farmland Preservation Plan. This ordinance is adopted to implement the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan; and incorporate any comprehensive plans adopted by townships subject to County Zoning authority. Significant changes were made to the ordinance (Appendix A) to update regulations with state code and to address changing land use patterns. Alterations include but are not limited to the addition of the new limited commercial and public open space zoning districts, accessory dwelling units, adult establishments, special events and temporary land use permits; and, rewritten sections such as agricultural tourism, renewable energy, vegetative screening, illumination, parking, and signage.

Due to the number of changes, the amendment to the ordinance is considered a comprehensive rewrite pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69 in which the ordinance is repealed and reenacted. The Sauk County Zoning Ordinance existing prior to this reenactment will remain in effect for one year in any town that was subject to the prior ordinance or until this ordinance is adopted by that town via a resolution, whichever is sooner. With the repeal and reenactment of Chapter 7, additions are needed to update Chapter 20 to allow enforcement and compliance.

**NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES
ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Chapter 7 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is repealed and reenacted as seen in appendix A and Chapter 20 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

(3) (a) Chapter 7: Zoning Ordinance amended March 21, 2017, Ord. No. 3-17; pursuant to Section 7.155 which authorizes penalties of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00.

CHAPTER 20 UNIFORM CITATION¹

Sec. 20.01. Authorization and purpose.

This ordinance is created pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 66.0113, which provides for a County ordinance to authorize the use of a citation to be issued for violations of ordinances, including ordinances for which a statutory counterpart exists.

Sec. 20.02. Citation form.

The citation used pursuant to this ordinance shall substantially conform to Wis. Stats. § 66.0113. Each agency authorized to issue these citations shall be responsible for their acquisition, distribution, issuance and the final disposition of actions resulting therefrom.

Sec. 20.03. Schedule of forfeitures and cash deposits.

The attached schedule of forfeitures, as amended from time to time, is hereby incorporated as if fully set forth herein and any person issued a citation for violations of any provision listed in this schedule shall be required to submit as a cash deposit the amount of the forfeiture and in addition, the penalty assessment imposed by Wis. Stats. § 757.05, the jail assessment imposed by Wis. Stats. § 302.46, the automation fee imposed by Wis. Stats. § 814.635, the court support fee imposed by Wis. Stats. § 814.634, court costs imposed by Wis. Stats. § 814.60 et seq., and any other fee or assessment imposed by the Wisconsin Statutes for that offense, to the Sauk County Clerk of Courts, Courthouse, Baraboo, Wisconsin 53913, or a personal appearance shall be required at the time and date shown on the citation.

Sec. 20.04. Persons authorized to issue citations.

In addition to regularly designated law enforcement officers of Sauk County, the Board of Supervisors may designate by resolution other officials who may issue citations, and may revoke the authority by resolution.

Sec. 20.05. Prosecution of ordinance violations.

Except as otherwise provided by law, the Sauk County District Attorney shall prosecute all alleged County traffic actions and actions concerning violation of County ordinances which are in conformity with state criminal laws and the courts of Sauk County. The Sauk County Corporation Counsel shall prosecute those actions which are outside the scope of the duties of the Sauk County District Attorney pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 978.05(2).

Sec. 20.06. Relationship to other laws.

The adoption and authorization for use of a citation under this chapter shall not preclude the governing body from adopting any other ordinance or providing for the enforcement of any other law or ordinance related to the same or any other matter. The issuance of a citation under this chapter shall not preclude the proceeding under any other ordinance or law relating to the same or any other matter. The proceeding under any other ordinance or law relating to the same or any other matter shall not preclude the issuance of a citation under this chapter.

Sec. 20.07. Schedule of forfeitures.

Pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 66.0113(1)(c), the following schedule of forfeitures is hereby established for violations of the stated County ordinance for which a citation is issued under the authority of this chapter. The cash deposit will be the amount of the forfeiture plus any fee or assessment imposed by state statute. Deposits may be made in cash, personal check, or money order. Checks and money orders shall be made payable to the Sauk County Clerk of Courts. The officer who issues the citations may accept the deposit from the cited person but shall thereafter forward the deposit along with the citation to the clerk of courts. In all cases, an official who accepts a cash deposit shall issue a receipt for the cash deposit.

Significant changes were made to the ordinance- to update regulations with state code and to address changing land use patterns. Alterations include but are not limited to the addition of the new light commercial and public open space zoning districts, accessory dwelling units, adult establishments, special events and temporary land use permits; and rewritten sections such as agricultural tourism, renewable energy, vegetative screening, illumination, parking, and signage. A copy of the amended Chapter 7 Zoning Ordinance may be accessed online at bit.ly/SaukCountyZoning or in person at the Land Resources and Environment office, located in the Sauk County West Square Building.

LAND RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENT

Whenever "escrow" is referred to in any Land Resources and Environment Fee Schedule, it shall mean that the applicant shall sign an escrow agreement and pay the required escrow before the project/application request commences. Applicants are responsible for the actual costs incurred, regardless of the outcome of a project or application request. Actual costs consist of planning, engineering, and legal services provided by consultants on behalf of the Department. If at any time actual costs should exceed the escrowed amount, the applicant shall remit additional funds into the escrow fund when requested by the County. If the applicant fails to replenish the escrow as requested, the County may stop reviewing the application until such time as the escrow is replenished. Any remaining funds in the escrow at the conclusion of the project shall be refunded to the applicant when all actual costs are paid.

Resolution Authorizing Submission of the Lake Monitoring and Protection Network Grant Application

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Extension Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Being fortunate to have an abundance of water resources, Sauk County recognizes the negative impacts aquatic invasive species can have on rivers, lakes, and streams. Prevention measures along with outreach and educational programming are critical components to protecting our water resources. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources administers the Lake Monitoring and Protection Network (LMPN) grant program that supports efforts to protect water resources, including watercraft inspection, monitoring, and early detection of aquatic invasive species, and other activities related to aquatic invasive species prevention.

Each year, a predetermined funding amount is allocated to each county and counties have the option to receive the funds directly or designate an agent to accept those funds and implement these activities on the county's behalf. The Upper Sugar River Watershed Association (USRWA) acts as the designated agent for Sauk County, utilizing the funding to provide invasive species outreach and education to Sauk County residents. A Cooperative Agreement is attached (Exhibit A), which outlines the responsibilities of the county and USRWA. In order for USRWA to receive LMPN funds, Sauk County must submit a Lake Monitoring and Protection Network grant application.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, authorizes the Administrator to submit the Lake Monitoring and Protection Network grant application.

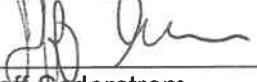

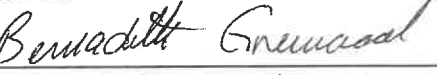

**Scope of Work/Cooperative Agreement for
[Sauk County]
Calendar Years 2025-2027**

Term of Agreement: January 1, 2025 – December 31, 2027

A. General Purpose

Designated agent – Cooperative agreement

This Agreement documents the manner in which the Upper Sugar River Watershed Association (hereafter “agent” or agent name) will provide core Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Prevention and Citizen Lake Monitoring Network (CLMN) services in the coverage area during the Term of Agreement referenced above. The coverage area includes the following counties: Iowa, Grant, Green, Lafayette, and Sauk.

- i. Sauk County designates Upper Sugar River Watershed Association as its agent.
- ii. All parties agree to meet annually to plan, prioritize, and coordinate project activities.
- iii. During the period of the contract, the agent shall maintain the following types of insurance and provide Sauk County with proof of insurance. The Certificates of General and Automobile Liability Insurance shall name Sauk County as an additional insured on the policies.
 1. Worker’s Compensation:
 - a. Coverage A: Limits – Statutory
 - b. Coverage B: Employer’s Liability Limits
 - c. Bodily Injury by Accident - \$100,000 each accident minimum
 - d. Bodily Injury by Disease - \$100,000 each employee minimum
 - e. Bodily Injury by Disease - \$500,000 policy limit minimum
- iv. Comprehensive General Liability Limits: \$1,000,000 bodily injury and \$1,000,000 property damage.
- v. Automobile Liability Insurance, with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 for each person and \$1,000,000 for each accident.
- vi. Professional Liability Insurance, with a limit of \$1,000,000 annual aggregate.

B. Goal of Upper Sugar River Watershed Association

To improve surface water quality through the detection, prevention, and monitoring of AIS and lake water quality conditions.

C. Duties of Upper Sugar River Watershed Association

In cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Upper Sugar River Watershed Association agrees to continue to implement an AIS Prevention and Outreach Program throughout Sauk County. Upper Sugar River Watershed Association will perform the following:

Services to be performed:

Prepare reports and disseminate reports and results.

Submit [1] progress reports to DNR AIS Biologist.

Designated Agents: Submit [1] progress reports to counties involved

Submit final report to DNR.

- a. Before finalizing the progress and final report, send a copy to the DNR AIS Biologist overseeing the grant for review.

Submit final reimbursement request to Environmental Grant Specialist (EGS) and Cc DNR AIS Biologist on [Form 8700-001](#) no later than 60 days after the end of this agreement.

Enter SWIMS data.

Facilitate and ensure entry of all data into Surface Water Integrated Monitoring System (SWIMS) for applicable Lake Monitoring and Protection Network (LMPN) activities is completed per annual reporting requirements and by end of grant period:

- a. Progress reports and final reports, once approved by the DNR AIS Biologist, will be uploaded to the LMPN SWIMS project by the county or agent for each year.
- b. Activities performed as part of Clean Boats Clean Waters (CBCW), Citizen Lake Monitoring Network (CLMN), Purple Loosestrife Beetle (PLB), and/or Snapshot Day may have earlier time requirements for data entry.
- c. All other activities which involve data entry into SWIMS must be entered by end of grant period.

Implement statewide communication and education priorities to ensure consistent AIS messaging.

- a. Work with DNR and UW Madison, Division of Extension in implementation of the Wisconsin Statewide Aquatic Invasive Species Management Plan.
- b. Collaborate with DNR on delivery of consistent project communication, outreach, and educational programming.

- c. Coordinate with DNR staff and other local partners within the county to share LMPN AIS prevention and education efforts.

Complete a DNR-approved training program for any network activities the county or agent are approved to carry out, including collecting, reporting, and interpreting water quality, aquatic invasive species, or watercraft inspection data.

Training sessions include:

- a. Clean Boats, Clean Waters (CBCW) trainings, if applicable
- b. CLMN trainings, if applicable
- c. Purple Loosestrife Biocontrol trainings, if applicable
- d. Snapshot Day, if applicable
- e. Project Red, if applicable
- f. Participate in AIS Early Detection Monitoring, if applicable
- g. Participate in DNR training on AIS Response Framework

Attend DNR meetings and annual AIS and Lakes & Rivers Partnership events including, but not limited to:

- a. AIS Partnership meetings in spring and fall (potentially one in-person, one virtual)
- b. Wisconsin Lakes and Rivers Partnership monthly meetings (AIS-focused meetings required; others optional).
- c. Participate in meetings with DNR to discuss agreement scoping, coordination/planning, agreement accomplishments, and financial status.

Adhere to decontamination and disinfection protocols required by the DNR for controlling, transporting, and disposing of aquatic plants and animals, and moving water.

- a. This includes requirements under s. 30.07, Wis. Stats., and chs. NR 19.055 and NR 40.07, Wis. Adm. Code, as well as compliance with the most recent DNR approved '[Boat, Gear, and Equipment Decontamination and Disinfection Protocol](#)'.

Retain, for a period of six years after the end date of this agreement, all project records, including proof of payments and proof of purchases, and monitoring data sheets to support events/tasks undertaken as part of this agreement.

Records shall include:

- a. Training sessions attended.
- b. Training sessions held and names of participants attending.
- c. Meetings with stakeholders and/or partner groups.
- d. AIS outreach activities and any monitoring data sheets.
- e. Media contacts.

Activities to be performed: Check all activities for participation in 2025-2027

Participate in a DNR-approved watercraft inspection program.

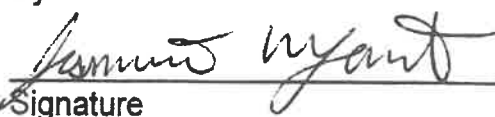

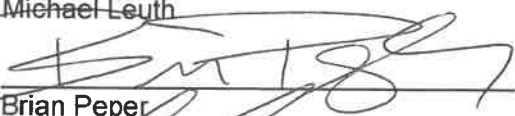

Resolution to Restructure the Fee Schedule for Civil Process Fees in the Sauk County Sheriff's Office Effective January 1, 2027.

Resolution offered by the Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Sauk County Sheriff's Office charges fees associated with civil process service as authorized in Wisconsin Statute §814.70. Our current fee schedule has been in effect since January 1, 2015. Wisconsin Statute §814.705(1)(a) authorizes the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to establish the fee schedule. The current fee schedule, which has been in place for over eleven years, no longer reflects the actual operational cost of the service provided. For that reason, it is requested that the fee for paper service be increased from \$60 to \$100 and the fee for writs and executions be increased from \$90 to \$125. These rates more accurately reflect the costs associated with civil process expenses and are more closely aligned with comparable neighboring counties. Our fees include up to 3 attempts and mileage.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, and directs the Sauk County Sheriff be authorized and directed to collect the fee of \$100 for paper service and \$125 for writs and executions, plus additional deputy hours and expenses when necessary effective January 1, 2027.

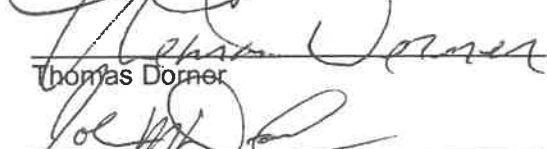

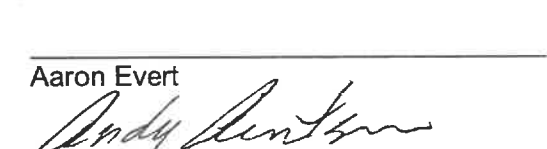

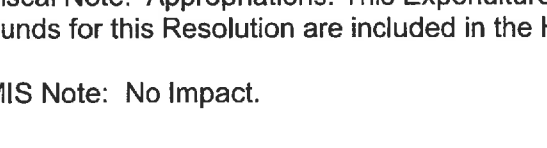
