7	RULE I. BOARD ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS.

 RULE II. AGENDA.

- A. As provided by statute, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors ("Board") shall organize on the third Tuesday of April in even numbered years. and adopt rules and regulations for the ensuing term by a majority vote of the board. Regular and special meetings of the Board shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 59.11. The Board shall hold an annual meeting on the Tuesday after the second Monday of November in each year for the purpose of transacting business and the adoption of the budget. When the day of the meeting falls on November 11, the meeting shall be held on the next succeeding day.
- B. The Chairperson of the County Board ("Chair") and Vice-Chairperson shall be elected biennially by the Board at the April meeting in even-numbered years. A majority vote of the total elected Supervisors is required to elect the Chair and Vice-Chair (e.g. 31 districts in Sauk County, 16 votes required regardless of number of Supervisors in attendance at meeting). Furthermore, any Supervisor may request removal of the Chair or Vice-Chair and new elections for a new Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson or both under item 13 of the regular Board meeting agenda, provided such request is placed with the County Clerk and County Administrator pursuant to the provisions of III. A. Such officers shall take office upon election. If the former Chair is considering running for reelection, the Chair shall turn the meeting over to the Vice-Chair to chair the meeting during the election of the chair. If the Chair and Vice-Chair are both running for election to Chair, the meeting shall be chaired by the Corporation Counsel until a new Chair is elected. No Supervisor may be elected as Chairperson for more than two (2) consecutive terms.
- C. The Board shall meet regularly in the County Board Room on the third Tuesday of each month except as provided in Rule I.A. above. Regular meetings of the full Board shall commence at 6:00 P.M. Any vote to adjourn to a different time or place for convening a regular meeting shall require approval by two-thirds of the members present.
- D. The Chair shall preserve order and decorum. The Chair may speak to points of order in preference to other members, and shall recite questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board by any two members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the Board. He or she shall vote on all roll calls, except upon appeals from his or her own decision. The Chair may NOT participate in debate or discussion unless he or she steps down from the Chair and assumes their regular seat (the Vice-Chair would then run the meeting) then following the same rules as any other Supervisor.
- E. The Board aspires to encourage appropriate dress by board members that reflects the professionalism of the Board. Business casual or more formal attire is encouraged.
- F. All comments, debates and discussions shall be appropriate and to the point of the topic under discussion, and conducted in a manner that is civil, and respectful of all concerned.
- G. A Special Meeting of the Board shall be held in accordance with the provisions set forth in 59.11 (2). A Supervisor may signify agreement to a request by email, delivered to the Clerk via County email from a Supervisor's official Sauk County email address to the Clerk's official email address. Furthermore, the Clerk may notice a Special Meeting by email. Personal email accounts, SMS or other electronic messages are not acceptable
- A. The order of business of Board meetings shall be as stated on the agenda for each session. The agenda shall jointly be the responsibility of the Chair, the County Administrator and the County Clerk. The agenda shall be circulated to the Board not less than two business days before each meeting.

RULE III. RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES.

A. All proposed Board agenda items shall be submitted in writing to the County Clerk and County Administrator by 4:30 p.m. on the Tuesday preceding the next regular meeting of the Board. The County Administrator is responsible for the referral and routing of all proposed resolutions and other items to come before a committee and the Board. Except as otherwise provided, all proposed Board agenda items shall be referred to each standing committee with subject matter jurisdiction prior to placement on the Board agenda for discussion, report, and recommendation. Any Supervisor may also

present a proposed resolution or agenda item for consideration by the full Board utilizing one of the following processes:

1. A Supervisor may request the committee chairman to place a proposed resolution or other item on the agenda of the next regular meeting of a committee of which he is a member; or

2. A Supervisor may request the County Administrator to refer a proposed resolution or item to the appropriate committee for consideration at its next regular meeting, if the requestor is not a member of that committee.

All business referred to a committee by the Board shall be taken up before the next regular Board meeting whenever possible. The Board may, by majority vote, recall any matter referred to a committee and refer the matter to another committee or take other appropriate action thereon. A Supervisor wishing to so recall an item from Committee must notify the County Administrator by the time set forth in III. A. so the proposed action may be properly included on the Board agenda. Supervisors are strongly encouraged to consider the recommendation of the committee prior to requesting a proposed resolution or item be placed on the agenda as the lack of committee support would be indicative of the proposed resolution's or item's feasibility.

B. Items may be included on the general consent portion of the agenda provided the matter was unanimously adopted by the sponsoring committee and the matter under consideration has no financial or public policy impact and is of a non-controversial nature. No ordinance shall be included in the general consent portion of the agenda. When the general consent portion of the agenda is placed before the Board for consideration, the Chair shall ask if any member of the Board objects to any item being considered by general consent. Any item placed on the general consent portion of the agenda may be placed under the new business portion of the agenda, and considered separately, upon the request of any supervisor, and without a motion and second, provided such request is made prior to a vote on the general consent portion of the agenda by the Board. If there is no objection to any item, the Chair will request a motion to approve the general consent portion of the agenda. All items in the general consent portion of the agenda may be approved by voice vote. Any member may request and shall be granted a recorded vote without a motion or second provided such request is made prior to the Chair's request for a motion to approve the consent agenda.

C. It shall be the responsibility of the sponsoring committee or supervisor to have the matter prepared in the form to be acted on and to have a fiscal note attached. All resolutions involving the expenditure or receipt of funds shall carry a fiscal note using a form approved by the Finance Committee which details the resolution's impact upon County finances approved and initialed by the Finance Director, Accounting Manager or County Administrator. In addition to the fiscal note, all resolutions shall contain a Management Information Systems (MIS) Note, and shall be reviewed by Corporation Counsel and approved as to form prior to inclusion in the agenda. A resolution lacking a fiscal note, MIS note, or legal review by Corporation Counsel shall not be considered by the Board. The background clause of any resolution or ordinance shall contain information sufficient to provide the purpose and need for the resolution or ordinance.

D. The Chair may immediately refer any matter not considered and reported to the Board by a committee to the appropriate committee without motion if there is no objection to referral. If objection is made, referral of the matter shall be immediately placed before the Board for vote and shall only be referred upon a majority vote of the members present and voting. Resolutions brought forward by individual supervisors must be presented to all committees having jurisdiction over the proposed matter as detailed above.

E. The County Board shall send a special advisory referendum question to the County Clerk

for placement on the next spring or fall ballot only if a supervisor submits the question in writing to the Board not less than one-hundred-twenty (120) days prior to the date of the next election and the question is approved for ballot placement by a two-thirds (2/3rds) vote of the Board.

RULE IV. ORGANIZATION.

A. In addition to presiding at meetings, the supervisor elected Chair by the Board, pursuant to Rule I.B., shall upon election, assume all the responsibilities and perform all duties required of the Chair, pursuant to applicable State Statutes and these Rules, until the Board elects a successor.

 B. In case of the absence or inability of the Chair for any meeting, the Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair. In case of the absence or inability of both the Chair and Vice-Chair for any meeting, the members shall choose a temporary Chair by a majority vote of the members present. In the case of the permanent absence or inability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and a new Vice-Chair shall be elected by the Board.

C. The Chair is authorized to attend meetings and conferences on matters related to county government and may direct the attendance of the Vice-Chair or some other members of the Board, either in place of the Chair, or along with the Chair, however per diem shall not be payable unless authorized in accordance with Rule V.A. The Chair shall serve as the County's voting delegate at the Annual Convention of the Wisconsin Counties Association. The Chair shall serve on the following: Madison Area Technical College Appointment Board, Western Wisconsin Technical College District Board, and WIRED Leadership Caucus.

D. If a vacancy occurs on the Board, the Chair is authorized to appoint a qualified elector of the supervisory district wherein the vacancy occurs to fill the unexpired term. Such appointment shall be subject to approval of the Board at the next regular Board meeting following appointment by the Chair. the procedures set forth Wis. Stat. s. 59.10(3)(e) shall govern in filling said vacancy. A supervisor filling a vacancy shall not (note this is not new language but already underlined in the existing rule) automatically be assigned to the same committees as his or her predecessor in office but may request particular assignments. The chair shall have the option of removing or replacing any or all committee assignments for a replacement supervisor including moving a minimal number of supervisors to different committees if it benefits the county. Reassignment of supervisors requires the express consent of each reassigned supervisor and approval by a majority of members voting on the reassignment. Replacement of a member of the Executive & Legislative Committee, shall require election by the Board.

E. Supervisors appointed to special committees, boards, and commissions shall serve on those bodies only so long as they remain members of the Board unless a state statute or county ordinance provides otherwise. At the point in time that a supervisor is no longer a member of the Board, the position on the special committee, board, or commission shall be deemed vacant, and the Chair shall appoint a new individual, who must be a member of the Board, to fill the unexpired term on the body. A former supervisor may only fill a citizen member position on a special committee, board or commission if the former supervisor's continued service will result in no diminution of representation on the body by members of the Board.

F. The County Administrator shall attend Board meetings.

G. The Corporation Counsel shall attend Board meetings and serve as parliamentarian and legal advisor to the Board. If the Corporation Counsel is unable to attend a Board meeting then the

County Administrator will serve as parliamentarian.

H. A minimum of one day of education for members of the Board shall be set by the Chair, said day of education to be held every two years. Such education may be conducted through electronic means, including but not limited to videos and webinars. The Chair may set additional days of education for Board members, including one or more days for the purpose of clarifying budget procedures and upcoming budget analysis matters.

I. A secret ballot may be used by the Board or a committee but only to elect an officer of the Board or the committee. When written ballots are used, supervisors shall indicate their vote by placing their district number on the reverse side of the ballot. Nominations may be verbal from the floor and do not require a second. However, the person nominated must accept the nomination in order to be placed on the ballot. If there are no nominations from the floor, in any election by the Board, the first ballot shall be the nominating ballot, to be followed by succeeding formal ballots until a majority vote of the members present elects. Persons nominated may address the Board for up to 3 minutes. Only persons named on a nominating ballot shall be considered during a formal ballot, and any ballot east in violation of this rule shall be considered void A nominee may withdraw themselves from the ballot at any time after the initial ballot.

J. The standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairperson, in consultation with the Executive & Legislative Committee, subject to the approval of the Board. Committee appointments shall be presented for approval at the next meeting of the Board following the date of organization. The Executive & Legislative Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairperson as soon as practical after the organizational meeting to consult on committee appointments. After consultation, the new, tentative committees appointed by the Chairperson shall serve prior to approval by the Board during the period between the organizational meeting and the regular meeting in May, where consideration by the Board shall take place.

K. A chair, vice-chair and secretary for each committee shall be selected by each committee's membership.

L. If the position of chair on a committee becomes vacant, the vice-chair becomes chair and an election shall be held to fill the position of vice-chair and any other subsequent vacancies.

M. Removal of a supervisor from a committee. A supervisor may only be removed from a committee by the County Board Chairperson with the approval of the County Board by a two-thirds vote of the Board members present.

N. Resignation by supervisor from a committee. If a supervisor wishes to resign from a committee, permission must be requested from the Board. Permission of the Board can be given through unanimous consent or a motion that is debatable and amendable. Once the request is granted, the vacancy is handled as any other vacancy.

O. Matters Pertaining to Standing Committees of the Board:

1. A supervisor shall serve as a committee member until the first Board meeting following the spring election.

2. Whenever two or more committees meet jointly, a quorum of each committee participating in the joint meeting is required. A supervisor who serves on two or more of the committees may be counted toward a quorum of more than one of the committees meeting

jointly. The joint committees shall vote to select one chair of one of the participating committees to serve as chair of the joint meeting.

3. Supervisors are expected to attend the committee meetings of the committees to which they are assigned. When a supervisor cannot attend a meeting, it is the responsibility of the supervisor to request excusal from the chair of the committee.

4. A County Board member attending a committee meeting of a committee on which they do not serve, shall be given the opportunity to address said committee at least once, for a period of time which is at least equal to the time allowed for individual speakers at public comment, provided the matter to be addressed is a matter that is on that committee's properly posted agenda. The decision to allow the supervisor to speak more than once is within the discretion of the chair of the committee. The chair's decision may be overruled by a majority vote of the committee.

5. Each committee shall, at its first meeting following the organizational meeting of the Board, select those officers required by Rule IV.L., and it shall thereafter be the responsibility of said officers to ensure that accurate, written minutes are made of each meeting of the committee and submitted to the County Clerk for filing. The presiding officer at any meeting shall ensure compliance with the Open Meetings Law.

6. Committee agenda format will be established in compliance with open meetings law and by the committee chair and secretary based on that respective committee's precedent.

P. Special committees, boards, special appointments and commissions shall be selected or appointed by the Chair with the approval of the Board. These committees, boards and commissions shall select their own chair. The Chair shall notify the supervisors of proposed appointments by United States Mail or email no later than the Thursday afternoon prior to the scheduled meeting of the Board at which the appointments will be voted upon. If an appointment is to be considered at a special meeting of the Board, the Chair shall provide notice by United States Mail or email no later than five days prior to the date of the special meeting.

Q. Remote Participation in Sauk County Board and Committee Meetings

A Supervisor may remotely attend, be counted towards a quorum, vote and be paid per diem as follows:

COUNTY BOARD MEETING:

Supervisor must request remote participation in a meeting of the full County Board of the Chair at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting, and notify the County Clerk if and once such request is granted by the Chair.

Supervisor may participate via voice or video; may speak only when recognized by the Chair pursuant to all other applicable rules of the board; may vote ONLY using County approved, properly configured, and secured voting device.

An individual Supervisor may remotely attend a meeting no more than three (3) times per two-year term.

No more than two Supervisors may remotely attend and participate in a meeting of the full County Board.

No more than two Supervisors may remotely attend and participate in a Remote participation in closed session is not allowed.

The Chair may alter the provisions of this paragraph to allow for unforeseen or urgent circumstances.

COMMITTEES OF THE COUNTY BOARD:

Supervisor must request the remote participation in a Committee meeting of the Committee Chair at least 5 days prior to the meeting, and notify the Secretary of the Committee if and once such request is granted

367 by the Chair.

Supervisor may participate and vote via voice or video; may speak only when recognized by the Chair pursuant to all other applicable Rules of the Board and Committee.

An individual Supervisor may remotely attend a meeting no more than three (3) times per two-year term.

No more than one (1) Supervisor may remotely attend and participate in a Committee meeting.

Remote participation in closed session is not allowed.

The Chair may alter the provisions of this paragraph to allow for unforeseen or urgent circumstances.

Sauk County Health Care Center (SCHCC) staff who participate in the SCHCC trustees meetings may do so remotely when they need to remain at the SCHCC for health and safety reasons. Citizen members of the SCHCC trustees may participate in meetings remotely when health and safety is a concern.

The Chair of the Board or a Committee may *not* remotely preside over any meeting. The provisions set forth in this paragraph shall be reviewed on a quarterly basis by the Executive and Legislative Committee.

RULE V. COMPENSATION.

A. Supervisors shall be authorized up to a maximum of 90 days' compensation (at a per diem rate of \$90.00 for each day of attendance when the Board is in session and meeting, and \$75.00 for other authorized service including committee meetings), plus mileage and reimbursement of authorized expenses, for committee work when attending committee meetings of which they are members, or as chair of a committee (or their designee) when attending a committee meeting of which they are not a member for the purpose of providing testimony on an issue. Authorized service includes service required by ordinance or resolution. The maximum limits established for committee work shall be in addition to the per diems and mileage supervisors are entitled to receive for attendance at meetings of the Board and exclusive of per diems paid by non-county boards or commissions where the payment of the per diem or mileage is not made from County funds. Reimbursement of expenses (such as mileage, parking, etc.) shall be allowed only if a request for payment is made on the form provided by the Accounting Department within three (3) months after the meeting or event date. Payment to County Board supervisors and other committee members shall be only via direct deposit.

B. As provided by Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2), no supervisor shall be allowed pay for committee service while the Board is in session, but the Board may authorize payment of per diem, mileage and reimbursement for other expenses for attendance at any school, institute or meeting which the Board directs them to attend. Each standing committee is specifically authorized to send up to two (2) members to up to two (2) conventions (including conferences and other trainings) per County fiscal year. The convention cannot exceed three (3) days or be farther than three hundred (300) miles. All other requests require approval by a majority of the Board. Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2).

C. Any increase in the number of days of committee work for which supervisors may be paid compensation and mileage in any year shall require approval by two-thirds vote of the members of the Board present, prior to payment. In addition to the above, the Chair shall receive compensation for performance of the duties of that office. The Chair is authorized to act as a member of all committees in an *ex officio* capacity, and per diem and mileage are eligible to be paid under this rule for attendance at all committee meetings attended by the Chair.

D. The supervisor elected Chair shall be entitled to receive the compensation provided for the part-time position of Chair consisting of a salary of \$650 per month in addition to any other per diem

and mileage entitlement available to other supervisors in accordance with Rule V.A., as provided by Sauk Co. Code § 35.03.

RULE VI. PROCEDURE.

- A. The Chair shall announce items as they arise on the agenda. With respect to a resolution or ordinance, the Chair shall ask if a member wishes to make a motion, and upon a motion, if there is a second. Upon a motion and second, the Chair, or the Clerk, shall state the question on the motion, identifying the resolution or ordinance by its title and number, and reading the resolution in full. If the text of the resolution or ordinance has been distributed to members in advance, the chair may state the question without reading it in full, instead identifying the resolution by its designated title and number, by saying: It is moved and seconded to adopt the resolution relating to...., as printed." Any Supervisor has the right to have the motion or resolution read. After the question has been stated, the Chair shall call upon the maker of the motion who may defer to the chair of the appropriate committee, or an appropriate County staff person, for any statement or explanation.

- B. In presenting business or debate, members shall address the Chair, be recognized, and when in order, proceed without any interruption. Debate and discussion should be limited to the agenda item under discussion. Discussion is intended to provide clarity on a given topic. In all cases, personalities are prohibited and civility shall be observed. In case more than one member shall seek recognition to address the Board or committee, the Chair shall decide who has precedence.

- C. All regular meetings of the Board and Board committees shall provide a noticed public comment period. During a public comment period, any person who is not a member of the body may comment on a specific item or issue that is on that particular agenda for a maximum of three minutes per person. Discussion of personalities is prohibited and civility shall be observed. The Board or committee Chair may authorize the appearance and comment of a non-member if the appearance is specifically listed on the agenda.

- D. Any member wishing to speak to a question shall be permitted to do so at least once, and a motion for the previous question shall not be in order until every member has had such opportunity. No member may speak twice on any question until every member choosing to speak has spoken. The person making a motion and the second may speak for up to five (5) minutes during the first round of debate and all others shall be limited to three (3) minutes per round.

- E. All Supervisors present in person and remotely are expected to vote on all questions and items put before the Board or Committee. A Supervisor who has a conflict of interest pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 19.59 or Sauk Co. Code Ch. 36, Code of Ethics, shall, prior to the commencement of discussion or consideration of the matter, or as soon thereafter as the conflict of interest is discovered, declare the same. The Chair shall be excused by the Vice-Chair, for appropriate reasons. A Supervisor who chooses to abstain from voting for any other reason should likewise, prior to the commencement of discussion or consideration of the matter, declare that they will be abstaining. All members abstaining shall be deemed present for purposes of a quorum even if absence from the chambers is required.

- F. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if called for by the Chair or any member of the Board. After motion is made and stated by the Chair, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Board, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment by a majority vote of the Board.

G. In every instance, a motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, for previous question and for limited debate shall be decided without discussion.

- H. These rules may be suspended or amended by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 2011 (11th) Edition, shall govern the proceedings of the Board in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules or the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- I. Except for resolutions approved as part of a consent agenda, all votes on resolutions or ordinances shall be recorded roll call votes. If the electronic voting system is not operational, the Board may, by a two-thirds vote, approve voice voting on any resolution that does not otherwise require a roll call or supermajority vote by law.
- J. Any budget alterations shall require authorization by two-thirds of the membership of the Board in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 65.90(5).
- K. When a motion has been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move for reconsideration thereof at the next regularly scheduled meeting or in the same meeting of the Board. Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions except a motion to adjourn.
- L. Reports to the Board are presented for information and not debate, and shall be limited to ten minutes in length after which a question and answer period may be conducted that also shall not exceed ten minutes. The time provided for a report or question and answer period may be extended either during the approval of the agenda or by motion to extend the time allowed for the report or the question and answer period.
- M. The Board shall take a ten-minute break after two hours of meeting, and shall break for ten minutes every two hours thereafter, for the comfort of supervisors and members of the public attending the meeting.
- N. Amendments/Changes to the Rules of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors during the current term shall be proposed and adopted pursuant to the following procedure:
 - 1. Proposed amendments to these rules shall first be reviewed by the Executive & Legislative Committee (E&L). The proposed amendment shall then be introduced to the Board at the subsequent Board meeting.
 - 2. The proposed amendment shall be read under the "Reports" section of the agenda. The sponsoring Supervisor may speak to the proposed rule change for up to 5 minutes. The Board shall take no action at this point. Supervisors may relay their comments on the proposed amendment to the sponsoring Supervisor afterwards, ideally via email.
 - 3. E&L shall then consider the proposed original or revised amendment at its subsequent meeting and forward a recommendation to adopt or not adopt to the full Board. The full Board will consider the proposed or revised amendment at its next regular meeting, with a 2/3 vote of all members present required for adoption
 - 4. E&L Committee shall begin review the County Board Rules in September of odd years for consideration for presentation at the October County Board Meeting.
 - 4. NOTE: this rule change is only for proposed changes to the County Board Rules after the

organizational meeting of the County Board and has no effect on the procedures for adopting Rules of Board at the organizational meeting.

RULE VII. FINANCIAL POLICY.

A. The Chair and the County Clerk shall issue County orders in favor of the several County offices for their respective salaries and for all bills allowed and appropriations made by this Board.

B. All members of the Board who are to be reimbursed for committee work shall submit vouchers to the County Clerk on a monthly basis, to be placed on file with other current claims or accounts to be authorized for payment at regular Finance Committee meetings. Per diem and mileage paid Board members through any calendar year shall be compiled in the Accounting Department and presented to the Board prior to annual publication in March of the following year. Supervisors who "ride along" with other supervisors may not claim mileage.

C. No current claim or account to be paid from funds previously appropriated for any item by the Board in the Budget shall be allowed, nor order passed whereby any money is paid out or expended, until said claim or account has been referred to the appropriate department committee and report made thereof as directed by said committee. Individual expenditures exceeding \$10,000 shall be specifically approved by the Board except as otherwise provided by ordinance or statute.

D. All claims or accounts for disbursements made by any County official must be itemized and contain sufficient information to identify proper budget authorization.

E. The County Administrator, with the assistance of the Finance Director, shall keep the Board informed of the financial condition of the County and shall submit complete quarterly financial statements to the Board.

RULE VIII. OPEN MEETINGS.

A. It is declared to be the policy of Sauk County that the public is entitled to the fullest and most complete information regarding the affairs of County government as is compatible with the conduct of County affairs and the transaction of County business. Wis. Stat. §§ 19.80 to 19.98 are to be complied with by all members at all meetings of public nature. The Board and its committees shall "sit with open doors," and timely notification of all public meetings, time, date, place and subject matter shall be given, including the specifics for any contemplated closed session.

B. Unless conducting non-County Board business, Supervisors may only be present in the West Square Building, the Historic Courthouse, the Law Enforcement Center, the County Highway Building, the Health Care Center and all other County owned buildings and properties to attend duly noticed and scheduled committee and Board meetings. Supervisors wishing to confer with a Department Head shall schedule an appointment in advance with that particular Department Head.

RULE IX. STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

AGING & DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER AND VETERANS SERVICE OFFICE COMMITTEE

Responsible for providing services to the general public with respect to matters related to

aging and disability and to improve the life of those with aging and disability related issues. This committee will serve as the official statutory Commission on Aging pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4) and shall be advised by the Aging, and Disability Advisory Committee. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following departments: Veterans Service Officer and Aging and Disability Resource Center. Sauk Co. Code Ch. 16. **Members: 5.**

TOC

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Responsible for coordination of County economic development initiatives with County
Planners and Sauk County Development Corporation. Involved in strategic resource
planning initiatives. Reviews matters which affect growth and development of Sauk
County, and economic development of communications network. Responsible for
County coordinated transportation, including overseeing the Tri-County Airport
Commission, municipal airports, Pink Lady Rail Transit Commission and Wisconsin
River Rail Transit Commission. Responsible for the study, review and recommendation
regarding freight, passenger and commuter rail development, intercity and commuter bus
services and development, and the provision and coordination of rural and commuter
transit services. Comprised of members from: Property Committee; Land Resources &
Environment Committee; UW Extension, Arts, & Culture Committee; and Highway
Committee. Transit is governed by Wis. Stat. § 59.58. Members: 7. The County Board
Chairperson is the chair of the Economic Development Committee.

EXECUTIVE & LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Responsible for proposing amendments and monitoring the operation of Rules of the Board; responsible for the conduct of all intergovernmental relations and affairs; monitors State legislative and administrative activity affecting Sauk County; proposes legislation or action on pending legislation affecting Sauk County; considers matters not specifically assigned to other committees. Responsible for the overall information technology requirements for all departments and agencies of Sauk County. Provides overall planning and long range forecasting for the information systems needs of Sauk County. Responsible for policy direction and oversight to the following departments: County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, County Clerk, Management Information Systems, Emergency Management. The Executive & Legislative Committee shall be composed of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board, and three (3) additional members to be elected at large by the Board pursuant to Rule II.B.10., above. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board shall serve in the same roles on the Executive & Legislative Committee, and the County Clerk shall serve as secretary to this committee. The County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, and County Clerk shall serve as ex officio members of this committee without voting privileges. Members: 5.

EXTENSION EDUCATION, ARTS & CULTURE COMMITTEE

Jointly responsible with the Area Extension Director for oversight of University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension educational programming in agriculture and natural resources, community and economic development, family living, 4-H and positive youth development, horticulture, and County tourism and promotion activities on behalf of the Board. Responsible for oversight regarding arts, humanities, culture and historic preservation projects on behalf of the Board. Serves as the Landmarks Commission in compliance with Sauk Co. Code Ch. 38 and Wis. Stats. §§ 59.56 and 59.69(4m). Responsible for oversight of the following departments: jointly responsible with the Area Director for UW the Extension Office. Wis. Stat. §59.56(3)(b).

Members: 5 Supervisors; 1 citizen may be appointed who shall be a public school administrator in the County. 2 members must also be members of the Conservation, Planning & Zoning Land Resources and Environment Committee.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Responsible for financial policy initiation and review of all County fiscal matters, including development of annual County operating budget. Reviews County investment and banking policies; manages County general fund and contingency fund; reviews per diem and mileage for all committees, commissions, boards or councils; recommends approval of County audit report; receives all special gifts and grants made in favor of the County. Meets jointly with Personnel and Insurance Committee to address strategic resource personnel planning. Provides policy direction and oversight to following departments: Accounting and County Treasurer. Members: 5.

HEALTH BOARD

Responsible for policy direction and oversight of Health Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. Chs. 250 through 255 relating to public and environmental health matters. Sauk Co. Code Ch. 3. Members: 7; 3 Citizens, 4 Supervisors.

HEALTH CARE CENTER BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Responsible for policy direction and oversight of the Sauk County Health Care Center pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.18 and Sauk Co. Code Ch. 46. When a supervisor member shall no longer be a member of the Board of Supervisors, that member shall complete the term of office to which they were appointed. However, the next vacancy on the Board of Trustees shall be filled so as to maintain the balance of four supervisor and three citizen members. The Board of Trustees serves as the Home Health professional advisory group pursuant to Wis. Adm. Code DHS § 133.05. The chair and vice-chair of the Health Care Center Board of Trustees also serve as chair and vice-chair of the Board of Directors of the Health Care Center Foundation. Members: 7; 3 citizens, 4 supervisors.

HIGHWAY COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy direction in design, construction and maintenance of all County roads and expenditure of highway maintenance funds received from the state or County, including planning, development of, and maintenance of all structures required for storage, maintenance and operations relating to the Highway Department. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 83.015(1)(c), this Committee is designated the County Highway Committee and each member is appointed and vacancies filled pursuant to the procedures contained in these Rules. The Committee shall have five (5) members composed of Sauk County Supervisors who shall serve for the same term as supervisors appointed to standing committees of the Board. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Highway Department. **Members: 5.**

HUMAN SERVICES BOARD

Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Human Services Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. chs. 46 and 51 and Wis. Stat. § 59.53 to oversee social services and community programs. Further authority is found in Sauk Co. Code Ch. 2. <u>Members: 9</u>; 3 citizens, 6 supervisors.

LAND RESOURCES & ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy direction for County planning, land use regulations, surveying, remonumentation, mapping and uniform rural building identification system, land records modernization activities. Serves as the County Zoning Agency pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69. Establishes policies relating to planning, acquisition, development and maintenance of County owned park and recreation sites. Responsible for natural resource management, resource conservation and environmental protection including soils, water, forestry and wildlife resources through participation in various federal, state and local programs. Responsible for developing sustainable practices within County operations and serving in an advisory capacity regarding "green technologies." Responsible for the development and implementation of the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Responsible for review and approval of vouchers related to the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Oversees operation of farmland located at the original Sauk County Health Care Center and environmental obligations associated with the closed Sauk County landfill. Serves as the Farmland Preservation Review Committee. Members: 8: 1 Citizen who meets the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), 7 Supervisors. 2 members must also be members of the Extension Education, Arts & Culture Committee. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), the chair of the Sauk County Farm Services Agency Committee or designee shall be a member of the Committee but shall refrain from discussion and voting on any matter where the Committee is acting as the County Zoning Agency. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)1 two members of the committee shall also be members of the Extension Education, Arts & Culture Committee. Members of this committee shall serve on the lake protection districts. Provides policy

direction and oversight to the following departments: Conservation, Planning & Zoning; Parks; County Surveyor; Land Information Officer; Register of Deeds; and Mapping.

LAW ENFORCEMENT & JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

Responsible for exploration of justice alternatives. Provides policy direction and oversight on behalf of the Board to the following departments: District Attorney, Coroner, Clerk of Courts, Court Commissioner, Register in Probate, Child Support, and Circuit Court Judges, Sheriff, and the Animal Shelter. Members: 5.

PERSONNEL & INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy jurisdiction over all County personnel matters including: recruitment and selection; collective bargaining and contract administration; employee relations; salary administration for all appointed and elected personnel; classification systems; employee training; fringe benefits; and reviews all new position requests and vacant positions. Oversees the County's safety program and safety training. Provides for all property, liability, and worker's compensation insurance needs for the County. Meets jointly with Finance Committee to address strategic resource personnel planning. Provides policy direction and oversight to the Personnel Department and Risk/Safety Manager. Members: 5.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Responsible for providing policy direction with regard to matters involving County property. Handles all matters relating to the acquisition of real property, construction, building improvements, repair or maintenance not specifically delegated to other committees. Responsible for planning and implementation of space use in County buildings. Oversees the appraisal and sale of tax delinquent County property by the County Treasurer and reviews the disposition of, or the granting of easements on, County real property. Responsible for the physical management requirements associated with the

Resolution to AUTHORIZE A CONTRACT WITH THE RESCUE AGENCY AND AMEND THE 2022 BUDGET

Resolution offered by the Board of Health and Finance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

The State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), provided a funding opportunity for entities including local and tribal health departments to help remove barriers to and promote acceptance of COVID-19 vaccination for communities that face barriers to accessing medical care and people who have a mistrust of government agencies, the medical community, and/or vaccines. As an awardee we will build upon existing relationships they have with communities, and will use or adapt strategies to meet the unique identified needs of our community.

Sauk County Public Health (SCPH) will continue our Equitable COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Project to communicate vitally important COVID-19 information in a culturally competent manner to Latinx, Black, American Indian and to rural residents of Sauk County through using the Rescue Agency to create targeted ad campaigns. This grant funds activities in Sauk County focused on increasing knowledge and awareness of the COVID-19 virus and vaccines, addressing misinformation, decreasing vaccine hesitancy, and decreasing barriers to accessing COVID-19 vaccine.

This project is to include a targeted marketing campaign through the Rescue Agency, and distribution of the marketing materials through On Demand TV Commercials, Social Media Ads, and Billboards. This project will also work with local faith leaders, Ho-Chunk Nation tribal leaders, and others to establish pop up vaccination sites in the more rural areas of our county. The media campaigns dispelling misinformation and educating about the safety and effectiveness of the vaccines, and informing individuals of where they can get a free vaccine even if they do not have insurance or a primary medical doctor will address the first three barriers identified.

Public Health will work with the Rescue Agency to develop the marketing materials. The Rescue Agency is known for helping government agencies create campaigns that drive health behavior change with a focus on cultural competency. By sharing the information that we have gathered from Sauk County people of color during the first phase of this project, we aim to create a targeted campaign that addresses these concerns and provides information to promote vaccination.

THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the service contract for services be authorized for the budgeted amount of \$50,000

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 2022 budget is amended to appropriate \$50,000 of grant funds for this purpose.

Resolution to Authorize the closing of certain county facilities for the purpose of conducting an emergency preparedness

Resolution offered by the Property and Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

The Sauk County Emergency Management Department responds to emergencies and attends meetings around the County and regions of Wisconsin. In addition, trains Sauk County employees and Sauk County's communities on Safety and Emergency Preparedness.

The best way to ensure emergency preparedness is to practice and simulate actual events that might take place. The Emergency Management Director has worked diligently to prepare realistic training scenarios that will necessitate the brief closure of county facilities for several hours, but the offices will not be closed for the entire day. The Wisconsin Statutes and county policies direct that county offices generally remain open during customary business hours, but the safety and security of county employees and members of the public utilizing county facilities is of primary concern to Sauk County. It is proposed that on May 6, 2022, the Courthouse and West Square facilities shall close from 8:00 a.m. to 12:30pm, while on May 13, 2022, that the Reedsburg Human Services Building shall close from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, for the purpose of conducting these such emergency preparedness drills.

The public shall have the afternoon from 12:30pm to 4:30 on May 6, 2022 at the West Square Building and Courthouse; and from noon to 4:30pm on May 13, 2022 at the Reedsburg Human Services Building, to transact any business. The benefits to the safety of county employees and the public from conducting these drills outweighs any inconvenience to the public convenience and necessity.

Ordinance Amendment to approve a map amendment (rezoning) of lands in the Town of Excelsior from a Commercial, Exclusive Agriculture, and Agriculture to an Exclusive Agriculture Zoning District filed upon Erik Larson, property owner.

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND:

Background: Erik and Shanna Larson own property in the NE 1/4, SE 1/4, Section 07, T12N, R05E, Town of Excelsior, and have requested a map amendment (rezoning) of property legally described pursuant to petition 08-2022 from Agriculture, Exclusive Agriculture, and Commercial to Exclusive Agriculture zoning. The intent of the map amendment (rezoning) being to create a single, consistent zoning on the parcel. The land currently zoned as Commercial was purchased from 010-0229-11100, which has a conditional use to operate a storage yard. Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND:

Ordinance Amendment to adopt a new Sauk County Zoning Ch. 51 Erosion Control and Stormwater Management Ordinance and to Amend Section 20.07, Chapter 20, Uniform Citation Ordinance

Ordinance Amendment offered by Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND:

The Land Resources and Environment Department has created Ch. 51 Erosion Control and Stormwater Management Ordinance for implementation in unincorporated areas of Sauk County that have adopted County Zoning pursuant to Wis Stats. §. 59.59. The purpose of this ordinance is to promote and protect the public health, safety, and general welfare of County citizens through the establishment of construction site erosion control and stormwater management in public and private property with the following objectives: protect water resources including but not limited to navigable waters, wetlands, floodplain, and groundwater; minimize sedimentation, water pollution from nutrients, heavy metals, chemical and petroleum products and other contaminants, flooding, and thermal impacts of water resources; promote infiltration and groundwater recharge; minimize impacts to surrounding land uses and natural resources during and post-construction; and, protect public and private property from runoff and erosion affected by construction activities. With the adoption of this Chapter 51, additions are needed to update Chapter 20 to allow enforcement and compliance of the newly adopted chapter.

WHEREAS, Sauk County is granted the authority to enact an Erosion Control and Stormwater Management Ordinance pursuant to Wis. Stats. §59.693(2) and Wis. Stats. §281.33; and,

WHEREAS, this ordinance strictly conforms with and does not preempt or supersede the more stringent erosion and sediment control standards as required by Wis. Stats §281.33(3m) and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources NR 151; and,

WHEREAS, this ordinance is applicable to all unincorporated areas of the County in which general zoning has been adopted and pursuant to Wis. Stats. §59.693(4) does not require approval and is not subject to disapproval by any town or town board; and,

WHEREAS, this ordinance supersedes all provisions of an ordinance enacted under Wis Stats. §. 59.59 that relate to construction site erosion control or storm water management regulation; and,

WHEREAS, the Land Resources and Environment Committee held a public hearing on March 22, 2022 and recommended approval of the ordinance amendments as presented; and.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Each section of the ordinance that is in violation and each day of continued violation is a separate offense.

Ordinance Amendment to Chapter 10 County Parks

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND: The purpose of the ordinance is to specify rules and regulations for the use and enjoyment of the Sauk County Park System and to further the safety, health, and welfare of all persons in the use thereof as well as to provide for the protection and preservation of property, facilities, and natural resources. Amendments to Chapter 10 have been made piecemeal over the years, resulting in some inconsistencies. With changing factors throughout the park system and the implementation of a new County Outdoor Recreation Plan and subsequent individual park master plans; Chapter 10 must be amended to address the uses and potential issues located throughout the system.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions, or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Chapter 10 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is repealed and replaced as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

10.01 County Property. (1) Except when the context provides otherwise, the provisions of this chapter shall apply to all lands, structures and property owned, leased, or administered by Sauk County under the management, supervision and control of the Sauk County Highway & Parks Committee.

- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person to destroy, molest or deface any natural growth or natural or archaeological features, or any Sauk County property; to enter or be in any building, installation or area that may be locked or closed to public use or contrary to posted notice. The picking of edible fruits or nuts is permitted.

- (a) ADULT GROUP. A group made up of adult members (18 years of age or older) of an established organization.

- (c) CAMPING PARTY. Any individual, family, individual group or juvenile group occupying a campsite.
- (d) CAMPING UNIT. Any single shelter except sleeping bags and hammocks used for a camp by a camping party except those used exclusively for dining purposes.
- ____ (f) FAMILY. A parent or parents with their children and no more than two (2) lineal relatives or not more than two (2) minor guests.
 - (g) FAMILY CAMPGROUND. Any tract of land designated for camping by families.
- (h) GROUP CAMPING. A campground designated for use by groups.
- (i) HUNT. "Hunt" or "hunting" includes shooting, shooting at, pursuing, taking, capturing, or killing or attempting to capture or kill any wild animal.

10.01 Purpose The purpose of this ordinance is to specify rules and regulations for the use and enjoyment of the Sauk County Park System and to further the safety, health, and welfare of all persons in the use thereof as well as to provide for the protection and preservation of property, facilities, and natural resources.

10.02 Scope. Except when the context provides otherwise, the provisions of this chapter shall apply to all lands, structures and property owned, leased, administered, or identified as park, parkway, or trail by Sauk County.

- 10.03 Definitions. For the purposes of this chapter, the following words, terms, and phrases, when used in this chapter shall have the meanings ascribed to them, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
 - (1) ADULT GROUP. A group made up of adult members (18 years of age or older) of an established organization.
 - (2) ANIMAL. Any animal owned or under the immediate care, custody, or control of a person.
 - (3) CAMP OR CAMPING. The use of a shelter such as a tent, trailer, motor vehicle, tarpaulin, bedroll or sleeping bag for temporary residence or sleeping purposes.
 - CAMPING PARTY. Any individual, family, individual group, or juvenile group occupying a campsite consisting of not more than four (4) unrelated adults (18 years of age or older), six (6) unrelated children and three (3) animals. On campsites 02 and 54, as shown on the official White Mound Campground map, the camping party may consist of not more than eight (8) unrelated adults (18 years of age or older), eight (8) unrelated children and three (3) animals.
 - (5) CAMPING UNIT. Any single shelter except sleeping bags and hammocks used for a camp by a camping party. A camping unit consists of one (1) camper; one (1) tent; one (1) camper and one (1) tent; or two (2) tents on a campsite. On campsites 02 and 54, as shown on the official White Mound Campground map, the camping unit may not exceed four (4) tents.
 - (6) CAMPSITE. A segment of a campground designated for camping use by a camping unit or camping party.
 - (7) COMMITTEE. The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Committee.
 - (8) DEPARTMENT. The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department.
 - (9) DIRECTOR. The Director of the Land Resources and Environment Department or designated representative.
 - (10) FAMILY. A parent or parents with their emancipated children.
 - (11) FAMILY CAMPGROUND. Any tract of land designated for camping by families.
 - (12) HUNT. "Hunt" or "hunting" includes shooting, shooting at, pursuing, taking, capturing, or killing or attempting to capture or kill any wild animal.
 - (13) INDIVIDUAL GROUP. A camping party of not more than four (4) unrelated adults (18 years of age or older), six (6) unrelated children, and three (3) animals occupying one (1) camping unit. On campsites 02 and 54, a camping party of not more than eight (8) unrelated adults (18 years of age or older), eight (8) unrelated children and three (3) animals occupying one (1) camping unit.
 - (14) JUVENILE GROUP. A group made up of juvenile members under the leadership of at least one (1) competent, mature adult for each ten juveniles in the group and using any number of camping units or occupying a group camparound.
 - (15) MANAGER. The Park and Recreation Manager of the Land Resources and Environment Department or designed representative.
 - MATERIAL. Includes any printed or written matter, any sample or device, circular, leaflet, pamphlet, newspaper, magazine, paper, book, or other printed or otherwise reproduced original or copies of any matter or literature.
 - for conservation, park and recreational purposes or placed under the jurisdiction of the Committee and including without limitation parks, beaches, the County

- No person or group shall engage in ball games or other sports activities, except in such areas as are designated for those purposes or in such areas where such activity will not interfere with the use and enjoyment of the park by others.
- No person shall ascend or land with any aircraft nor engage in stunt flying or parachute landing in any park or parkway without a written permit from the Department.

- No person shall interfere with or in any manner hinder any employee or agents of the Land Resource and Environment Department from the performing their assigned duties. Interfering includes, without limitation, knowingly giving false information to an employee with the intent to mislead the employee in the performance of duty including the issuance of citations.

- (1) No person shall wade, bathe or swim within a park except at such pools or beaches as are or may be designated for that purpose by the Department.
- (2) Use of soaps or detergents for any purposes at White Mound Lake shall be prohibited.
- (3) No person shall disturb a bathing beach boundary buoy or marker in any County park or cause to be within that area of water enclosed by boundary buoys any boat or raft used to transport persons.
- (4) The Department may prohibit swimming in areas adjacent to water access sites by posted notice. No person may swim within the area delineated by a posted notice.
- (5) There are no lifeguards at any swimming beach/area in any County parks. Swimming and wading in designated areas is "at your own risk".

10.12 Public Utilities and Private Construction.

- Public Utilities. The location of all sewers and receivers, gas pipes, water pipes, stopcock boxes, hydrants, lamp posts, telegraph, telephone and electric power posts and lines, manholes, conduits and pumps within any park or parkway shall be subject to the jurisdiction and control of the Department; and their construction, erection, repair, or relocation shall be undertaken only after a written permit is received from said Department.
 - Private Construction.

- (a) No person shall open a trench for any purpose or dig into or take up any part of any park or parkway, without a written permit of the Director or their designee. The person to whom such a permit is granted shall complete the work within the time specified in said permit and shall do said work and refill and replace or remove in a substantial and workmanlike manner all materials disturbed and leave the place where said work was done in a good condition as before said work was begun.
- (b) No such trench or opening shall be dug in any location or manner which may injure the roots of any tree.
- (c) Every person who shall receive a permit to open a trench, to cut a curb or to deposit materials in or upon any park or parkway shall at all times after such work has been commenced or materials deposited, and until the same has been completed and until all accumulations of materials resulting from such work has been removed, so guard and protect the same that person driving or passing along the roadway or in the vicinity of the place where the work is being done, shall not be likely to meet with any accident therefrom; and shall also during the time from sunset to sunrise of each night, while said work is in progress, cause the same to be securely fenced and guarded by a red light or lights placed in a conspicuous position and so shared that the same shall not be extinguished.
- 10.13 Sleeping or Camping. No person shall sleep, camp or lodge in any park or parkway, except in such places designated for such purposes, and then only subject to the rules and regulations of this Ordinance governing the use of such areas.
- (1) No camping unit, sleeping bag or hammock shall be set up beyond the limits of the campsite.
- (2) No camping party shall move from its assigned campsite to another campsite without prior approval.
 - (3) All camping permits expire at 1:00 p.m. on the last day of the permit period.
- (4) No camping party shall camp, and no camping unit shall remain for a period greater than 40 days in one (1) calendar year in the property of registration.
- (5) No camping party shall camp, and no camping unit shall remain for a period greater than fourteen (14) days in any three (3) week period from Memorial Day to Labor Day. After fourteen (14) days, the camping unit must be removed from the property for at least fourteen (14) days before being eligible to return.
 - (6) Campsites can be rented as unattended between Labor Day to Memorial Day.
- (7) No camping party shall start setting up or taking down its camping unit between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and the following 6:00 a.m.
- [8] It shall be unlawful to park any motor vehicle outside the parking areas designated at each campsite and not more than two (2) vehicles are permitted to any campsite, unless posted otherwise.

(9) Violation of any state law or any rules of the Department by a member of a camping party is cause for revocation of the camping permit.

(10) Campers check in time is 3:00 p.m. and check out time is 1:00 p.m.

10.14 Closing Hours.

(1) Except for the vehicular traffic moving upon "thru" roadways, and except when the Director or their designee published general permission to use all or certain parks or parkways, the parks and parkways shall be closed each night between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. the following morning, and no person shall remain therein during said hours; provided that the Director or their designee may from time to time, in all or any of the parks or parkways, publish or post-closing hours different from the above, or discontinue closing hours, as in the exercise of the judgment of the committee may appear reasonable and necessary.

(2) In case of an emergency, or when in the judgment of the Director or their designee, the public interest demands it, any portion of the parks and parkways or buildings therein may be

closed to the public, or to designated persons until permission is given to return.

10.15 Other Permits.

(1) All permits shall be issued by the Committee, Director, or their designee, in writing, except camping permits, shelter permits or building use permits issued by the Director or their designee, and subject to the park rules and regulations, and the persons to whom such permits have been granted shall be bound by said rules and regulations as fully as though the same were inserted in said permits, and any person or persons to whom such permits have been granted shall be liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by the Committee, Department or by negligence of the person or person to whom such permits have been granted, their servants or agents.

County Land Resources and Environment Committee is hereby authorized to adopt additional or revised rules and regulations for the proper conduct and administration of the parks and parkways in the County of Sauk not inconsistent with this ordinance, to grant permits in conformity with the provisions hereof, and to perform such other acts with reference to the management of said parks expedient to promote the beauty and usefulness of said parks, parkways, and trails and to increase the comfort, safety, convenience and public welfare of the citizens of Sauk County and of visitors to said parks and parkways in their use of the same.

10.16 Enforcement and Penalties. (1) Any peace officer of Sauk County or proper state official, may without warrant arrest any offender to whom they may detect in the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, and take the person so arrested before a court having competent jurisdiction and shall have at all times the right to enter the premises of any building, structure or enclosure in any park or parkway, including such grounds, buildings, structures or enclosures which may be leased to or set aside for private or exclusive use of any individual or group of individuals, for the purpose of arresting violators hereof, and may use all necessary means to attain that end.

(2) The civil and criminal provisions of the ordinance shall be enforced by employees of the Sauk County Sheriff's Department or by the Director and those administrative, supervisory, or managerial Land Resources and Environment personnel delegated by the Director or their designee. This ordinance may be enforced by citation or civil forfeiture and the Sauk County Corporation Counsel is authorized to prosecute violations of this ordinance. Any person violating this ordinance may be issued a citation in which case they shall be punished by the forfeiture provided in Chapter 20 Sauk County Code of Ordinances.

(3) Any person, firm, company, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) together with the costs of action, and in default of payment thereof.

10.17 Conflicting Provisions Repealed. This ordinance repeals all ordinance and/or amendments to dealing with the regulation of Sauk County parks, parkways, and trails, which were previously in effect.

Resolution to Authorize Participation in the Department of Natural Resources Municipal Dam Grant Program

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: During the 2019 inspection of the Delton dam, it was noticed that there was concrete spalling and repairs were necessary. On June 24, 2021, the County entered a contract with Ayres Associates to engineer the project for a cost of \$4,000. On December 15, 2021, during a routine inspection, it was noted that a concrete training wall near the edge of the dam had shifted. In discussions with representatives from JF Brennan on-site as well as phone conversations with Ayres Associates, this is not an imminent issue, but does need to be addressed.

Given that Ayres is already contracted for work at the Delton Dam, the LRE Department brought forth a resolution to the County Board in February to amend the contract to include this new project as well. The projects may also be eligible for WDNR Municipal Dam Grant funding. To apply for the Municipal Dam Grant program, a resolution is required authorizing participation.

Sauk County owns Delton Dam and requests financial assistance under s. 31.385 and s. 227.11, Wis. Stats. and Ch. NR 335, Wis. Adm. Code, for the purpose of dam repair/modification.

The state share for such a project may not exceed 50 percent (50%) of the first \$1,000,000 of total eligible project costs nor 25 percent (25%) of the next \$2,000,000 of total eligible project costs. With a maximum award amount of \$1,000,000.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, hereby authorizes the County Administrator to:

- 1. Submit an application to the DNR for financial aid under ch. NR 335, Wis. Admin. Code;
- 2. Sign grant agreement documents;
- 3. Take all necessary action to complete the project associated with any grant agreement; and
- 4. Submit reimbursement claims along with the necessary supporting documentation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Sauk County agrees to pay a share of the eligible costs which is equal to the total project cost minus the state share.

Resolution to Authorize a Small Dam Option for Hemlock Dam and to Rescind the Use of Funds through the Department of Natural Resources Municipal Dam Grant Program

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Hemlock Dam creates Hemlock Slough, located at Hemlock County Park, in the Town of LaValle, Sauk County. The dam was constructed in 1964 for recreational purposes. During the months of August and September 2018, the dam sustained damages during a flooding event. Subsequently, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR), gave the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department an Administrative Order to Repair or Abandon Hemlock Dam. The WDNR requested that a decision to abandon or repair Hemlock Dam be made by August 30, 2019. To give the County time to review its options, an extension request was granted by the DNR.

On October 15, 2019, the decision (Resolution 132-2019) was made by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to repair Hemlock Dam. Shortly thereafter, Resolution 154-2019 was approved by the Sauk County Board awarding a contract to Ayres and Associates to engineer a large-scale dam for an amount not to exceed \$38,041. In addition to preparing plans/specifications for the dam, Ayres and Associates assisted with the preparation of the materials necessary to make application for the DNR Municipal Dam Grant Program. Resolution 53-2020 authorized our participation in the program with the intention that Sauk County would pay a share of the eligible costs for the construction of the dam, which is equal to the total project cost minus the state share.

As a result of pursuing reconstruction of the dam as well as Municipal Dam Grant Funds, additional jurisdictional and maintenance requirements were proposed by the WDNR for the large-scale dam being proposed. To avoid the additional requirements a small-scale dam was authorized by the County Board on March 16, 2021 (Resolution 29-2021). The contracted amount for engineering services up to \$76,191 was authorized in an amended contract with Ayres Associates. Despite the authorization of the small-dam, further requirements of the DNR Municipal Dam Grant program have resulted in our inability to accept funding under the program. As a result, Sauk County would be responsible for the engineering and construction costs associated with the replacement of the Hemlock Dam.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, hereby re-authorizes a small-scale dam for Hemlock Dam and directs the Land Resources and Environment Director to prepare said plans; and rescinds the use of funds through the DNR Municipal Dam Grant Program to assist paying for engineering and construction costs.

Zoning Map Amendment Procedures and Requirements

At the public hearing, the applicant may appear in person or through an agent or an attorney of their choice. The applicant/agent/attorney may present testimony, evidence and arguments in support of the application. All site plans, pictures, etc. become the property of the Land Resources & Environment Department, will remain in the file, and will be public record.

What is a Zoning Map Amendment?

The purpose of a zoning map amendment is to alter, enlarge, or reduce a geographic extent of any zoning district, or to enact a new zoning designation for any particular parcel or real property. A change in zoning allows for different land uses and in some instances, different densities of development. The Land Resources & Environment Committee will recommend approval or disapproval of a rezone to the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in accordance with the standards and criteria set by the zoning ordinance.

Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Zoning Map Amendment request, the LRE Committee must follow four standards:

- a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance.
- b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering the zoning ordinance as currently depicted has been observed.
- d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
 - The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
 The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.

 - 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
 - 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

- If the Town choses to review the zoning map amendment request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.
- 6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may result in denial or postponement of your request.
- 7. The LRE Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors may approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the zoning map amendment request.

Please Note: If a zoning map amendment application is dis approved by the LRE Committee and no appeal is filed, no new zoning map amendment application can be re-submitted for a period of 365 days from the date of the LRE Committee's decision, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of charges of factors found valid by the LRE Committee.





RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE ADRC TO PURCHASE A HANDICAPPED ACCESSIBLE VAN FOR THE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM USING DOT TRUST FUND AND AMENDING THE 2022 BUDGET FOR THIS PURPOSE

Resolution offered by the Aging and Disability Resources and Veterans Service Office Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

The Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) provides needed transportation to the elderly and disabled clients through two Department of Transportation (DOT) grants. Many clients are not ambulatory and must have a vehicle that will accommodate a wheelchair, motorized wheelchair, and/or scooter. The ADRC has buses that accommodate such riders, but it is more cost effective to transport such clients in a van.

The ADRC currently has \$66,610.75 in its DOT Trust fund account. The Trust fund is to be used to purchase or maintain vehicles for the ADRC's transportation program. The State Department of Transportation does not allow the ADRC to have more than \$80,000.00 in the fund at any one time; any funds over \$80,000.00 must be returned to the state.

In the 2022 budget, the ADRC anticipated purchasing a handicap accessible van in 2025. However, with the cost of vehicles increasing and more limited availability (Dodge no longer makes a Caravan), the ADRC would like to purchase another vehicle to meet the over 100 requests for rides a week. A& J Vans has a 2021 Chrysler Voyager for \$35,030 after a \$1,000 discount. The package from BraunAbility that modifies the vehicle into a rear entry handicap accessible van is \$21,995. Title and license fee is \$169.50, for a total of \$57,194.50. Currently there are not any passenger vans available through the state contract. The ADRC Director has called several Chrysler locations and the least expensive Voyager was \$48,000, before the BraunAbility package is added.

The state has given permission to use the trust fund to purchase the vehicle, if approved by the County Board. Once the trust fund is reduced to less than \$9,500, Sauk County will be better positioned to apply for a new bus from the 53.10 grant due in August. The handicapped accessible vehicle will be purchased with DOT trust funds; no levy dollars will be used.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that Sauk County is hereby authorized to purchase the rear-entry handicapped accessible van from A&J Vans at a cost of 57,194.50 using DOT trust funds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, that the 2022 ADRC budget be amended to appropriate \$57,195 of the ADRC's DOT trust fund.



§34.05 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides for the designation of official County depositories and the specification by County Boards of Supervisors of the basis upon which Treasurers shall be authorized to deposit and invest funds. The Sauk County Finance Committee has reviewed these and other financial matters and, in light of past practice and the best interest of Sauk County, does make the following recommendations as outlined in the resolution.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Treasurer shall deposit County funds as provided under the statutes of the State of Wisconsin, County Financial Policy 10-95, and this resolution, emphasizing preservation of principal, liquidity and rate of return; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Sauk County participate in the State of Wisconsin's Local Government Investment Pool pursuant to §25.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes, with the Sauk County Treasurer or authorized deputies hereby designated as the "local official" authorized to invest County monies in this fund and to make withdrawals therefrom as required; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Treasurer shall be authorized to maintain a working or active checking account for the immediate operation of Sauk County in any financial institution that is a member of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and under the State of Wisconsin deposit guarantee program if applicable. The financial institution must be conveniently located for conducting daily business; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to §34.09 of the Wisconsin Statutes, every federal or state credit union, state bank, federal or state savings and loan association, savings and trust company and federal or state savings bank and every national bank may be designated as a public depository and may receive and hold public deposits, subject to the referenced chapter, if the financial institution has a branch or main office located in this state, complies with this chapter with respect to public deposits and accepts payments made by the state under §16.412 of the Wisconsin Statutes; and,



THIS UTILITY AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS EASEMENT AND TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is granted by Sauk County ("Grantor") to Reedsburg Utility Commission ("Grantee").

RECITALS:

- A. Grantor is the fee holder of certain real property in the Village of West Baraboo, Sauk County, State of Wisconsin, as shown on attached **Exhibit A**, fully incorporated herein ("the *Property*"), being located at Tax Parcel Identification #191-0072-00000 and #191-0086-00000.
- B. Grantee requested that Grantor grant a permanent easement and temporary construction easement ("the *Easement*") over certain portions of the Property as described and depicted on attached **Exhibit A**, fully incorporated herein. This being the Utility and Telecommunications Easement Area ("Easement Area").

AGREEMENT

For good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

1. Grant of Easement.

a. Grantor hereby grants, gives, and conveys to Grantee, its successor and assigns, and Grantee's contractors and agents, the perpetual right, privilege, right-of-way, easement and authority for ingress and egress over, upon, and across the Easement Area to survey,

construct (including but not limited to an approximate 12' x 8' Telecommunications Fiber Optic/Utility Building), reconstruct, use, operate, patrol, maintain, test, inspect, repair, replace, alter, remove or replace or abandon (said activities hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Installation") of any existing and future utilities, including but not limited to electrical and fiber optic infrastructure, lines, cables, and connections and any appurtenances and equipment related thereto (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Grantee's Utility").

b. Improvements in the Easement Area shall be located above and below grade, including, but not limited to, an approximate 12' x 8' Telecommunications Fiber Optic/Utility Building, cable, lines and telecommunication boxes that extend up to and beyond grade surface. No above ground objects or features will be placed in the area identified on **Exhibits A** as "Sauk County Highway Department [Private Access] One Way", also known as "Your Way Lane" that is approximately thirty (30) feet wide running from Highway BD south and across the Property to Highway 136, collectively referred to ("Private Access").

2. Grant of Temporary Construction Easement.

- a. Grantor hereby further grants to Grantee, its successors and assigns (and for the use of its agents, employees, contractors, licensees, and invitees), a temporary construction easement for the Installation of Grantee's Utility (the "Temporary Construction Easement"), in and on the Easement Area.
- b. No above ground objects or features shall be placed in the Private Access. The Temporary Construction Easement shall be used by the Grantee only during periods of installation, keeping, maintaining, and for any necessary restoration of the Grantee's Utilities.
- 3. Access to Easement Area. Grantor grants to Grantee, its successors and assigns, access to the Easement Area for ingress and egress over, upon, and across Private Access during the term of the easements.
- 4. Indemnification. Grantee shall indemnify Grantor from and against all loss, costs (including reasonable attorney fees), injury, death, or damage to persons or property that at any time during the term of this Agreement may be suffered or sustained by any person or entity in connection with Grantee's activities conducted on the Property, regardless of the cause of the injury, except to the extent caused by the gross negligence or misconduct of Grantor or its agents or employees.
- 5. Consistent Uses Allowed. Grantor reserves the right to use the Easement for purposes that will not interfere with Grantee's full enjoyment of the Easement rights granted in this Agreement.
- 6. Restoration of Surface. Grantee shall restore the surface disturbed by any construction or maintenance of any equipment located within the Easement to its condition before the disturbance.
- 7. Covenants Run with Land. All terms and conditions in this Agreement, including the benefits and burdens, shall run with the land and shall be binding upon, inure to the benefit of, and be enforceable by Grantor and Grantee and their respective successors and assigns. The party named as Grantor in this Agreement and any successor or assign to Grantor as fee simple owner of the Property shall cease to have any liability under this Agreement with respect to facts or circumstances arising after the party has transferred its fee simple interest in the Property.

- 8. Non-Use. Non-use or limited use of the Easement rights granted in this Agreement shall not prevent the benefiting party from later use of the Easement rights to the fullest extent authorized in this Agreement.
- 9. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- 10. Entire Agreement. This Agreement sets forth the entire understanding of the parties and may not be changed except by a written document executed and acknowledged by all parties to this Agreement and duly recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Sauk County, Wisconsin.
- 11. Notices. All notices to either party to this Agreement shall be delivered in person or sent by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, to the other party at that party's last known address. If the other party's address is not known to the party desiring to send a notice, the party sending the notice may use the address to which the other party's property tax bills are sent. Either party may change its address for notice by providing written notice to the other party.
- 12. Invalidity. If any term or condition of this Agreement, or the application of this Agreement to any person or circumstance, shall be deemed invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of the term or condition to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each term and condition shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- 13. Waiver. No delay or omission by any party in exercising any right or power arising out of any default under any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be construed to be a waiver of the right or power. A waiver by a party of any of the obligations of the other party shall not be construed to be a waiver of any breach of any other terms or conditions of this Agreement.
- 14. Enforcement. Enforcement of this Agreement may be by proceedings at law or in equity against any person or persons violating or attempting or threatening to violate any term or condition in this Agreement, either to restrain or prevent the violation or to obtain any other relief. If a suit is brought to enforce this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its costs, including reasonable attorney fees, from the non-prevailing party.
- 15. No Public Dedication. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed a gift or dedication of any portion of the easements granted under this Agreement to the general public or for any public purpose whatsoever.



BACKGROUND: Wisconsin Statutes 59.10(3)(b) requires in part: "each board shall propose a tentative county supervisory district plan setting forth the number of supervisory districts and tentative boundaries or a description of boundary requirements, hold a public hearing and adopt a tentative plan". The final Supervisory District plan was adopted by the County Board on November 9th, 2022. While the County was developing Supervisory Districts, the State was creating districts for State and Federal elections. Those re-districting plans were the subject of litigation. On March 3rd, 2022 the Wisconsin Supreme Court adopted a State re-districting plan that created new districts for the State and Federal legislative districts. That plan was overturned by the Supreme Court of the United States regarding the State legislative districts, but not the Federal legislative Districts. The new Federal legislative Districts required slight changes to municipal wards. On April 15th, 2022 the Wisconsin Supreme Court adopted new redistricting maps for the State Legislative districts. The changes to the State Legislative districts also required changes to municipal ward boundaries. Changes to the municipal legislative districts requires updating of the County Supervisory Districts to incorporate the new wards into the proper County Supervisory District. None of the changes have any effect on the County Supervisory Districts that were established on November 21st, 2022.

WHEREAS, adoption of this ordinance amendment approves the updates to the Sauk County Final Redistricting Plan to include those changes necessitated State of Wisconsin re-districting and the requisite ordinance amendment establishing the aforementioned districts.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes sec. 59.10(3)(b)4., the Chair of the Board of Supervisors file a certified copy of the final county supervisory district plan with the Secretary of State.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk provide copies of the final county supervisory district plan and final municipal ward plan to each municipality in the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged

unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby. Section 4. Section 1.001 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is repealed and recreated as follows (new wards are in bold and underlined. The emphasis shall be removed for purposes of publication): Sec. 1.001. - Supervisory districts. Plan for 31 single-member County supervisory districts. Sauk County 2020 census population — 65,770. Sauk County supervisory district target — 2,121.

I have hand delivered this letter and sent it via registered mail.

I am writing to make claim against Sauk County pursuant to state statute 893.82 I am making claim within 120 days of the incident the claim arises from.

I spoke with Rebecca C. Evert and numerous other employees at both the courthouse and adjacent building that contains human services and neither could produce a form to make claim against the county so in lieu of that I will model the information contained herein after that requested on the form available online for making a claim against The City of Racine Wisconsin.

The damage was caused by one Mark J. Barreau a Sauk County Highway Employee
He is about 6 foot tall, older with grey hair, and extremely obese.

I will attempt to provide as much detail as possible, so the county can make the best decision they can, I can provide copies of estimates for the repair of the damages I am seeking from 2 separate sources I will list herein:

Safelite Auto Glass 505 South BLVD Baraboo Wi 53913

Stated a full windshield replacement would be 378.00 with Taxes

Madison Auto Glass Run By Todd Hetrick stated a full windshield replacement would cost 247.93 With Tax

I am seeking the amount of the lowest Estimate 247.93

On May 5th at approximately 6:30 A.M. my roommate Briana Yanske was driving my 2001 Toyota Corolla South on USH 12 just outside of where the two lanes merge into one outside Sauk City I was in the front passenger seat.

A Red County Highway Truck driven by one Mark Barreau Marked Truck #400 was driving in front of us.

Suddenly a plum sized rock fell from the top of the truck gate and cracked my windshield in two places essentially destroying it as the larger of the two cracks went almost completely through the windshield.

The rock was perched on top of the truck back, this was seen by myself and my roommate, it then fell from the truck.

It was in no way kicked up from the road.

Having never had this occur before we were at a loss as to what to do so we tried to get the attention of the truck driver by honking at him and waving.

He continued along and pulled into what was described by Hannah Volz as a Highway Maintenance Building on USH 12 just south of CTH PF.

When he stopped his vehicle I opened my door and calmly stated what had happened and asked to speak with his supervisor and he stomped up to me in a loud voice started yelling and was so close I couldn't safely or fully exit my vehicle and he acted in a manner that any reasonable person would believe would be followed by him assaulting them.

The deputy would be one Officer Hannah Volz who I do not in any capacity know.

I will hereafter discuss and rebutt her incident report that was used by the counties insurance Aegis to deny paying for the damages caused by the county.

She wrote many inaccurate statements into her report and attributed statements both not made by myself and made by her to me.

This was witnessed by Briana Yanske

She wrote in many statements that were clearly her attempt to make sure that I could not make a successful insurance claim against the county for breaking my windshield in the manner in which they did.

Any reasonable person would be able to see the fact that she was clearly writing a narrative to defend a fellow county employee and/or the county she works for.

At the end of our interaction when I informed Hannah Volz that I would be pursuing the county for the damages she became extremely hostile and argumentative going so far as to state that my needing to file for indigency due to being disabled and on a fixed income in the event that I had to sue the county in small claims was taking advantage of the system.

Her statements and my own were witnessed by Briana Yanske

I will first address inaccuracies in her report:

Wherein Hannah Volz Wrote: That I advised dispatch that a county truck threw up a rock and hit my windshield, I would contend that I never made this statement to dispatch, and if I did I was under duress and spoke incorrectly, I have been unable to obtain the related call records despite making a records request to the Sauk County Sheriff's Office and having waited over two weeks. This is directly contradicted by my statement in her report to her that the rock came out of/off of the dump truck.

The following statement: "Gabriel said they pulled in there, at which time he confronted the driver of the dump truck about the rock flying out and hitting their windshield. Gabriel said that he was being very vocal with the driver and yelling at him"

I never yelled at the driver at any point, I swore at him after he was extremely threatening for no reason, and swore at me.I initially calmly tried to explain what happened and asked to speak with a supervisor, I retain a video of this interaction in its entirety.

The statement: "Gabriel said he did that because the other guy was yelling at him in a threatening manner and he wanted to let the other guy know not to mess with him"

I never stated anything of any kind about wanting to let "the other guy" know not to mess with me, I was not interested in having a pissing match or any kind of physical altercation of any kind with an obese highway employee who had half a person's weight on me. I actually stated that I was not trying to fight Mark over a windshield directly to Hannah in front of Briana at one point. This in my opinion and I would believe the opinion of any reasonable person was an attempt by Hannah Volz to make me appear much more aggressive than at any point I was, it is good that as I have stated I recorded Mark and I's entire interaction.

The statement: Gabriel stated he understood; however he wants the county to be responsible for damaging the windshield on his vehicle.

This statement was never In any capacity uttered by me, why the hell would I WANT the county to be responsible for the damage to my windshield? What I wanted was to have not had my windshield destroyed by a rock falling off the back of a county truck, on my vehicle I struggle to be able to afford to maintain due to being low income. What I wanted was a nice day and to go to the garage sales I was headed to, to look for low cost clothing and other things I needed. What I definitely didn't want was a county walrus yelling at me and acting like he was going to attack me and then a having a cop who worked for the same county invent a narrative to defend him, once she realized I was capable of self advocating despite my disabilities. Be these things as they may I do not WANT the county to be responsible the county IS responsible its not a matter of what I want.

The statement: "Gabriel stated that he is disabled so, because of that, he gets his court fees paid for, so if it means he has to take the county to civil court and sue them over a \$100 dollar chip in his windshield then that is what he is going to do"

I never at any point put a monetary value on the damage to my vehicle as I am no expert in the cost of a windshield or repair cost, but I knew even then a destroyed windshield does not cost \$100.00, Hannah Volz actually in front of both I and Briana Yanske made a statement about the larger crack that was almost completely through my windshield when arguing with me and trying to say anything she could to try to talk me out of pursuing the county for my broken windshield, to the affect of thinking it would be a \$100.00 dollar repair, as with all of the other statements made by her that pertain to my vehicle and the county truck involved she is no expert in car repair or maintenance, so she would have no idea what she was talking about.

I am not pursuing the county out of spite I live on a fixed income of approximately 850.00 a month even the cheapest repair option for my windshield comes out to roughly 30 percent of my monthly income. I quite literally can't afford not to pursue being made whole.

Many statements made by Hannah Volz in her report are clearly made with the intent to make a lawsuit hard to win, this is unsurprising as, as I stated she at length argued with me about my wanting to pursue the county for the damage to my vehicle to the point that my roommate grabbed my arm and said lets just go she is clearly just trying to argue, Hannah makes statements that I outline that are exactly word for word what an insurance adjuster would need to fight a claim such as the one I made clear to her I was going to make.

The following statements are Hannah Volz inventing a narrative to make it hard for me to fight the county in court:

Wherein she writes: He advised dispatch that a county truck threw a rock up and hit their windshield,

Again I never stated this to dispatch this is the first of two times that Hannah makes sure to state in her report that the rock was kicked up not that it fell of the truck she goes on to state further in her report (the following apparently stated by Mark Barreau) He said, he may have kicked-up a rock with his tire; however that is part of the risk that you take operating on the roadway. This is an incredibly convenient statement, made by Mark in this report as it is a statement that would make the

county not negligent if it were true, the problem is, it is unverifiable, mark was driving the truck so he could not see behind him, and Hannah Volz was not present when the rock fell, I however have a witness who will attest to the fact that a rock fell off the back of the truck.

Wherein she writes: I asked Gabriel if he had insurance on the vehicle. He stated that he did; however, he only had liability through geico insurance company.

Hannah Volz never at any point had me produce proof of insurance, that fact coupled with this statement begs the question, why did Hannah volz ask me this question and why did she include a statement that the counties insurance would see and know they could not pay me and my insurance would not fight them if they saw? This statement is not relevant to what occurred and it is one of many that are included in what appears to be an attempt by Hannah volz to make it hard for me to make claim against the county.

Wherein Hannah writes: Gabriel stated that he understood; however he wants the county to be responsible for damaging the windshield on his vehicle. I explained to Gabriel that, essentially, it is a civil issue and that is something that could be worked out in civil court; however I did give Gabriel options on how to fix the windshield on his own.

This shows intent on hannahs part to stop me from suing the county, why would a police officer give me options on how to fix my windshield rather than pursue the county? Why would she "explain" to me how a civil issue works if I had told her I knew how to file for indigency which demonstrates that I clearly know how to file a small claims case and therefore am versed in legal civil issues.

Wherein Hannah writes: Mark explained to me that he was traveling south on USH 12. His box was completely empty.

Would mark not have had time to empty his box? Can this be verified by photo or video? Did she physically climb up onto the box and check for rocks around the rim of it where any reasonable person would believe a truck that hauls dirt and rocks most days might have a rock sitting?

Would mark not have reason as would Hannah to state the box was empty?

Wherein Hannah writes: He said that there was no gravel or rock in the back of his truck at any time.

Has he never hauled a rock with a truck designed for such?

Again would he not have reason to state this?

Wherein Hannah writes:

It appeared that the truck was in good working condition

What relevance to what occurred does this have? It appears to be nothing more than a statement made for an insurance adjuster to capitalize on, Hannah is also not an automotive expert so this carries no more weight than if you or I stated it.

Wherein Hannah writes: and that if there were any pieces of gravel in the bottom, they would not fall through any crack because it did not appear that there were any cracks in the box of the dump truck.

If Mark had stated there was no rock or gravel, why was this included? What relevance does this statement have other than to further hammer home the point for an insurance adjuster that the county couldn't possibly be negligent? Did Hannah physically climb into the truck to check for cracks? I doubt that. Again Hannah is no automotive expert so these points although on her part I am sure they were believed to be smart by her, carry no real weight and would not in a court room.

The final point I'd like to address is this statement:

Mark told me that at the time, the male stated, "she has a gun" and pointed to the driver who was Briana. Mark explained that he responded by saying "if you have a

gun on county property then I am going to be calling the Sheriff's Department." Mark told me that, at that time, the occupants got back into the car and left the scene.

This statement by Mark is a curious one as no Wisconsin law prohibits the carrying of a gun on county property if not in a building, without there being posted signage preventing such. And the gun would not be illegally carried if inside of a car driven by a person with a conceal carry such as the one Briana Yanske holds.

This shows that Mark is manipulative and seeks to lie or omit facts to conceal the truth of what occurred in his interactions with myself.

Mark in his statements completely omitted the fact that after being told that Briana Yanske had a gun, he began to rant and rave about having been threatened with a gun. It is too bad for mark that I recorded the entirety of our interactions and can show him to be an unreliable person prone to purposefully changing narratives as he and Hannah have in the confines of her report, based on his actions in the video that he omitted and the statement about conceal carrying a gun he made in an attempt to scare us into leaving without reporting his damaging our vehicle.

All of the rhetorical questions above I think would make a great case against the report written by Hannah volz in a court room setting.


I would like the county to pay for my windshield they broke due to the direct negligence of Mark Barreau. I would like to be paid 247.93 the lowest estimate for a full windshield replacement I received.

If I am made to file in small claims against the county as high as gas is I will also seek additional reimbursement for the gas involved in getting the quotes, the gas it would take to drive to get the repairs, the hours I worked on this letter and made phone calls required for it, the cost of the ink and paper I used to make 2 copies of this letter, the cost of postage for this letter, and possibly the cost of therapy appointments to deal with the extreme mental distress caused by Mark.

In the event that they do not I will pursue all legal options available to me.

In almost 6 years of living in sauk to my knowledge I have only had a parking ticket. I am a productive member of society in spite of severe disabilities, I donate skateboards to the local skateboard shop to be used by youth camps members who cannot afford them. I am a tax paying citizen and what was done to me both by Marks behavior and Hannah Volz narrative and the destruction of my windshield are wrong.

Resolution Assigning Funds as of December 31, 2021 and Amending the 2021 Budget

Resolution offered by the Finance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Throughout the year, various additional funds become available that require no additional County matching funds or are expansions of existing grant funding and programs. Also throughout the year, additional expenditures are incurred for which funding is available. At the completion of each year's annual financial audit after all transactions have been recorded, a final resolution is brought forward to present a summary of departments and/or funds that exceeded their annual appropriations. This resolution authorizes amendments to the budget for those departments and/or funds that had offsetting revenues or fund balances, as well as for departments without offsetting funding and in need of a transfer from the contingency fund.

The 2021 contingency fund was originally budgeted at \$430,000, funded completely by General Fund balance. During 2021, \$120,000 was already transferred from the contingency fund, leaving \$310,000 available for overdrawn departments.

Further, during consideration of bond issuance for construction of Highway facilities and related equipment purchases, the Board of Supervisors authorized up to \$50 million of debt issuance for these projects. Actual issuance of debt was \$45 million with the understanding that the remaining \$5 million be funded by General Fund balance if needed.

WHEREAS, the following General Fund departments' net budgets, expenses less revenues received, were exceeded in 2021 as follows:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, to authorize the County Administrator to enter a contract with Parkitecture + Planning, LLC for the design and engineering of the horse campground at White Mound County Park.

Ordinance Amendment to approve a map amendment (rezoning) of lands in the Town of Greenfield from Resource Conservancy to a Commercial Zoning District filed upon State 113 LLC, property owner, Michelle Gillette, registered agent.

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND:

Background: State 113 LLC own property in the NE ¼, NW ¼, Section 07, T11N, R07E, Town of Greenfield, and has requested a map amendment (rezoning) of property legally described pursuant to petition 13-2022 from Resource Conservancy to Commercial zoning. The intent of the map amendment (rezoning) being to bring existing businesses on the property into compliance with Sauk County ordinances by locating the businesses within a proper zoning district. The property currently is zoned Resource Conservancy which does not support the use of a warehousing, self-storage facility, or miniwarehousing.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.69(5) Sauk County has the authority to develop, adopt, and amend a zoning ordinance. At a public hearing held by the Land Resources and Environment (LRE) Committee on May 24, 2022; the LRE Committee made findings pursuant to Sauk County Code of Ordinance §7.150(9) and recommended approval of the map amendment.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §66.1001 Wisconsin Statutes, any program or action of a local governmental unit that affects land use shall be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The Sauk County Comprehensive Plan, adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in 2009, defines managing and focusing "on efficient land use patterns that promotes redevelopment of under-utilized lands. It sets limits on outward growth, incorporates permanent land preservation techniques, and achieves livable communities." Upon evaluation of the request, the Land Resources and Environment Committee found that the rezone request to a Commercial Zoning district maintains this objective.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 7.005(2) Official Zoning Map of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows:

Rezone of the approximate southerly 3.08 acres of tax parcel 018-0212-00000 from a Resource Conservancy Zoning District to a Commercial Zoning District.

In doing so, these public motorized trails are eligible for grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The program funds 100% of the cost for the acquisition, development, insurance, and maintenance of public trails. Funding for the program comes from registration fees and a portion of tax on gasoline. Grant applications must be submitted by the local governing body to the DNR.

Sauk County is facilitating the grant on behalf of the Driftless Area Sports Riders, a local off-highway motorcycle (OHM) club. The OHM club is requesting funds to cover the cost of a one-two day special event for OHM riders in the fall of 2022. The estimated cost is \$1,925, which would be used to reimburse the OHM club for actual expenses incurred such as insurance and signage. The grant also covers County staff time. The club will volunteer labor to administer, prepare, staff and clean-up after the event.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Parks Operations Coordinator and Land Resources and Environment Director, under the direction of the Land Resources and Environment Committee, be authorized to submit an application on behalf of the Driftless Area Sports Riders to the State of Wisconsin DNR for any financial aid that may be available for a proposed event as well as submit reimbursement claims along with supporting documentation within proper timeframe of project completion dates; sign and submit documents and take necessary action to undertake, direct and complete the approved project.

Resolution to Amend the 2022 LRE Budget to Include Funding for a Streambank Project at the County Farm

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee and Finance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department entered into a Water Quality Brokering Agreement with the Village of Loganville in December 2020. Loganville was seeking authorization as part of its Wisconsin Pollution Discharge Elimination System (WPDES) permit to discharge total phosphorus above levels otherwise authorized to do so by their permit. To do so, Loganville would need to execute conservation practices, which would reduce total phosphorus pollution in the watershed at other locations.

County staff worked with the Village of Loganville to identify property owners that may be willing to work on projects that meet this objective. The County Farm stream was identified as a potential project site for stream bank work to be completed. Given that the project is located on County owned property, the Village of Loganville requested financial assistance for the project.

The LRE Committee discussed the financial assistance request with the Village's contracted engineering service who is working on the projects. The LRE Committee recommended that if financial assistance is provided, funds should be from general fund balance at a cost to the County of no more than 33% of the overall estimated project costs. The estimated cost for 3,500 linear feet of streambank restoration is \$153,530. This would result in a cost to the County of \$50,665. The remaining \$102,866 would be paid by the Village of Loganville.

The project will be constructed over a few years period from 2022 to potentially 2024. Funding for the project may be carried forward within the LRE Budget from year to year, until its completion.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to authorize an amendment to the 2022 Budget to include funding for Streambank work at the County Farm associated with a Water Quality Brokering Agreement with the Village of Loganville.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the 2022 Budget be amended to include \$50,665 of general fund balance towards the identified project.

GLS Utility LLC was the most responsive bidder. It is estimated that over the three-year contract with GLS Utility LLC, Sauk County will spend approximately \$200,609. The funds for this contract are a part of the Building Services annual contracted services budget.

GENERAL CODE OF SAUK COUNTY, WISCONSIN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT # 9 - 2012

Ordinance Amendment to Sauk County Code Chapter 15 to Add All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) and Utility-Terrain Vehicle (UTV) Crossings and Routes on County **Highways**

Ordinance Amendment offered by Highway Committee

Chapter 15 was originally created and adopted by The Sauk County Board of Supervisors on April 16, 2013, by Ordinance No. 6-2013. Chapter 15 sets forth the procedure and criteria for designating and approving county highway segments and crossings as ATV/UTV routes, and states the applicable rules for trail construction and maintenance, and operation. Over the last nine years multiple requests for routes on

County Highways and State Highways have been approved by the County Board. While originally starting as short connecting routes between Town Roads currently over 80% of

County Highway mileage are designated as ATV/UTV/Routes. The proposed update to Chapter 15 would open all County Highways as ATV/UTV Routes. The State of

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has determined that a County Board must approve all ATV/UTV routes on State Highways individually. The state routes are

reviewed by the Highway Department and Highway Committee. Sauk Co. Code §15.003 states that if the Highway Committee recommends approval of a route or crossing, an ordinance approving the decision shall be prepared for consideration by the County

Board. No route or crossing is approved until action of the County Board.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the All-Terrain Vehicle and Utility-Terrain Vehicle routes on State Highways identified on the Appendix to this Ordinance are hereby approved, to be effective upon passage.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Administrator hereby authorized

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Chapter 15 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

15.001 Authority and purpose. The Sauk County Board has considered the recreational and economic value of all-terrain vehicle (ATV) and utility-terrain vehicle (UTV) trail opportunities while also considering protecting the safety of all motorists and users of the roadway by maintaining the road edge, surface and integrity of the right-of-way, public safety, liability aspects, terrain involved, traffic density, and history of automobile traffic. The establishment of this ordinance is for the recreational and economic value to the ATV/UTV public and Sauk County makes no warranty expressed or implied that the routes, crossings, or trails are safe for the operation of these motorized vehicles. After due consideration, this ordinance is created pursuant to county board authority under Wis. Stat. §§ 59.02, 23.33(8)(b) and 23.33(11).

15.002 State laws and definitions adopted. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the statutory provisions in Wis. Stat. chs. 23, 340 to 348, and 350 establishing definitions and regulations with respect to ATVs and UTVs, and Wis. Adm. Code. ch. NR 64, All-Terrain Vehicles, exclusive of any provisions therein relating to penalties to be imposed and exclusive of any regulations for which the statutory penalty is a fine or term of imprisonment, are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this chapter as if fully set forth herein. Unless otherwise provided in this chapter, any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this ordinance. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of the statutes or administrative codes incorporated herein are made a part of this chapter in order to secure uniform statewide regulation of ATVs and UTVs, except to the extent that the provisions of this chapter are more restrictive.

(2) As used in this chapter, the following term shall have the following meaning:

"Sponsor" means an individual, organization, ATV or UTV club, or municipality that submits an application to the Sauk County Highway Department for the designation of a county trunk highway or state bridge crossing as an ATV/UTV route and agrees to pay for the costs to make, install, and maintain ATV/UTV route signs.

15.003 Delegation to highway committee. The Sauk County Highway Committee (Committee) is authorized to recommend segments of Sauk County trunk highways and state bridge crossings as ATV/UTV routes, in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 23.33, Wis. Admin. Code Ch. NR § 64, and this chapter. Final approval shall require adoption of an ordinance by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.

15.004 Designation, modification, suspension and termination of ATV/UTV routes.
(1) All Sauk County Highways are open for ATV/UTV use.

(4 2) The Sauk County Highway Department and Sheriff's Department shall monitor existing and review proposed ATV/UTV routes for compliance with this ordinance and to prevent unauthorized or adverse use of county trunk highways or unreasonable interference with other private or public property uses.

(23) Any individual, municipality, ATV or UTV club or organization may apply for an ATV/UTV route designation along, or a trail crossing over, a county trunk highway if they agree to sponsor the ATV/UTV route as required under Sauk Co. Code ss. 15.007 and 15.008.

- (3) The highway commissioner shall apply the criteria listed in Sauk Co. Code s. 15.006 when evaluating a proposed ATV/UTV route designation for the Committee.
- (4) The Sauk County Board of Supervisors may rescind or modify the designation of an ATV/UTV route by ordinance.
- (5) The Committee may temporarily modify or suspend any ATV/UTV route designation upon recommendation of the highway commissioner or Sauk County Sheriff and shall immediately report such modification or suspension to the Sauk County Board of Supervisors for final approval or disapproval.

- (6) The highway commissioner may, without prior approval of the Committee, modify or suspend any ATV/UTV route designation for up to 120 days whenever conditions require closure, upon failure of sponsor to pay for repairs and maintenance as provided in Sauk Co. Code ss. 15.007 and 15.008 or upon recommendation of the Sauk County Sheriff.
- (7) The Sauk County Sheriff may temporarily close any ATV/UTV route whenever conditions require closure and shall immediately notify the highway commissioner of such closure.
 - (8) Upon county board adoption of a designated ATV/UTV route ordinance:
- (a) The county clerk shall immediately send a copy of the ordinance to the Sauk County Highway Department, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the state traffic patrol, the Sauk County Sheriff, and to the law enforcement agency and clerk of each municipality having jurisdiction over any of the county trunk highways to which the ordinance designating ATV/UTV route applies.
- (b) A copy of designated ATV/UTV routes, along with a map showing their location, shall be kept on file at the highway department, provided to the sheriff's department, and posted on the Sauk County website.
- (9) Designation of segments of the Sauk County Highway System as ATV/UTV routes shall not imply and does not impose upon the Sauk County Highway Department a greater duty of care or responsibility for maintenance of those segments than for any other segment of county highway, nor does it guarantee the safety of the routes. Operators of ATVs/UTVs on county highways designated as an ATV/UTV route assume all the usual and normal risks of ATV/UTV operation.
- (10) In addition to establishing ATV/UTV routes to connect ATV/UTV routes and trails as defined in Wis. Stat. § 23.33(1)(d), the Committee may establish routes for the purpose of connecting off-road trails established by private entities for the exclusive use of their members, their invitees, or other persons paying a fee for use of the trail. However, the use of the route along the roadway may not be limited to those persons approved by or paying a fee to the private entity.
- (11) Under Wis. Stat. ss. 23.33(4)(d)3.b. and (11)(am)3., Sauk County authorizes the operation of ATVs/UTVs on State Trunk Highway bridges as shown on Sauk County's Approved ATV/UTV Map Book.

In addition, all ATV/UTV operators must do the following:

- a. Cross the bridge in the most direct manner practicable and at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing.
 - b. Stay as far to the right of the roadway or shoulder as practicable.
 - c. Stop the vehicle prior to the crossing.

- d. Yield the right-of-way to other vehicles, pedestrians, <u>electric scooters and</u> electric personal assistive mobility devices using the roadway or shoulder.
 - e. Exit the highway as quickly and safely as practicable after crossing the bridge.
- f. Comply with all state regulations, codes, statutes and orders pertaining to ATV/UTV operation.
- 15.005 Application process for ATV/UTV routes. (1) Anyone requesting an ATV/UTV route designation shall complete an application on a form prescribed by the highway commissioner in compliance with this ordinance, the Wisconsin Statute and Administrative Code, and file the complete application with the highway department by January 1 each year.
 - (2) A complete application must include the following:
 - (a) A map showing the proposed ATV/UTV route including all segments on a county

- (b) A map showing any ATV/UTV routes and trails which intersect with the proposed ATV/UTV route.
- (c) A sworn statement that the sponsor has legally enforceable permission from all affected landowners to use their property for the proposed ATV/UTV trail.
- (d c) A statement of reasons explaining why the county trunk highway segment or segments should be designated as an ATV/UTV route.
- (e) If the spensor is an organization, the names and addresses of its officers, the date when the organization was established or incorporated, the number of members, and a copy of the organization bylaws.
- (fd) A statement that the sponsor will execute a support and maintenance agreement with Sauk County for financial and maintenance support of the proposed route including payments for the procurement, installation, and maintenance of the required ATV/UTV route signs and approaches in right-of-way required by applicable state statutes and administrative codes and the provisions of this ordinance.
- (g) A copy of a supporting resolution or ordinance of the municipality in which the ATV or UTV route is located.
- Upon receipt by the Highway Department of an application for an ATV/UTV route designation, the highway department shall notify any municipality in which the proposed ATV/UTV route designation is located of the application.
- The highway commissioner shall review a complete application for conformance with the criteria set forth in Sauk Co. Code s. 15.006, and with all applicable state, federal and local laws and regulations.
- The highway commissioner shall make a report and recommendation to the Committee on each complete application for a designation of a segment of county trunk highway segment or state bridge crossing as an ATV/UTV route.
- (6) The Committee will consider the highway commissioner report and the criteria in Sauk Co. Code s. 15.006 in determining whether to approve or deny an application for ATV/UTV route designation.

15.006 Criteria. The following shall be considered in examining an ATV/UTV-route designation application:

- (1) Is the application sufficiently complete, detailed and documented.
- 186 (2) Does the proposed route conform with all applicable state, federal, and local 187 188 laws and regulations.
- (3) Does each affected municipality support the proposed ATV/UTV routes within 189 their jurisdiction, and was each affected municipality netified of the application. 190
- Is there a need for the ATV/UTV route designation of the county trunk highway. 192
- (5) Does the requested segment connect segments of ATV/UTV trail or route 193 194 networks.
- (6) Length of segment requested. 195
- The safety of all users, including ATV/UTV riders, pedestrians, bicyclists, 196 motorcyclists, motor vehicle operators, and other transportation users. 197
- (8) Posted speed limit of the roadway. 198
- (9) Traffic volume on requested segment. 199
- (10) Pavement condition (PASER Rating). 200
- (11) Pavement width. 201
- (12) Vertical or horizontal alignment safety concerns. 202
- 203 ____(13) Crossings free from obstructions.
- (14) Report and recommendation of the Sauk County Highway Commissioner. 204

15.007 15.006 Signage of ATV/UTV routes. (1) The sponsor for an ATV/UTV route designation shall pay for the projected cost of procurement and installation of signs relating to the ATV/UTV route, as determined by the highway commissioner. The highway commissioner shall prepare an estimate of the cost of procurement and installation of the signage and furnish the estimate to the sponsor.

- (2) Upon passage of an ordinance designating an ATV/UTV route on a county trunk highway, the sponsor shall provide the highway department payment of the full cost for procurement and installation of signs for the approved ATV/UTV route. Failure to make payment in full may result in the highway commissioner suspending the designated ATV/UTV route until payment in full is received by the Sauk County Highway Department.
- (3) The Sauk County Highway Department is solely responsible for ATV/UTV route signage installation and no person may install any sign on a designated ATV/UTV route without written authorization of the highway commissioner.
- (4) All required signs shall be in accordance with state statutes and administrative codes applicable to ATV/UTV routes on county trunk highways and bridge crossings.
- (5) No person may erect, remove, obscure, or deface any authorized ATV/UTV route sign without written authorization of the highway commissioner.
- (6) A sponsor is solely responsible for all ATV/UTV route sign maintenance and repair costs. Upon determining need for repair or maintenance, the highway commissioner shall provide to the sponsor of an approved ATV/UTV route a statement of the cost for repair and maintenance. Full payment for cost of repair and maintenance must be paid to the highway department within 30 days receipt of statement. Failure to make payment in full may result in temporary suspension of the designated ATV/UTV route until payment is made in full.

15.008 15.007 Construction and maintenance of ATV/UTV routes, approaches or crossings. Required construction and maintenance of crossings and routes shall be performed as follows:

- (1) A sponsor shall furnish all materials, do all work, and pay all costs in connection with the construction or maintenance of the approach or crossing and its appurtenances within the right-of-way to the standards required by the county. The county shall not give, sell, or otherwise provide any equipment, labor, or materials for the project.
- (2) A sponsor shall construct any roadway approach or crossing utilizing a preapproved plan and traffic control procedure explained by an authorized highway department employee. The highway department shall inspect the site of each route and each crossing before and during construction to ensure compliance with requirements.
- (3) Maintenance of approaches or crossings is the responsibility of the organization or person signing the application. The highway department may monitor approaches and crossings on a periodic basis. The results of these reviews may indicate a need for maintenance. In such case, the highway department will notify the person signing the application of those needs and the person or organization will have 10 days to complete the necessary maintenance or repairs. Failure to timely complete the necessary maintenance or repairs may result in the suspension or closure of the approved ATV/UTV route.
- (4) No revisions or additions shall be made to the route or crossing or its appurtenances on the right-of-way without the written permission of the Committee.
 - (5) All construction and maintenance shall be done subject to the rules and

regulations prescribed by the highway department and be performed and completed to the highway department's satisfaction.

- (6) All trails, approaches, and crossings must meet and comply with all local regulations and ordinances.
- 15.009 15.008 Operation on ATV/UTV routes and crossings. (1) No person shall operate an ATV or UTV on a county trunk highway unless the county trunk highway has been designated as an ATV/UTV route by the Committee and the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, except for operation that is allowed under state statute or administrative code.
- (2) No person shall operate an ATV or UTV on a county trunk highway designated as an ATV/UTV route if the county trunk highway is closed for any reason.
- (3) The following restrictions apply to operation of ATVs and UTVs on all county trunk highways designated as ATV/UTV routes:
- (a) Operators shall abide by all traffic laws, including the rules of operation and equipment requirements contained in Wis. Stat. § 23.33 and Wis. Adm. Code. ch. NR 64, unless further restricted by this chapter.
- (b) ATVs and UTVs may only be operated on an approved ATV/UTV route between ½ hour before sunrise and ½ hour after sunset.
- (c) ATVs and UTVs shall be operated on a route at a safe speed not to exceed $\frac{35}{45}$ miles per hour unless a reduced speed is otherwise required by law or roadway conditions.
- (d) All ATV and UTV operators shall slow to a safe and prudent speed when there are animals on or near the roadway.
- (e) All ATVs and UTVs must operate with fully functional headlights, taillights, and brake lights.
- (f) All ATV or UTV operators shall ride in single file on the extreme right-hand side of the paved portion of the highway. Operation on the gravel shoulders, grassy in-slope, ditches, or other highway right-of-way is prohibited. Left turns may be made from any part of the highway when it is safe given prevailing conditions.
- (g) Crossing should be made only at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing. "Obstruction" includes, but is not limited to, impairment of view and potentially hazardous roadway conditions.
- (h) No person under the age of 16 may operate an ATV or UTV on any segment of a county trunk highway that is a designated ATV/UTV route.
- ($\frac{i}{h}$) Every person who operates an ATV or UTV on any segment of a county trunk highway which is designated as an ATV/UTV route shall have in his or her immediate pessession a valid motor vehicle operator's license and shall display the license document upon demand from any law enforcement officer, state patrol officer, inspector under Wis. Stat. § 110.07(1), conservation warden, or municipal peace officer.
- (j i) No person may ride in or on any part of an ATV or UTV that is not designated or intended to be used by passengers.
- (k i) No operator or passenger of an ATV or UTV may possess, in or on an ATV or UTV on any county trunk highway, any bottle or receptacle containing alcohol beverages if the bottle or receptacle has been opened, the seal has been broken or the contents of the bottle or receptacle have been partially removed or released.
- ($\frac{1}{K}$) All ATV and UTV equipment is required to have applicable liability insurance and have proof of insurance.
- 15.010 15.009 Enforcement. (1) This chapter shall be enforced by any law enforcement official as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 23.33(12).
 - (2) Adoption of this chapter shall not prohibit any law enforcement officer or DNR


warden from proceeding under any other ordinance, regulation, statute, law or order that pertains to the subject matter under this chapter.

- **15.011 15.010 Penalties and remedies. (1)** Any person who violates any section of this ordinance or statutes adopted by reference, other than a violation under s. 15.011(3) of this ordinance, shall pay a forfeiture of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$500.00 for each offense, as established in Sauk Co. Code ch. 20. Said forfeiture is exclusive of mandatory assessments and costs.
- (2) If it cannot be readily determined which individual is directly responsible for damage to or destruction of a route designation requirement, the person having signed the permit application shall be deemed responsible and cited for violations. A statement to that effect shall appear on the application above the signature line. A failure to pay such forfeiture may form a basis for revocation of a permit.
- (3) The penalty for operating an ATV/UTV off the roadway of a designated ATV/UTV route to include the grassy in-slope, ditches, or other highway right-of-way; other than for direct access from a trail to a roadway on a designated trail, or operating outside of permitted times for route use, or operating in excess of permitted speed; shall result in a forfeiture of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$250.00, as established in Sauk Co. Code ch. 20. Said forfeiture is exclusive of mandatory assessments and costs.
- (4) In addition to any forfeiture, a court may order restitution to repair any damage caused by violation of this chapter.

Resolution Authorizing Amendments to the Sauk County Farm and Health Care Center Cropland and Pasture Lease Agreements.

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

Sauk County owns approximately 294 acres of cropland and pasture, known as the Sauk County Farm in the town of Reedsburg. An additional 12 acres of cropland are located adjacent to the current Sauk County Health Care Center in the City of Reedsburg. In March 2022, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors adopted the Sauk County Farm Property Master Plan outlining how the farm will showcase new and innovative conservation practices that prevent soil erosion and reduce agricultural runoff to protect groundwater and surface water resources. Cropland and pasture are leased to local farmers every five years and a competitive bidding procedure is used to solicit bids for renting this land. Sauk County entered into three lease agreements for such premises that commenced on March 1, 2018 and will terminate on February 28, 2023. In discussions with the operators, the LRE department has suggested changing the lease end date to December 31, 2022 to better align with future activities outlined in the Sauk County Property Master Plan. The amendment to the leases would change the end date to December 31, 2022 and slightly reduce the rental payment for 2022.

WHEREAS, Sauk County entered into three lease agreements for cropland and pasture at the Sauk County Farm and cropland at the Sauk County Health Care Center on March 1, 2018 for a period of five years beginning March 1, 2018 and ending February 28, 2023; and,

WHEREAS, Sauk County and the operators desire to amend the lease agreements based upon terms and conditions set forth within the amendment attached as Exhibit A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the attached amendment is hereby agreed to and the Administrator and the County Clerk are hereby authorized to execute an amendment to such lease agreement.

Ordinance Amendment to Chapter 7, Sauk County Code of Ordinance

Ordinance Amendment offered by Land Resources and Environment Committee

BACKGROUND:

Petition to the Land Resources and Environment Committee for a text amendment to Chapter 7, Sauk County Code of Ordinance. The request would include amendments to Section 7.011(13), the definition of animal sanctuary to include the words "Animal Rescue"; to Section 7.035(1), Use Table, to allow an Animal Sanctuary/Animal Rescue within the RC Zoning District with the approval of a conditional use permit; and to Section 7.077 Secondary Standards. The proposed text amendment request by the applicant has been further modified by the department to address public health, safety, and general welfare concerns. The proposed amendment would affect all Towns within the unincorporate lands of Sauk County within the agricultural, resource conservancy and rural community zoning districts. The ability to enact the proposed ordinance amendment is granted pursuant to Wis Stats. §. 59.59.

WHEREAS, Sauk County is granted the authority to enact a text amendment pursuant to Wis. Stats. §59.69(5)(e); and,

WHEREAS, the Land Resources and Environment Committee held a public hearing on June 28, 2022 and recommended approval of the ordinance amendment as presented; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect no later than 40 days after the County Board decision unless the majority of towns affected file resolutions with the Sauk County Clerk, approving or disapproving the amendment after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions, or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

BACKGROUND: Sauk County government serves a population of approximately 65,750 residents. The County currently has nearly 650 full-time and part-time employees, 550 of which are non-union. Sauk County's current compensation plan was developed in 2013 and implemented mid-year in 2014. During the past 8 years, only isolated minor updates have occurred. We have an aging workforce and over the next five years approximately 37% of our workforce will be eligible for retirement, and a valid compensation plan will be critical to our efforts to attract qualified replacements.

WHEREAS, the 2022 budget, as adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, authorized an operational analysis of the Sauk County Classification and Compensation Plan for all employees (excluding sworn members of WPPA Local 241); and

WHEREAS, a Request for Proposal (RFP) was developed and issued to elicit bids from qualified firms to conduct a Classification and Compensation Analysis,

WHEREAS, a review panel consisting of the Administrator, Corporation Counsel, Finance Director, and Human Resources Director reviewed and analyzed the five proposals received based on the experience/reliability (30 out of 120 points), expertise of personnel (30 out of 120 points), method of performance (30 out of 120 points), and cost (30 out of 120 points) and,

WHEREAS, based on the review panel's analysis, the Personnel and Insurance Committee recommend McGrath Human Resource Group to conduct the Classification and Compensation Analysis.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Administrator be and hereby is authorized to enter into such contract with McGrath Human Resource Group, with Corporation Counsel's review of said contract, in an amount not to exceed \$77,695.

Revenues

Overall, 31.02% of annual revenues have been recognized through June. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both property taxes which are recorded 1/12th every month, and transfers between Sauk County funds which have an equal offsetting expense. Note that sales tax (discussed in more detail later) lags by one month.

- Many of Sauk County's grants and aids, the largest revenue source after property tax levy, are paid on a reimbursement basis. The County incurs the expenses, submits the paperwork to primarily the State, and reimbursement comes later. For this reason, many grant dollars lag the percentages. Grants and aids are the highest revenue source for the County other than property taxes. Additionally, the grants and aids budget includes American Rescue Plan Act funds of \$8,660,007 which have only been minimally spent to date, so only minimally recognized. In Human Services, many Wisconsin Department of Health & Family Services payments are received in July for the first half of the year, approximately \$3.2 million. Transportation aids of \$1,602,000 are received 25% in January, 50% in July, and 25% in October. Local road improvement funds of \$1,000,000 are received in December. Shared revenue of \$771,800 is received 15% in July and 85% in November. CDBG Close Federalized grant funds of \$375,000 will not be received until project(s) are completed.
- User fees seem to be generally on track for the first half of 2022; however, 75% of the County's user fees are generated by the nursing home. With staffing shortages, the Health Care Center has needed to limit admissions, so these revenues are lagging.
- Licenses and permits largely relate to retail food licenses issued by Environmental Health. Budgeted at \$485,000, these dollars are generally received in May through June.
- Fines, forfeitures and penalties are typically highest in the summer months.
- Interest earned on invested funds is rebounding as 2022 progresses. Budgeted interest was set conservatively low.
- Donations are slightly lower than budgeted due to congregate mealsites being limited due to COVID restrictions. Losses are moderated by successful restaurant model meal provision and home delivered meals donations.

Property taxes are due on January 31 and are collected by local treasurers through that date. After January 31, all collections become the responsibility of the County. By August 15, Sauk County must make full payment to all the other taxing jurisdictions without regard to what has been collected. Outstanding taxes as of July 31, 2022 follow. This means uncollected delinquent taxes due to Sauk County equal \$8,971,690, which is \$2,651,370 more than a year ago at this time. The increase is a function of the due date of July 31 being on a weekend, allowing additional time until the following Monday for timely payments. Also, payments by credit card have more than doubled. Timely credit card payments take an extra few days to clear the banks. If the impact of weekend due dates and credit card payments is taken into account, collections are \$60,000 better in 2022 than in 2021. Of this total, about 23.87% (about \$2,160,000) was originally levied to fund County operations. The remaining 76.13% was originally levied by schools and other local governments. The second installment of the 2021 levy, collected 2022, was due July 31, 2022.

Sales tax receipts lag the month of sale by two months. For instance, for sales made at stores during January, vendors report and remit the sales tax to the State at the end of February, the State processes the information throughout March, and the County receives its payment at the end of March or possibly even the first part of April. Therefore, the County's financial reports as of the end of March only contain sales made through February. Further, sales tax is not at all received equally each month through the year. Summer receipts and the December holidays are higher. Sauk County increased its sales tax budget for 2022 to \$9,482,726.

Adjusting the budget for historical seasonal receipts, 2022 sales tax collections are ahead of budget at this point.

Expenditures

Expenditures for wages, salaries and benefits tend to be spread relatively evenly throughout the year, and it is generally reasonable to assume 1/12th should be recorded each month. Supplies and services in most areas also tend to be spent fairly evenly throughout the year. Debt service is paid in April (interest only) and October (principal and interest). Capital outlay is rarely spent evenly, and there are huge peaks and valleys by month or quarter.

Overall, 40.94% of annual expenditures have been recognized through June. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both debt service and transfers between Sauk County funds which have equal offsetting revenues.

Current Sauk County 2022 Financial Position

Sauk County managers spend a great deal of effort monitoring the Sauk County budget, making plans when areas of concern develop, and taking action (often with Committee and County Board action) when trouble is certain.

The impact of the economy is also watched through a number of key areas, including property tax collections, key planning and zoning permits, register of deeds collections, and interest earned on invested funds.

Cash balances: Cash balances remain strong and are invested with preservation of principal as the primary objective. The Treasurer is managing the liquidity of maturing investments in anticipation of increasing interest rates. Cash balances are normally lowest in December/January before property tax collections come in and highest in June/July with tax payment due July 31.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: the Wisconsin Department of Health Services {OHS} states the mission of the Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) is, "To provide older adults and people with physical or developmental/intellectual disabilities the resources needed to live with dignity and security and achieve maximum independence and quality of life." The goal of the ADRC is to empower individuals to make informed choices and to streamline access to the right and appropriate services and supports. Since July 2008 (Resolution # 140-07) the Sauk County ADRC has been a partner in the Eagle Country ADRC consortium managing the employees and services of the ADRC, Sauk County office and meeting the OHS Scope of Services contract requirements. In order to provide the highest level of service and program options to the citizens of Sauk County eligible for aging and ADRC services, the Sauk County Aging & Disability Resource Center and Veteran's Service Office Committee recommends that the Sauk County ADRC leave the Eagle Country ADRC and become a standalone agency. In order to become a standalone agency, notice needs to be provided to the Eagle Country ADRC and the State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors does hereby support and authorize the Sauk County ADRC to execute and submit the Notice of Intent to Submit an Application to operate a standalone ADRC and to notify the Eagle Country ADRC of Sauk County's intent to withdraw as a partner by January 1st, 2023 and seek an early release from any contractual obligations of the regional partnership.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County ADRC is authorized to take any action necessary with the State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services to effectuate the Sauk County ADRC to become a standalone ADRC by January 1st, 2023.







The parties shall indemnify and hold harmless the other, its officers and employees from and against damages, claims liabilities, fines, penalties and expenses (to include reasonable attorney's fees) due to its negligent acts, willful misconduct, errors or omissions of any Axim employee during the performance of its obligations hereunder that arise out of (1) injuries or death to persons or damage to property, (2) services and/or deliverables agreed to under this order (3) violation of any federal, state, county or municipal laws. Axim's total liability to Customer for any reason shall not exceed the total amount paid to Axim by Customer for the services provided under this Agreement.

Axim's duty to defend and hold harmless Customer shall not apply to any liability claim for damages or injuries arising from or as a result of the negligence of Customer or employees / agents of Customer.

Axim shall have no liability for any claim of infringement to the extent based on (1) the use of a superseded or altered version of any Axim provided product or framework or (2) the combination, operation or use of the Axim provided product with software, hardware or other materials not furnished or authorized to be used by Axim.

To the extent permitted by law, in no event shall either party be liable to the other for any lost revenues, lost profits, incidental, indirect, consequential, special or punitive damages of any kind.

10. WARRANTY.

Axim warrants that it will perform the services in good faith and in conformance with professional industry standards. All Axim employees, that work on the project, shall have the knowledge, education, training, skills and experience of the subject matter to which they will be performing services.



AXIM'S AGGREGATE LIABILITY FOR DAMAGES ARISING OUT OF, RELATING TO OR IN ANY WAY CONNECTED WITH THE RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES, THIS AGREEMENT, ITS NEGOTIATION OR TERMINATION, OR PURSUANT TO ANY SOW (WHETHER IN CONTRACT OR TORT) SHALL IN NO EVENT EXCEED THE AMOUNT OF FEES RECEIVED BY AXIM FROM CUSTOMER PURSUANT TO THE APPLICABLE SOW UNDER WHICH THE ALLEGED LIABILITY AROSE.

12. FORCE MAJEURE.

Neither party will be liable to the other for delays in performing any obligations under the Agreement due to circumstances beyond its reasonable control, including but not limited to revolts, insurrections, riots, wars, acts of enemies, national emergency, strikes, floods, earthquake, embargo, inability to secure materials or





transportation, and acts of God, and other events beyond the reasonable control of the parties caused by nature or governmental authorities.

16. DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

Customer and Axim shall endeavor to resolve any controversy, claim or dispute arising out of or relating to the Agreement, or the performance or breach thereof, by negotiation. Any claim that is not resolved by negotiation within thirty (30) days of notification shall be settled by arbitration administered by the American Arbitration Association under its Commercial Arbitration Rules, and judgment on the award rendered by the arbitrator(s) may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. The hearing locale will be held in the AAA office closest to Axim corporate headquarters.

17. OTHER.

This Agreement shall be governed by and constructed in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin without regard to conflicts of laws provisions thereof.

Both Axim and Customer will comply with all laws applicable to the Agreement.

All notices given under the Agreement will be effective when received in writing. Notices to the Customer and Axim will be sent to the address provided in the proposal.

Changes to the Agreement must be in writing and must be signed by both parties.

18. COMPLETE AGREEMENT.

Customer acknowledges it has read the Agreement, understands it and agrees to be bound by its Terms and Conditions. This contract contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes any and all prior agreements, understandings and communications between Customer and Axim related to the subject matter of this contract. No amendment or modification of this contract shall bind either party unless it is in writing and is signed by Customer's authorized representative and an authorized representative of Axim.

This digital network is essential in transitioning the state's 911 system from the old and outdated analog system to a current and advanced NextGeneration 911 system. 2019 Wisconsin Act 26 created a much needed PSAP grant program aimed to provide grant dollars for advanced training of telecommunicators; equipment or software expenses; and incentives to consolidate some or all the functions of two or more PSAPs. 2019 Wisconsin Act 26 requires that only one PSAP per county receive the grant funds. DMA Chapter 2 requires the county board of supervisors determine the one PSAP per county via resolution except for Milwaukee County where the intergovernmental Cooperation Council will make the determination.

The 2019 space needs assessment also identified the highest priority places needing attention and grouped those areas together into phases. Phase I was security upgrades to the Courthouse and Reedsburg Human Services and has been substantially completed. Phase II is upgrading office suites for ADRC, Veteran Services, and a leased space used by the Job Center. A request for proposal (RFP) was written for the architecture and engineering to renovate the specified spaces. This work will enable the ADRC staff to have individual private offices instead of sharing an office, like they currently are doing. This change will allow for more privacy when meeting with clients along with modernizing the current office layout and furniture. Work to be completed in the Veterans office is to update the office area with a second door of egress along with modernizing the current office layout and furniture. The leased space scope of work will include updating the current office layout. A renovation to the 1st floor bathrooms of the Courthouse is also included in the RFP scope of work. Modernizing the design of the HVAC systems and controls, electrical, plumbing, and fire suppression along with improved wayfinding signage all were specified in the RFP. One proposal was received for the architecture and engineering design. The Facilities Director evaluated the proposal based on the RFP requirements, overall price, and talking with references provided by the vendor. The Facilities Director is confident moving forward with the proposal from InSite Consulting Architects LLC at a cost of \$51,512.00 for the architecture and engineering design of spaces at the Courthouse and West Square Administration Facilities.

Zoning Map Amendment Procedures and Requirements

At the public hearing, the applicant may appear in person or through an agent or an attorney of their choice. The applicant/agent/attorney may present testimony, evidence and arguments in support of the application. All site plans, pictures, etc. become the property of the Land Resources & Environment Department, will remain in the file, and will be public record.

What is a Zoning Map Amendment?

The purpose of a zoning map amendment is to alter, enlarge, or reduce a geographic extent of any zoning district, or to enact a new zoning designation for any particular parcel or real property. A change in zoning allows for different land uses and in some instances, different densities of development. The Land Resources & Environment Committee will recommend approval or disapproval of a rezone to the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in accordance with the standards and criteria set by the zoning ordinance.

Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Zoning Map Amendment request, the LRE Committee must follow four standards:

- a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance.
- b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering the zoning ordinance as currently depicted has been observed.
- d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
 - 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
 - 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
 - 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
 - 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.


Note: Pursuant to Wis. Stat § 91.48(1) A political subdivision (Sauk County) with a certified farmland preservation zoning ordinance may not rezone land out of a farmland preservation zoning district (Exclusive Agriculture) without having the rezoning certified under Wis. Stat § 91.36 and provided that the standards (a) through (d) above are met.

Process

- 1. Contact the LRE Department to schedule a meeting to review your potential request.
- 2. Complete the Zoning Map Amendment Application and provide all the supplemental items to the LRE Department by the filing deadline.
- 3. Review such application with the appropriate staff member to determine completeness.
- 4. If the application is complete, LRE staff will publish notice of your request for a zoning map amendment in the County's official newspaper noting the location and time of the required public hearing before the LRE Committee. Neighbors, town officials, and affected state agencies will be notified as well.
- 5. If the Town choses to review the zoning map amendment request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.
- 6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may result in denial or postponement of your request.
- 7. The LRE Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors may approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the zoning map amendment request.

Please Note: If a zoning map amendment application is dis approved by the LRE Committee and no appeal is filed, no new zoning map amendment application can be re-submitted for a period of 365 days from the date of the LRE Committee's decision, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of 249 ges of factors found valid by the LRE Committee.



Resolution to Award a Contract for ATV Trail Improvements

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring or developing lands for public motorized trail use. In doing so, these public motorized trails are eligible for ATV/UTV grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The program funds 100% of the cost for the acquisition, development, insurance, and maintenance of public ATV/UTV trails. Funding for the program comes from ATV/UTV registration fees and a portion of tax on gasoline. The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department (LRE) applied for funding for ATV trail improvements in northwest Sauk County. Funding was requested due to the cost of grading, adding an appropriate base and surface, regrading and seeding, adding breaker run and stone and purchasing the appropriate trail signs. The DNR awarded Sauk County a reimbursement grant in the amount of \$23,999.

LRE staff held a public bid opening on August 31, 2022 and received 1 sealed bid from LA Valley Underground, LLC in the amount of \$23,650. With the trail improvement costs, LRE staff time and permit fees, the estimated total is expected to exceed the grant amount of \$23,999. LRE plans to request additional funding from the DNR, but in the event that additional funding is not awarded, the Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. ATV Club passed Resolution 09/07/22, which states that the Sauk Ridge Runners ATV Club will reimburse Sauk County up to \$900 for staff time to administer the grant if additional funding is denied by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Sauk County believes it is in the best interest of Sauk County to enter into a contract, subject to a contract review by Sauk County Corporation Counsel, for a sum of \$23,650 with LA Valley Underground, LLC for ATV trail improvements.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that a contract for ATV trail improvements be awarded to LA Valley Underground, LLC for said improvements in the amount of \$23,650 and the Land Resources and Environment Director is authorized to enter into an Agreement with LA Valley Underground, LLC and Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. for ATV trail improvements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that ATV trail improvement construction may commence once an Agreement has been signed by both Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. and Sauk County and all necessary permit approvals have been obtained.

Resolution Establishing the 2023, 2024, 2025, and 2026 Health Insurance Program for Sauk County.

Resolution offered by the Finance and Personnel and Insurance Committees

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

The employee health insurance program currently consists of three plan design options which are offered to eligible employees. Pursuant to the Personnel Ordinance, financial responsibility shall be limited to 88 percent of the least expensive plan option for single or family coverage.

The County Administrator and Human Resources Director reviewed proposals submitted for 2023 and determined transitioning to Dean would be in the best interests of the county as they proposed the most cost-effective proposal for our service area and demographics while maintaining adequate coverage.

The proposal from Dean drops the plan design to two options, a tiered copay plan and a point of service plan. It also includes renewal guarantees into 2026 as follows: 2024 – not to exceed 6.5%, 2025 – not to exceed 7.9%, and 2026 – not to exceed 9.9%.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to establish the health insurance program for Sauk County, offering rates as follows:
