Good afternoon, the purpose of this email is to request a matter be put on the agenda of the Sauk County Board's next meeting, which I believe will be Feb. 16th. I've talked with Joan Fordham, who serves on the SFCA Board of Directors, about this, and she suggested that I contact you.

The SFCA Board currently has one vacancy on it, and that is for a Member-at-Large. We have four candidates for that position, and they will be interviewing with the SFCA Board's Personnel Committee on Feb. 11th. The Committee then will make a recommendation to the full SFCA Board. Before the person recommended to fill the vacancy can actually take a position on the SFCA Board, their appointment first has to be ratified by the county in which they reside. One of the four candidates we have is a Sauk County resident. [The other three are from other counties in this area.] While we won't know until Feb. 11th whether the applicant from Sauk County will be the one recommended to fill the vacancy on our Board, we would like to ask if the agenda of the Sauk County Board's Feb. 16th meeting could include something along the lines of "Ratification of an Appointment of a Sauk County Resident to the Southwest Family Care Alliance Board as a Member-at-Large, Contingent on Approval by the Southwest Family Care Alliance Board". I then could let you know no later than first thing on Monday, Feb. 14th whether the Sauk County resident was or was not recommended by the Personnel Committee at their Feb. 11th meeting.

Because the full SFCA Board doesn't meet until Feb. 21, if we don't take it to the Sauk County Board until after that, it would be the end of March before that individual could assume a role on the SFCA Board.

Please let me know if this is acceptable or if you have any questions or need other information. Please note that I will not be in the office tomorrow, Fri., Feb. 4th. Should you need to contact us on this matter tomorrow, please contact Teri Buros, SFCA's Chief Executive Officer.

CREATING A SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO STUDY TMG RECOMMENDATIONS FOR STRUCTURAL CHANGE IN COUNTY GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND GOVERNANCE

WHEREAS, Sauk County has always strived to be a cost effective and efficient provider of services to the taxpayers of Sauk County, and such an approach is all the more necessary in times of scarce fiscal resources; and,

WHEREAS, it is worthy of study to consider both departmental structure and governance structure in order to provide the best service possible to the public while being wise guardians of the public purse; and,

WHEREAS, the County contracted with TMG, The Management Group, to study the departmental, programmatic and governance models used by Sauk County for inter-relationships of departments providing health services.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that there is hereby created a Special Committee to study TMG recommendations and that is specifically designated to further explore, and recommend an appropriate governance structure, and departmental organizational structure for human services and health related programming; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this committee shall make a report to the County Board no later than October 18, 2011; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this committee is created pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.13, and the supervisor members are authorized per diem and mileage pursuant to Rules of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this special committee shall be comprised of the County Board Chair and six board members appointed by the County Board Chairperson that shall include: one supervisor from the Personnel Committee; one supervisor from the Aging and Disability Resource Committee; one supervisor from the Public Health Board; one supervisor from the Health Care Center Board of Trustees, one supervisor from the Human Services Board, one supervisor from the Finance Committee, the Administrative Coordinator, the Personnel Director and the Corporation Counsel.

Background

Sauk County contracted with The Management Group (TMG) in 2010 to conduct a high level analysis of the Human Services Department. The study included analyzing the interaction between the departments that comprise the Support Services Functional Group and the inter-relatedness of the functional areas. The TMG group recommended various scenarios that could be implemented that change the departmental and governance structure of functions related to health and human services. (Sauk County Human Services Department Organizational Analysis Final Report, October 19, 2010, p. 19)

In order to provide a forum for exploring a potential opportunity for restructuring, the Executive and Legislative Committee are recommending that the Board designate an Ad Hoc Committee tasked with examining this issue in its entirety as a viable process that is inclusive, exhaustive and collaborative.

Mission: To determine which functions, if any, in the human services and health related departments should be reorganized; and what organizational structure and oversight would best serve the citizens of Sauk County.

Goals:

- 1. More efficient use of staff.
- 2. Better public relations and customer service particularly in overlapping programs such as the working lands initiative.
- 3. Better ability to process long term planning and incorporate state programs and recommendations of comprehensive plan.
- 4. Potential savings.

Objective: To arrive at consensus by October 18, 2011 in order to begin incorporation of changes into 2013 budget and 2012 Rules of the Board during Board reorganization.

Ad Hoc Timing / Structure and Formation

It is anticipated that appointment of an Ad Hoc Study committee would be undertaken by the Board of Supervisors at their February meeting. Composition: Seven members who would meet regularly until the end of the year.

Committee Process and Methodology

Review functional areas. Conduct a thorough review and examination of services and programs for potential restructure. The focus will be on, service needs, quality of service, level of service and the best way to deliver that service.

Meet with departmental stakeholders. Meetings with departmental staff and other entities (both internal and external) as required would facilitate the information needed to develop pros and cons and possible alternatives as they relate to a potential restructure.

Identification of programs and issues affected. This would include scrutinizing functions within each of the departmental areas, as well as departments that have a community of interest or would be affected by a restructure initiative.

WHEREAS, the negotiating team comprised of members of your Personnel Committee, the Personnel Director and the Corporation Counsel have engaged in bargaining with five of the bargaining groups representing the County's represented employees, as well as follow on mediation, and have been unable to reach a voluntary settlement with regard to four of these bargaining groups; and,

WHEREAS, an impasse has been certified by the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission with regard to each of these bargaining groups pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 111.70 and Wis. Stat. § 111.77, and both parties have exchanged final offers; and,

WHEREAS, your Executive & Legislative Committee and Personnel Committee have determined that it is in the best interest of Sauk County to utilize the insurance legal expense endorsement coverage available under our policy of insurance with Wisconsin County Mutual Insurance Corporation, in order to obtain the expertise of this firm; and,

WHEREAS, Linder & Marsack, S.C. has represented Sauk County on several matters in the past, and Lindner & Marsack, S.C. is one of the foremost management labor law firms in the State of Wisconsin.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Corporation Counsel is authorized to utilize the Legal Expense Endorsement for the purpose of utilizing Lindner & Marsack, S.C. to represent Sauk County in interest arbitration proceedings pertaining to the four bargaining groups consisting of AFSCME Local 3148 (Health Care Center), AFSCME Local 360 (Highway), AFSCME Local 252 (Sheriff's Dept. Sworn) and AFSCME Local 252 (Sheriff's Dept. Unsworn).

FISCAL NOTE: The quote provided by Lindner & Marsack proposed between \$8,000 and \$10,000 per arbitration proceeding. The Wisconsin County Mutual Legal Expense Coverage Endorsement provides that WCMIC will cover 50% of the costs after a \$2,500 deductable is applied. Therefore, estimating a cost of \$10,000 per contract for four contracts, the total cost to Sauk County should be approximately between \$21,000 and \$25,000 to be paid from the insurance fund. County staff will pursue any possible avenues for cost savings. Two law firms on the WCMIC list were contacted, and Lindner & Marsack, S.C. was approximately between \$2,000 to \$5,000 less per contract than the other firm solicited.

Assuming each arbitration is \$10,000, costs would be allocated as follows:

AMENDING THE 2011 BUDGET TO APPROPRIATE \$90,259 PURSUANT TO AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN SAUK COUNTY, WISCONSIN AND THE HO-CHUNK NATION

WHEREAS, by Resolution 43-10 dated April 20, 2010, Sauk County was authorized to enter into an intergovernmental agreement with the Ho-Chunk Nation; and,

WHEREAS, this agreement provides for an annual payment of \$90,259 from the Ho-Chunk Nation to Sauk County; and,

WHEREAS, these funds may be used at the County's discretion for any purpose unless that purpose is considered a prohibited purpose that diminishes the Nation's governmental jurisdiction or has an adverse financial impact on the Nation; and,

WHEREAS, the County may not spend any money received under this agreement until the County provides a written report to the Nation each March 1; and the Nation must expressly state that the intended use does not constitute a prohibited purpose, or 30 days must have elapsed since the Nation has received said report and the Nation has not objected.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the 2011 budget is hereby amended to appropriate \$90,259 for the following purposes: \$60,259 for Human Services programming, \$20,000 for Highway maintenance, and \$10,000 for Badger Oversight Management Commission administrative support.

RESOLUTION NO. 13 - 11

AMENDING THE 2011 BUDGET AND APPROVING COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANTS - REVOLVING LOAN FUND

WHEREAS, Resolution 75-04 created the county wide Revolving Loan Fund for the purpose of supporting economic development efforts on a countywide basis; and,

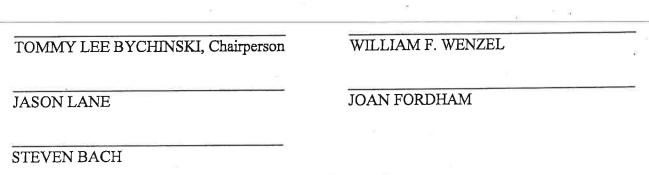

WHEREAS, an AEA designation enables eligible farmers to enter into voluntary Farmland Preservation Agreements with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection for at least a 15-year period and enables farmers to receive income tax credits in return for preserving their land in agricultural use; and

WHEREAS, the Fairfield Town Board approached the Sauk County Land Conservation and Planning and Zoning departments to assist the town and interested farmers with the development of a petition to establish an AEA in the Town of Fairfield; and

WHEREAS, the Land Conservation and Planning and Zoning departments have prepared a petition entitled the 'Fairfield Agricultural Enterprise Area' which encompasses an area of 9,509 acres and includes seven participating farmers with approximately 3,690 eligible acres; and

WHEREAS, the participating farmers would be eligible for a tax credit of five dollars per acre provided they meet compliance with runoff rules established by ATCP 50; and

WHEREAS, the Fairfield Town Board, in December, 2010 voted to approve a resolution supporting the Fairfield AEA; and

WHEREAS, each participating farmer has submitted a signature page in support of establishing an AEA; and

WHEREAS, in order to fully prepare an AEA petition that can be submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, each political subdivision that has land within the boundary of the proposed AEA must submit a copy of a resolution clearly stating that the political subdivision is petitioning the State of Wisconsin on behalf of the AEA; and

WHEREAS, the lands identified to be part of the Fairfield AEA are located within Sauk County, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, and therefore requires the support of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that the County of Sauk supports the petition and designation of the Fairfield Agriculture Enterprise Area by the State of Wisconsin under Wis. Stat. § 91.84.

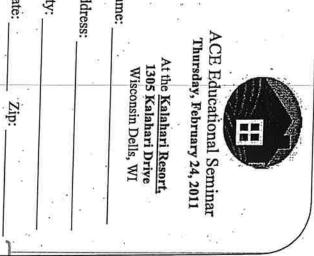
