Ordinance Amendment to approve a map amendment (rezoning) of lands in the Town of Westfield from an Exclusive Agriculture to an Agriculture Zoning District filed upon Elvin Yoder, property owners.

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Background: Elvin Yoder owns property in the NE¼, NW¼, Section 26, T11N, R4E, Town of Westfield, and has requested a map amendment (rezoning) of property legally described pursuant to petition 11-2023 from an Exclusive Agriculture zoning district to an Agriculture zoning district. The intent of the map amendment (rezoning) being create a 2.38 acre lot for community uses including a cemetery, school, and place of worship.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.69(5) Sauk County has the authority to develop, adopt, and amend a zoning ordinance. At a public hearing held by the Land Resources and Environment (LRE) Committee on September 26, 2023; the LRE Committee made findings pursuant to Sauk County Code of Ordinance §7.150(9) and recommended approval of the map amendment.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §66.1001 Wisconsin Statutes, any program or action of a local governmental unit that affects land use shall be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The Sauk County Comprehensive Plan, adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in 2009, defines managing and focusing "on efficient land use patterns that promotes redevelopment of under-utilized lands. It sets limits on outward growth, incorporates permanent land preservation techniques, and achieves livable communities." Upon evaluation of the request, the Land Resources and Environment Committee found that the rezone request to an Exclusive Agriculture zoning district maintains this objective.

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 7.005(2) Official Zoning Map of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows:

Rezone of approximately 2.38 acres of tax parcel 040-0553-10000 from an Exclusive Agriculture Zoning District to an Agriculture Zoning District.

#### Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department created the 2022-2042 Sauk County Farm Property Master Plan to ensure the continued management of the site's agricultural and natural resources, preservation of its historic features, and the transformation of the space into an educational resource for the communities of Sauk County. Over the next 20 years, the County Farm is envisioned to become an important educational resource for Sauk County residents of all ages and backgrounds to learn about regenerative, profitable, and resilient agricultural practices through on-site demonstration, research and collaborative partnerships. The master plan is centered on the following goals: to create educational opportunities for Sauk County's current and future farmers through community partnerships; utilize the space for agricultural demonstration and research; and pay homage to the history and people of the property. The County Farm will become a space where educational institutions, non-profit organizations, public agencies, and any interested person in Sauk County can converge to learn about farming and train the leaders who will carry forward our community's agricultural legacy.

Resolution No. 150-2019 adopting the 2020-2024 Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan was approved by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors on January 21, 2020. As part of the Master Plan process for the Sauk County Farm, an area was designated as a future educational hub for indoor/outdoor events, programming, recreational trails, community gardens, and habitat restoration. As part of the 2023 LRE Budget, \$75,000 of general funds were included for the design of this area. Resolution No. 17-2023 awarded a contract for design and engineering services of the educational hub at the Sauk County Farm.

The Sauk County Farm Property Master Plan and development plan for the education hub intersects with the following priorities and objectives of the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan; priority: further development of the County Park System, objectives: develop master plans for Sauk County properties; priority: resource management and stewardship, objective: community education, and improved water quality; priority: partnerships, objectives: intersect with other units of government and non-government organizations (NGOs), and leverage recreational and planning grants; priority: economic development and tourism.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, does hereby adopt the Sauk County Education Hub Development Plan attached hereto as Appendix A as an appendix to the 2022-2042 Sauk County Farm Property Master Plan in the County CORP.




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

BACKGROUND: The existing collective bargaining agreement between Sauk County and WPPA L241 (Sheriff's Department Sworn Unit) expires on December 31, 2023. The Personnel and Insurance Committee has negotiated a tentative agreement with WPPA L241 (attached hereto), for the terms of a successor agreement for the calendar dates of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026. In accordance with Wisconsin Act 10, certain sworn law enforcement officers maintained collective bargaining rights pursuant to Wis Stats. 111,70/111.77.

The provisions of the tentative agreements reflect a commitment of Sauk County to remain competitive with the wage rates of neighboring counties, and the dedication of both parties to recruit and retain the highest quality employees for Sauk County. The July 1, 2021 - 2023 Collective Bargaining Agreement shall remain unchanged for a three-year period commencing January 1, 2024 except as follows:

Additions and new language indicated by: Shadow

- 1. Fair and equitable wage increase effective the first pay period to include January 1, 2024.
  - a. Effective January 1, 2024, 6.0% on all rates and increase Step 5 (8 years) by \$.50;
  - b. Effective January 1, 2025, 6.0% on all rates and increase Step 5 (8 years) by \$.50;
  - c. Effective January 1, 2026, 6.0% on all rates and increase Step 5 (8 years) by \$.25.

4.06 COLLECTIVE BARGAINING. If collective bargaining sessions are conducted for a successor agreement during the normal working hours of bargaining committee members at the request of the Employer, up to five (5) such members from separate divisions (patrol, jail and detective), with a maximum of two (2) per division, shall suffer no reduction in pay for up to five (5) bargaining sessions. TA 9/20/2023

7.01 - NON-DISCRIMINATION. The Employer and the Union agree that there shall be no discrimination against any employees or prospective employees because of race, creed, color, age, sex/gender, national origin, sexual orientation, ancestry, marital status, gender identity, genetic testing, pregnancy or childbirth, military service, handicapping conditions disability, or any other characteristic protected by state or federal law. It is and shall be the policy of the Employer and the Union to treat all employees equally. Because discrimination complaints are processed through state and federal agencies and courts, they are not grievable under this agreement. TA 8/22/2023

<u>9.02 - JOB POSTINGS.</u> The Employer agrees that when a position becomes available that would be a promotional opportunity for existing employees, the following steps shall be followed:

- 1. Vacancies shall be posted.
- 2. Qualified existing employees shall be allowed to take any accredited tests given for said position.
- 3. Existing employees shall be given preference in filling open positions over external applications, all other things being equal.

All vacant sworn bargaining unit positions not filled by the posting process shall be filled from an established position eligibility list in accordance with the provisions set forth by the Human Resources Department.

The Employer further agrees that when a position becomes available that is an opportunity for an existing employee to change a shift assignment, the following steps shall be followed:

1. Vacancies shall be posted.

2. Qualified existing employees shall be allowed to express their interest in vacancy.

3. Vacancy shall be filled with the senior qualified bidder from employees within the classification and division. Thereafter remaining vacancies shall be posted and shall be filled with the most senior qualified bidder within the balance of the sworn bargaining unit.

Furthermore: Any employee posting into another position classification shall remain on the step they are on when moving into the new position.

The Sheriff reserves the right to post vacant positions externally in conjunction with the language contained in Article 9.02. The Electronic Monitoring Deputy position shall be appointed by the Sheriff.

The Employer agrees that when a regular position authorized by Sauk County, becomes vacant and is not refilled through the bidding process, the notice of the job opening shall be posted and qualified employees shall be allowed to take any accredited tests given for said position, and existing employees shall be given preference in making promotions, all other things being equal. Vacancies shall be posted first and shall be filled with the senior qualified bidder from employees within the classification and division. Thereafter remaining vacancies shall be posted and shall be filled with the most senior qualified bidder within the balance of the sworn bargaining unit. All vacant sworn bargaining unit positions not filled by the posting process shall be filled from an established position eligibility list in accordance with the provisions set forth in Chapter 13 of the Sauk County Code of Ordinances. Furthermore: Any employee posting into another position classification shall remain on the step they are on when moving into the new position.

The Sheriff reserves the right to post vacant positions externally in conjunction with the language contained in Article 9.02.—TA 8/22/2023

10.04 CALL-IN. All employees covered by this Agreement shall respond to a call to work outside of their regular schedule of hours, by their department head or others designated by the department head. A minimum of two (2) hours at time and one-half (1 1/2) times pay shall be granted to any employee who is requested to report outside his/her regular schedule of hours or who reports to work as scheduled and is sent home... TA 8/22/2023

10.06 - SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL. Sauk County agrees that a shift differential shall be paid as follows, except for employees who are working in accordance with a regular shift which starts after 6:00 AM and finishes by 5:00 PM; any employee actually working between 2:30 PM and 11:00 PM shall receive an additional twenty cents (\$.20) per hour; any employee actually working a regular shift starting at or after 10:30 PM, or otherwise actually working after 11:00 PM, shall receive an additional twenty-five cents (\$.25) per hour from such time until 7:00 AM (or 9:00 AM for an employee working a regular shift lasting until 9:00 AM) for hours actually worked. 10.08 TWELVE (12) HOUR SHIFT SCHEDULE/ROTATION. Members of the patrol division shall have a 12-hour shift schedule/rotation. The 12-hour shift schedule/rotation shall consist of four (4) teams. [Days A, Days B, Nights A, Nights B] Days A and B will work a split shift of [5am-5pm/6am-6pm] and Nights A and B will work a split shift of [5pm-5am/6pm-6a m]. Days A and B and Nights A and B

schedules shall be opposite "days-on" and "days-off from each other on the following fourteen (14) day rotation:

- a. 2 on- 2 off/ 3 on- 2 off/ 2 on-3 off during a 14-day cycle (i.e., Mon-Tues ON-- Weds-Thurs OFF / Fri-Sat-Sun ON Mon-Tues OFF/ Wed-Thurs ON-Fri-Sat-Sun OFF)
- b. An officer's "shift working date" is the actual date the shift begins.
- c. One eight (8) hour day will be implemented into the fourteen (14) day rotation for each Deputy. This 8-hour day will be flexible for training, special team call outs and other assignments. Management reserves the right to adjust the 8-hour day with a five (5) day notice. Management will assign the short days.
- d. Shift Differential: Night Shift A and B [5pm 5a m/6pm 6a m] shall receive shift differential (\$.25 cents an hour) as provided for in Article 10, Section 10.06.
- d. Excluding exigent circumstances, deputies shall take a minimum of eight (8) continuous hours of rest in each 24-hour period. TA 9/5/2023

10.09 ORDER-INS. When staffing levels for the patrol and security division are below the number deemed necessary for any reason, including but not limited to: staffing shortages, immediate emergency shortages, special events, etc. and the needs are not met voluntarily, these patrol division call in lists will be utilized for order-in.

Patrol Division - Order-in procedures will follow as:

- a Each shift and stack will be an exclusive order-in list. (Days A, Days B, Nights A, Nights B).
- b Order-ins for deputies will be rotating based on reverse seniority in their designated stacks.
- c Deputies are subject to order-ins on their regular days off.
- d Deputies can fulfill their "turn" in the order-in rotation by volunteering or being ordered to work a minimum of 2 hours in a patrol function. This does not include volunteering for special details.
- e Deputies will get one "Pass" per calendar year

Security Division - All posted and voluntary overtime will be filled on a straight seniority basis. A Deputy volunteering for a full shift will be given preference over partial shift volunteers. It is understood that occasionally situations occur requiring management to immediately fill staffing needs and proceed straight to the order-in procedure.

Order-in procedures for the security division will follow as:

- a. Each shift will be an exclusive order-in list.
- b. Order-in's for Deputies will be rotating, based on reverse seniority, on their assigned shift.
- c. Deputies can fulfil their turn and drop to the bottom of the order-in rotation, by volunteering or being ordered to work a minimum of 2 hours. This does not include volunteering for special details.
- d. Credit for volunteering, or being ordered, does not accumulate and only serves to move the Deputy to the bottom of the order-in rotation.

- e. Deputies will get 2 passes per calendar year; one pass may be utilized January thru June and the second pass may be utilized July thru December.
- f. Deputies newly assigned to a shift will be placed at the top of the order-in rotation.

While Security Deputies will be provided access to view the order-in lists and may assist in making calls for overtime/order-in, any modifications to the lists will be made by Security Division Supervisors. Deputies are responsible for notifying their supervisor about credit for overtime worked. TA 9/5/2023

10.10 CANINE HANDLER SCHEDULE. The canine handler(s) shall end assigned shifts one (1) hour earlier for each 12 hour shift in order to work an eleven (11) hour shift to accommodate care of K-9. The canine handler(s) shift shall be shortened by one (1) hour at the beginning or end of the shift shall end assigned shifts one (1) hour earlier for each eight (8) hour shift worked in order to work a seven (7) hour shift to accommodate care of K-9. TA 9/5/2023

#### 11.02 - VACATION AND COMPENSATORY TIME APPROVAL....

b. Vacation or compensatory time off days in the detective division may be approved for up to two (2) employees total at the discretion of the division head, or their designee, and with that availability of personnel and overtime costs being recognized as managerial concerns. It is understood that, while management may not always be able to grant every request, no other criteria will be arbitrarily introduced as deciding factors in the vacation approval decision making process. The Sheriff or designee may approve more than two (2) employees for vacation or compensatory time off days on a case by case basis in considering the reasonableness and need for the request.

granted to one employee within the division, per shift, on the same date(s) at the discretion of the immediate supervisor....

d. In the Patrol Division, vacation leave may be used in increments up to and including twelve (12) hours. Between Labor Day and Memorial Day, when one employee is already approved for vacation, a second employee may be considered for vacation time. The second employee shall request vacation per departmental procedures and shall be notified of the status of the request within four (4) calendar weeks of the request. Management retains the right to recall the vacation approval within forty-eight (48) hours of the shift start. Employee's immediate supervisor may honor requests upon shorter notice, if possible. No vacation will be granted on weekends from the Friday of Memorial Weekend to the Monday of Labor Day Weekend with the exception of up to three (3) 12-hour days which shall be taken consecutively one (1) 12 hour day per employee. For the purpose of this agreement, weekends are defined as Friday starting at 5 AM until Monday at 5:00 AM. TA 9/5/2023

#### 11.04 - HOLIDAY DURING A VACATION.

a. If a holiday falls during the vacation period, an employee will be compensated for the holiday and not use a day of vacation. extra day of vacation will be granted... TA 8/22/2023

12.02 SICK LEAVE CREDIT. For any employee hired after December 31, 2023. Sick Leave Credits may be accrued as follows:

- 1) All Sheriff's Department employees being represented for whom vacation periods are provided shall be given sick leave with pay at the rate of one (1) day, or eight (8) hours, of sick leave for each completed calendar month of compensated service. The term "each completed calendar month of compensated service" shall be construed to mean any calendar month in which the employee has completed thirteen (13) days of compensated service. This definition applies to all employees of the Sheriff's Department engaged in service of the County except part-time and seasonal employees or employees who are on a per diem basis. Upon the completion of the first six months of continuous employment, employees of this bargaining group may utilize accrued sick leave balances. Members of the Patrol Division may use sick leave in increments up to and including twelve (12) hours.
- 2) No employee shall be credited with an accumulation of more than one hundred and twenty (120) days of sick leave credits at any time. Employees regularly working the twelve (12) hour rotation shall not exceed 1,020 hours in their accrual bank. No employee shall be permitted to take more than one hundred and twenty (120) days of sick leave in any one (1) calendar year. Employees shall not be required to use sick leave in case of an on-the-job injury. Any employee having unused sick leave on the date of retirement, provided the employee has reached age fifty (50) if employed in a protective occupation as classified by the Wisconsin Retirement System, or age fifty-five (55) if employed in a non-protective occupation as classified by the Wisconsin Retirement System, and the employee qualifies for an annuity under the Wisconsin Retirement System, shall be able to either:
  - a. All employees shall be able to receive seventy (70.0%) of the cash value of the employee's accrued sick leave paid to the employee less applicable deductions; or,
  - b. All employees shall be eligible to convert seventy (70.0%) thereof to participate in a Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA). purchase continuing health insurance under the County's Employee Health Insurance Plan; or,
  - e. The employee may, at his/her-discretion, receive one hundred percent (100%) the cash value of the conversion privilege in lieu of any right to further participation in the County's Employee Health Insurance Plan; the choice is irrevocable and must be made upon notice of intent to retire...

For any employees hired before January 1, 2024. Sick Leave Credits may be accrued as follows:

1) All Sheriff's Department employees being represented... TA 9/5/2023

12.05 - BEREAVEMENT LEAVE. Employees shall be entitled to bereavement leave to attend an event related to the death of an employee's spouse, child (including an unborn child after 20 weeks of gestation), parent, brother, sister, stepparent, stepchild, mother-in-law, father-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, grandparent, grandparent of spouse, or grandchild. In the event an employee's circumstances, familial relationships or other personal circumstances are unique and not addressed in this bereavement leave policy yet warrant time as anticipated by this policy, the Sheriff or Chief Deputy may grant an exception... TA 9/5/2023

12.09 - JURY DUTY/SUBPOENAED WITNESS LEAVE. Employees called for jury duty or as a subpoenaed witness shall be entitled to receive lost pay provided they deposit any compensation received for such duty, excluding mileage allowance, with the Employer and receive a receipt for said deposit. Employees called for jury duty or as a subpoenaed witness shall be entitled to receive compensation equal to what the employee would have earned if not called for jury duty provided that the employee deposits any compensation received for such duty, excluding mileage allowance, with the Finance Department, and receive a receipt for said deposit. TA 8/22/2023

14.11 TRAVEL TIME. The parties recognize that employees may be required to attend mandatory training. As used in this section, mandatory training means any training that the employee is ordered by Sheriff's Department Administration to attend. The Sheriff's Department recognizes one-hour commute as a normal commute time and such The parties agree that travel time will be paid for all travel that requires more than one-hour travel time each way, not just for the driver. For training that is expected to last more than one day, Administration shall decide whether an employee will stay overnight or travel to and from home during the mandatory training. Travel time is calculated as the time from the Law Enforcement Center to the training location. TA 8/22/2023

14.12 CREDIT FOR EXPERIENCE (LATERAL EMPLOYMENT). New employees hired into sworn law enforcement positions may be given credit for pay and vacation relevant police/law enforcement experience upon hire at the discretion of the Employer.

Beginning on the first pay period of 2024 (or date of contract ratification if contract is approved after that date), employees who were previously hired at a higher rate of pay (lateral for pay only) will begin accruing vacation at a rate commensurate with their total years of recognized service (prior years of recognized law enforcement experience added to the current length of employment). This change will affect the accrual rate and will not be retroactive.

14.13 DETECTIVE DIVISION ON-CALL PROCEDURES. To ensure adequate and appropriate response to emergencies and criminal investigations, all detectives for the Sauk County Sheriff's Department will rotate through an on-call schedule established by department administration. The on-call schedule will assign individual detectives to provide coverage during times when determined an on-call detective is needed. One detective will be on call at a time. If additional detectives are necessary, call-in or order-in procedures will be followed.

- a. On-call shifts are defined as:
  - i Weekdays: Weekdays are Monday through Thursday starting 8:00PM 6:00PM until 8:00AM, the following day. Exact hours may be revised based upon scheduling needs and other factors.
  - ii Weekends: Weekends are 8:00PM 6:00PM Friday, through 8:00AM, Monday. Exact hours may change dependent on available on-duty detectives. Unless staffing adjustments occur by a supervisor, weekend on-call shifts shall be defined as:
    - a. Friday: Friday 6:00PM through Saturday 8:00AMb. Saturday: Saturday 8:00AM through Sunday 8:00AM

- c. Sunday: Sunday 8:00AM through Monday 8:00AM
- d. Weekend on-call order-ins will be done so by individual dates, in succession.

  A detective will not be ordered in for on-call coverage for the entire consecutive set of weekend days.
- iii Holiday(s) are those Holiday(s) identified in Article 11.08 of the contract, for those employees who work the 5-day schedule. Exact dates and hours for Holiday(s) may vary but in most cases, consist of a 24-hour period beginning at 8:00AM and ending at 8:00AM the following day.
- iv The detective division shall have an "order-in" list to fill vacancies for staffing shortages, immediate emergency shortages, special events, etc. and the needs are not met voluntarily, the detective division call-in list will be utilized for order-in. This list will also be utilized to fill vacant on-call shifts. The order-in procedures for detectives will follow as:
  - a. Order-ins for detectives will be done by reverse seniority.
  - b. Detectives are subject to order-ins on their regular days off.
  - c. Detectives can fulfill their "turn" in the order-in rotation by volunteering or being ordered to cover a vacant "on-call" shift. This does not include volunteering for special details. Credit for volunteering, or being ordered, does not accumulate and only serves to move the detective to the bottom of the order-in rotation.
  - d. If a detective is on a full vacation or a full comp time on any day leading up to or immediately after a vacant order-in day, that detectives shall be exempt from that specific order in day, or set of days (i.e. a weekend including Saturday or Sunday), but shall not be skipped entirely, and be subject to the next order in.
  - e. Detectives will get one "pass" per calendar year
    - i. If a detective is geographically, physically, or otherwise legitimately unable to respond as determined by the division head or his designee, such event shall not constitute as a "pass".
  - f. If a detective volunteers or uses their "pass" their spot on the order-in list shall be documented as a such, and their name shall be moved to the bottom of the order-in list
  - g. It is understood that occasionally situations occur requiring management to immediately fill staffing needs and proceed straight to the order-in procedure.
  - h. While detectives will be provided access to view the order-in lists, any modifications to the lists will be made by a detective supervisor.

b. On-call compensation is in addition to benefits enumerated in the collective bargaining agreement. On-call compensation may not be exchanged for compensatory time.

- c. Switching on-call shift assignments: Switching on-call shift assignments must be approved by the Division Sergeant or Lieutenant. If a switch is authorized, the trade dates must be established in writing.
- d. Detectives that are on-call status must be available for calls. They must be accessible through the Communication Center by cell phone or radio. Detectives who are on-call, must be "in service" no later than 45 minutes after notification. An on-call detective must be fit for duty. An on-call detective may use their vehicle for personal use during their on-call status, as authorized by the Sheriff.
- e. When an on-call detective is in service, that detective will receive their hourly overtime rate, and the on-call pay rate will be suspended until the detective ends their active duty status. At that time, they will again begin receiving on-call pay until relieved of their on-call responsibility,
- f. Request to be relieved of on-call duty status must be made to the division lieutenant or designee. On-call Status will be maintained until the detective is notified that he/she has been relieved from on-call status. The vacant position will be offered starting with the most senior employee within the Division on a rotating basis. Should all employees decline, a detective will be ordered to on-call status with the least senior employee in the Division on a rotating basis.
- g. The detectives that are not on-call will still be required to carry their cell phones while off duty in the event that additional detectives are needed to assist the on-call detective, or for other incidents or investigations.
- h. Activation of the on-call detective remains the sole responsibility of the Department's Administration and may not be initiated by the on-call detective alone.
- i. Compensation.
  - The hourly rate for weekday on-call status is \$1.50 \$2.00.
  - ii The hourly rate for weekend on-call status is \$1.75 \$2.25.
  - iii The hourly rate for Holiday on-call status is \$2.00 \$2.50. TA 9/5/2023

The realtor for the family reached back out to the Sauk County Corporation Counsel to see if the county was still interested in purchasing the property. The Property Committee again met and offered the original price, and the offer of \$205,000 was accepted.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board authorizes the purchase of 616 Linn St. Baraboo WI 53913, specifically described as the Southeast quarter of the Northwest quarter (SE-NW), of section thirty-four (34), township twelve (12), North of Range Six E (6E) containing .52 acres in size, at a cost of \$205,000; and

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

## What is a Zoning Map Amendment?

The purpose of a zoning map amendment is to alter, enlarge, or reduce a geographic extent of any zoning district, or to enact a new zoning designation for any particular parcel or real property. A change in zoning allows for different land uses and in some instances, different densities of development. The Land Resources & Environment Committee will recommend approval or disapproval of a rezone to the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in accordance with the standards and criteria set by the zoning ordinance.

### Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Zoning Map Amendment request, the LRE Committee must follow four standards:


- a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance.
- b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering the zoning ordinance as currently depicted has been observed.
- d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
  - 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
  - 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
  - 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
  - 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

Note: Pursuant to Wis. Stat § 91.48(1) A political subdivision (Sauk County) with a certified farmland preservation zoning ordinance may not rezone land out of a farmland preservation zoning district (Exclusive Agriculture) without having the rezoning certified under Wis. Stat § 91.36 and provided that the standards (a) through (d) above are met.

## **Process**

- 1. Contact the LRE Department to schedule a meeting to review your potential request.
- Complete the Zoning Map Amendment Application and provide all the supplemental items to the LRE Department by the filing deadline.
- 3. Review such application with the appropriate staff member to determine completeness.
- 4. If the application is complete, LRE staff will publish notice of your request for a zoning map amendment in the County's official newspaper noting the location and time of the required public hearing before the LRE Committee. Neighbors, town officials, and affected state agencies will be notified as well.
- 5. If the Town choses to review the zoning map amendment request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.
- 6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may result in denial or postponement of your request.
- The LRE Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors may approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the zoning map amendment request.

Please Note: If a zoning map amendment application is dis approved by the LRE Committee and no appeal is filed, no new zoning map amendment application can be re-submitted for a period of 365 days from the date of the LRE Committee's decision, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of changes of factors found valid by the LRE Committee.



## **Conditional Use Procedures and Requirements**

What is a conditional use?

A conditional use is a land use that may be permitted in a respective zoning district only after approval is granted by the Land Resources & Environment Committee (LRE) in accordance with the standards and criteria set by the zoning ordinance. A conditional use is not suited to all locations in a zoning district, but may be allowed in some locations if it is not contradictory to the ordinance's standards/criteria and the general purpose statement for the particular zoning district. The Agency may approve such a request with conditions, which generally relate to the site's suitability and compatibility with neighboring land uses. Conditional uses must be custom tailored to a specific location and must be listed as such in the use table key of the zoning ordinance.

### Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Conditional Use request, the LRE Committee must follow two standards:

a) The establishment, maintenance, or operation of the proposed use may not be detrimental to or endanger the public

health, safety, or general welfare of the occupants of surrounding lands.

b) The use will be designed constructed, operated, and maintained so as to be compatible and be appropriate in appearance with the existing or intended character of the general vicinity, and that such use may not change the essential character of the area by substantially impairing or diminishing the use, value or enjoyment of existing or future permitted uses in the area.

The LRE Committee must also consider the request based on the following:

(a) Erosion potential of the site based on topography, drainage, slope, soil type, and vegetative cover and mitigation of erosion potential.

(b) The prevention and control of water pollution, including sedimentation, and the potential impacts on floodplain

and wetlands.

- (c) Whether the site has adequate utilities including, acceptable disposal systems.
- (d) Whether the site has access to roads and highways.

(e) Whether the site has suitable ingress and egress.

(f) Whether the site is designed to minimize traffic congestion, and the potential effect on traffic flow.

If the LRE Committee finds that the standards and criteria have been met, the committee has the authority to grant the conditional use permit. The Committee also has the authority to attach conditions and restrictions on the establishment, location, maintenance, and operation of the conditional use as it deems necessary to ensure that the proposed conditional use adheres to the purpose and review criteria within the zoning ordinance.

### **Process**

1. Contact the LRE Department to schedule a meeting to review your potential request.

2. Complete the Conditional Use Permit Application and provide all the supplemental items to the LRE Department by the filing deadline.

3. Review such application with the appropriate staff member to determine completeness.

4. If the application is complete, LRE staff will publish notice of your request for a conditional use in the County's official newspaper noting the location and time of the required public hearing before the LRE Committee. Neighbors, town officials, and affected state agencies will be notified as well.

5. If the Town choses to review the conditional use request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.


6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may


result in denial or postponement of your request.


7. If the LRE Committee grants your conditional use you must obtain a land use permit from the LRE Department. A conditional use must be initiated by securing a land use permit within 365 days of the date of the approval. Failure to do so will result in the conditional use being void. The permit will be issued if all of the requirements of the Department and any conditions of the Committee have been addressed. If the LRE Committee denies your conditional use, the decision will become final unless a written appeal is filed with the Zoning Administrator within 30-days of the decision. Appeals are heard before the Board of Adjustment.



## Zoning Map Amendment Procedures and Requirements

At the public hearing, the applicant may appear in person or through an agent or an attorney of their choice. The applicant/agent/attorney may present testimony, evidence and arguments in support of the application. All site plans, pictures, etc. become the property of the Land Resources & Environment Department, will remain in the file, and will be public record.

## What is a Zoning Map Amendment?

The purpose of a zoning map amendment is to alter, enlarge, or reduce a geographic extent of any zoning district, or to enact a new zoning designation for any particular parcel or real property. A change in zoning allows for different land uses and in some instances, different densities of development. The Land Resources & Environment Committee will recommend approval or disapproval of a rezone to the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in accordance with the standards and criteria set by the zoning ordinance.

### Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Zoning Map Amendment request, the LRE Committee must follow four standards:

- a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance.
- b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering the zoning ordinance as currently depicted has been observed.
- d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
  - 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
  - 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
  - 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
  - 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.


Note: Pursuant to Wis. Stat § 91.48(1) A political subdivision (Sauk County) with a certified farmland preservation zoning ordinance may not rezone land out of a farmland preservation zoning district (Exclusive Agriculture) without having the rezoning certified under Wis. Stat § 91.36 and provided that the standards (a) through (d) above are met.

## Process

- 1. Contact the LRE Department to schedule a meeting to review your potential request.
- 2. Complete the Zoning Map Amendment Application and provide all the supplemental items to the LRE Department by the filing deadline.
- 3. Review such application with the appropriate staff member to determine completeness.
- 4. If the application is complete, LRE staff will publish notice of your request for a zoning map amendment in the County's official newspaper noting the location and time of the required public hearing before the LRE Committee. Neighbors, town officials, and affected state agencies will be notified as well.
- 5. If the Town choses to review the zoning map amendment request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.
- 6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may result in denial or postponement of your request.
- 7. The LRE Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors may approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the zoning map amendment request.

Please Note: If a zoning map amendment application is dis approved by the LRE Committee and no appeal is filed, no new zoning map amendment application can be re-submitted for a period of 365 days from the date of the LRE Committee's decision, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of changes of factors found valid by the LRE Committee.

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### Standards and Criteria

In reviewing a Zoning Map Amendment request, the LRE Committee must follow four standards:

- a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the zoning ordinance.
- b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering the zoning ordinance as currently depicted has been observed.
- d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
  - 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
  - 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
  - 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
  - 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

Note: Pursuant to Wis. Stat § 91.48(1) A political subdivision (Sauk County) with a certified farmland preservation zoning ordinance may not rezone land out of a farmland preservation zoning district (Exclusive Agriculture) without having the rezoning certified under Wis. Stat § 91.36 and provided that the standards (a) through (d) above are met.

#### **Process**

- 1. Contact the LRE Department to schedule a meeting to review your potential request.
- 2. Complete the Zoning Map Amendment Application and provide all the supplemental items to the LRE Department by the filing deadline.
- 3. Review such application with the appropriate staff member to determine completeness.
- 4. If the application is complete, LRE staff will publish notice of your request for a zoning map amendment in the County's official newspaper noting the location and time of the required public hearing before the LRE Committee. Neighbors, town officials, and affected state agencies will be notified as well.
- 5. If the Town choses to review the zoning map amendment request at the Town Planning Commission and Town Board level, you will need to attend such meetings to provide information regarding the request. Please request that copies of minutes/proceedings outlining the Town's recommendation be provided to the LRE Department for the file.
- 6. A public hearing will be held before the LRE Committee. Either the property owner or designated agent will need to be present at the hearing to provide testimony regarding the request. The LRE Committee must make a decision based only on the evidence that is submitted to it at the time of the hearing. Failure to provide representation may result in denial or postponement of your request.
- The LRE Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors may approve, disapprove, or modify and approve the zoning map amendment request.

Please Note: If a zoning map amendment application is dis approved by the LRE Committee and no appeal is filed, no new zoning map amendment application can be re-submitted for a period of 365 days from the date of the LRE Committee's decision, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of changes of factors found valid by the LRE Committee.

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

# GENERAL CODE OF SAUK COUNTY, WISCONSIN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT # 8 - 2023

Ordinance Amendment to approve a map amendment (rezoning) of lands in the Town of Freedom from an Agriculture to a Recreation-Commercial Zoning District filed upon Mid-Continent Railway Historical Society, Inc., property owner.

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

### **BACKGROUND:**

Background: The Mid-Continent Railway Historical Society, Inc. owns property in the SW ¼, NW ¼, Section 2, T11N, R5E, Town of Freedom, and has requested a map amendment (rezoning) of property legally described pursuant to petition 12-2023 from Agriculture to Recreation-Commercial zoning. The intent of the map amendment (rezoning) is to allow the property owner to use the property in conjunction with and as an accessory to their adjoining property which houses the Mid-Continent Railway Museum.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.69(5) Sauk County has the authority to develop, adopt, and amend a zoning ordinance. At a public hearing held by the Land Resources and Environment (LRE) Committee on October 24, 2023; the LRE Committee made findings pursuant to Sauk County Code of Ordinance §7.150(9) and recommended approval of the map amendment.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §66.1001 Wisconsin Statutes, any program or action of a local governmental unit that affects land use shall be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The Sauk County Comprehensive Plan, adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in 2009, defines managing and focusing "on efficient land use patterns that promotes redevelopment of under-utilized lands. It sets limits on outward growth, incorporates permanent land preservation techniques, and achieves livable communities." Upon evaluation of the request, the Land Resources and Environment Committee found that the rezone request to a Recreation-Commercial Zoning district maintains this objective.

### NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 7.005(2) Official Zoning Map of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows:

Rezone of the approximate 1.33 acres of tax parcel 016-0026-00000 from an Agriculture Zoning District to a Recreation-Commercial Zoning District.

### Resolution to Amend the Rules of the County Board

### Resolution offered by the Executive & Legislative Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

**BACKGROUND:** Resolution #96-2023 created the Committee on the Consolidation of Committees (hereinafter "CCC"). The CCC was charged "with the duty to review the current Sauk County Committee structure and make recommendations to the full County Board regarding consolidation of standing committees".

The CCC held a series of meetings to discuss the pros and cons of consolidating committees, the financial implications of consolidation, the likelihood of garnering more candidates for Supervisor, the efficiency for staff and the role of the County Administrator in the Sauk County government structure. Based on those discussion and considerations, the CCC developed the new structure for the Sauk County Standing committees as set forth below.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Standing Committees shall be as set forth below and incorporated into the Sauk County Rules of the Board.

### RULE IX. STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

### **AGING & DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER COMMITTEE**

Responsible for providing services to the general public with respect to matters related to aging and disability and to improve the life of those with aging and disability related issues. This committee will serve as the official statutory Commission on Aging pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4) and shall be advised by the Aging, and Disability Advisory Committee. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following departments: Aging and Disability Resource Center. See, Sauk Co. Code Ch. 16. Oversight Committee for the Healthcare Center Board of Trustee.

Members: 11. The Committee shall have 6 County Board Supervisors.

### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE**

Responsible for coordination of County economic development initiatives with County Planners and Sauk County Development Corporation. Involved in strategic resource planning initiatives. Reviews matters which affect growth and development of Sauk County, and economic development of communications network. Responsible for economic development in Sauk County and oversees County coordinated transportation, including overseeing the Tri-County Airport Commission, municipal airports, Pink Lady Rail Transit Commission and Wisconsin River Rail Transit Commission. Responsible for the study, review and recommendation regarding freight, passenger and commuter rail development. intercity and commuter bus services and development, and the provision and coordination of rural and commuter transit services. Transit is governed by Wis. Stat. s. 59.58. Also responsible for oversight regarding arts, humanities, culture and historic preservation projects on behalf of the Board. Serves as the Landmarks Commission in compliance with Sauk Co. Code Ch. 38 and Wis. Stats. §§ 59.56 and 59.69(4m). Members: 7.

### **EXECUTIVE & LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE**

Responsible for proposing amendments and monitoring the operation of Rules of the Board; responsible for the conduct of all intergovernmental relations and affairs; monitors State legislative and administrative activity affecting Sauk County; proposes legislation or action on pending legislation affecting Sauk County; considers matters not specifically assigned to other committees. Responsible for policy direction and oversight to the following departments: County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, County Clerk, Emergency Management. This committee shall also have oversight of the Veteran Services Office.

Comprised of members from: The Executive & Legislative Committee shall be composed of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board, along with the Chair of the other Standing Committees. The Chair of the Committee shall vote only in the case of a tie. The County Clerk shall serve as secretary to this committee. The County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, and County Clerk shall serve as ex officio members of this committee without voting privileges. Members: 9.

### FINANCE, PERSONNEL & INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Responsible for financial policy initiation and review of all County fiscal matters, including reviewing and possibly revising the annual County operating budget, submitted to the Committee by the County Administrator, for presentation to the Reviews County investment and banking policies: manages County general fund and contingency fund; reviews per diem and mileage for all committees, commissions, boards or councils; recommends approval of County audit report; receives all special gifts and grants made in favor of the County. Responsible for policy jurisdiction over all County personnel matters including: recruitment and selection; collective bargaining and contract administration; employee relations; salary administration for all appointed and elected personnel; classification systems; employee training; fringe benefits; and reviews all new position requests and vacant positions. Oversees the County's safety program and safety training. Provides for all property, liability, and worker's compensation insurance needs for the County. Provides policy direction and oversight to Accounting, County Treasurer, the Personnel Department and Risk/Safety Manager. Members: 9.

#### **HEALTH RESOURCES**

Responsible for policy direction and oversight of Health Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. Chs. 250 through 255 relating to public and environmental health matters. See, Sauk Co. Code Ch. 3. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Human Services Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. chs. 46 and 51 and Wis. Stat. § 59.53 to oversee social services and community programs. Members: 9; 5 Supervisors, 1 M.D., 1 R.N., One member that represents the diversity of the county, 1 member who receives, or has a family member that receives, services from the Department of Human Services.

### **LAND RESOURCES & ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE**

Responsible for policy direction for County planning, land use regulations, surveying, remonumentation, mapping and uniform rural building identification system, land records modernization activities. Serves as the County Zoning Agency pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69. Establishes policies relating to planning, acquisition, development and maintenance of County owned park and recreation

sites. Responsible for natural resource management, resource conservation and environmental protection including soils, water, forestry and wildlife resources through participation in various federal, state and local programs. Responsible for developing sustainable practices within County operations and serving in an advisory capacity regarding "green technologies." Responsible for the development and implementation of the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Responsible for review and approval of vouchers related to the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Oversees operation of farmland located at the original Sauk County Health Care Center. Serves as the Farmland Preservation Review Committee. Also, jointly responsible with the Area Extension Director for oversight of University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension educational programming in agriculture and natural resources, community and economic development, family living, 4-H and positive youth development, horticulture, and County tourism and promotion activities on behalf of the Board.

Members: 9; 7 Supervisors, 6 of whom shall be Supervisors from districts that have at least a portion of their district in County Zoning, 1 Citizen who meets the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), 1 citizen may be appointed who shall be a public school administrator in the County. If there is no school administrator appointed then a Supervisor shall be appointed to fill that spot on the committee. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2) the designee shall be a person who is engaged in agricultural use, as defined under s. 91.01 (2)(a)1, and shall be a member of the Committee but shall refrain from discussion and voting on any matter where the Committee is acting as the County Zoning Agency. A public school administrator, if one is appointed, shall be a Member of the Committee but shall refrain from voting on matter not related to UW-Extension. Members of this committee shall serve on the lake protection districts. Provides policy direction and oversight to the following departments: Land Resources and Environment; Parks; County Surveyor; Land Information Officer; Register of Deeds; and Mapping.

### LAW ENFORCEMENT & JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

Responsible for exploration of justice alternatives. Provides policy direction and oversight on behalf of the Board to the following departments: District Attorney, Coroner, Clerk of Courts, Court Commissioner, Register in Probate, Child Support, and Circuit Court Judges, Sheriff, and the Animal Shelter. <u>Members: 9.</u>

### PUBLIC WORKS AND INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy direction in design, construction and maintenance of all County roads and expenditure of highway maintenance funds received from the state or County, including planning, development of, and maintenance of all structures required for storage, maintenance and operations relating to the Highway Department. The funding will only last one year and she has agreed to return to .80 FTE in 2025. The funding covers 20% of wages and benefits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2024, the .80 FTE Information & Assistance Specialist will be reclassified to full time for the year 2024 only. The additional .20 FTE will be devoted to the Independent Living Supports Program.

In September, the MIS Department initiated a Request for Proposal for a replacement system. This resulted in the receipt of proposals from six vendors. After a careful review by the Health Department, it was determined that the proposed system from Champ Software, INC (Nightingale Notes EHR) was the best system proposed to support the provision of Public Health Services by Sauk County.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, that the purchase of Nightingale Notes EHR software from Champ Software, INC, at an initial cost of \$51,797, and estimated recurring annual support and licensing fees of \$34,097, be hereby approved; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the 2024 Sauk County Budget for the Health Department be amended to include \$51,797 from the Public Health Workforce Grant to support the acquisition of this system; and,

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §66.1001 Wisconsin Statutes, any program or action of a local governmental unit that affects land use shall be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The Sauk County Comprehensive Plan, adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in 2009, defines managing and focusing "on efficient land use patterns that promotes redevelopment of under-utilized lands. It sets limits on outward growth, incorporates permanent land preservation techniques, and achieves livable communities." Upon evaluation of the request, the Land Resources and Environment Committee found that the rezone request to a Commercial zoning district maintains this objective.

## NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 7.005(2) Official Zoning Map of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows:

Rezone of approximately 7.9 acres of tax parcel 024-0569-10000 from an Agriculture Zoning District to a Commercial Zoning District.

Resolution Authorizing the County Administrator to Submit Multi-Discharger Variance Application to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

#### Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

**BACKGROUND:** The multi-discharger variance (MDV) for phosphorus extends the timeline for Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (WPDES) permitted facilities with complying with low-level phosphorus limits. In exchange, these facilities commit to stepwise reductions of phosphorus within their effluent as well as helping to address nonpoint sources of phosphorus from farm fields, cities or natural areas to implement projects designed to improve water quality. Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department and various WPDES permit holders are pursuing an approach to address reductions of phosphorus in the Baraboo River and Lower Wisconsin Watersheds through MDV watershed projects. Actual funding amounts are not made available until January 1 of any given year.

WHEREAS, Pursuant to s. 283.16, Wis. Stats, the MDV application must be submitted by Sauk County annually to determine eligibility to receive multi-discharger variance (MDV) funds; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that Sauk County continues to support the installation of conservation practices that prevent phosphorus pollution caused by soil erosion and agricultural runoff to protect groundwater surface water resources; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the County Administrator is hereby authorized to submit the MDV application.

Resolution to Authorize Continued County Participation in the Wildlife Damage Abatement Program and the Wildlife Damage Claim Program

#### Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is authorized to protect American agriculture and other resources from damage associated with wildlife. The primary authority for Animal Plant Health Inspection Service - Wildlife Services (APHIS-WS) is the Act of March 2, 1931 (46 Stat. 1468; 7 U.S.C.426-426b) as amended, and the Act of December 22, 1987 (101 Stat. 1329-331, 7 U.S.C. 426c). The APHIS-WS program was designed to cooperate with states, local jurisdictions, individuals, public and private agencies, organizations, and institutions to conduct a program of wildlife services involving mammal and bird species that are reservoirs for zoonotic diseases or animal species that are injurious and/or a nuisance to, among other things; agriculture, horticulture, forestry, animal husbandry, wildlife, and human health and safety. In 1983, the Wisconsin State Legislature established the Wildlife Damage Abatement Claim Program (WDACP) through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) to work in partnership with the USDA on wildlife damage efforts in Wisconsin. Wisconsin Statute 29.889 (4)(a) identifies that in order to be eligible for wildlife damage abatement assistance, the land for which assistance is sought is required to be located in a county which is participating in the administration of the wildlife damage abatement program. Sauk County has participated in the APHIS-WS program since 1984 and is required to sign a five-year Cooperative Service Agreement effective January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2028.

**THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, hereby authorizes the Administrator to sign a Cooperative Agreement (attached) with the WDNR and the USDA to administer the APHIS-WS program from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2028, in partnership with the WDNR and USDA; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors designates the Land Resources and Environment Committee as the oversight committee per the requirements of Section III of the Cooperative Service Agreement.

# COOPERATIVE SERVICE AGREEMENT between SAUK County

and

WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES (WDNR)

and

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE ANIMAL AND PLANT HEALTH INSPECTION SERVICE (APHIS) WILDLIFE SERVICES (WS)

#### **ARTICLE 1 – PURPOSE**

The purpose of this Cooperative Service Agreement is to cooperate in a County/State/Federal black bear, white-tailed deer, elk, cougar, Canada goose, wild turkey and Sandhill crane damage management program. The primary objective is to provide commercial agricultural producers the necessary technical and/or operational assistance in identifying, abating, managing, and assessing damage with the species listed.

#### **ARTICLE 2 – AUTHORITY**

APHIS-WS has statutory authority under the Acts of March 2, 1931, 46 Stat. 1468-69, 7 U.S.C. §§ 8351-8352, as amended, and December 22, 1987, Public Law No. 100-202, § 101(k), 101 Stat. 1329-331, 7 U.S.C. § 8353, to cooperate with States, local jurisdictions, individuals, public and private agencies, organizations, and institutions while conducting a program of wildlife services involving mammal and bird species that are reservoirs for zoonotic diseases, or animal species that are injurious and/or a nuisance to, among other things, agriculture, horticulture, forestry, animal husbandry, wildlife, and human health and safety.

#### **ARTICLE 3 - MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

The cooperating parties mutually understand and agree to/that:

- 1. APHIS-WS shall perform services set forth in the Work Plan, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. The parties may mutually agree in writing, at any time during the term of this agreement, to amend, modify, add or delete services from the Work Plan.
- 2. The Cooperator certifies that APHIS-WS has advised the Cooperator there may be private sector service providers available to provide wildlife damage management (WDM) services that the Cooperator is seeking from APHIS-WS.
- 3. All equipment with a purchase price of \$5,000 or more per unit, purchased directly with funds from the cooperator for use on this peroject shall be subject to disposal according to

APHIS policy, and shall be specifically listed in the attached work plan and financial plan. Property title/disposal shall be determined when this project (including all continuations and revisions of this agreement) terminates, or when the equipment is otherwise directed to other projects, whichever comes first. If the equipment is sold prior to the project end, the proceeds should be allocated according to APHIS policy. Continuations and revisions to this agreement shall list any equipment with a purchase price of \$5,000 or more per unit, carried over from a purchase directly with funds from the cooperator for use on this project. All other equipment purchased for the program is and will remain the property of APHIS-WS.

4. The cooperating parties agree to coordinate with each other before responding to media requests on work associated with this project.

#### ARTICLE 4 - COOPERATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

The County (Cooperator) agrees:

1. To designate the following as the authorized representative who shall be responsible for collaboratively administering the activities conducted in this agreement:

- 2. To authorize APHIS-WS to conduct direct control activities and/or technical assistance to reduce commercial agricultural damage associated to wildlife damage caused by the species identified in the Work Plan. Activities are defined in the Work Plan. APHIS-WS will be considered an invitee on the lands controlled by Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claims Program (WDACP) enrollees. These program enrollees will be required to exercise reasonable care to warn APHIS-WS as to dangerous conditions or activities in the project areas.
- To reimburse APHIS-WS for costs, not to exceed the annually approved amount specified in the Financial Plan. If costs are projected to exceed the amount reflected in the Financial

Plan, the agreement with amended Work Plan and Financial Plan shall be formally revised and signed by all parties before services resulting in additional costs are performed. The Cooperator agrees to pay all costs of services submitted via an invoice from APHIS-WS within 30 days of the date of the submitted invoice(s). Late payments are subject to interest, penalties, and administrative charges and costs as set forth under the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996.

- 4. To provide a Tax Identification Number or Social Security Number in compliance with the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996.
- 5. As a condition of this agreement, the Cooperator ensures and certifies that it is not currently debarred or suspended and is free of delinquent Federal debt.
- To designate APHIS-WS the County authorized individual whose responsibility shall be coordination and administration of WDACP activities conducted pursuant to this Agreement.
- 7. To notify APHIS-WS verbally or in writing as far in advance as practical of the date and time of any proposed meeting related to the program.
- 8. The Cooperator acknowledges that APHIS-WS shall be responsible for administration of APHIS-WS activities and supervision of APHIS-WS personnel. APHIS-WS will recognize the County as the lead cooperator in this Agreement and the WDNR for providing overall program oversight. APHIS-WS will coordinate activities with the County and WDNR.
- 9. To obtain the appropriate permits for removal activities for species listed in the Work Plan.
- 10. The Cooperator will not be connected to the USDA APHIS computer network(s).

#### ARTICLE 5 – APHIS-WS RESPONSIBILITIES

#### APHIS-WS Agrees:

1. To designate the following as the APHIS-WS authorized representative who shall be responsible for collaboratively administering the activities conducted in this agreement:

- 2. To conduct activities at sites designated by Cooperator as described in the Work Plan, Plan of Administration, and Financial Plans (Attachments A-C). APHIS-WS will provide qualified personnel and other resources necessary to implement the approved WDM activities delineated in the Work Plan, Plan of Administration, and Financial Plan of this agreement.
- 3. Designate to the County and WDNR the authorized APHIS-WS employee who shall be responsible for the joint administration of the activities conducted pursuant to this Agreement. APHIS-WS employees' rights will be governed by applicable Federal personnel laws, rules, and regulations. County employees' rights will be governed by County ordinances, Personnel Policy, and Union contracts where applicable.
  - a. APHIS-WS will designate the District Supervisor and/or Assistant District Supervisor as the authorized representative who will provide immediate direction and guidance to personnel in performing activities outlined in this Agreement, to include:
    - adequate numbers of qualified personnel to initiate and conduct the wildlife damage management activities outlined in the Work Plan of this Agreement.
    - ii. training, technical supervision, and coordination of activities as outlined in the Work Plan of this Agreement.
    - iii. to arrange for office space and provide equipment and other miscellaneous needs for personnel assigned to this program as outlined in the Work Plan of this Agreement.
- 4. That the performance of wildlife damage management actions by APHIS-WS under this agreement is contingent upon a determination by APHIS-WS that such actions are in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act, Endangered Species Act, and any other applicable federal statutes. APHIS-WS will not make a final decision to conduct requested wildlife damage management actions until it has made the determination of such compliance.
- 5. To invoice the County quarterly for actual costs incurred by APHIS-WS during the performance of services agreed upon and specified in the Work Plan. Authorized auditing representatives of the County shall be accorded reasonable opportunity to inspect the accounts and records of APHIS-WS pertaining to such claims for reimbursement to the extent permitted by Federal law and regulations. APHIS-WS agrees to handle cooperative finances and budgeting as outlined in the Financial Plan of this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE 6 – CONTINGENCY STATEMENT

This agreement is contingent upon the passage by Congress of an appropriation from which expenditures may be legally met and shall not obligate APHIS-WS upon failure of Congress to so appropriate. This agreement may also be reduced or terminated if Congress only provides APHIS-WS funds for a finite period under a Continuing Resolution.

#### ARTICLE 7 – NON-EXCLUSIVE SERVICE CLAUSE

Nothing in this agreement shall prevent APHIS-WS from entering into separate agreements with any other organization or individual for the purpose of providing wildlife damage management services exclusive of those provided for under this agreement.

#### ARTICLE 8 – CONGRESSIONAL RESTRICTIONS

Pursuant to Section 22, Title 41, United States Code, no member of or delegate to Congress shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement or to any benefit to arise therefrom.

#### ARTICLE 9 - LAWS AND REGULATIONS

This agreement is not a procurement contract (31 U.S.C. 6303), nor is it considered a grant (31 U.S.C. 6304). In this agreement, APHIS-WS provides goods or services on a cost recovery basis to nonfederal recipients, in accordance with all applicable laws, regulations and policies.

#### ARTICLE 10 - LIABILITY

APHIS-WS assumes no liability for any actions or activities conducted under this agreement except to the extent that recourse or remedies are provided by Congress under the Federal Tort Claims Act (28 U.S.C. 1346(b), 2401(b), and 2671-2680).

#### **ARTICLE 11 – NON-DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE**

The United States Department of Agriculture prohibits discrimination in all its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, and where applicable, sex, marital status, familial status, parental status, religion, sexual orientation, genetic information, political beliefs, reprisal, or because all or part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program. Not all prohibited bases apply to all programs.

#### ARTICLE 12 - DURATION, REVISIONS, EXTENSIONS, AND TERMINATIONS

This agreement shall become effective on January 1, 2024 and shall continue through December 31, 2028. This Cooperative Service Agreement may be amended by mutual agreement of the parties in writing. The Cooperator must submit a written request to extend the end date at least 10 days prior to expiration of the agreement. Also, this agreement may be terminated at any time by mutual agreement of the parties in writing, or by one party provided that party notifies the other in writing at least 120 days prior to effecting such action. Further, in the event the Cooperator does not provide necessary funds, APHIS-WS is relieved of the obligation to provide services under this agreement.

#### ATTACHMENT A WORK PLAN

In accordance with the Cooperative Service Agreement between the County, WDNR and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), Wildlife Services (WS), this Work Plan sets forth the objectives, activities and budget of this project during the period of this agreement.

#### Introduction

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is authorized to protect American agriculture and other resources from damage associated with wildlife. Wildlife Services activities are conducted in cooperation with other Federal, State, and local agencies, private organizations and individuals.

The APHIS-WS program uses an Integrated Wildlife Damage Management (IWDM) approach (sometimes referred to as IPM or "Integrated Pest Management") in which a series of methods may be used or recommended to reduce wildlife damage. These methods include the alteration of cultural practices as well as habitat and behavioral modification to prevent damage. However, controlling wildlife damage may require that the offending animal(s) are killed or that the populations of the offending species be reduced.

#### **Purpose**

Objectives and need for assistance: Agricultural producers need professional wildlife damage management assistance in identifying, abating, and assessing black bear, white-tailed deer, elk, cougar, Canada goose, wild turkey, and sandhill cranes damage. APHIS-WS's objective will be to provide that assistance.

Expected results or benefits: The benefits to be derived from a cooperative black bear, white-tailed deer, elk, cougar, Canada goose, wild turkey, and Sandhill cranes management program include timely availability of the necessary wildlife damage management expertise, technical assistance, loans of necessary abatement equipment, and crop/livestock damage appraisal services for producers experiencing conflicts with one of more of these species. The intended result will be wildlife damage relief.

#### **Planned APHIS-WS Activities**

1. Approach: The proposed wildlife damage management program will be comprised of education, extension, technical assistance, and operational efforts. When complaints occur, an evaluation of the situation will be made to determine what appropriate action should be taken. APHIS-WS will consider all applicable methods and combinations of techniques available to alleviate the conflict. APHIS-WS will recommend an integrated wildlife damage management approach which may consist of elements such as: changes in farming or livestock practices, loan of damage abatement equipment, installation of cost-shared permanent fences, WDNR issued shooting permits, and crop damage compensation (WDNR funded). Specific abatement measures to be considered are outlined in Attachment B.

- 2. Resources Required: Overall supervision and program direction will be provided by the APHIS-WS State Director. Immediate supervision and program direction will be provided by the APHIS-WS District Supervisor and/or Assistant District Supervisor. All County Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claims Program (WDACP) funds will be managed as an integral part of the APHIS-WS districts WDACP budget. Specific financial details are outlined in Financial Plan.
- 3. Procurement: Purchase of supplies, equipment, and miscellaneous needs including salaries will be made by APHIS-WS as outlined in the Financial Plan. All WDACP expenditures will be processed through APHIS-WS financial administrative systems (FMMI) and charged to the County WDACP account as outlined in the APHIS-WS District WDACP budget.
- 4. Stipulations and Restrictions: APHIS-WS activities under this cooperative effort will be limited to the State of Wisconsin. Techniques will be environmentally sound, safe, and effective. Wildlife damage management activities will be performed within the policy guidelines of APHIS-WS, the State of Wisconsin, and the County in compliance with applicable State and Federal regulations.
- 5. Reports: Upon request, APHIS-WS will provide an annual report to the County on APHIS-WS activities conducted under this Cooperative Agreement.

#### **Effective Dates**

This agreement shall become effective on January 1, 2024 and continue through December 31, 2028 unless otherwise modified or terminated as described in ARTICLE 12.

# ATTACHMENT B WISCONSIN WILDLIFE DAMAGE ABATEMENT & CLAIMS PROGRAM (WDACP) PLAN OF ADMINISTRATION SAUK COUNTY

As confirmed in the County Board of Supervisor's Resolution No. 87-2013, the County request to participate in the Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claims Program (WDACP), established under s. 29.889, Stats., and s. NR 12 Wis. Adm. Code. This Plan of Administration (Plan) outlines the relationships and duties of the County, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR), and the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Services, Wildlife Services (APHIS-WS), herein called the parties. By submission of this Plan, the County agrees to fully comply with s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR 12, Wis. Adm. Code and the Wisconsin WDACP Technical and Field Manuals which are made a part of this Plan by reference.

- 1. Definitions: For the purposes of this Plan, the Parties accept the definitions found in s. 29.889(1) Stats. And s. NR 12.31 WI. Adm. Code. In addition, the Parties agree that:
  - a. "Improperly filed claim" means any wildlife damage claim received by WDNR which does not comply fully with all eligibility requirements of s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR. 12 Wis. Adm. Code or this Plan or procedures described in the WDACP Technical or Field Manual.
  - b. "Permanent fence contract" means any permanent fence contract written in accordance with the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual and designed to remain effective for a minimum of 15 years.
- 2. Level of Participation: The County agrees to administer the full WDACP.
- 3. Eligible Species: The County agrees to administer the WDACP with respect to the following wild animals: bear, cougar, white-tailed deer, elk, Canada goose, wild turkey, and Sandhill cranes \* (\*only become eligible for program benefits when a hunting season in Wisconsin has been established).
- 4. Eligible Crops: The County agrees to provide WDACP services with respect to the following: damage to commercial seedlings or crops growing on agricultural lands, damage to crops that have been harvested for sale or further use but have not been removed from the agricultural land, damage to orchard trees or nursery stock, damage to livestock, or damage to apiaries.
- 5. Delegation of Responsibility:
  - a. The County, through an established committee or through a county designee shall provide Administration of the County WDACP pursuant to s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR 12, Wis. Adm. Code including approval of: annual budget requests, permanent fence contracts, crop prices, properly filed wildlife damage claims, shooting permit compliance waivers, and enrollee appeals, (if any).

b. APHIS-WS shall provide the field management of the County WDACP, including hiring, training, and supervising staff, providing program services, records management, purchasing, and equipment inventory.

#### 6. Budgeting:

#### a. APHIS-WS agrees to:

- i. Prepare a WDACP budget proposal for the following calendar year for County review and approval by October 31 (or as negotiated).
- ii. Not bind the County to the expenditures of funds exceeding their total County WDACP budget.
- iii. Keep administrative costs to a minimum, by billing WDACP expenses to each County on a quarterly basis.

#### b. The County agrees to:

- i. Provide an annual budget request to WDNR by November 1 (or as negotiated) for the following calendar year. All budget requests will include cost estimates for administration, abatement, wildlife damage claims, and an estimated number of claimants.
- ii. Prepare quarterly (or as negotiated) reimbursement request to WDNR for eligible WDACP expenditures.
- iii. Not bind WDNR for expenditures beyond the approved County Plan of Administration. The County may request additional funding by written amendment. It is understood that additional funding is not guaranteed and is subject to fund availability.
- iv. Unless otherwise agreed upon, submit advance abatement and administrative fund requests that are compliant with s. 29.889 and NR 12, after submitting a final reimbursement request for previous year for which WDACP participation was approved.

#### c. WDNR Agrees to:

- i. Review and approve, amend, or deny the annual budget request in accordance with s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR 12.32, Wis. Adm. Code, and advance funds under s. NR 12.34 (unless otherwise agreed upon), Wis. Adm. Code within 30 days of department approval of the annual budget estimate.
- ii. Review and approve, amend, or deny reimbursement requests in accordance with s. NR 12.34 and s. NR 12.35, Wis. Adm. Codes.

- iii. Review and act on properly filed wildlife damage claim requests no later than June 1 following the calendar year in which damage occurred.
- iv. If eligible wildlife damage claims are submitted late by the County, WDNR may accept and process the claims if funds are available, and the payment will not adversely affect claimants for the proceeding calendar year claim payments.
- v. If statewide approved wildlife damage claims exceed available funds, claims shall be paid on a prorated basis as established in s. NR 12.37 (3) Wis. Adm. Code.

#### d. The Parties mutually recognize and agree:

- i. WDNR may not bind the State of Wisconsin to pay costs beyond the amount appropriated for the WDACP.
- ii. WDNR may defer until after July 1, the payment of County reimbursement requests beyond the initial 25% funds advancement.
- iii. The County and WDNR shall not restrict APHIS-WS to line items estimates in the WDACP budget if total expenditures, per expense category of abatement or administration, do not exceed the total budgeted amount approved by the County and WDNR.
- iv. The County WDACP budget may be spent in its entirety. Any unspent funds will remain with the WDNR WDACP program.
- v. Supplies, materials, and equipment will be purchased with WDACP funds. If this Agreement is terminated by any of the Parties, items purchased will be transferred within the WDACP for use or proceeds of items shall remain with the WDACP or returned for reimbursement if possible.
- vi. WDNR will not reimburse the cost of abatement measures unless those measures were prescribed and implemented according to the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual.
- vii. WDNR will not make payment for any wildlife damage claim which does not comply with all eligible requirements of s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR 12, Wis. Adm. Code, or this Plan of Administration.

#### 7. Recordkeeping:

- a. APHIS-WS and the County agree to:
  - Maintain record keeping practices and procedures that confirm to accounting practices directed by the WDNR and in compliance with s. NR 12, Wis. Adm. Code.

- ii. Make all records and files relating to the WDACP available to the other Parties, upon request.
- iii. Send copies of any WDACP documentation to the other Parties, upon request.
- iv. Use WDNR authorized databases and forms for billing and reporting.
- b. APHIS-WS agrees to: Maintain separate enrollee files and keep records of all abatement recommendations, appraisals, and all WDACP related interactions with each enrollee.
- c. The County agrees to: Direct all billings to WDNR, Wildlife Damage Specialist
- d. WDNR may: Conduct periodic audits of County record keeping procedures and prepare a written report to the County.
- e. The Parties recognize and agree: All WDACP records are subject to the Wisconsin Open Records Law s.16.61, Stats. Any WDACP records requested will be provided by the County, WDNR, and/or APHIS-WS, as applicable.

#### 8. Abatement Measures:

- a. The parties mutually recognize and agree that:
  - i. WDNR shall maintain web pages detailing the WDACP and describing how services may be requested.
  - ii. All enrollees shall be required to have a signed enrollment form on file to meet the hunting requirements in s. 29.889 (7m), Stats., s. NR 12.36, Wis. Adm. Code prior to receiving WDACP assistance.
  - iii. All abatement measures recommended to alleviate wildlife damage shall conform to the procedures and priorities found in the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual and will be accepted by the County as complete and appropriate "recommended abatement". Other abatement measures may be used if approved in advance, in writing, by WDNR.
  - iv. In the event equipment loaned by APHIS-WS to an enrollee is damaged beyond normal wear and tear, the enrollee/owner shall be billed for parts and labor to repair the damaged equipment, or if repair costs exceed the value of the equipment, the enrollee will be billed for the replacement of the equipment. APHIS-WS agrees to invoice the enrollee for these costs through a separate Cooperative Service Agreement and deposit the proceeds in the County's WDACP account. If the enrollee refuses to pay:
    - The County shall direct APHIS-WS to refuse abatement services until payment is made (consequently the enrollee would be ineligible for a wildlife damage claim) or

- 2. The County shall take a reasonable legal action to recover the loss of WDACP materials and/or equipment and deposit the proceeds in the County's WDACP account.
- v. Permanent fences for white-tailed deer or elk abatement shall only be recommended subject to the priorities and conditions set forth in the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual or as directed by WDNR.
  - 1. A WDACP enrollee for which a permanent fence has been recommended and approved will be required to agree to the design of the fence in advance of letting the project for bid. The enrollee will be responsible for all materials and/or installation costs in excess of the low bid amount if the enrollee requests changes in the fence design subsequent to letting the bids for said fence.
  - A permanent fence contract shall be signed by the enrollee/landowner, the County, WDNR, and APHIS-WS. This contract shall be registered with the appropriate County Register of Deeds.
  - 3. All aspects of permanent fencing projects shall comply with requirements in the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual.
  - 4. All permanent fences must be approved by the County and approved in writing by the WDNR prior to soliciting and awarding bids for materials and construction of the fence.
  - All permanent fences that exceed the specification found in the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual must have prior written approval from WDNR.
  - 6. The County will pay the WDACP's 75% obligation for permanent high-tensile woven wire projects approved by the WDNR, when APHIS-WS has determined that the WDACP requirements for materials and construction have been met.
  - 7. An initial fence inspection will be completed by APHIS-WS and all information will be entered into the WDNR database including a copy of the registered permanent fence contract.
  - 8. APHIS-WS shall conduct inspections a minimum of once annually of all permanent fences cost-shared through the WDACP to ensure fence contract compliance. All inspection records will be annually recorded in the WDACP database.
  - 9. A penalty fee (fee to be determined) may be charged to the enrollee if the fence has been awarded and the enrollee withdraws or elects to NOT build the approved fence.

- 10. Enrollees will be denied additional full program WDACP assistance if a permanent fence has been recommended as the primary abatement and the enrollee refuses the fence. For as long as a permanent fence is the primary recommended abatement for that enrollee full WDACP program assistance (any abatement and/or claims) will be denied in all subsequent years until a fence is erected. NOTE: Enrollee may remain eligible for Act 82 permits, as long as all conditions for Act 82 enrollment have been met.
- 11. The contractor shall be liable for the payment of penalties to the WDACP accruing in the amount described in the permanent fence Bid Request, in the event the Contractor fails to meet the delivery and/or installation schedules as specified. Penalties, if applicable, shall be deducted from the payment that is owed to the contractor under the terms of the Bid and its associated bid conditions.
- 12. APHIS-WS will prepare all Satisfaction of Contract paperwork and record this paperwork with the appropriate county Register of Deeds, when the fence has reached the end of its 15-year term and/or when the contract has been otherwise satisfied (i.e., enrollee has provided payment to end the contract prior to the end of the 15-year term according to the pay back clause of the clause of the register permanent fence contract).
- vi. Enrollees shall be encouraged to integrate sound conservation practices with their normal agricultural practices.
- vii. The County, in accordance with s. NR 12.35(4) Wis. Adm. Code will not administer abatement measures to persons not cooperating with County personnel or the County's agents responsible for administering the County's WDACP. Abusive language, behavior, threats of violence, or otherwise will be considered a failure on the part of the enrollee to cooperate. This condition of administration will be provided by the County or its agent, in writing to program enrollees.
- b. WDNR and APHIS-WS agree to: Provide current information, as available, on the effectiveness of the above abatement measures and/or changes to the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual.
- 9. Wildlife Damage Claims:
  - a. APHIS-WS agrees to:
    - Advise the County WDACP enrollees in writing procedures and requirements for submitting a wildlife damage claim, and all other WDACP eligibility requirements through the use of the current program Farmers Fact sheet and/or other informational materials.

- ii. Require that potential claimants specify the location of damage, crop(s) being damaged, species of wildlife causing damage, and the date damage first occurred with a written, telephone, or personal consultation.
- iii. Require that enrollees have signed enrollment form(s) (WDNR form) on file to meet the hunting requirements in s. 29.889 (7M), Stats. And s. NR 12.36(2) Wis. Adm. Code.
- iv. Inspect reported damage to verify eligibility requirement and recommend abatement measures.
- v. Determine the amount of huntable land and the applicable number of hunters for each enrollee in accordance with s. NR 12.31(4) or (4e), Wis Adm. Code, notify each enrollee of the requirement to allow open public hunting or managed hunting access (at least 2 hunters per 40 acres of land suitable for hunting). Land suitable for hunting all eligible species other than deer and elk shall be determined in a manner consistent with s. NR 12.31(4e) Wis. Adm. Code. Participants who only receive a deer shooting permit and waive any eligibility to receive a wildlife damage claim payment or other WDACP program assistance, are exempt from the public hunting requirement (Act 82 enrollment), (s. NR 12.36 (1m) Wis. Adm. Code). Participants who receive abatement only on leased land properties for bear damages to apiaries are exempt from the public hunting requirements as defined in s. 29.889 (7m), Stats.
- vi. Prepare maps of properties enrolled in the WDACP that are required to open to the public for hunting the species causing damage. Maps must detail the acres enrolled, Township, Range, Section number(s), identifying owned and leased land properties enrolled, and the enrollee's contract information. APHIS-WS will obtain approval from the enrollee to assure that the map includes complete and accurate information regarding all properties enrolled. APHIS-WS staff will enter a copy of the map into the WDNR database, per the WDNR mapping guidelines.
- vii. Notify WDACP enrollees that any site will be ineligible if they fail to:
  - 1. Control hunting access on all contiguous land under the same ownership and control, except in situations involving apiaries on land not controlled by the enrollee as defined in s. 29.889 (7m), Stats.
  - 2. Allow public hunting for the species causing damage (two options available)
    - a. Open public hunting (OPH)
    - b. Managed Hunting Access (MHA) the presence of 2 hunters per 40 acres of land suitable for hunting.

- 3. Sign the appropriate enrollment form(s) including obtaining landowner consent for enrollment of leased properties in a timely manner.
- 4. File a wildlife damage complaint with APHIS-WS within 14 days of first damage each year.
- 5. Follow APHIS-WS's recommended abatement according to the WDACP Technical Manual list of approved methods.
- 6. Request an appraisal for each crop and/or cutting from APHIS-WS orally or in writing at least 10 days prior to the harvest of crops, and delay harvest of said crops for a period of up to 10 days to allow APHIS-WS time to appraise the unharvested crops, or until the appraisal is completed.
- 7. Notify APHIS-WS if they charge any fees for hunting or hunting access, or any other activity that includes hunting for the species causing the damage.
- viii. Inspect the crop or individual fields identified by the enrollee, prior to harvest, and access the eligible wildlife damage and prepare a wildlife damage claim.
- ix. Retain the claim until the end of the calendar year or end of the state harvest season for the enrolled species, whichever is later, to determine the enrollee's compliance with the WDACP requirements.
- x. Establish, as described below, uniform unit prices for eligible crops and calculated the value of the eligible wildlife damage claims (see Mutual Agreement between all parties 4b).
- xi. Ensure that crop damage resulting from improper crop management, compromised growing conditions and weather, or wildlife other that the covered species, is not included in the official crop damage appraisals conducted by APHIS-WS prior to preparation of the enrollee's official wildlife damage claim.
- xii. Summarize and prepare the necessary WDNR forms for all wildlife damage claims for review by the County prior to the succeeding March 1<sup>st</sup>. Upon approval by the County, claims will be submitted to the WDNR, unless otherwise negotiated by the succeeding March 1<sup>st</sup>.
- xiii. Notify, in writing, any enrollee whose wildlife damage claim has been rejected and provided the reason for the rejection, as well as the appropriate appeal procedures.
- b. The County agrees to:

- i. Review and approve all properly filed wildlife damage claims.
- ii. Establish crop prices in accordance with the WDACP Technical Manual or approve prices as recommended by APHIS-WS.
- iii. Deny all wildlife damage claims for a crop site where an invalid enrollment form has been signed by the enrollee and filed with APHIS-WS
- iv. Deny all wildlife damage claims where APHIS-WS did not receive a complaint within 14 days of first damage.
  - v. Deny all wildlife damage claims for crop sites where APHIS-WS abatement recommendations were not followed.
- vi. Deny all wildlife damage claims for crops that were harvested before an appraisal request was made to APHIS-WS or before an appraisal was completed (within a 10-day period from notification of harvest).
- vii. Deny all wildlife damage claims on row crops for damage occurring to these crops during a particular growing season after 90 percent of the County's harvest for this crop has been completed, as required by s. NR 12.37(1)(c), Wis. Adm. Code. The County may consult with the local FSA and UW extension offices for assistance in making the 90 percent determination (if desired).
- viii. Deny all wildlife damage claims if an enrollee is not compliant with the prescribed harvest objective if issued a deer damage shooting permit, and the consulting group consisting of the County, the damage specialist and WDNR, does not collectively recommend an exemption to the harvest objective requirement.
- ix. The County shall take reasonable legal action to recover claim payments made on the basis of fraudulent or negligent claims or statements.
- c. WDNR agrees to: Accept the amount of wildlife damage for all properly filed wildlife damage claims approved by the County as final for purposes of review.
- d. It is mutually agreed by the County, APHIS-WS, and WDNR that:
  - i. Damage assessment for compensation will be performed by APHIS-WS staff in accordance with the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual and Field Handbook and will be accepted by the County as complete and accurate "assessed damage".
  - ii. Compensation prices will be developed by APHIS-WS using information from UW Extension and/or local marketplace data and proposed to the County for approval, each year. Such prices will be established according to procedures set forth in the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual. Such

- prices will be applied to all individuals with eligible wildlife damage to those crops throughout the County.
- iii. Public complaints (abatement compliance, fraud, etc.) must be written and received by APHIS-WS by December 31<sup>st</sup>, to be given consideration in the wildlife damage claims determination process. Hunting access denial complaints shall be written and received by APHIS-WS within 10 days of hunting access denial to be given consideration in the wildlife damage claims determination process, as described in the WDACP Technical Manual.
- iv. The County will not administer a damage appraisal and/or claim to persons not cooperating with County personnel or its agent responsible for administering the County's Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claims Program. Abusive language, behavior, threats of violence, or otherwise will be considered a failure on the part of the enrollee to cooperate. This condition of administration will be provided by the county or its agent, in writing to program enrollees.
- v. As required by s. NR 12.37(4)(a) 4.b., Wis. Adm. Code as part of the claims approval process, if an enrollee who has been issued a shooting permit is found not to be compliant with the harvest objective prescribed under his/her permit under s. NR 12.163(2)(a), Wisc. Adm. Code, then the County, its agent, and the department shall consult before making a collective recommendation to grant an exemption to the harvest objective requirement. This group shall review the evidence if there is consensus that an exemption is warranted, they shall recommend that the County designated committee charged with the approval of such damage claims, grant approval of the damage claim for the year in which the permit was issued. Compelling evidence that shall be used is detailed in s. NR 12.163(2)(b)2., Wis. Adm. Code.
- 10. Charges: The terms of this Agreement may be changed by written amendment approved by all Parties.

#### 11. Termination:

- a. The County may terminate participation in the WDACP upon notifying WDNR in writing thirty (30) days prior to termination.
- b. WDNR shall terminate a County Plan of Administration if the County does not comply with all conditions of s. 29.889, Stats., s. NR 12, Wis. Adm. Code, this Plan of Administration, the Wisconsin WDACP Technical Manual, or fails to properly report costs of the program or claims.
- c. WDNR agrees to reimburse the County for WDACP costs incurred and determined proper by DNR under this Plan of Administration prior to the effective date of termination.

- d. That upon termination of the Agreement, the County shall reimburse APHIS-WS for all County WDACP obligations created by APHIS-WS as a result of this Agreement and not previously reimbursed, to the limits of the County WDACP budget.
- e. In the event that the County chooses to exercise its right to overrule APHIS-WS on a particular case under the general policy provision, APHIS-WS reserves the right to withdraw administrative and/or fiscal support of that case. Either action may occur without termination of this Agreement.
- 12. Length of Effect: This Plan shall remain in effect until December 31, 2028, unless otherwise changed or terminated as described in Article 12 and sections 10 and 11.

# Resolution offered by the Property Committee and Finance Committee

BACKGROUND: Sauk County owns and maintains over 196 miles of fiber optic network cable and conduit throughout the county. CTH BD and N. Reedsburg Rd is being reconstructed into a roundabout during the 2024 road construction season. It is the responsibility of the owner of the utility to re-route utilities at the owner's expense to avoid a construction conflict. The current Sauk County Facilities are in conflict with the new roundabout construction plans. Approximately 2,534' of new duct and new fiber optic cable will be installed during the re-route of County Facilities. Splicing of the new fiber will be completed by a county contractor. The non-budgeted project came in at a not exceed cost of \$66,500. Design/Engineering (\$10,500.00), labor and materials for conduit & fiber (\$43,00.00), splicing (8,000), & materials purchased by county (\$5,000). Building Services is asking to also amend the current 2023 Building Services Capital Outlay budget to add \$66,500 of general fund dollars to cover the cost of the project.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, hereby authorizes the County Administrator to sign a contract with Telcom Construction to provide the labor at a cost of \$43,000 to relocate current Sauk County Fiber to a location that is not within conflict of the proposed roundabout plan at a cost of \$66,500.

# RESOLUTION # 98 - 2023

# Resolution to Expand the Long-Term Care Continuum in Sauk County

## Resolution offered by the Property Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

**BACKGROUND:** In August of 2010, Keefe & Associates studied the potential long-term care continuum for the county. It laid out a strategy for potentially adding Assisted Living to the nursing home Reedsburg campus. Until 2018, multiple follow up studies reported the market was continuously oversaturated until a report by Wipfli LLC in 2018.

It is highly unlikely Sauk County will be able to expand the continuum without increasing the amount of taxpayer support the existing facility already requires. For the years 2018 through the end of 2024 the county will have spent more than \$17 million in sales and property tax revenues or an average of \$2.44 million per year.

There is no statutory requirement for the county to own or maintain a nursing home. The monies allocated to support the nursing home are better spent meeting the needs of our aging population through statutorily required programs that benefit residents throughout Sauk County rather than a facility that primarily serves only the Reedsburg market.

This resolution proposes marketing the nursing home and incentivizing a developer to build a long-term care facility and preserve the 82 bed licenses in the county.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that a Request for Proposals marketing the Sauk County Nursing Home be issued with the following conditions:

- The bed licenses cannot be sold or transferred outside of Sauk County subject to severe penalties as established in the terms of sale.
- The county reserves the first right of refusal not to exceed the sale price should the owner decide to sell the property.
- Preferential consideration may be given to a local (Sauk County based) buyer.
- The sale price shall not be less than the value of the outstanding bond payments.
- The remaining 31.7 acres of land may also be used to incentivize the construction of an assisted living or comparable long-term care facility.
- Any amount over the value of the outstanding bond payments may be used to incentivize construction of an assisted living or comparable long-term care facility.
- The potential buyer shall demonstrate a history of 5-star ratings in the senior health care industry.
- The potential buyer shall retain existing staff subject to job performance.
- The Board of Supervisors shall approve all final contracts.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the existing nursing home staff will have first priority when filling new or vacant positions elsewhere in the county based upon qualifications and past job performance; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** the county board shall encumber the remaining 31.7 acres of adjoining land for a period not to exceed 10 years if a long-term care facility is not acquired for the site; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that if the property is sold, the County Administrator shall present a plan to Finance for final consideration by the County Board of any unused sales tax or tax levy from the 2024 proposed budget with allocations being prioritized for the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC), Veteran's Services, Human Services and Public Health as well as county staff salaries.

# 2024 - 2026 RULES OF THE COUNTY BOARD

## **RULE I - Organization**

- A. As provided by statute, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors ("Board") shall organize on the third Tuesday of April in even numbered years. Regular and special meetings of the Board shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 59.11. The Board shall hold an annual meeting on the Tuesday after the second Monday of November in each year for the purpose of transacting business and the adoption of the budget. When the day of the meeting falls on November 11, the meeting shall be held on the next succeeding day.
- B. The Chair of the County Board ("Chair"), Vice-Chair, and 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-Chair shall be elected biennially by the Board at the April meeting in even-numbered years. A majority vote of the total elected Supervisors is required to elect the Chair, Vice-Chair and 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair (e.g. 31 districts in Sauk County, 16 votes required regardless of number of Supervisors in attendance at meeting). Furthermore, any Supervisor may request removal of the Chair or Vice-Chair and new elections for a new Chair, Vice-Chair or both under item 13 of the regular Board meeting agenda, provided such request is placed with the County Clerk and County Administrator pursuant to the provisions of III. U. Such officers shall take office upon election. The meeting shall be chaired by the Corporation Counsel until a new Chair is elected. No Supervisor may be elected as Chair for more than three (3) consecutive terms.
- C. In addition to presiding at meetings, the supervisor elected Chair by the Board, pursuant to Rule I.B., shall upon election, assume all the responsibilities and perform all duties required of the Chair, pursuant to applicable State Statutes and these Rules, until the Board elects a successor.
- D. In case of the absence or inability of the Chair for any meeting, the Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair. In case of the absence or inability of both the Chair and Vice-Chair for any meeting, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice -Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair. In the absence of the Chair, Vice-Chair and 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice -chair, the members shall choose a temporary Chair by a majority vote of the members present. In the case of the permanent absence or inability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and a new Vice-Chair shall be elected by the Board.
- E. The Chair is authorized to attend meetings and conferences on matters related to county government and may direct the attendance of the Vice-Chair or some other members of the Board, either in place of the Chair, or along with the Chair, however per diem. shall not be payable unless authorized in accordance with Rule II, E. The Chair shall serve as the County's voting delegate at the Annual Convention of the Wisconsin Counties Association. The Chair shall serve on the following: Madison Area Technical College Appointment Board, Western Wisconsin Technical College District Board, and WIRED Leadership Caucus.

If a vacancy occurs on the Board, the procedures set forth Wis. Stat. s. 59.10(3)(e) shall govern in filling said vacancy. A supervisor filling a vacancy shall not automatically be assigned to the same committees as his or her predecessor in office but may request particular assignments. The chair shall have the option of removing or replacing any or all committee assignments for a replacement supervisor including moving a minimal number of supervisors to different committees if it benefits the county. Reassignment of supervisors requires the express consent of each reassigned supervisor and approval by a majority of members voting on the reassignment. Replacement of a member of the Executive & Legislative Committee, shall require election by the Board.

- F. Supervisors appointed to special committees, boards, and commissions shall serve on those bodies only so long as they remain members of the Board unless a state statute or county ordinance provides otherwise. At the point in time that a supervisor is no longer a member of the Board, the position on the special committee, board, or commission shall be deemed vacant, and the Chair shall appoint a new individual, who must be a member of the Board, to fill the unexpired term on the body. A former supervisor may only fill a citizen member position on a special committee, board or commission if the former supervisor's continued service will result in no diminution of representation on the body by members of the Board.
- G. A secret ballot may be used by the Board or a committee but only to elect an officer of the Board or the committee. When written ballots are used, except for secret ballots, supervisors shall indicate their vote by placing their district number on the reverse side of the ballot. The first ballot shall be the nominating ballot, to be followed by succeeding formal ballots until a majority vote of the members present elects. Persons nominated may address the Board for up to 3 minutes. Only persons named on a nominating ballot shall be considered during a formal ballot. A nominee may withdraw themselves from the ballot at any time after the initial ballot.
- H. The standing committees shall be appointed by the Chair, in consultation with the Executive & Legislative Committee, subject to the approval of the Board. Committee appointments shall be presented for approval at the next meeting of the Board following the date of organization. The Executive & Legislative Committee shall meet at the call of the Chair as soon as practical after the organizational meeting to consult on committee appointments. After consultation, the new, tentative committees appointed by the Chair shall serve prior to approval by the Board during the period between the organizational meeting and the regular meeting in May, where consideration by the Board shall take place.

#### RULE II – Members Decorum

- A. The Board aspires to encourage appropriate dress by board members that reflects the professionalism of the Board. Business casual or more formal attire is encouraged.
- B. All comments, debates and discussions shall be appropriate and to the point of the topic under discussion, and conducted in a manner that is civil, and respectful of all concerned.
- C. Unless conducting non-County Board business, Supervisors wishing to confer with a Department Head shall schedule an appointment in advance with that particular Department Head and a Supervisor shall not contact staff (non-department head) without first seeking permission from the Administrator or Department Head.
- D. A minimum of one day of education for members of the Board shall be set by the Chair, said day of education to be held every two years. Such education may be conducted through electronic means, including but not limited to videos and webinars. The Chair may set additional days of education for Board members, including one or more days for the purpose of clarifying budget procedures and upcoming budget analysis matters.

#### Compensation

E. Supervisors shall be authorized up to a maximum of 90 days' compensation (at a per diem rate of \$90.00 for each day of attendance when the Board is in session and meeting, and

\$75.00 for other authorized service including committee meetings), plus mileage and reimbursement of authorized expenses, for committee work when attending committee meetings of which they are members, or as chair of a committee (or their designee) when attending a committee meeting of which they are not a member for the purpose of providing testimony on an issue. Authorized service includes service required by ordinance or resolution. The maximum limits established for committee work shall be in addition to the per diems and mileage supervisors are entitled to receive for attendance at meetings of the Board and exclusive of per diems paid by non-county boards or commissions where the payment of the per diem or mileage is not made from County funds. Reimbursement of expenses (such as mileage, parking, etc.) shall be allowed only if a request for payment is made on the form provided by the Accounting Department within three (3) months after the meeting or event date. Payment to County Board supervisors and other committee members shall be only via direct deposit.

- F. As provided by Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2), no supervisor shall be allowed pay for committee service while the Board is in session, but the Board may authorize payment of per diem, mileage and reimbursement for other expenses for attendance at any school, institute or meeting which the Board directs them to attend. Each standing committee is specifically authorized to send up to two (2) members to up to two (2) conventions (including conferences and other trainings) per County fiscal year. The convention cannot exceed three (3) days or be farther than three hundred (300) miles. All other requests require approval by a majority of the Board. Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2). In addition, all Supervisors are allowed to attend the Wisconsin Counties Association Annual Meeting with all registration fees to be paid for by the County. The Chair shall be able to attend National Association of Counties meeting with reimbursement for expenses incurred.
- G. Any increase in the number of days of committee work for which supervisors may be paid compensation and mileage in any year shall require approval by two-thirds vote of the members of the Board present, prior to payment. In addition to the above, the Chair shall receive compensation for performance of the duties of that office. The Chair is authorized to act as a member of all committees in an ex officio capacity, and per diem and mileage are eligible to be paid under this rule for attendance at all committee meetings attended by the Chair.
- H. The supervisor elected Chair shall be entitled to receive the compensation provided for the part-time position of Chair consisting of a salary of \$650 per month in addition to any other per diem and mileage entitlement available to other supervisors in accordance with Rule II. E., as provided by Sauk Co. Code § 35.03.
- I. All members of the Board who are to be reimbursed for committee work shall submit vouchers to the County Clerk on a monthly basis, to be placed on file with other current claims or accounts to be authorized for payment at regular Finance Committee meetings. Per diem and mileage paid Board members through any calendar year shall be compiled in the Accounting Department and presented to the Board prior to annual publication in March of the following year. Supervisors who "ride along" with other supervisors may not claim mileage.
- J. No current claim or account to be paid from funds previously appropriated for any item by the Board in the Budget shall be allowed, nor order passed whereby any money is paid out or expended, until said claim or account has been referred to the appropriate department committee and report made thereof as directed by said committee.

K. All claims or accounts for disbursements made by any County official must be itemized and contain sufficient information to identify proper budget authorization.

## Rule III – Meetings General

- A. The Board shall meet regularly in the County Board Room on the third Tuesday of each month except as provided in Rule I.A. above. Regular meetings of the full Board shall commence at 6:00 P.M. Any vote to adjourn to a different time or place for convening a regular meeting shall require approval by two-thirds of the members present.
- B. A Special Meeting of the Board shall be held in accordance with the provisions set forth in 59.11 (2). A Supervisor may signify agreement to a request by email, delivered to the Clerk via County email from a Supervisor's official Sauk County email address to the Clerk's official email address. Furthermore, the Clerk may notice a Special Meeting by email. Personal email accounts, SMS or other electronic messages are not acceptable.
- C. The order of business of Board meetings shall be as stated on the agenda for each session. The agenda shall jointly be the responsibility of the Chair, the County Administrator and the County Clerk. The agenda shall be circulated to the Board not less than two business days before each meeting. Agenda amendments that comply with Open Meeting Law notice requirements are permitted after initial circulation.
- D. The format for the agenda at the April organizational meeting held in even-numbered years shall be as follows:
  - 1. Call to order.
  - 2. Invocation and pledge of allegiance.
  - 3. Verification of credentials and roll call.
  - Administration of oath of office.
  - 5. Adoption of agenda.
  - 6. Approval of the minutes of the previous meeting.
  - 7. Designation of official newspaper.
  - 8. Election of a Chair and, Vice Chair & 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-Chair.

(Proceed in accordance with regular meeting agenda, see III.E. 6. through 15.)

- E. The format for the regular meeting agenda of the County Board shall be as follows:
  - 1. Call to order.
  - 2. Roll call.
  - 3. Invocation and pledge of allegiance.
  - 4. Adoption of agenda.
  - 5. Approval of the minutes of previous meeting.
  - 6. General consent agenda items.
  - 7. Scheduled appearances included on the agenda.
  - 8. Public comment with each speaker limited to no more than three minutes.
  - 9. Communications.
  - 10. Appointments.
  - 11. Bills.
  - 12. Claims.

- 13. Elections.
- 14. Proclamations.
- 15. Reports.
- 16. Unfinished business.
- 17. New business.
- 18. Referrals.
- 19. New agenda items (no discussion). Submit in writing or by email new business items to the County Administrator as soon as possible for Rule III.U. committee referral or addition to the Board agenda.
- 20. Adjournment.
- F. It is declared to be the policy of Sauk County that the public is entitled to the fullest and most complete information regarding the affairs of County government as is compatible with the conduct of County affairs and the transaction of County business. Wis. Stat. §§ 19.80 to 19.98 are to be complied with by all members at all meetings of public nature. The Board and its committees shall "sit with open doors," and timely notification of all public meetings, time, date, place and subject matter shall be given, including the specifics for any contemplated closed session.

#### **Procedure**

- G. The Chair shall preserve order and decorum. The Chair may speak to points of order in preference to other members, and shall recite questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board by any two members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the Board. He or she shall vote on all roll calls, except upon appeals from his or her own decision. The Chair may NOT participate in debate or discussion unless he or she steps down from the Chair and assumes their regular seat (the Vice-Chair would then run the meeting) then following the same rules as any other Supervisor.
- H. The Chair shall announce items as they arise on the agenda. With respect to a resolution or ordinance, the Chair shall ask if a member wishes to make a motion, and upon a motion, if there is a second. Upon a motion and second, the Chair, or the Clerk, shall state the question on the motion, identifying the resolution or ordinance by its title and number, and reading the resolution in full. If the text of the resolution or ordinance has been distributed to members in advance, the chair may state the question without reading it in full, instead identifying the resolution by its designated title and number, by saying: It is moved and seconded to adopt the resolution relating to...., as printed." Any Supervisor has the right to have the motion or resolution read. After the question has been stated, the Chair shall call upon the maker of the motion who may defer to the chair of the appropriate committee, or an appropriate County staff person, for any statement or explanation.
- In presenting business or debate, members shall address the Chair, be recognized, and when in order, proceed without any interruption. Debate and discussion should be limited to the agenda item under discussion. Discussion is intended to provide clarity on a given topic. In all cases, personalities are prohibited and civility shall be observed. In case more than one member shall seek recognition to address the Board or committee, the Chair shall decide who has precedence.
- J. All regular meetings of the Board and Board committees shall provide a noticed public comment period. During a public comment period, any person who is not a member of the

body may comment on a specific item or issue that is on that particular agenda for a maximum of three minutes per person. Based on the number of people registered to comment, the chair has discretion to limit public comment to two minutes and shall announce said restriction prior to public comments commencing. Any person who wishes to comment on a matter not on the County Board agenda shall provide their comment to the County Clerk in writing for possible distribution to the Board. Discussion of personalities is prohibited and civility shall be observed. The Board or committee Chair may authorize the appearance and comment of a non-member if the appearance is specifically listed on the agenda.

- K. Any member wishing to speak to a question shall be permitted to do so at least once, and a motion for the previous question shall not be in order until every member has had such opportunity. No member may speak twice on any question until every member choosing to speak has spoken. The person making a motion and the second may speak for up to five (5) minutes during the first round of debate and all others shall be limited to three (3) minutes per round.
- L. All Supervisors present in person and remotely are expected to vote on all questions and items put before the Board or Committee. A Supervisor who has a conflict of interest pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 19.59 or Sauk Co. Code Ch. 36, Code of Ethics, shall, prior to the commencement of discussion or consideration of the matter, or as soon thereafter as the conflict of interest is discovered, declare the same. The Chair shall be excused by the Vice-Chair, for appropriate reasons. A Supervisor who chooses to abstain from voting for any other reason should likewise, prior to the commencement of discussion or consideration of the matter, declare that they will be abstaining. All members abstaining shall be deemed present for purposes of a quorum even if absence from the chambers is required.
- M. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if called for by the Chair or any member of the Board. After motion is made and stated by the Chair, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Board, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment by a majority vote of the Board.
- N. In every instance, a motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, for previous question and for limited debate shall be decided without discussion.
- O. Except for resolutions approved as part of a consent agenda, all votes on resolutions or ordinances shall be recorded roll call votes. If the electronic voting system is not operational, the Board may, by a two-thirds vote, approve voice voting on any resolution that does not otherwise require a roll call or supermajority vote by law.
- P. Any budget alterations shall require authorization by two-thirds of the membership of the Board in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 65.90(5).
- Q. When a motion has been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move for reconsideration thereof at the next regularly scheduled meeting or in the same meeting of the Board. Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions except a motion to adjourn.
- R. Reports to the Board are presented for information and not debate, and shall be limited to ten minutes in length after which a question and answer period may be conducted that also shall not exceed ten minutes. The time provided for a report or question and answer period may be

- extended either during the approval of the agenda or by motion to extend the time allowed for the report or the question and answer period.
- S. The Board shall take a ten-minute break after two hours of meeting, and shall break for ten minutes every two hours thereafter, for the comfort of supervisors and members of the public attending the meeting.
- T. Remote Participation in Sauk County Board and Committee Meetings:

The Chair of the Board or a Committee may not remotely preside over any meeting.

A Supervisor may remotely attend, be counted towards a quorum, vote and be paid per diem as Follows:

#### COUNTY BOARD MEETING:

- 1. Supervisor must request remote participation in a meeting of the full County Board of the Chair at least 72-hours prior to the meeting, and notify the County Clerk if and once such request is granted by the Chair.
- 2. Supervisor may participate via voice or video; may speak only when recognized by the Chair pursuant to all other applicable rules of the board; may vote ONLY using County approved, properly configured, and secured voting device.
- 3. An individual Supervisor may remotely attend a meeting no more than three (3) times per two-year term.
- 4. No more than two Supervisors may remotely attend and participate in a meeting of the full County Board.
- 5. Remote participation in closed session is not allowed.
- 6. The Chair may alter the provisions of this paragraph to allow for unforeseen or urgent circumstances.

#### COMMITTEES OF THE COUNTY BOARD:

- 1. Supervisor must request the remote participation in a Committee meeting of the Committee Chair at least 72 hours prior to the meeting, and notify the Secretary of the Committee if and once such request is granted by the Chair.
- 2. Supervisor may participate and vote via voice or video; may speak only when recognized by the Chair pursuant to all other applicable Rules of the Board and Committee.
- 3. An individual Supervisor may remotely attend a meeting no more than three (3) times per two-year term.
- 4. No more than one (1) Supervisor may remotely attend and participate in a Committee meeting.
- 5. Remote participation in closed session is not allowed.

6. The Chair may alter the provisions of this paragraph to allow for unforeseen or urgent circumstances.

#### SAUK COUNTY HEALTHCARE CENTER

Sauk County Health Care Center (SCHCC) staff who participate in the SCHCC trustees meetings may do so remotely when they need to remain at the SCHCC for health and safety reasons. Citizen members of the SCHCC trustees may participate in meetings remotely when health and safety is a concern.

- U. All proposed Board agenda items shall be submitted in writing to the County Clerk and County Administrator by 4:30 p.m. on the Tuesday preceding the next regular meeting of the Board. The County Administrator is responsible for the referral and routing of all proposed resolutions and other items to come before a committee and the Board. Except as otherwise provided, all proposed Board agenda items shall be referred to each standing committee with subject matter jurisdiction prior to placement on the Board agenda for discussion, report, and recommendation. Any Supervisor may also present a proposed resolution or agenda item for consideration by the full Board utilizing one of the following processes:
  - 1. A Supervisor may request the committee chairman to place a proposed resolution or other item on the agenda of the next regular meeting of a committee of which he is a member; or
  - 2. A Supervisor may request the County Administrator to refer a proposed resolution or item to the appropriate committee for consideration at its next regular meeting, if the requestor is not a member of that committee.

All business referred to a committee by the Board shall be taken up before the next regular Board meeting whenever possible. The Board may, by majority vote, recall any matter referred to a committee and refer the matter to another committee or take other appropriate action thereon. A Supervisor wishing to so recall an item from Committee must notify the County Administrator by the time set forth in III. A. so the proposed action may be properly included on the Board agenda. Supervisors are strongly encouraged to consider the recommendation of the committee prior to requesting a proposed resolution or item be placed on the agenda as the lack of committee support would be indicative of the proposed resolution's or item's feasibility.

V. Items may be included on the general consent portion of the agenda provided the matter was unanimously adopted by the sponsoring committee and the matter under consideration has no financial or public policy impact and is of a non-controversial nature. No ordinance shall be included in the general consent portion of the agenda. When the general consent portion of the agenda is placed before the Board for consideration, the Chair shall ask if any member of the Board objects to any item being considered by general consent. Any item placed on the general consent portion of the agenda may be placed under the new business portion of the agenda, and considered separately, upon the request of any supervisor, and without a motion and second, provided such request is made prior to a vote on the general consent portion of the agenda by the Board. If there is no objection to any item, the Chair will request a motion to approve the general consent portion of the agenda. All items in the general consent portion of the agenda may be approved by voice vote. Any member may request and

- shall be granted a recorded vote without a motion or second provided such request is made prior to the Chair's request for a motion to approve the consent agenda.
- We It shall be the responsibility of the sponsoring committee or supervisor to have the matter prepared in the form to be acted on and to have a fiscal note attached. All resolutions involving the expenditure or receipt of funds shall carry a fiscal note using a form approved by the Finance Committee which details the resolution's impact upon County finances approved and initialed by the Finance Director, Finance Manager or County Administrator. In addition to the fiscal note, all resolutions shall contain a Management Information Systems (MIS) Note, and shall be reviewed by Corporation Counsel and approved as to form prior to inclusion in the agenda. A resolution lacking a fiscal note, MIS note, or legal review by Corporation Counsel shall not be considered by the Board. The background clause of any resolution or ordinance shall contain information sufficient to provide the purpose and need for the resolution or ordinance.
- X. The Chair may immediately refer any matter not considered and reported to the Board by a committee to the appropriate committee without motion if there is no objection to referral. If objection is made, referral of the matter shall be immediately placed before the Board for vote and shall only be referred upon a majority vote of the members present and voting. Resolutions brought forward by individual supervisors must be presented to all committees having jurisdiction over the proposed matter as detailed above.
- Y. The County Board shall send a special advisory referendum question, pursuant to Wisconsin State statute 59.52(25), to the County Clerk for placement on the next spring or fall ballot only if a supervisor submits the question in writing to the Board not less than one-hundred-twenty (120) days prior to the date of the next election and the question is approved for ballot placement by a two-thirds (2/3rds) vote of the Board.

### **RULE IV Committees**

- A. Matters Pertaining to Standing Committees of the Board:
  - 1. A supervisor shall serve as a committee member until the first Board meeting following the spring County Board Supervisor election.
  - A chair, vice-chair and secretary for each committee shall be selected by each committee's membership. Only Supervisors may hold these positions. Supervisors may only be the Chair of one standing committee. A Supervisor elected to be the chair of a two Committees shall resign as the Chair of one of the Committees.
  - If the position of chair on a committee becomes vacant, the vice-chair becomes chair and an election shall be held to fill the position of vice-chair and any other subsequent vacancies.
  - A supervisor may only be removed from a committee by the County Board Chair with the approval of the County Board by a two-thirds vote of the Board members present.
  - 5. If a supervisor wishes to resign from a committee, permission must be requested from the Board. Permission of the Board can be given through

- unanimous consent or a motion that is debatable and amendable. Once the request is granted, the vacancy is handled as any other vacancy.
- 6. Whenever two or more committees meet jointly, a quorum of each committee participating in the joint meeting is required. A supervisor who serves on two or more of the committees may be counted toward a quorum of more than one of the committees meeting jointly. The joint committees shall vote to select one chair of one of the participating committees to serve as chair of the joint meeting.
- 7. Supervisors are expected to attend the committee meetings of the committees to which they are assigned. When a supervisor cannot attend a meeting, it is the responsibility of the supervisor to request excusal from the chair of the committee.
- 8. A County Board member attending a committee meeting of a committee on which they do not serve, shall be given the opportunity to address said committee at least once, for a period of time which is at least equal to the time allowed for individual speakers at public comment, provided the matter to be addressed is a matter that is on that committee's properly posted agenda. The decision to allow the supervisor to speak more than once is within the discretion of the chair of the committee. The chair's decision may be overruled by a majority vote of the committee.
- 9. Each committee shall, at its first meeting following the organizational meeting of the Board, select those officers required by Rule IV.L., and it shall thereafter be the responsibility of said officers to ensure that accurate, written minutes are made of each meeting of the committee and submitted to the County Clerk for filing. The presiding officer at any meeting shall ensure compliance with the Open Meetings Law.
- 10. Committee agenda format will be established in compliance with open meetings law and by the committee chair and secretary based on that respective committee's precedent.
- B. Special committees, boards, special appointments and commissions shall be selected or appointed by the Chair with the approval of the Board. These committees, boards and commissions shall select their own chair. The Chair shall notify the supervisors of proposed appointments by United States Mail or email no later than the Thursday afternoon prior to the scheduled meeting of the Board at which the appointments will be voted upon. If an appointment is to be considered at a special meeting of the Board, the Chair shall provide notice by United States Mail or email no later than five days prior to the date of the special meeting.

#### STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

## **AGING & DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER COMMITTEE**

Responsible for providing services to the general public with respect to matters related to aging and disability and to improve the life of those with aging and disability related issues. This committee will serve as the official statutory

Commission on Aging pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4) and shall be advised by the Aging, and Disability Advisory Committee. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following departments: Aging and Disability Resource Center. See, Sauk Co. Code Ch. 16. Oversight Committee for the Healthcare Center Board of Trustees.

Members: 11. The Committee shall have 6 County Board Supervisors.

### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE**

Responsible for coordination of County economic development initiatives with County Planners and Sauk County Development Corporation. Involved in strategic Reviews matters which affect growth and resource planning initiatives. development of Sauk County, and economic development of communications network. Responsible for economic development in Sauk County and oversees County coordinated transportation, including overseeing the Tri-County Airport Commission, municipal airports, Pink Lady Rail Transit Commission and Wisconsin River Rail Transit Commission. Responsible for the study, review and recommendation regarding freight, passenger and commuter rail development, intercity and commuter bus services and development, and the provision and coordination of rural and commuter transit services. Transit is governed by Wis. Stat. s. 59.58. Also responsible for oversight regarding arts, humanities, culture and historic preservation projects on behalf of the Board. Serves as the Landmarks Commission in compliance with Sauk Co. Code Ch. 38 and Wis. Stats. §§ 59.56 and 59.69(4m). Members: 7.

#### **EXECUTIVE & LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE**

Responsible for proposing amendments and monitoring the operation of Rules of the Board; responsible for the conduct of all intergovernmental relations and affairs; monitors State legislative and administrative activity affecting Sauk County; proposes legislation or action on pending legislation affecting Sauk County; considers matters not specifically assigned to other committees. Responsible for policy direction and oversight to the following departments: County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, County Clerk, Emergency Management. This committee shall also have oversight of the Veteran Services Office.

Comprised of members from: The Executive & Legislative Committee shall be composed of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board, along with the Chair of the other Standing Committees. The Chair of the Committee shall vote only in the case of a tie. The County Clerk shall serve as secretary to this committee. The County Administrator, Corporation Counsel, and County Clerk shall serve as ex officio members of this committee without voting privileges. Members: 9.

## **FINANCE, PERSONNEL & INSURANCE COMMITTEE**

Responsible for financial policy initiation and review of all County fiscal matters, including reviewing and possibly revising the annual County operating budget, submitted to the Committee by the County Administrator, for presentation to the Board. Reviews County investment and banking policies; manages County general fund and contingency fund; reviews per diem and mileage for all committees, commissions, boards or councils; recommends approval of County audit report; receives all special gifts and grants made in favor of the County. Responsible for policy jurisdiction over all County personnel matters including: recruitment and selection; collective bargaining and contract administration; employee relations; salary administration for all appointed and elected personnel;

classification systems; employee training; fringe benefits; and reviews all new position requests and vacant positions. Oversees the County's safety program and safety training. Provides for all property, liability, and worker's compensation insurance needs for the County. Provides policy direction and oversight to Accounting, County Treasurer, the Personnel Department and Risk/Safety Manager. Members: 9.

### **HEALTH RESOURCES**

Responsible for policy direction and oversight of Health Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. Chs. 250 through 255 relating to public and environmental health matters. See, Sauk Co. Code Ch. 3. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Human Services Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. chs. 46 and 51 and Wis. Stat. § 59.53 to oversee social services and community programs. Members: 9; 5 Supervisors, 1 M.D., 1 R.N., One member that represents the diversity of the county, 1 member who receives, or has a family member that receives, services from the Department of Human Services.

#### LAND RESOURCES & ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy direction for County planning, land use regulations, surveying, remonumentation, mapping and uniform rural building identification system, land records modernization activities. Serves as the County Zoning Agency pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69. Establishes policies relating to planning, acquisition, development and maintenance of County owned park and recreation sites. Responsible for natural resource management, resource conservation and environmental protection including soils, water, forestry and wildlife resources through participation in various federal, state and local programs. Responsible for developing sustainable practices within County operations and serving in an advisory capacity regarding "green technologies." Responsible for the development and implementation of the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Responsible for review and approval of vouchers related to the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Oversees operation of farmland located at the original Sauk County Health Care Center. Serves as the Farmland Preservation Review Committee. Also, jointly responsible with the Area Extension Director for oversight of University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension educational programming in agriculture and natural resources, community and economic development, family living, 4-H and positive youth development, horticulture, and County tourism and promotion activities on behalf of the Board.

Members: 9; 7 Supervisors, 6 of whom shall be Supervisors from districts that have at least a portion of their district in County Zoning, 1 Citizen who meets the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), 1 citizen may be appointed who shall be a public school administrator in the County. If there is no school administrator appointed then a Supervisor shall be appointed to fill that spot on the committee. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2) the designee shall be a person who is engaged in agricultural use, as defined under s. 91.01 (2)(a)1, and shall be a member of the Committee but shall refrain from discussion and voting on any matter where the Committee is acting as the County Zoning Agency. A public school administrator, if one is appointed, shall be a Member of the Committee but shall refrain from voting on matter not related to UW-Extension. Members of this committee shall serve on the lake protection districts. Provides policy direction and oversight to the following departments: Land

Resources and Environment; Parks; County Surveyor; Land Information Officer; Register of Deeds; and Mapping.

### LAW ENFORCEMENT & JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

Responsible for exploration of justice alternatives. Provides policy direction and oversight on behalf of the Board to the following departments: District Attorney, Coroner, Clerk of Courts, Court Commissioner, Register in Probate, Child Support, and Circuit Court Judges, Sheriff, and the Animal Shelter. **Members: 9.** 

#### **PUBLIC WORKS AND INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE**

Responsible for policy direction in design, construction and maintenance of all County roads and expenditure of highway maintenance funds received from the state or County, including planning, development of, and maintenance of all structures required for storage, maintenance and operations relating to the Highway Department. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 83.015(1)(c), this Committee is designated the County Highway Committee and each member is appointed and vacancies filled pursuant to the procedures contained in these Rules. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Highway Department. Responsible for providing policy direction with regard to matters involving County property. Handles all matters relating to the acquisition of real property, construction, building improvements, repair or maintenance not specifically delegated to other committees. Responsible for planning and implementation of space use in County buildings. Oversees the appraisal and sale of tax delinquent County property by the County Treasurer and reviews the disposition of, or the granting of easements on, County real property. Responsible for the physical management requirements associated with the closed Sauk County Landfill. Approves the use of County owned property by non-County groups when such property is not under the direct purview of another committee. Oversees communications infrastructure, including fiber optic cable, towers, and associated equipment. Responsible for the overall information technology requirements for all departments and agencies of Sauk County. Responsible for oversight of the Management Information Systems department. Provides overall planning and long-range forecasting for the information systems needs of Sauk County. Provides oversight to the Building 9. [Drafter's Note: Elimination of the Services Department Members: Communications & Infrastructure Committee and transfer of its functions to the Property Committee was approved on April 29, 2019 but is not effective until April 21, 2020]

#### **RULE V. Miscellaneous Provisions**

- A. The County Administrator shall attend Board meetings.
- B. The Corporation Counsel shall attend Board meetings and serve as parliamentarian and legal advisor to the Board. If the Corporation Counsel is unable to attend a Board meeting, then the County Administrator will serve as parliamentarian.
- C. Amendments/Changes to the Rules of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors during the current term shall be proposed and adopted pursuant to the following procedure:
  - Proposed amendments to these rules shall first be reviewed by the Executive &

- Legislative Committee (E&L). The proposed amendment shall then be introduced to the Board at the subsequent Board meeting.
- 2. The proposed amendment shall be read under the "Reports" section of the agenda. The sponsoring Supervisor may speak to the proposed rule change for up to 5 minutes. The Board shall take no action at this point. Supervisors may relay their comments on the proposed amendment to the sponsoring Supervisor afterwards, ideally via email.
- 3. E&L shall then consider the proposed original or revised amendment at its subsequent meeting and forward a recommendation to adopt or not adopt to the full Board. The full Board will consider the proposed or revised amendment at its next regular meeting, with a 2/3 vote of all members present required for adoption.
- 4. E&L Committee shall begin review the County Board Rules in September of odd years for consideration for presentation at the October County Board Meeting.
- D. The County Administrator, with the assistance of the Finance Director, shall keep the Board informed of the financial condition of the County and shall submit complete quarterly financial statements to the Board.
- E. These rules may be suspended or amended by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 2011 (11th) Edition, shall govern the proceedings of the Board in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules or the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

These funds may be used at the County's discretion for any purpose unless that purpose is considered a prohibited purpose that diminishes the Nation's governmental jurisdiction or has an adverse financial impact on the Nation. The County may not spend any money received under this agreement until the County provides a written report to the Nation each March 1; and the Nation must expressly state that the intended use does not constitute a prohibited purpose, or 30 days must have elapsed since the Nation has received said report and the Nation has not objected.

WHEREAS, the adoption of the 2024 County budget allocated \$57,879 of the \$90,259 Ho-Chunk annual payment;

### DESIGNATING COUNTY DEPOSITORIES; ESTABLISHING INVESTMENT AND RELATED FINANCIAL PROCEDURES

### **Resolution offered by the Finance Committee**

### **BACKGROUND:**

§34.05 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides for the designation of official County depositories and the specification by County Boards of Supervisors of the basis upon which Treasurers shall be authorized to deposit and invest funds. The Sauk County Finance Committee has reviewed these and other financial matters and, in light of past practice and the best interest of Sauk County, does make the following recommendations as outlined in the resolution.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Treasurer shall deposit County funds as provided under the statutes of the State of Wisconsin, County Financial Policy 10-95, and this resolution, emphasizing preservation of principal, liquidity and rate of return; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Sauk County participate in the State of Wisconsin's Local Government Investment Pool pursuant to §25.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes, with the Sauk County Treasurer or authorized deputies hereby designated as the "local official" authorized to invest County monies in this fund and to make withdrawals therefrom as required; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Treasurer shall be authorized to maintain a working or active checking account for the immediate operation of Sauk County in any financial institution that is a member of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and under the State of Wisconsin deposit guarantee program if applicable. The financial institution must be conveniently located for conducting daily business; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to §34.09 of the Wisconsin Statutes, every federal or state credit union, state bank, federal or state savings and loan association, savings and trust company and federal or state savings bank and every national bank may be designated as a public depository and may receive and hold public deposits, subject to the referenced chapter, if the financial institution has a branch or main office located in this state, complies with this chapter with respect to public deposits and accepts payments made by the state under §16.412 of the Wisconsin Statutes; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County Treasurer or authorized deputies shall be responsible for obtaining the appropriate collateralization agreements to guarantee the safety of Sauk County funds in excess of insured or guaranteed limits. This pledge of collateral for deposits must follow the Governmental Accounting Standards Board requirements; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all County officers and all other County personnel receiving or handling County funds shall deposit monies at least weekly with the Sauk County Treasurer or in other appropriate authorized accounts. The list below reflects institutions that currently contain County funds. The Sauk County Treasurer may make changes or additions to these institutions which are approved by the Finance Committee; and,

# REVENUE AND ENFORCEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN SAUK COUNTY AND THE CITY OF BARABOO

2. SCOPE OF AGREEMENT: This agreement is meant to cover the West Square Building parking lot located in the City of Baraboo:				
This agreement is meant only to apply to the enforcement of City ordinances for above referenced parking lot and is not intended to change or alter in any way the ownership, maintenance or upkeep of these parking lot or the surrounding property. The parties hereby agree that all normal maintenance and upkeep procedures and activities by the County shall be unaffected by this agreement and shall remain the responsibility of the County.				
<b>3. COLLECTION:</b> The County hereby authorizes City, to enact and enforce parking ordinances according to officially adopted City ordinances. There shall be appropriate notice by way of signs at these locations notifying the public of these parking restrictions. All signs to be erected by the County. Any citations for violations of the City ordinances shall be the property of the City without any reimbursement to the County.				
<b>4. ENFORCEMENT:</b> The City agrees to enforce the parking restrictions regarding the aforementioned West Square Building parking lot pursuant to the officially adopted City ordinances. The County shall identify those vehicles eligible for parking in the West Square Building by means of a sticker, sign or device affixed to each vehicle. County vehicles eligible to park in the West Square Building parking lot are intended to be used vehicles that are used on a regular basis the County. The spaces are not intended to be used to store vehicles that are non-operable or that are used on a seasonal basis.				
All ordinance violations shall be processed by the City and all actions to prosecute these ordinance violations shall be taken by the City Attorney. The County shall have no responsibility or ability to prosecute violations City parking ordinances. This does not limit in any way their current ability to enforce their own County Ordinances.

BACKGROUND: In 1999 the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) partnered with the American Association of State and Highway Officials (AASHTO) and more recently with the American Traffic Safety Services Association (ATSSA) to create the National Work Zone Safety Awareness Week campaign, held annually in April prior to the construction season for much of the nation. The Wisconsin County Highway Association is asking all seventy-two (72) counties in the state to unite and kick-off "Work Zone Safety Awareness Week" with a resolution and campaign to raise awareness for its workers and those of various highway contractors performing work for the counties. According to data from UW Madison's Traffic Operations and Safety Laboratory's Community Maps between 2019 and 2023, there were 64 fatalities recorded as a result of more than 10,000 crashes within work zones which injured more than 3,800 people. Construction and maintenance activities on our streets and highways periodically require that work zones be established. There has been an average of 2,336 work zone crashes in Wisconsin in each of the last five years. In 2023, Wisconsin suffered from 2,168 crashes in road construction and maintenance zones, resulting in over 712 injuries and 10 fatalities. Through enforcement activities and other participation, the Sauk County Sheriff's Office, Wisconsin State Patrol, and the Sauk County Highway Department will work to make "Work Zone Safety Awareness Week" a success. The Federal Highway Administration has designated April 15th through April 19th, 2024, as National Work Zone Safety Awareness Week, with this year's theme being, "Work Zones are temporary. Actions behind the wheel can last forever", which focuses on awareness to all drivers in work zones of their speed and proximity to workers.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the week of April 15<sup>th</sup> through April 19<sup>th</sup>, 2024 be designated as "Work Zone Safety Awareness Week" in Sauk County.

# GENERAL CODE OF SAUK COUNTY, WISCONSIN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT # 1 - 2024

# Ordinance Amendment to SAUK CO. CODE CHAPTER 15 TO ADD ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE (UTV) CROSSINGS AND ROUTES ON COUNTY HIGHWAYS

### **Ordinance Amendment offered by Highway Committee**

BACKGROUND: The State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has determined that a County Board must approve all ATV/UTV routes individually, and Sauk County has created an Ordinance regulating the uses of All-Terrain Vehicles and Utility-Terrain Vehicles in the County. In order to promote the recreational use of All-Terrain Vehicles and Utility-Terrain Vehicles, Sauk County designated all County Highways as All-Terrain Vehicle and Utility-Terrain Vehicle routes. The Sauk County Highway Committee receives petitions to designate portions of State Highways as All-Terrain Vehicles and Utility-Terrain Vehicles routes. The petitions are reviewed by the Highway Department and notification is sent to the Municipalities that have proposed county highway routes. Sauk Co. Code §15.003 states that if the Highway Committee recommends approval of a route or crossing, an ordinance approving the decision shall be prepared for consideration by the County Board. No route or crossing is approved until action of the County Board. Any route on a State Highway will also need approval by Wisconsin DOT in order to be opened to ATV/UTV traffic.

## NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

That the All-Terrain Vehicle and Utility-Terrain Vehicle routes on State Highways identified on the Appendix to this Ordinance are hereby approved, to be effective upon passage and Approval By Wisconsin DOT






2024 ATV/UTV Routes Requested











### RESOLUTION # 17 - 2024

Resolution to Authorize Participation in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Programs for Snowmobile Trails, ATV/UTV Trails and Off-Highway Motorcycle Events

### Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring and developing lands for public motorized trail and event use and these public motorized trails and events are eligible for grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). 100% of these funds are applied to the costs for the acquisition, development, insurance and maintenance of public trails and events. Funding for the programs comes from registration fees, a portion of tax on gasoline and user fees. Grant applications must be submitted by the local governing body to the DNR.

The development, maintenance, grooming and event planning of the snowmobile, all-terrain vehicles/utility task vehicles (ATV/UTV) and off-highway motorcycle (OHM) trails is managed through contracts with the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. and Driftless Dual Sport Riders, attached as Appendix A, Appendix B and Appendix C, respectively.

There are currently 238.3 miles of funded snowmobile trail in Sauk County, funded at \$300 per mile, with the grant program totaling \$71,490. Currently, there are approximately 0.59 miles of ATV/UTV trail in Sauk County, funded at \$800 per mile for summer use and \$300 per mile for winter use, with the grant program totaling \$649. There are no designated OHM trails in Sauk County, however, the OHM club annually hosts a riding event at an estimated cost of \$1.925.

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department (LRE) is primarily responsible for the financial administration of the grant programs. Other responsibilities include trail inspections, maintaining and updated contract with each club or association, applying for grant funding and verifying that all written and verbal permission from all landowners is obtained. Sauk County's existing liability insurance policy protects Sauk County's interest in providing snowmobile, ATV/UTV and OHM trails and events.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Parks Administrative Services Coordinator and the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Director, under the discretion of the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Committee, be authorized to submit applications on behalf of the above mentioned clubs to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for any financial aid that may be available, submit reimbursement claims along with supporting documentation within proper timeframe of project completion dates, sign and submit documents and take necessary action to undertake, direct and complete the approved projects.

This Contract made this 19<sup>th</sup> day of March 2024, by and between the County of Sauk, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "County", and the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, Inc., a private snowmobile club corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

### WITNESSETH:

**WHEREAS**, the County wishes to ensure that snowmobile trails within Sauk County are developed and maintained in a suitable fashion to ensure that the trails are safe and enjoyable for use by the public; and,

**WHEREAS**, the County considers it necessary for the safety, comfort and enjoyment of the public that the snowmobile trails be groomed;

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Communications: The Contractor shall designate one elected official from the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, as set forth below, to be the point of contact for the County related to this contract. The designated elected association member shall be the only person to contact the County related to this contract and shall be the sole association member that the County is required to communicate with regarding this contract. This contract provision is intended to regulate all routine communications between the Contractor and the County. The Contractor may change their designated representative with a written amendment to this contract. All legal notices to the County shall be sent to the Sauk County Clerk.

- Scope of Land Area Covered by Contract: This contract shall apply to the snowmobile trails
  described and known as the Sauk County Snowmobile Trail System, hereinafter referred to as
  "Trails", estimated at approximately 238.3 miles of state-approved snowmobile trails within the
  County, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit A", attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- 3. Term of Contract: This Contract shall commence on the date noted above and shall be for the 2024-2025 winter snowmobile season, unless sooner terminated pursuant to paragraph twenty-one (21) below.



4. Outdoor Motorized Recreation Trail Aids Application and Grant Award: County shall apply for outdoor motorized recreation trail aids by completion of the Outdoor Motorized Recreation Grant Application of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, hereinafter referred to as "WDNR". Contractor shall submit written requests for funding by March 1 to the County. Requests received after March 1 will not be considered for the snowmobile season pursuant to paragraph three (3) above.

Completion of the appropriate WDNR Form is required under Wisconsin Statutes 23.09(26) and 23.33 and failure to do so will result in denial of financial assistance.

The County shall annually request, by resolution, the authorization of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to participate in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program.

In the event that funding is awarded to the County, the County shall review the grant agreement with the WDNR. If the grant agreement is desirable to the County, the County shall return a copy of the signed agreement to the WDNR.

County shall apply for supplemental funding if desired by Contractor, and on the basis that funding is available through the WDNR.

 Payment: Contractor shall submit work reports and receipts paid by the Contractor onto SNARS (Snowmobile Automated Reported System, provided by the WDNR). The County shall approve entries on SNARS monthly during the time period pursuant to paragraph twelve (12) below.

Payment to the Contractor by the County will be based upon monthly invoices, submitted by the fourth Wednesday of each month, with an itemized of invoices paid by the Contract (the receipts) and one lump sum for work reports, and be based upon time expended. The invoice shall also include copies of each paid invoice (receipt) and the work reports and shall be sent electronically to the County.

Payment shall be made at rates in accordance with the Equipment and Labor Rate provisions adopted by the Snowmobile Recreation Advisory Council for the current snowmobile season, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit B", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

All representatives of County providing labor and/or supplies to the snowmobile program shall prepare work and expense reports. These reports shall be submitted to SNARS on an annual basis.

Contractor shall meet all of the agreements contained herein. County shall withhold payment if Contractor fails to meet the specifications listed in this contract. Once Contractor meets all specifications of the agreements contained herein, County shall submit payment within forty-five (45) days.

County shall request reimbursement for the grant by completion of the Grant Payment Request & Worksheet of the WDNR.



- 6. Equipment, Tools and Labor: Contractor agrees to furnish all tools, equipment, and labor necessary to maintain, groom, and perform all work as specified under the terms of this contract.
- 7. Material: Contractor shall furnish all signs, posts, gates and related material necessary for the development and maintenance of the trail system.
- 8. Signs: Contractor agrees to erect, replace and maintain all signs consistent with standards specified in the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Administrative Code and regulations promulgated by the WDNR.
- 9. Fall Maintenance and Land Use Agreements: Contractor agrees to perform all brushing, dragging, litter removal, and clean-up necessary to prepare the Trail to meet the specifications established by the WDNR in order to qualify the Trail for winter use. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Land Use Certification Form ("Exhibit C"), certifying that all landowners have been contacted verbally, electronically or with a signed contract and have granted permission to use his/her land and/or all necessary private property easements, leases, permits or other appropriate agreements have been secured for snowmobile trail use. County shall maintain copies of all land use agreements, update a listing of all landowners annually, and verify that all land use agreements are secured. County shall notify Contractor of any absent land use agreements, and Contractor shall provide absent land use agreements within one (1) month of notice. County shall annually send land use certification(s) to the WDNR.
- 10. Spring Clean-up and Removal of Signs: At the end of the snowmobile season, and no later than April 15, Contractor shall remove signs as appropriate, clean-up and remove all litter from the subject Trail. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Closure Certification Form ("Exhibit D") certifying fence closures have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or closed, the appropriate signs and/or markers have been removed, and that the trail section has been cleaned-up and closed in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR after the Trail system has been closed for each year. County shall annually send closure certification(s) to the WDNR.
- 11. Grooming: The Contractor shall groom the trails to the trail specifications established by the WDNR.
- 12. Trail Opening and Closing: The Trail system shall be considered open during the time period from December 1 to March 31 of each year. All signs, gates, markers and related items shall be in place and the trail is in a safe operating condition as of December 1. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Opening Certification Form ("Exhibit E") certifying that all fence openings have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or opened, the required signs and/or markers have been installed and the trail section has been developed to acceptable safety standards and in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR, before the Trail system is opened to the public. County shall annually send opening certification(s) to the WDNR.

The Contractor will determine if conditions are, or are not, suitable for snowmobiling and will open and close the trails accordingly. Contractor shall notify County of trail opening and trail closing at least one (1) hour prior to trail opening and trail closing. The County will maintain a



record of trail openings and closures. The Contractor shall suspend all grooming operations during closure except as otherwise specifically authorized by County.

- 13. Safety Procedures Equipment: Contractor shall attach a blinking light on top of the vehicle used during grooming and shall have headlights, taillights, and blinking lights on and working at all times. All grooming equipment and vehicles shall be clearly marked with "Slow Moving Vehicle" signs to safeguard other Trail users.
  - County shall inspect trails randomly during the time period from December 1 to March 31 of each year. County shall inform Contractor of any adverse determination regarding the trails and allow Contractor an opportunity to be heard in that regard and require Contractor to develop the trails to the acceptable safety standards and in accordance with the trail specifications established by the WDNR immediately after notice.
- 14. Independent Contractor Status: The Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the County. Contractor shall placard or otherwise mark its equipment with the Contractor's name on both sides of its equipment.
- 15. Indemnification: Contractor agrees to save, hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County and the State of Wisconsin and all its officers, employees and agents, against any and all liability claims, costs of whatever kind and nature, for injury to or death of any person or persons, and for loss or damage to any property, County, State or other, occurring in connection with or in any way incident to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operation or performance of the work in connection with this Contract.
- 16. Insurance Coverage: The Contractor shall carry liability coverage for its officers, employees, and agents in the amount of \$500,000.00 for each single personal injury, \$500,000.00 for each multiple personal injury, and \$500,000.00 for each property damage. The Contractor shall also carry liability coverage in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 to indemnify the applicable rail authority for damages from the design, construction, maintenance, existence or use of an established rail crossing or a snowmobile rail crossing for which a permit has been issued by the WDNR. The Contractor shall provide the County with acceptable certificates of insurance, from a corporation licensed in the State of Wisconsin to provide insurance, before the Trail system is opened to the public and before January 31 of each year. County shall annually send insurance certification(s) to the WDNR and other appropriate entities.
- 17. Conduct: The Contractor agrees that its agents, employees and representatives shall conduct themselves in a decent, orderly, and business-like manner at all times while performing under this Contract.
- 18. Compliance: Contractor agrees to follow and comply with the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, Wisconsin Administrative Code, the regulations promulgated by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and of Sauk County Code of Ordinances.
- 19. Amendment of Contract: This contract may only be amended, changed, or modified in writing by mutual agreement of the parties.




- 20. Assignment: Contractor shall not assign, subcontract, or otherwise transfer this Contract except with the express written approval of the County.
- 21. Contract Termination: Notwithstanding any provision herein, the County reserves the right to terminate this Contract, for cause, upon seven (7) days written notice to the Contractor if the County determines that the Contractor's operation is unsatisfactory in any respect or if the County determines that the Contractor has failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the terms of this Contract. This contract is also subject to the availability of funding and shall be terminated in the event that funding for the required services is not available. In such event, the County shall notify the Contractor of such termination due to funding constraints.
- 22. Form of Contract: Section 16.76(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes, is incorporated by reference into this contract, as applicable.
- 23. Applicable Law: This Contract shall be construed and governed by the rules and laws of the State of Wisconsin.

### Notes regarding correct rates for grooming equipment:

- A Class A power unit pulling either an 11'6" or 9'6" grooming drag that does not meet the specifications for either 1, 2 or 3 drags will be placed at level 4 for rate purposes.
- A Class A power unit **not** pulling a 7'6" grooming drag will be placed in Class B for rate purposes.
   A Class B power unit **not** pulling a 5'10" grooming drag will be placed in Class C for rate purposes.
- 4. A power unit will not be placed in a higher class if it pulls a larger grooming drag than specified for the class.
- 5. Modifications to the drag must maintain original cutting and packing function as designed. Modifications made outside the main frame will not increase the funding class.
- Those winged drags that were previously funded and met the specifications as stated prior 2022-23 season may continue to be funded at their previous classification (drag dimensions included) for a period of 10 years (through 2031-32)
- 7. Groomer time spent traveling on a route that is an integral part of a single funded trail may be funded at a rate of 50% of the assigned groomer rate, as non-grooming transport time. DNR will determine if route is integral to the funded trail.

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### II NON-GROOMING MAINTENANCE LABOR AND EQUIPMENT RATES A

### **MAINTENANCE LABOR (For other than trail grooming)**

A labor rate of \$9.00 per hour maximum is established for all non-grooming labor performed in WINTER trails, or \$12.00 per hour maximum on any SUMMER ATV/UTV trails under the maintenance agreement by snowmobile clubs and or other similar organizations with the sponsoring county. Maintenance will generally include mowing and brushing, sign and post replacement, plowing of parking lots and roads, shelter and toilet maintenance and normal repair and replacement of structures and facilities.

The allowable labor rate for county employees and others included in labor contracts will be as specified by contract.

### B EQUIPMENT RATES (For other than trail grooming)

The following schedule is based on frequently used pieces of equipment for non-grooming maintenance. The Department of Transportation rates are considered when these rates are reviewed each year.

Equipment rates for pieces of equipment not found on this list will be found in the DOT rates. Unless specified otherwise, these rates for equipment are based on hourly use. These rates do **not** include the operator. Where the Department of Transportation issues rates that reflect an adjustment due to fuel rates, these rates shall be the rates utilized for the season.



### SAUK COUNTY ATV/UTV TRAIL DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE CONTRACT

This Contract made this 19<sup>th</sup> day of March 2024, by and between the County of Sauk, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "County", and the Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc., a private ATV/UTV club corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County wishes to ensure that ATV/UTV trails within Sauk County are developed and maintained in a suitable fashion to ensure that the trails are safe and enjoyable for use by the public; and,

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Communications. The Contractor shall designate one elected official from Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc., as set forth below, to be the point of contact for the County related to this contract. The designated elected club member shall be the only person to contact the County related to this contract and shall be the sole club member that the County is required to communicate with regarding this contract. This contract provision is intended to regulate all routine communications between the Contractor and the County. The Contractor may change their designated representative with a written amendment to this contract. All legal notices to the County shall be sent to the Sauk County Clerk.

- 2. Scope of Land Area Covered by Contract. This contract shall apply to the ATV/UTV trails described and known as the Sauk County ATV/UTV Trail System, hereinafter referred to as "Trails", estimated at approximately 0.59 miles of ATV/UTV trails within the County, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit A", attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- 3. Term of Contract. This Contract shall commence on the date noted above and shall be for the 2024-2025 ATV/UTV season, July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the "Contract Termination" provisions in this agreement.
- 4. Outdoor Motorized Recreation Trail Aids Application and Grant Award. The County shall apply for outdoor motorized recreation trail aids by completion of the Outdoor Motorized Recreation Grant Application provided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, hereinafter referred to as "WDNR". Contractor shall submit written requests for funding by March 1 to the County. Requests received after March 1 will not be considered for the ATV/UTV season pursuant to the terms identified in this agreement.

Completion of WDNR forms is required under Wisconsin Statutes 23.09(26) and 23.33 and failure to complete said forms will result in denial of finanqial assistance.



The County shall annually request, by resolution, the authorization of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to participate in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program.

In the event that funding is awarded to the County, the County shall review the grant agreement with the WDNR. If the grant agreement is desirable to the County, the County shall return a copy of the signed agreement to the WDNR.

County shall apply for supplemental funding if desired by Contractor if funding is available through the WDNR.

5. Payment. Payment to the Contractor by the County will be based upon submittal of monthly invoices, provided to the Department by the fourth Wednesday of each month. The invoice shall include an itemized listing of invoices paid by the Contractor (the receipts) and one lump sum for work reports, based upon time expended. The invoice shall also include copies of each paid invoice (receipt) and work reports. Invoices (receipts) and work reports shall be sent electronically to the Land Resources and Environment Department – Parks and Recreation Area.

Payment shall be made at rates in accordance with the Equipment and Labor Rate provisions adopted by the Off Road Vehicle Advisory Council for the current ATV/UTV season, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit B", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

All representatives of the County providing labor and/or supplies to the ATV/UTV program shall prepare work and expense reports.

The Contractor shall meet all of the requirements contained within this contract. County shall withhold payment if the Contractor fails to meet the specifications listed in this contract. Once the Contractor meets all specifications and requirements of this agreement, the County shall submit payment within forty-five (45) days.

The County shall request reimbursement for the grant by completing and submitting the Grant Payment Request & Worksheet provided by the WDNR.

- 6. Equipment, Tools and Labor. Contractor agrees to furnish all tools, equipment, and labor necessary to maintain and perform all work as specified under the terms of this contract.
- 7. Material. Contractor shall furnish all signs, posts, gates and related materials necessary for the development and maintenance of the trail system.
- 8. Signs. Contractor agrees to erect, replace and maintain all signs consistent with standards specified in the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Administrative Code and regulations promulgated by the WDNR.
- 9. Maintenance and Land Use Agreements. Contractor agrees to perform all brushing, dragging, litter removal, and clean-up necessary to prepare the Trail to meet the specifications established by the WDNR in order to qualify the Trail for use. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with a Trail System Land Use Certification Form ("Exhibit C"), certifying that all landowners have been contacted verbally, electronically or with a signed contract and have granted permission to use their land and/or all necessary private property easements, leases, permits or other appropriate agreements have been secured for ATV/UTV trail use. The County shall maintain copies of all land use agreements, update a listing of all landowners annually, and verify that all land use agreements are secured. County shall notify Contractor



of any absent land use agreements, and the Contractor shall provide absent land use agreements within one (1) month of notice. The County shall annually send land use certification(s) to the WDNR.

10. Trail Opening and Closing. The Trail system shall be considered open year-round. All signs, gates, markers and related items shall be in place and the trail shall be maintained in a safe operating condition at all times. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with a Trail System Opening Certification Form ("Exhibit D") certifying that all fence openings have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or opened, the required signs and/or markers have been installed and the trail section has been developed to acceptable safety standards and in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR, before the Trail system is opened to the public. County shall annually send opening certification(s) to the WDNR.

The Contractor will determine if conditions are, or are not, suitable for ATV/UTV use and will open and close the trails accordingly. Contractor shall notify County of trail opening and trail closing at least one (1) hour prior to trail opening and trail closing. The County will maintain a record of trail openings and closures.

11. Safety Procedures – Equipment. Contractor shall attach a blinking light on top of the vehicle used while developing and/or maintaining trails and shall have headlights, taillights, and blinking lights on and working at all times. All equipment and vehicles shall be clearly marked with "Slow Moving Vehicle" signs to safeguard other Trail users.

The County shall randomly inspect trails annually. The County shall inform Contractor of any adverse determination regarding the trails and allow the Contractor an opportunity to correct any deficiencies or develop the trails to the acceptable safety standards, in accordance with the trail specifications established by the WDNR immediately after notice.

- 12. Independent Contractor Status. The Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the County. The Contractor shall placard or otherwise mark its equipment with the Contractor's name on both sides of its equipment.
- 13. Indemnification. The Contractor agrees to save, hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County and the State of Wisconsin and all its officers, employees and agents, against any and all liability claims, costs of whatever kind and nature, for injury to or death of any person or persons, and for loss or damage to any property, County, State or other, occurring in connection with or in any way incident to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operation or performance of the work in connection with this Contract.
- 14. Insurance Coverage. The Contractor, at their expense, shall maintain public liability insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in the State of Wisconsin, including bodily injury and property damage coverage insuring the Contractor and County with minimum coverage as follows: liability coverage for its officers, employees, and agents with policy limits at minimum of \$1,000,000 single limit and \$3,000,000 aggregate and workers compensation insurance in the following amounts:
  - a. Coverage A: Limits Statutory
  - b. Coverage B: Employer's Liability Limits
  - c. Bodily Injury by Accident \$100,000 each accident minimum
  - d. Bodily Injury by Disease \$100,000 each employee minimum
  - e. Bodily Injury by Disease \$500,000 policy limit minimum



The County shall be named as an additional insured on all insurance policies except workers compensation. The certificate shall provide for a ten-day written notice to the County in the event of cancellation or material change of coverage. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with acceptable certificates of insurance, from a corporation licensed in the State of Wisconsin to provide insurance. County shall annually send insurance certification(s) to the WDNR and other appropriate entities.

- **15. Conduct.** The Contractor agrees that its agents, employees and representatives shall conduct themselves in a decent, orderly, and business-like manner at all times while performing under this Contract.
- **16. Compliance.** Contractor agrees to follow and comply with the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, Wisconsin Administrative Çode, the regulations promulgated by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and of Sauk County Code of Ordinances.
- 17. Amendment of Contract. This contract may only be amended, changed, or modified in writing by mutual agreement of the parties.
- 18. Assignment. Contractor shall not assign, subcontract, or otherwise transfer this Contract except with the express written approval of the County.
- 19. Contract Termination. Notwithstanding any provision herein, the County reserves the right to terminate this Contract, for cause, upon seven (7) days written notice to the Contractor if the County determines that the Contractor's operation is unsatisfactory in any respect or if the County determines that the Contractor has failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the terms of this Contract. This contract is also subject to the availability of funding and shall be terminated in the event that funding for the required services is not available. In such event, the County shall notify the Contractor of such termination due to funding constraints.
- 20. Form of Contract. Section 16.76(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes, is incorporated by reference into this contract, as applicable.
- 21. Applicable Law. This Contract shall be construed and governed by the rules and laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- 22. Notices. Any notice required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing, shall reference this Agreement and will be deemed given: (i) upon personal delivery to the appropriate address; or (ii) three (3) business days after the date of mailing if sent by certified or registered mail; or (iii) one (1) business day after the date of deposit with a commercial courier service offering next business day service with confirmation of delivery.

Nothing in this paragraph is intended to disrupt routine communications between the parties.

- 23. No Construction Against Either Party. This agreement is the product of negotiations between the parties and was either reached with the advice of legal counsel or the opportunity to obtain legal counsel and shall not be construed against either party.
- 24. Multiple Originals. This contract may be executed in multiple originals, each of which together shall constitute a single agreement.
- 25. Captions. The parties agree that in this contract, captions are used for convenience only and shall not be used in interpreting or construing this contract.
- 26. Statutory Protections. It is agreed by the parties that nothing in this contract, including but not limited to indemnification and hold harmless clauses, shall in any way constitute a waiver on the part of the Employer of any immunity, liability limitation or other protection available to the Employer under any applicable statute or other law. To the extent that any provision of this contract is found by any court of competent jurisdiction to conflict with any such legal protection, then whichever protections, either statutory or contractual, provide a greater benefit to the Employer shall apply unless the Employer elects otherwise.
- 27. Open Records Law Compliance. Contractor understands and agrees that, because Employer is a party to this contract, provisions of the Wisconsin Open Records Law and other laws relating to public records may apply to records kept by Contractor and/or the Employer. Contractor agrees to fully comply with such laws, and to cooperate with Employer in its compliance with such laws. Cooperation shall include, but not be limited to, the provision of records, or copies of records to Employer or others upon the request of Employer. Compliance and cooperation of Contractor shall be at its sole cost and expense.
- 28. Relationship of Parties. Nothing in, or done pursuant to, this contract shall be construed to create the relationship of employer and employee, principal and agent, partners, or a joint venture between Employer and Contractor. This contract does not create an employee/employer relationship between the parties. It is the parties' intention that the Contractor will be an independent contractor and not the County's employee for all purposes, including, but not limited to, the application of the Fair Labor Standards Act minimum wage and overtime payments, Federal Insurance Contribution Act, the Social Security Act, the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, the state revenue and taxation law, the state workers' compensation law and the state unemployment insurance law. This contract shall not be construed as creating any joint employment relationship between the Contractor and the Employer, and the Employer will not be liable for any obligation incurred by Contractor including but not limited to unpaid minimum wages, overtime premiums, unemployment insurance benefits, worker's compensation benefits, health insurance, health benefits, disability benefits, or retirement benefits. Contractor is not entitled to receive any benefits from Employer or to participate in any Employer benefit plan.



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### II NON-GROOMING MAINTENANCE LABOR AND EQUIPMENT RATES A

### **MAINTENANCE LABOR (For other than trail grooming)**

A labor rate of \$9.00 per hour maximum is established for all non-grooming labor performed in WINTER trails, or \$12.00 per hour maximum on any SUMMER ATV/UTV trails under the maintenance agreement by snowmobile clubs and or other similar organizations with the sponsoring county. Maintenance will generally include mowing and brushing, sign and post replacement, plowing of parking lots and roads, shelter and toilet maintenance and normal repair and replacement of structures and facilities.

The allowable labor rate for county employees and others included in labor contracts will be as specified by contract.

### **B** EQUIPMENT RATES (For other than trail grooming)

The following schedule is based on frequently used pieces of equipment for non-grooming maintenance. The Department of Transportation rates are considered when these rates are reviewed each year.

Equipment rates for pieces of equipment not found on this list will be found in the DOT rates. Unless specified otherwise, these rates for equipment are based on hourly use. These rates do **not** include the operator. Where the Department of Transportation issues rates that reflect an adjustment due to fuel rates, these rates shall be the rates utilized for the season.



# SAUK COUNTY OFF-HIGHWAY MOTORCYCLE TRAIL DEVELOPMENT, MAINTENANCE AND EVENT CONTRACT

Contract by and between Sauk County ("County") and Driftless Dual Sport Riders ("Contractor") as follows:

WHEREAS, Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring or developing lands for public motorized trail use. In doing so, these public motorized trails are eligible for grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned grant program funds 100% of the cost for the acquisition, development, insurance, and maintenance of public trails. Funding for the program comes from registration fees and a portion of tax on gasoline; and

WHEREAS, The Driftless Dual Sports Riders contacted the County, requesting assistance with a grant application for a one-two day special event to be held at the Sauk Prairie State Recreation Area; and

WHEREAS, Under the concept of re-purposing as described in the Master Plan, County is facilitating the grant on behalf of the local OHM club by requesting funds to cover the cost of a one-two day special event for Off-Highway Motorcycle riders in 2024 ("Event"); and

WHEREAS, under the Master Plan guidelines the club requests to re-purpose up to 50% of the established biking, equestrian and public roads within the Sauk Prairie State Recreation Area for the Event; and

WHEREAS, the County has been awarded a grant from the Wisconsin DNR to facilitate the Event, which would be used to reimburse the OHM club for actual expenses incurred such as insurance and signage, and also covers County staff time.

NOW, THEREFORE, based on the good and valuable consideration stated herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

### Duties of Contractor. Contractor shall be responsible for the following:

- a. Notify the County Land Resources and Environment Department of the dates the event is scheduled.
- b. The Event shall be held no later than November 30, 2024.
- c. Notify the County upon completion of the work, meet with the County representative on-site to review the trails. If the clean-up is found to be deficient, or if the trails need repair due to the event, Contractor shall clean up and make repairs as noted in the written notice provided by the County.
- d. The Contractor will be responsible for site safety during all phases of the Event. Contractor shall ensure that all trails to be used for the Event are signed with appropriate warning signs and blocked off to prevent public access.
- e. All Federal, State, County, and local laws, permits, and regulations are to be adhered to by the contractor. No deviations from the specifications allowed unless the County agrees. The County is not aware of any permits specific to this project.
- f. Once the Event is completed and all clean-up and/or repair work is approved by the County, all leftover materials, waste, tools and equipment must be removed from the Event site, trail and area.



- 2. Duties of the County. The County shall be responsible for the following:
  - a. Manage the grant funds and reporting to the State of Wisconsin DNR.
  - b. Make reimbursement for expenses to the Contractor within 45 days of reimbursement requests.
- 3. Communications. The Contractor shall designate one elected official from Driftless Dual Sport Riders, as set forth below, to be the point of contact for the County related to this contract. The designated elected club member shall be the only person to contact the County related to this contract and shall be the sole club member that the County is required to communicate with regarding this contract. This contract provision is intended to regulate all routine communications between the Contractor and the County. The Contractor may change their designated representative with a written amendment to this contract. All legal notices to the County shall be sent to the Sauk County Clerk.

Nothing contained in this section shall be construed to restrict the transmission of routine communications between representatives of the parties.

- **5. Insurance.** During the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall maintain the types and amounts of insurance in the attached insurance certificate (Exhibit 1).
  - a. Certificates of insurance are required for all policies. The Certificates of General and Automobile Liability Insurance must name the County as an additional insured on the policy and must require that a thirty (30) day cancellation notice be given to the County. An updated copy of the Certificate must be provided anytime a change is made to any policy.



- 6. Delay in Performance. Neither party shall be considered in default of this Agreement or any Task Order for delays in performance caused by circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the nonperforming party. For purposes of this Agreement, such circumstances include, but are not limited to, abnormal weather conditions, floods, earthquakes, fire, epidemics, war, riots, and other civil disturbances, strikes, lockouts, work slowdowns, and other labor disturbances, sabotage, judicial restraint, and delay in or inability to procure permits, licenses or authorizations from any local, state or federal agency for any of the supplies, materials, accesses, or services required to be provided by either party under this Agreement or any Task Order. The nonperforming party shall be granted a reasonable extension of time for any delay in its performance caused by any such circumstances.
- 7. Governing Law, Jurisdiction and Venue. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin. The parties hereby irrevocably submit to the jurisdiction of the state courts of the State of Wisconsin for the purpose of any suit, action or other proceeding arising out of or based upon this Agreement. The parties further agree that the venue for any legal proceedings related to this Agreement shall be Sauk County, Wisconsin.
- 8. Survival. The warrantees, representations and covenants of this Agreement shall survive completion of the Services under this Agreement or any termination of this Agreement.
- 9. Waiver. A waiver by either of the parties of any breach of this Agreement shall be in writing. Such a waiver shall not affect the waiving party's rights with respect to any other or further breach.
- 10. Severability. The invalidity, illegality or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement or the occurrence of any event rendering any portion or provision of this Agreement void shall in no way affect the validity or enforceability of any other portion or provision of this Agreement or any Task Order. Any void provision shall be deemed severed from this Agreement and the balance of this Agreement shall be construed and enforced as if it did not contain the particular portion or provision held to be void. The parties further agree to amend this Agreement to replace any stricken provision with a valid provision that comes as close as possible to the intent of the stricken provision. The provisions of this Article shall not prevent this entire Agreement from being void should a provision which is of the essence of this Agreement be determined void.
- 11. Integration. This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the parties. It supersedes all prior and contemporaneous communications, representations and agreements, whether oral or written, relating to the subject matter of this Agreement.
- **12. Assignment.** Neither party shall assign any rights or duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party.
- 13. Successors and Assigns. The parties each bind themselves and their successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and, in the case of a partnership, the partners, to the other party to this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and partners of such other party in respect to all provisions of this Agreement.
- 14. No Construction Against Either Party. This Agreement is the product of negotiations between the parties and was either reached with the advice of legal counsel or the opportunity to obtain legal counsel, and shall not be construed against either party.



- **15. Multiple Originals.** This contract may be executed in multiple originals, each of which, together shall constitute a single agreement.
- **16. Captions.** The parties agree, that in this contract, captions are used for convenience only and shall not be used in interpreting or construing this contract.
- 17. No Partnership or Joint Venture. This contract shall not in any way be deemed to create a partnership or joint venture between the parties to the Agreement.
- 18. Statutory Protections. It is agreed by the parties that nothing in this contract, including but not limited to indemnification and hold harmless clauses, shall in any way constitute a waiver on the part of the County of any immunity, liability limitation or other protection available to the County under any applicable statute or other law. To the extent that any provision of this contract is found by any court of competent jurisdiction to conflict with any such legal protection, then whichever protections, either statutory or contractual, provide a greater benefit to the County shall apply unless the County elects otherwise.
- 19. Open Records Law Compliance. Contractor understands and agrees that, because County is a party to this contract, provisions of the Wisconsin Open Records Law and other laws relating to public records may apply to records kept by Contractor. Contractor agrees to fully comply with such laws, and to cooperate with County in its compliance with such laws. Cooperation shall include, but not be limited to, the provision of records, or copies of records to County or others upon the request of county. Compliance and cooperation of Contractor shall be at its sole cost and expense.
- 20. Amendment. No amendment of this contract shall be binding unless in writing and signed by all of the parties.
- **21. Standard of Care.** The same degree of care, skill, and diligence shall be exercised by Contractor in the performance of its duties as is ordinarily possessed and exercised by a member of the same profession, currently practicing, under similar circumstances.
- 22. Equal Employment Opportunity. Contractor hereby affirms its support of affirmative action and that it abides by the provisions of the "Equal Opportunity Clause" of Section 202 of Executive Order 11216 and other applicable laws and regulations. Contractor affirms its policy to recruit and hire employees without regard to race, age, color, religion, sex, sexual preference/orientation, marital status, citizen status, national origin or ancestry, presence of a disability or status as a veteran, including a veteran of the Vietnam era, membership in the national guard or reserve components of the military of the United States, political affiliation, or any other legally protected status. It is Contractor's policy to treat employees equally with respect to compensation, advancement, promotions, transfers and all other terms and conditions of employment. Contractor further affirms completion of applicable governmental employer information reports including the EEO-1 and VETS-100 reports, and maintenance of a current Affirmative Action Plan as required by Federal regulations.
- 23. Gratuities Kickbacks non-collusion. It shall be a breach of this contract and subsequent amendments for contractor to offer, give, or agree to give anything of pecuniary value or to make an offer for employment to any elected official, employee, or former employee in connection with this Agreement. Prohibited conduct shall include, but is not limited by enumeration, acts or attempts to influence: any decision, approval, disapproval, recommendation, preparation of any part of a program requirement or a purchase request, the contents of any



specification or procurement standard, rendering of advice, investigation, auditing, or in any other advisory capacity in any proceedings or application, request for ruling, determination, claim or controversy, or other particular matter pertaining to any program requirement or contract, subcontract, or any solicitation or proposal therefore.

**24. Time of the Essence.** Except as otherwise specifically stated herein, time is of the essence with respect to all provisions of this contract that specify a time for performance.

Resolution to donate the fire hose and wagon from the historic 1921 firehouse at the Sauk County Farm to the Reedsburg Area Historical Society and Pioneer Village.

### Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department created the 2022-2042 Sauk County Farm Property Master Plan to ensure the continued management of the site's agricultural and natural resources, preservation of its historic features, and the transformation of the space into an educational resource for the communities of Sauk County. Over the next 20 years, the County Farm is envisioned to become an important educational resource for Sauk County residents of all ages and backgrounds to learn about regenerative, profitable, and resilient agricultural practices through on-site demonstration, research, and collaborative partnerships. The master plan is centered on the following goals: to create educational opportunities for Sauk County's current and future farmers through community partnerships; utilize the space for agricultural demonstration and research; and pay homage to the history and people of the property. The County Farm will become a space where educational institutions, non-profit organizations, public agencies, and any interested person in Sauk County can converge to learn about farming and train the leaders who will carry forward our community's agricultural legacy.

Resolution No. 150-2019 adopting the 2020-2024 Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan was approved by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors on January 21, 2020. Objectives of the plan include donation of the original horse-drawn fire hose and wagon to a local museum or historical society for greater educational use, and the restoration and reuse of the fire house into a storage shed for the community gardens.

The Reedsburg Historical Society and Pioneer Village has an expressed interest and ability to display the original horse-drawn wagon and hose which are currently stored in the historic 1921 fire house at the Sauk County Farm. The wagon and hose would be put on display in the Sanders Building located within the Pioneer Village. They already have on display the Sauk County Farm one-room schoolhouse that was originally located near the farm from 1858-1962.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, does hereby donate the original fire hose and wagon from the historic 1921 firehouse at the Sauk County Farm to the Reedsburg Area Historical Society and Pioneer Village.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Background: Sauk County is currently enrolled in a Microsoft Enterprise Agreement (EA) and has been since 2009. An Enterprise Agreement is a three-year license agreement that provides special pricing and licensing terms for products enrolled in the agreement. Sauk County's current three-year agreement is set to renew on April 1, 2024. Under this agreement, Sauk County may purchase additional licenses, at the contracted rate, at any time during the term of the contract and is required to do so in order to maintain the correct number of licenses in compliance with the terms of the agreement. The term of this agreement is through March 31, 2027.

This renewal will upgrade the current licensing from Office365 to Microsoft365, an enterprise version of the current license model, providing improved security features and enhanced management of end-user devices with multi-factor authentication and mobile device management.

Under this agreement, Sauk County will license 595 MS Office users and 187 email-only users.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the existing Microsoft Enterprise Agreement be renewed for a three-year term beginning April 1, 2024, at an annual cost of \$255,138 and;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Sauk County MIS Director be authorized to obtain additional licenses under this agreement, up to the number required to maintain compliance with said agreement, on behalf of Sauk County, and;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County MIS Director be delegated the authority to sign any contracts related to this renewal on behalf of Sauk County.

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# Public Participation Plan Sauk County Multijurisdictional 2024 Hazards Mitigation Plan Update

Working in concert with local jurisdictions, Sauk County has initiated a project to update its countywide hazards mitigation plan to comply with the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. The items listed below are the ways in which the county will facilitate public participation and local government involvement in the preparation, review, and adoption of the plan update.

- Formation of a Steering Committee. An advisory steering committee will be established to guide the project and provide oversight and input. Members, selected by Sauk County Emergency Management, will include county officials and staff, local government officials, emergency services, community members and representatives who wish to participate.
- Public Notices for Steering Committee Meetings. All steering committee meetings will be formally noticed and open to the public consistent with the state's open meeting law.
- Local Government Involvement. Each of the local governments in Sauk County will be contacted early
  in the process and informed about the project and asked to enter into a memorandum of understanding
  (MOU) with the county. Although the MOU would be non-binding, it would establish a framework for
  intergovernmental cooperation and coordination in terms of information sharing and give the jurisdiction
  the opportunity to also adopt the plan making it eligible for federal mitigation funding.
- Local Jurisdiction Survey. A listing of critical facilities in the jurisdiction and a draft version of the
  assessment matrix used in the plan will be sent to each of the local jurisdictions in the county. Local
  officials will have an opportunity to review and comment on the materials prepared up to that date.
- **Fire Chiefs Survey**. A survey will be sent to each of the fire chiefs in the county to collect information on wildland fire in their jurisdiction.
- Website. Information about the project will be posted on the county's website, along with draft documents, maps, meeting notices and agendas, and project-related news.
- Material Availability. As various drafts are completed, copies will be sent to each of the local
  jurisdictions in Sauk County and other interested parties for review and comment. Drafts will also be
  posted on the county's website.
- Plan Adoption. The County Board will review the plan at one of its meetings and take final action on the
  resolution adopting the plan. Each of the participating cities and villages who want to adopt the plan may
  also adopt resolutions of adoption as well.
- Press Releases. Press releases will be issued to the local media on an as-needed basis.
- Other Means. The county may provide other avenues for public participation and local government involvement during the course of the project.

# Resolution Authorizing the Acquisition of a Learning Management System from TalentLMS

**BACKGROUND:** Sauk County currently employs roughly 700 employees, plus contractors and elected officials. Providing comprehensive, consistent, and compliant training for this staff is a continuing challenge. A Learning Management System (LMS) provides a software platform that can deliver training courses to staff electronically. This ensures all staff receive the required training in a timely manner while providing the necessary management and regulatory compliance records. Additionally, this will help support the County in a new initiative to increase employee recruitment and retention (a top priority of the County Board based on 2023 survey results).

During the latter half of 2023, Sauk County reviewed numerous LMS options. The field of options was reduced to three specific vendors and, following demonstrations of each, it was determined that the system from TalentLMS best met the specific requirements of Sauk County.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, that the acquisition of licensing for TalentLMS at an annual cost of \$14,970 be hereby approved; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County MIS Director is delegated the authority to enter into any agreements related to the purchase of said system on behalf of Sauk County.

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## RESOLUTION # 22-2024

Resolution to Authorize the Director of Land Resources and Environment to Accept Multi-Discharge Variance Funding; and Amending the 2024 Budget

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee and Finance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

**BACKGROUND:** The Multi-Discharge Variance (MDV) program for phosphorus extends the timeline for Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (WPDES) permitted facilities complying with low-level phosphorus limits. In exchange, facilities commit to step reductions of phosphorus within their effluent and provide funding to address nonpoint sources of phosphorus from farm fields or other natural areas through the implementation of practices designed to improve water quality. Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department can assist in the implementation of these practices.

In December 2023, the department submitted the paperwork necessary to participate in the MDV program and accept funding per Sauk County Resolution No. 94-2023. Actual funding amounts did not become available until January 1, 2024. The original MDV funding amount was anticipated to be \$22,951; however, finalized funding amounts are now \$144,642.17.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to authorize the Director of Land Resources and Environment to accept multi-discharge variance funding and to:

- Submit watershed plans, annual reports, and other documentation required by the MDV Program to the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources; and
- Enter into cost-sharing agreement with landowners/operators to install best management practices utilizing MDV funding.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the 2024 Budget be amended to increase the Multi-Discharge Variance expenditure funded by municipal wastewater treatment facilities.

## RESOLUTION # 26-2024

Resolution to Authorize Sauk County Sheriff's Office to Enter into a Contract Agreement with Southern Health Partners to Oversee and Provide Licensed Healthcare Services for Jail Inmates

## Resolution offered by the Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Sheriff's Office is charged with the responsibility for administering, managing, and supervising the health care delivery system of the Sauk County Jail under Department of Corrections Code 350.09. The Sheriff's Office solicited bids from medical healthcare providers to provide on-site health care personnel, direct medical services for inmates, and coordination of off-site medical care, hospitalization, dental and other services that may be needed. The Sheriff's Office received two (2) competitive sealed bids for medical services in the Jail based on an average daily population of 129, and the public opening of bids took place on January 25, 2024, at the Sauk County Law Enforcement Center, and the lowest responsible bidder is Southern Health Partners. It is in the best interest of Sauk County to enter into a contract for a stipulated sum of \$522,120 for year one (1) with an annual increase of 4% or Medical CPI (Consumer Price Index), whichever is higher, with Southern Health Partners for the medical services in the Sauk County Jail. Southern Health Partners will be able to provide physicians and registered nurse in the Jail and will:

- Provide 24 hours/day, 7 days/week, 365 days/year consultation with Sauk County Jail Staff when healthcare staff is not present at the facility;
- Provide 112 hours a week of registered nurse services in the Jail to provide medical care to include direct medical services for inmates, coordination of off-site medical care, hospitalization, dental, and other services that may be needed, and oversight of all inmate medications within the Jail;
- Provide expertise in health care provision for the specialized inmate population;
- Provide insurance coverage to defend medical practice in any potential civil litigation against the County of Sauk and/or the Sauk County Sheriff's Office.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the lowest responsible bidder of Southern Health Partners in the amount of \$522,120 is hereby accepted by Sauk County for medical services in the jail and the Sauk County Sheriff is authorized to sign a contract for year one (1) with an annual increase of 4% or Medical CPI, whichever is higher, on behalf of Sauk County.
