





BACKGROUND: Daniel Olson, former Sauk County Corporation Counsel, filed the attached notice of claim (see the attached Exhibit A) on January 18th, 2022 with the individuals listed on page 3 three of Exhibit A. The notice of claim alleges that Daniel Olson sustained damages and alleges that said damages were caused by Sauk County, individual Sauk County Board Supervisor, employees of Sauk County (both current and former employees), Sauk County's insurer, employees of Sauk County's insurer and various attorneys that have provided legal services to Sauk County and the Wisconsin Counties Association. The Notice of Claim has been referred to the County's appropriate insurance carrier who has determined that, notwithstanding the claim's failure to conform to the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 893.80, the claim may be formally disallowed by Sauk County.





NOTICE OF INTENT TO SUE & PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

This correspondence constitutes an offer to compromise a claim and is inadmissible pursuant to Fed. R. Evid. 408 and Wis. Stat. § 904.08.

Dear Defendant:

This Notice of Intent to Sue & Proposed Settlement of Claims provides notice that Daniel M. Olson (Plaintiff) intends to commence a lawsuit against you (Defendant) for violations of federal and state law. Plaintiff will seek compensatory and punitive damages and any other available relief under law or equity for those violations, which are based on but not exclusive to the following general misconduct:

Unconstitutional retaliation against Plaintiff for his protected speech/testimony to a county committee on December 10, 2019.

Unconstitutional acts or omissions to prevent or otherwise interfere with Plaintiff's protected speech/testimony to a county committee on January 7, 2020.

Unconstitutional retaliation against Plaintiff for his protected speech/testimony to a county committee on January 7, 2020.

Unconstitutional acts or omissions to prevent or otherwise interfere with Plaintiff's protected speech/testimony to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Sauk County District Attorney, and Sauk County Sheriff on January 21, 2020.

Unconstitutional retaliation against Plaintiff for his protected speech/testimony to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Sauk County District Attorney, and Sauk County Sheriff on January 21, 2020.

Unconstitutional deprivation of Plaintiff's protected speech/testimony to the Sauk County District Attorney and Sauk County Sheriff by intentional or reckless obstruction of requested investigation.

Unconstitutional deprivation of Plaintiff's equal protection rights to exercise his protected speech, liberty and property rights.

Unconstitutional procedures to deprive Plaintiff of his protected speech, liberty and property rights without due process.

Suspension and termination of Plaintiff's employment for improper purposes.

Violation of Plaintiff's contractual right to good faith and fair dealing.

Malicious or recklessly false communications about and against Plaintiff.

Intentional or negligent interference with Plaintiff's employment relationship.

Unreasonable infliction of emotional injury on Plaintiff.

The foregoing misconduct establishes violations of federal and state law, including but not limited to: Section 1983 (Free Speech Deprivation), Section 1983 (Substantive Due Process Violation), Section 1983 (Procedural Due Process Violation), Section 1983 (Equal Protection Violation), Section 1983 (Conspiracy to Violate Civil Rights Violation), Wrongful Termination, Breach of Contract, Defamation, Conspiracy to Interfere With Employment Relationship, and Negligent Infliction of Emotional Harm.

Plaintiff's claims against you are based on uncontroverted competent evidence including public records, emails, videos, audio recordings and may include other similar evidence Defendant knew or should have known Defendant is legally required to preserve.

PLAINTIFF CAN OBTAIN A COURT-ORDERED ACCOUNTING OF PRE-FILING EVIDENCE. IF DEFENDANT DESTROYED, SPOILED OR LOST EVIDENCE DEFENDANT IS LEGALLY REQUIRED TO PRESERVE, DEFENDANT IS SUBJECT TO PENALTIES, FINES, ADVERSE RULINGS AND EVIDENTIARY SANCTIONS.

Irrespective of any prior impermissible spoliation of evidence, your duties under federal and state law to preserve **ALL** electronic records or information related to Plaintiff's employment with Sauk County continue unabated and extend to but are not limited to: communications, in their **ORIGINAL** unadulterated and **FORENSICALLY PRISTINE** form, to or from each Defendant directly or indirectly concerning Plaintiff and irrespective of whether Plaintiff is specifically identified in the communication, including word processing files, email messages, text messages, voicemail messages, videos and the like, including **ALL ASSOCIATED METADATA**, irrespective of whether the record(s) exists on or in a publicly or **PRIVATELY-OWNED** phone, laptop, computer or any other device or source.

Settlement Terms. As and for complete settlement of Plaintiff's claims against you, Plaintiff proposes the following:

- A. Compensatory Damages payment per enclosed Attachment 1.
- B. Punitive Damages payment per enclosed Attachment 1.
- C. Interest payment to be determined by agreement.
- D. Equitable relief to be determined by agreement.

Time to Respond. This settlement offer is valid for thirty (30) days unless withdrawn earlier by Plaintiff or extension of time to respond is agreed to in writing by Plaintiff and Defendant.

Lawsuit Filing. Plaintiff will file his lawsuit against you on January 28, 2022, the 2-year anniversary of the unlawful retaliatory employment suspension imposed against Plaintiff, but such filing will not constitute an automatic withdrawal of this settlement offer.

Resolution to Authorize Participation in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program for Snowmobile Trails

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring or developing lands for public motorized trail use and these public motorized trails are eligible for snowmobile grant funds.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources administers a grant program that is 100% funded for the acquisition, development, insurance, and maintenance of public snowmobile trails. Funding for the program comes from snowmobile registration fees, a portion of tax on gasoline and user fees.

The development, maintenance, and grooming of the snowmobile trails in Sauk County are managed through a contract with the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, attached as Appendix A. The Land Resources and Environment Department is primarily responsible for the financial administration of the grant program. Other responsibilities include trail inspections, maintaining an updated development, maintenance and grooming contract, applying for grant funding, and verifying that all written and verbal permission from all snowmobile trail landowners is obtained. Currently, there are 215.5 miles of snowmobile trails throughout Sauk County. The trails are funded at \$300 per mile, with the grant program totaling \$64,650.00. Sauk County's existing liability insurance policy already protects Sauk County's interest in providing snowmobile trails.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Parks Operations Coordinator and the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Director, under the direction of the Land Resources and Environment Committee, be and hereby are authorized and directed to submit an application to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for any financial aid that may be available, submit reimbursement claims along with supporting documentation within proper timeframe of project completion dates, sign and submit documents and take necessary action to undertake, direct and complete the approved project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, that the County Administrator be authorized to execute a Development, Maintenance and Grooming Contract with the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, Inc. (Appendix A).

SAUK COUNTY SNOWMOBILE TRAIL DEVELOPMENT, MAINTENANCE AND GROOMING CONTRACT

This Contract made this 1st day of March 2022, by and between the County of Sauk, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "County", and the Association of Sauk County Snowmobile Clubs, Inc., a private snowmobile club corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County wishes to ensure that snowmobile trails within Sauk County are developed and maintained in a suitable fashion to ensure that the trails are safe and enjoyable for use by the public; and,

WHEREAS, the County considers it necessary for the safety, comfort and enjoyment of the public that the snowmobile trails be groomed;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. **Scope of Land Area Covered by Contract:** This contract shall apply to the snowmobile trails described and known as the Sauk County Snowmobile Trail System, hereinafter referred to as "Trails", estimated at approximately 215.5 miles of state-approved snowmobile trails within the County, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit A", attached hereto and made a part hereof.
2. **Term of Contract:** This Contract shall commence on the date noted above and shall be for the 2022-2023 winter snowmobile season, unless sooner terminated pursuant to paragraph twenty (20) below.
3. **Outdoor Motorized Recreation Trail Aids Application and Grant Award:** County shall apply for outdoor motorized recreation trail aids by completion of the Outdoor Motorized Recreation Grant Application of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, hereinafter referred to as "WDNR". Contractor shall submit written requests for funding by March 1 to the County. Requests received after March 1 will not be considered for the snowmobile season pursuant to paragraph two (2) above.

Completion of the appropriate WDNR Form is required under Wisconsin Statutes 23.09(26) and 23.33 and failure to do so will result in denial of financial assistance.

The County shall annually request, by resolution, the authorization of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to participate in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program.

In the event that funding is awarded to the County, the County shall review the grant agreement with the WDNR. If the grant agreement is desirable to the County, the County shall return a copy of the signed agreement to the WDNR.

County shall apply for supplemental funding if desired by Contractor, and on the basis that funding is available through the WDNR.



4. Payment: Contractor shall submit work reports and receipts paid by the Contractor onto SNARS (Snowmobile Automated Reported System, provided by the WDNR). The County shall approve entries on SNARS monthly during the time period pursuant to paragraph eleven (11) below.

Payment to the Contractor by the County will be based upon monthly invoices, submitted by the fourth Wednesday of each month, with an itemized of invoices paid by the Contract (the receipts) and one lump sum for work reports, and be based upon time expended. The invoice shall also include copies of each paid invoice (receipt) and the work reports and shall be sent electronically to the County.

Payment shall be made at rates in accordance with the Equipment and Labor Rate provisions adopted by the Snowmobile Recreation Advisory Council for the current snowmobile season, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit B", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

All representatives of County providing labor and/or supplies to the snowmobile program shall prepare work and expense reports. These reports shall be submitted to SNARS on an annual basis.

Contractor shall meet all of the agreements contained herein. County shall withhold payment if Contractor fails to meet the specifications listed in this contract. Once Contractor meets all specifications of the agreements contained herein, County shall submit payment within forty-five (45) days.

County shall request reimbursement for the grant by completion of the Grant Payment Request & Worksheet of the WDNR.

5. Equipment, Tools and Labor: Contractor agrees to furnish all tools, equipment, and labor necessary to maintain, groom, and perform all work as specified under the terms of this contract.
6. Material: Contractor shall furnish all signs, posts, gates and related material necessary for the development and maintenance of the trail system.
7. Signs: Contractor agrees to erect, replace and maintain all signs consistent with standards specified in the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Administrative Code and regulations promulgated by the WDNR.
8. Fall Maintenance and Land Use Agreements: Contractor agrees to perform all brushing, dragging, litter removal, and clean-up necessary to prepare the Trail to meet the specifications established by the WDNR in order to qualify the Trail for winter use. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Land Use Certification Form ("Exhibit C"), certifying that all landowners have been contacted verbally, electronically or with a signed contract and have granted permission to use his/her land and/or all necessary private property easements, leases, permits or other appropriate agreements have been secured for snowmobile trail use. County shall maintain copies of all land use agreements, update a listing of all landowners



annually, and verify that all land use agreements are secured. County shall notify Contractor of any absent land use agreements, and Contractor shall provide absent land use agreements within one (1) month of notice. County shall annually send land use certification(s) to the WDNR.

9. Spring Clean-up and Removal of Signs: At the end of the snowmobile season, and no later than April 15, Contractor shall remove signs as appropriate, clean-up and remove all litter from the subject Trail. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Closure Certification Form ("Exhibit D") certifying fence closures have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or closed, the appropriate signs and/or markers have been removed, and that the trail section has been cleaned-up and closed in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR after the Trail system has been closed for each year. County shall annually send closure certification(s) to the WDNR.
10. Grooming: The Contractor shall groom the trails to the trail specifications established by the WDNR.
11. Trail Opening and Closing: The Trail system shall be considered open during the time period from December 1 to March 31 of each year. All signs, gates, markers and related items shall be in place and the trail is in a safe operating condition as of December 1. The Contractor shall provide the County with a Trail System Opening Certification Form ("Exhibit E") certifying that all fence openings have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or opened, the required signs and/or markers have been installed and the trail section has been developed to acceptable safety standards and in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR, before the Trail system is opened to the public. County shall annually send opening certification(s) to the WDNR.

The Contractor will determine if conditions are, or are not, suitable for snowmobiling and will open and close the trails accordingly. Contractor shall notify County of trail opening and trail closing at least one (1) hour prior to trail opening and trail closing. The County will maintain a record of trail openings and closures. The Contractor shall suspend all grooming operations during closure except as otherwise specifically authorized by County.

12. Safety Procedures - Equipment: Contractor shall attach a blinking light on top of the vehicle used during grooming and shall have headlights, taillights, and blinking lights on and working at all times. All grooming equipment and vehicles shall be clearly marked with "Slow Moving Vehicle" signs to safeguard other Trail users.

County shall inspect trails randomly during the time period from December 1 to March 31 of each year. County shall inform Contractor of any adverse determination regarding the trails, and allow Contractor an opportunity to be heard in that regard and require Contractor to develop the trails to the acceptable safety standards and in accordance with the trail specifications established by the WDNR immediately after notice.



13. Independent Contractor Status: The Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the County. Contractor shall placard or otherwise mark its equipment with the Contractor's name on both sides of its equipment.
14. Indemnification: Contractor agrees to save, hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County and the State of Wisconsin and all its officers, employees and agents, against any and all liability claims, costs of whatever kind and nature, for injury to or death of any person or persons, and for loss or damage to any property, County, State or other, occurring in connection with or in any way incident to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operation or performance of the work in connection with this Contract.
15. Insurance Coverage: The Contractor shall carry liability coverage for its officers, employees, and agents in the amount of \$500,000.00 for each single personal injury, \$500,000.00 for each multiple personal injury, and \$500,000.00 for each property damage. The Contractor shall also carry liability coverage in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 to indemnify the applicable rail authority for damages from the design, construction, maintenance, existence or use of an established rail crossing or a snowmobile rail crossing for which a permit has been issued by the WDNR. The Contractor shall provide the County with acceptable certificates of insurance, from a corporation licensed in the State of Wisconsin to provide insurance, before the Trail system is opened to the public and before January 31 of each year. County shall annually send insurance certification(s) to the WDNR and other appropriate entities.
16. Conduct: The Contractor agrees that its agents, employees and representatives shall conduct themselves in a decent, orderly, and business-like manner at all times while performing under this Contract.
17. Compliance: Contractor agrees to follow and comply with the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, Wisconsin Administrative Code, the regulations promulgated by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and of Sauk County Code of Ordinances.
18. Amendment of Contract: This contract may only be amended, changed, or modified in writing by mutual agreement of the parties.
19. Assignment: Contractor shall not assign, subcontract, or otherwise transfer this Contract except with the express written approval of the County.
20. Contract Termination: Notwithstanding any provision herein, the County reserves the right to terminate this Contract, for cause, upon seven (7) days written notice to the Contractor if the County determines that the Contractor's operation is unsatisfactory in any respect or if the County determines that the Contractor has failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the terms of this Contract. This contract is also subject to the availability of funding, and shall be terminated in the event that funding for the required services is not available. In such event, the County shall notify the Contractor of such termination due to funding constraints.
21. Form of Contract: Section 16.76(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes, is incorporated by reference into this contract, as applicable.



22. Applicable Law: This Contract shall be construed and governed by the rules and laws of the State of Wisconsin.

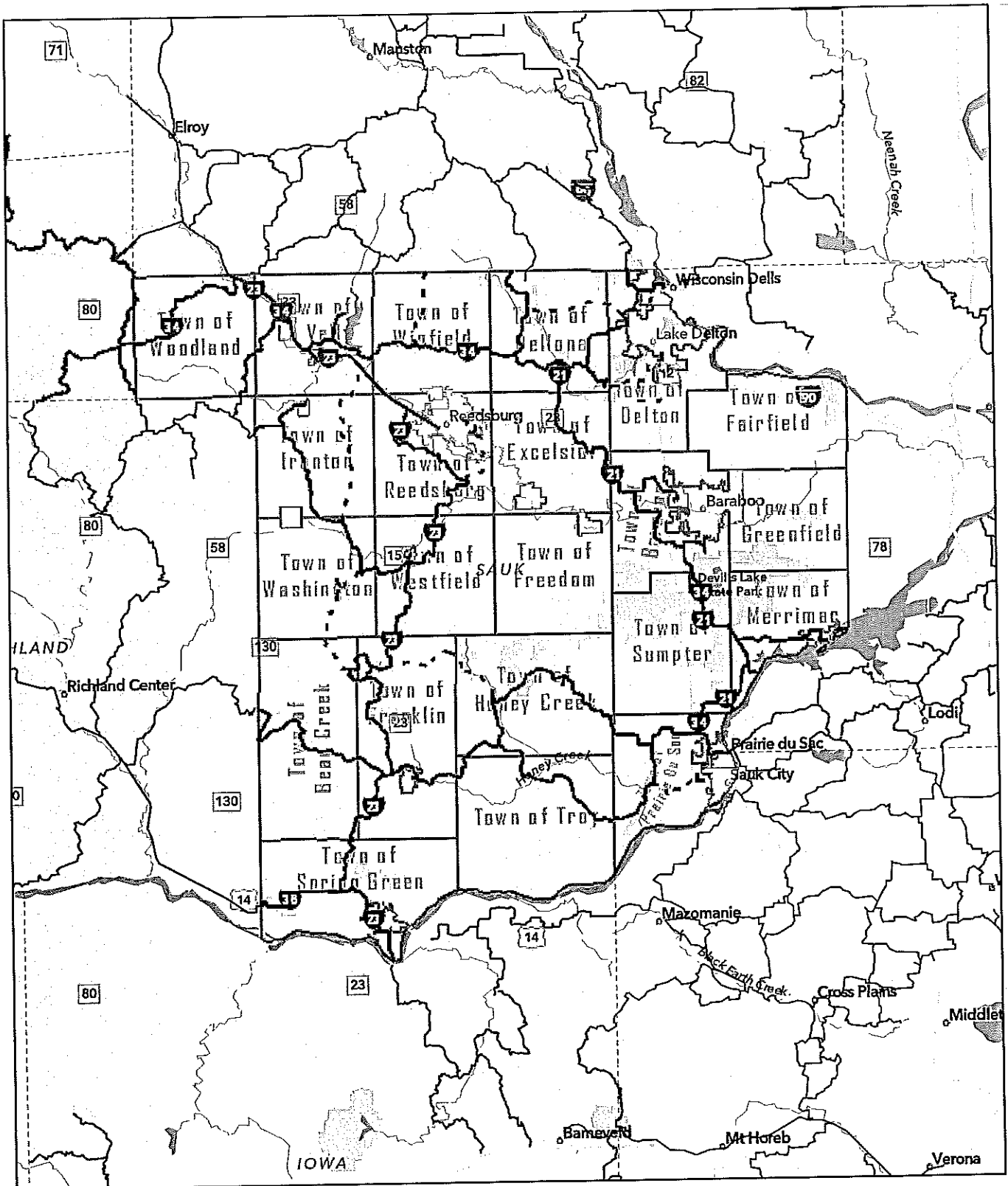

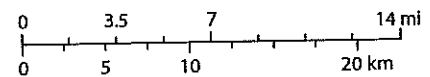

A labor rate of \$8.00 per hour maximum is established for all non-grooming labor performed under the maintenance agreement by snowmobile clubs and or other similar organizations with the sponsoring county. Maintenance will generally include mowing and brushing, sign and post replacement, plowing of parking lots and roads, shelter and toilet maintenance and normal repair and replacement of structures and facilities.

The allowable labor rate for county employees and others included in labor contracts will be as specified by contract.

B EQUIPMENT RATES (For other than trail grooming)

The following schedule is based on frequently used pieces of equipment for non-grooming maintenance. The Department of Transportation rates are considered when these rates are reviewed each year.

These rates do **not** include the operator. Where the Department of Transportation issues rates that reflect an adjustment due to fuel rates, these rates shall be the rates utilized for the season.

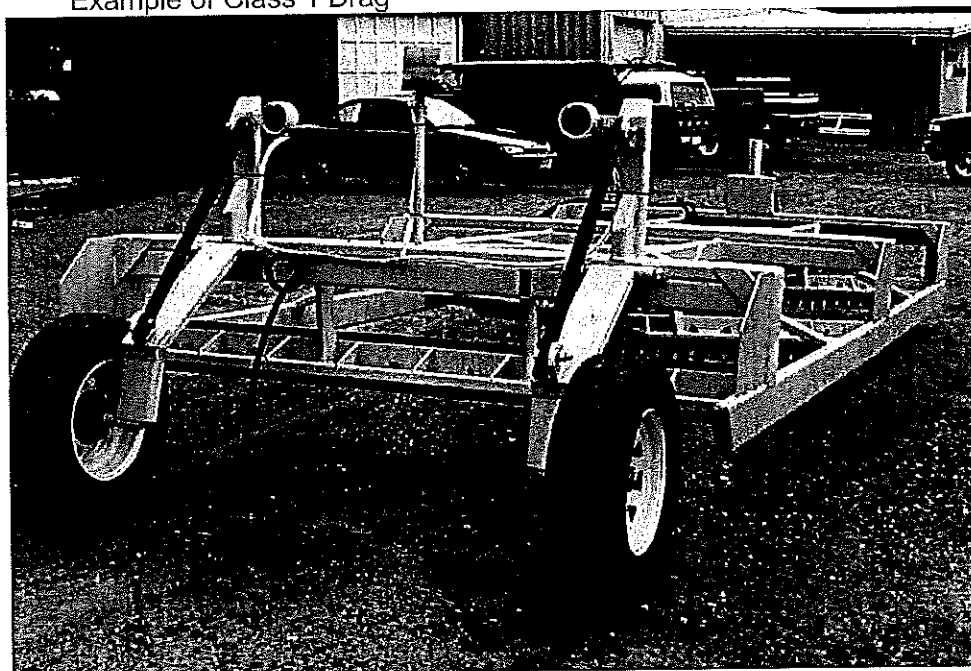

Resolution to Authorize Participation in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program for ATV/UTV Trails

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County annually participates in maintaining, acquiring, insuring or developing lands for public motorized trail use. In doing so, these public motorized trails are eligible for ATV/UTV grant funds through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. The program funds 100% of the cost for the acquisition, development, insurance, and maintenance of public ATV/UTV trails. Funding for the program comes from ATV/UTV registration fees and a portion of tax on gasoline.

The development and maintenance of the ATV/UTV trails in Sauk County are managed through a contract with the Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. ATV/UTV Club, attached as Appendix A. The Land Resources and Environment Department is primarily responsible for the financial administration of the grant program. Other responsibilities include trail inspections, maintaining an updated development and maintenance contract, applying for grant funding, and verifying that all written and verbal permission from all ATV/UTV trail landowners is obtained.

Currently, there are approximately 0.82 miles of ATV/UTV trails throughout Sauk County. The trails are funded at \$800 per mile for summer use and \$200 per mile for winter use, with the grant program totaling approximately \$820. Sauk County's existing liability insurance policy already protects Sauk County's interest in providing ATV/UTV trails.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Parks Operations Coordinator and the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Director, under the direction of the Land Resources and Environment Committee, be authorized and directed to submit an application to the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for any financial aid that may be available, submit reimbursement claims along with supporting documentation within proper timeframe of project completion dates, sign and submit documents, and take necessary action to undertake, direct and complete the approved project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, that the County Administrator be authorized to execute a Development and Maintenance Contract with Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc. (Appendix A).

SAUK COUNTY ATV/UTV TRAIL DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE CONTRACT

This Contract made this 1st day of March 2022, by and between the County of Sauk, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "County", and the Sauk Ridge Runners, Inc., a private ATV/UTV club corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County wishes to ensure that ATV/UTV trails within Sauk County are developed and maintained in a suitable fashion to ensure that the trails are safe and enjoyable for use by the public; and,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Scope of Land Area Covered by Contract.

This contract shall apply to the ATV/UTV trails described and known as the Sauk County ATV/UTV Trail System, hereinafter referred to as "Trails", estimated at approximately 0.82 miles of ATV/UTV trails within the County, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit A", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

2. Term of Contract.

This Contract shall commence on the date noted above and shall be for the 2022-2023 ATV/UTV season, July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the "Contract Termination" provisions in this agreement.

3. Outdoor Motorized Recreation Trail Aids Application and Grant Award.

The County shall apply for outdoor motorized recreation trail aids by completion of the Outdoor Motorized Recreation Grant Application provided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, hereinafter referred to as "WDNR". Contractor shall submit written requests for funding by March 1 to the County. Requests received after March 1 will not be considered for the ATV/UTV season pursuant to the terms identified in this agreement.

Completion of WDNR forms is required under Wisconsin Statutes 23.09(26) and 23.33 and failure to complete said forms will result in denial of financial assistance.

The County shall annually request, by resolution, the authorization of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to participate in the State of Wisconsin Motorized Recreation Grant Program.

In the event that funding is awarded to the County, the County shall review the grant agreement with the WDNR. If the grant agreement is desirable to the County, the County shall return a copy of the signed agreement to the WDNR.

County shall apply for supplemental funding if desired by Contractor, if funding is available through the WDNR.

4. Payment.

Payment to the Contractor by the County will be based upon submittal of monthly invoices, provided to the Department by the fourth Wednesday of each month. The invoice shall include an itemized listing of invoices paid by the Contractor (the receipts) and one lump sum for work reports, based upon time expended. The invoice shall also include copies of each paid invoice (receipt) and work reports. Invoices



(receipts) and work reports shall be sent electronically to the Land Resources and Environment Department – Parks and Recreation Area.

Payment shall be made at rates in accordance with the Equipment and Labor Rate provisions adopted by the Off Road Vehicle Advisory Council for the current ATV/UTV season, as specifically set forth in "Exhibit B", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

All representatives of the County providing labor and/or supplies to the ATV/UTV program shall prepare work and expense reports.

The Contractor shall meet all of the requirements contained within this contract. County shall withhold payment if the Contractor fails to meet the specifications listed in this contract. Once the Contractor meets all specifications and requirements of this agreement, the County shall submit payment within forty-five (45) days.

The County shall request reimbursement for the grant by completing and submitting the Grant Payment Request & Worksheet provided by the WDNR.

5. Equipment, Tools and Labor.

Contractor agrees to furnish all tools, equipment, and labor necessary to maintain and perform all work as specified under the terms of this contract.

6. Material.

Contractor shall furnish all signs, posts, gates and related materials necessary for the development and maintenance of the trail system.

7. Signs.

Contractor agrees to erect, replace and maintain all signs consistent with standards specified in the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Administrative Code and regulations promulgated by the WDNR.

8. Maintenance and Land Use Agreements.

Contractor agrees to perform all brushing, dragging, litter removal, and clean-up necessary to prepare the Trail to meet the specifications established by the WDNR in order to qualify the Trail for use. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with a Trail System Land Use Certification Form ("Exhibit C"), certifying that all landowners have been contacted verbally, electronically or with a signed contract and have granted permission to use their land and/or all necessary private property easements, leases, permits or other appropriate agreements have been secured for ATV/UTV trail use. The County shall maintain copies of all land use agreements, update a listing of all landowners annually, and verify that all land use agreements are secured. County shall notify Contractor of any absent land use agreements, and the Contractor shall provide absent land use agreements within one (1) month of notice. The County shall annually send land use certification(s) to the WDNR.

9. Trail Opening and Closing.

The Trail system shall be considered open year-round. All signs, gates, markers and related items shall be in place and the trail shall be maintained in a safe operating condition at all times. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with a Trail System Opening Certification Form ("Exhibit D") certifying that all fence openings have been completed, gates have been inspected and/or opened, the required signs and/or markers have been installed and the trail section has been developed to acceptable safety standards and in accordance with trail specifications established by the WDNR, before the Trail system is opened to the public. County shall annually send opening certification(s) to the WDNR.



The Contractor will determine if conditions are, or are not, suitable for ATV/UTV use and will open and close the trails accordingly. Contractor shall notify County of trail opening and trail closing at least one (1) hour prior to trail opening and trail closing. The County will maintain a record of trail openings and closures.

10. Safety Procedures – Equipment.

Contractor shall attach a blinking light on top of the vehicle used while developing and/or maintaining trails and shall have headlights, taillights, and blinking lights on and working at all times. All equipment and vehicles shall be clearly marked with "Slow Moving Vehicle" signs to safeguard other Trail users.

The County shall randomly inspect trails annually. The County shall inform Contractor of any adverse determination regarding the trails, and allow the Contractor an opportunity to correct any deficiencies or develop the trails to the acceptable safety standards, in accordance with the trail specifications established by the WDNR immediately after notice.

11. Independent Contractor Status.

The Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the County. The Contractor shall placard or otherwise mark its equipment with the Contractor's name on both sides of its equipment.

12. Indemnification.

The Contractor agrees to save, hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County and the State of Wisconsin and all its officers, employees and agents, against any and all liability claims, costs of whatever kind and nature, for injury to or death of any person or persons, and for loss or damage to any property, County, State or other, occurring in connection with or in any way incident to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operation or performance of the work in connection with this Contract.

County Indemnification of Contractor and Landowners for any and all liability claims, costs of whatever kind and nature, for injury to or death of any person or persons, and for loss or damage to any property occurring in connection with the design and/or construction of the ATV Trail or in any way incident to or arising out of the occupancy, use, service, operation or performance of the work by County or their agents in connection with this Contract.

13. Insurance Coverage.

The Contractor, at their expense, shall maintain public liability insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in the State of Wisconsin, including bodily injury and property damage coverage insuring the Contractor and County with minimum coverage as follows: liability coverage for its officers, employees, and agents with policy limits at minimum of \$1,000,000 single limit and \$3,000,000 aggregate. The County shall be named as an additional insured on all insurance policies except workers compensation. The certificate shall provide for a ten-day written notice to the County in the event of cancellation or material change of coverage. The Contractor shall annually provide the County with acceptable certificates of insurance, from a corporation licensed in the State of Wisconsin to provide insurance. County shall annually send insurance certification(s) to the WDNR and other appropriate entities.

14. Conduct.

The Contractor agrees that its agents, employees and representatives shall conduct themselves in a decent, orderly, and business-like manner at all times while performing under this Contract.

15. Compliance.



Contractor agrees to follow and comply with the applicable Wisconsin Statutes, Wisconsin Administrative Code, the regulations promulgated by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, and of Sauk County Code of Ordinances.

16. Amendment of Contract.

This contract may only be amended, changed, or modified in writing by mutual agreement of the parties.

17. Assignment.

Contractor shall not assign, subcontract, or otherwise transfer this Contract except with the express written approval of the County.

18. Contract Termination.

Notwithstanding any provision herein, the County reserves the right to terminate this Contract, for cause, upon seven (7) days written notice to the Contractor if the County determines that the Contractor's operation is unsatisfactory in any respect or if the County determines that the Contractor has failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the terms of this Contract. This contract is also subject to the availability of funding, and shall be terminated in the event that funding for the required services is not available. In such event, the County shall notify the Contractor of such termination due to funding constraints.

19. Form of Contract.

Section 16.76(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes, is incorporated by reference into this contract, as applicable.

20. Applicable Law.

This Contract shall be construed and governed by the rules and laws of the State of Wisconsin.

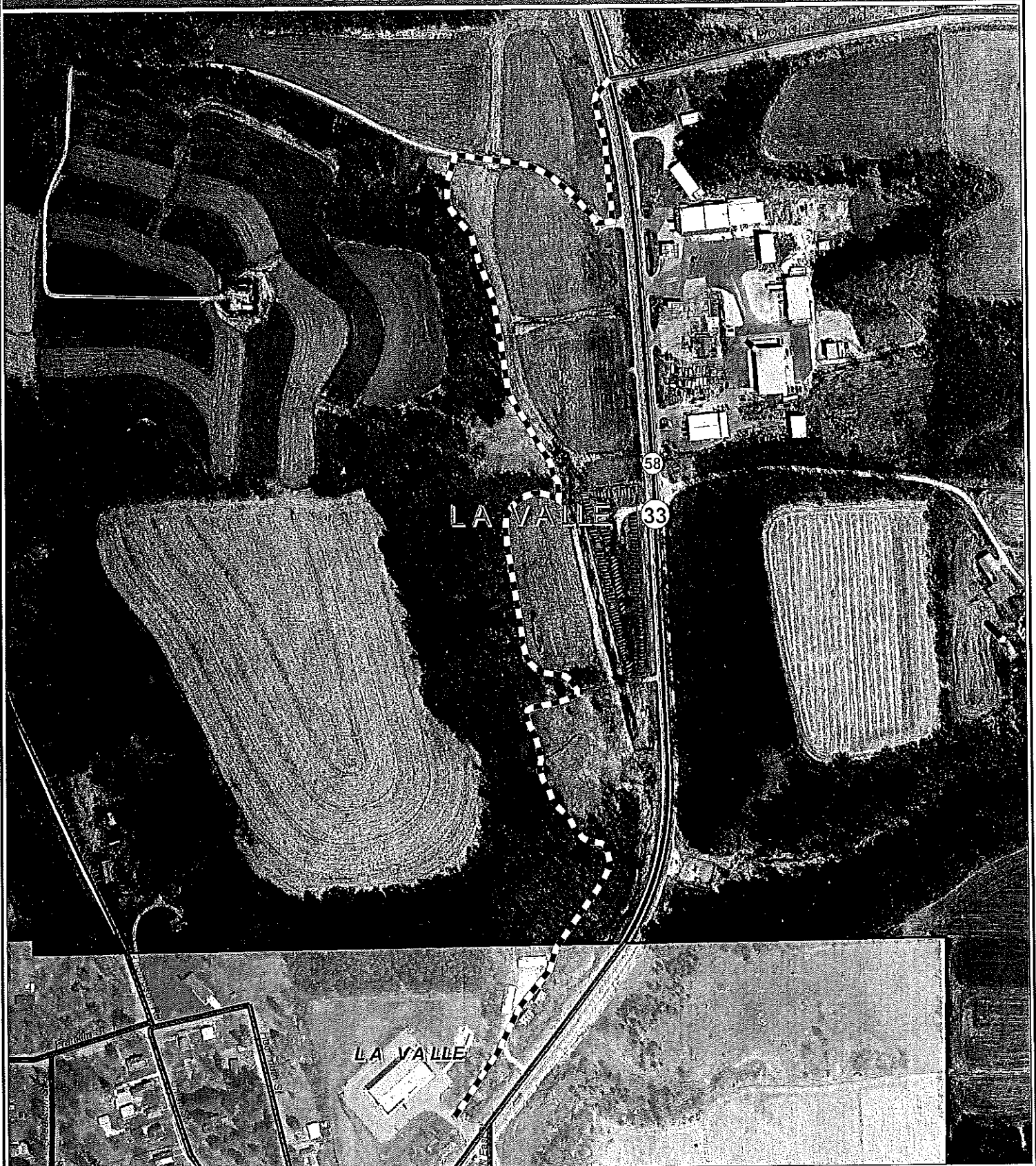

Sauk County ATV/UTV Routes and Trails SRR2 ATV Trail - 0.82 Miles



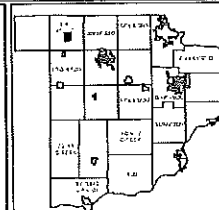
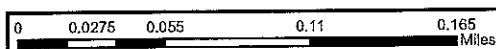

A labor rate of \$8.00 per hour maximum is established for all non-grooming labor performed under the maintenance agreement by snowmobile clubs and or other similar organizations with the sponsoring county. Maintenance will generally include mowing and brushing, sign and post replacement, plowing of parking lots and roads, shelter and toilet maintenance and normal repair and replacement of structures and facilities.

The allowable labor rate for county employees and others included in labor contracts will be as specified by contract.

B EQUIPMENT RATES (For other than trail grooming)

The following schedule is based on frequently used pieces of equipment for non-grooming maintenance. The Department of Transportation rates are considered when these rates are reviewed each year.

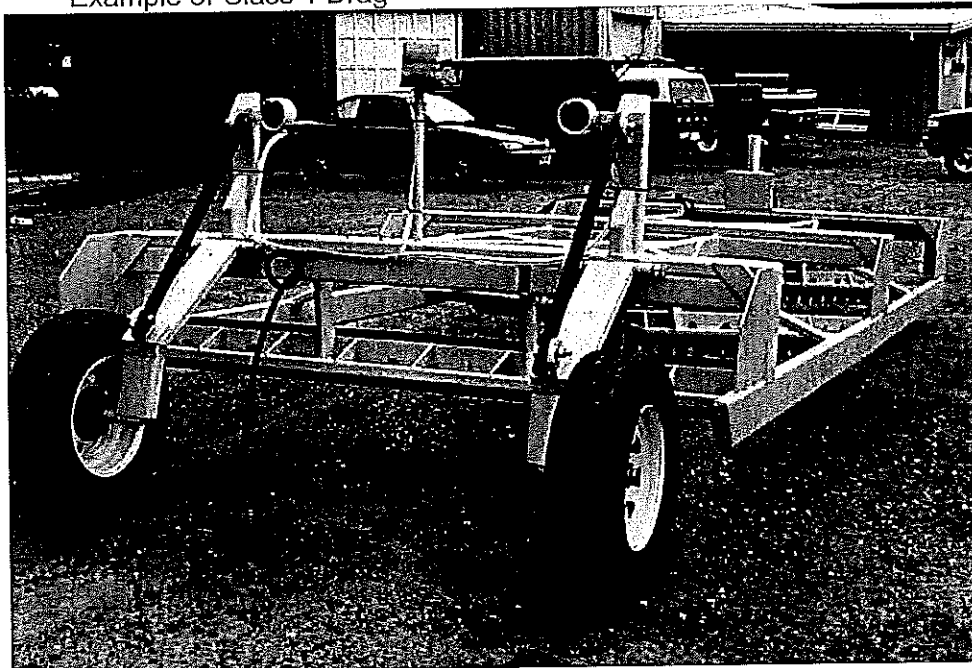

BACKGROUND:

The American Disabilities Act (ADA) requires state and local governments to provide goods, services, and programs to individuals with disabilities on an equal basis with the rest of the public. While people think that this only applies to new or alterations to existing services, facilities, or programs; this is not the case. Older facilities and programs are not grandfathered under the ADA provisions. Public entity program accessibility obligations are outlined under 28 CFR Part 35.150, as amended from time to time. Alterations to facilities may be necessary but are not required if said actions would result in undue financial and administrative burdens. However, an audit of our existing facilities and a transition plan will enable the County to update and make those accommodations necessary over the course of time.

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department has worked with MSA Professional Services Inc. for the ADA Access Audit and Transition Plan (Appendix A). This plan identifies accessibility barriers in the County's public recreation facilities and provides guidance for upgrades, repairs, and renovations over the next ten years.

The Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Department has created the 2021-2026 Bluffview Community Park Master Property Plan (Appendix A) for the development, future management, enhancement, and expansion of recreational services. The property has been acquired for the use of federal Community Development Block Grant Funds (CDBG) to create a community park for the citizens of Bluffview, a low-income community. The County hired Damon Farber Landscape Architects to design the property and Vierbicher to assist with the administration of the funds. The property was designed to create a playground for all ages, family gathering spaces, ADA accessibility, improved aesthetic appeal, and enhanced environmental benefits. Sauk County will maintain the property as part of the County Parks and Recreational System for the enjoyment and benefit of local and visiting citizens.

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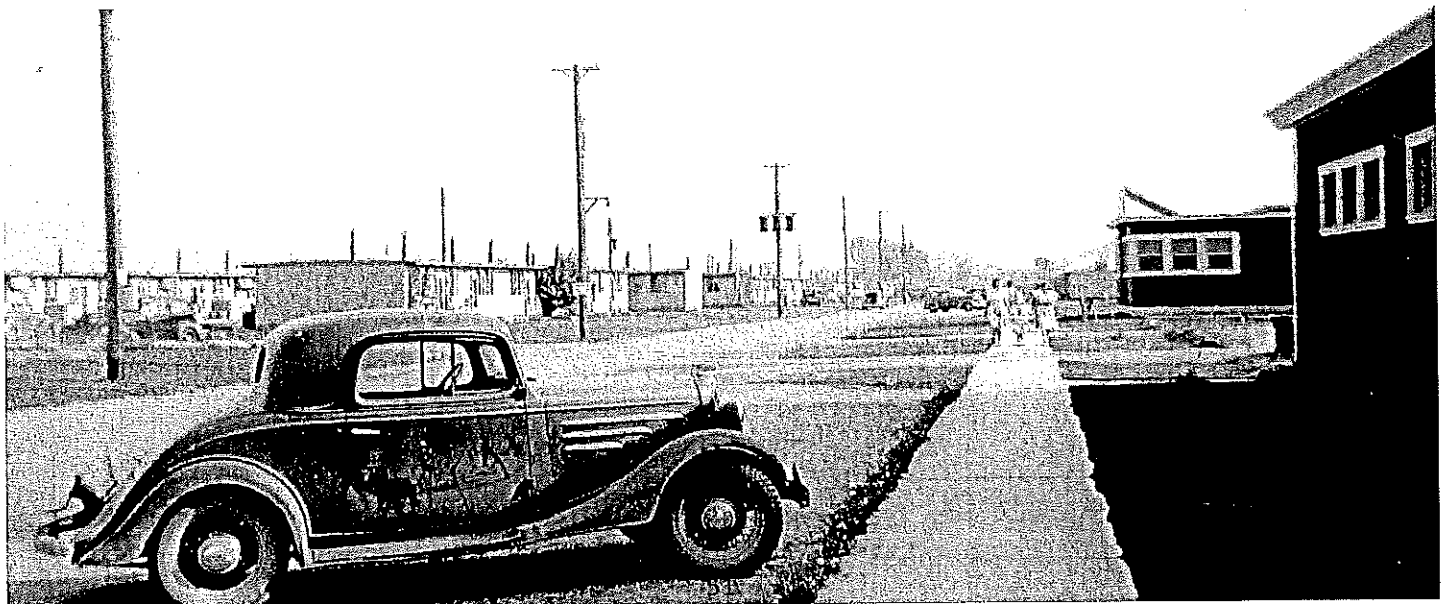

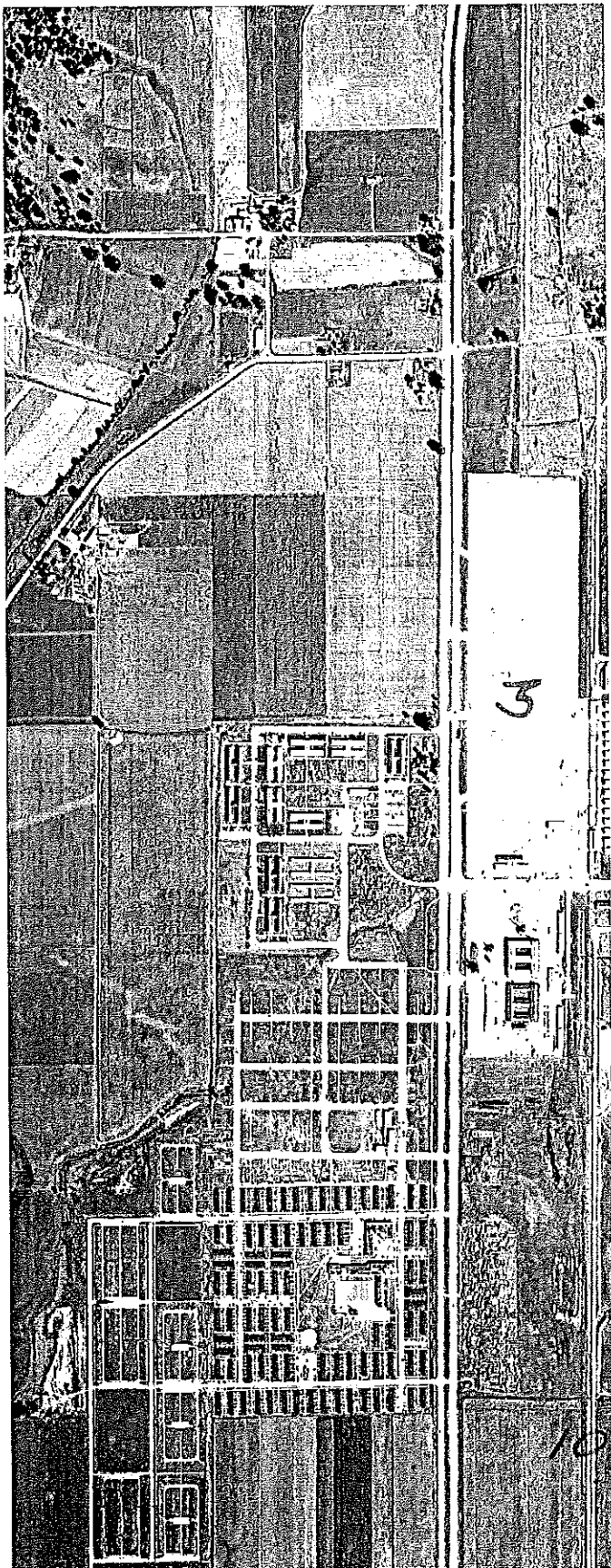
INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

Bluffview is an unincorporated community within the Town of Sumpter in central Sauk County, Wisconsin. Much of the community originates from the dedicated worker housing of the Badger Ordnance Works (BOW) facility, a 1941 Ammunition Plant. The housing development was declared as excess property by the US Army in 1960, allowing the sale of the existing land and buildings to a private party and opening new housing and development options to the general public. As a relatively diverse and low-income area, the Bluffview Community often lacks the resources and investment common to other communities. In an effort to support new investment in the community, Sauk County intends to create a new Bluffview Community Park with funding through the CDBG-CLOSE program. Given the history and current conditions of Bluffview, the community is expected to benefit considerably from County investment.

In 2020, Sauk County was awarded a CDBG-CLOSE grant and acquired a parcel of land with the intention to develop the Bluffview Community Park. Originally an outlot created with the platting of Bluffview Village in 2004, this property is centrally located within the Bluffview Community. The 3.58-acre property contains a man-made pond in addition to considerable open space. Possible future land uses include the addition of ADA-compliant walking trails, a playground, gathering spaces, and recreational facilities.

Sauk County has completed the following master plan for Bluffview Community Park to guide the construction, management, enhancement, and expansion of the future facility. The master planning process has been designed for community involvement and emphasizes the need for a park planning process that reflects the community it serves. The plan is intended to outline the future of the property, both before and after construction, while enhancing the principles laid out in the Sauk County 2020-2024 Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan. Primary objectives for the planning process include community safety, outdoor recreation, equity and accessibility, land acquisition, and natural resource management.



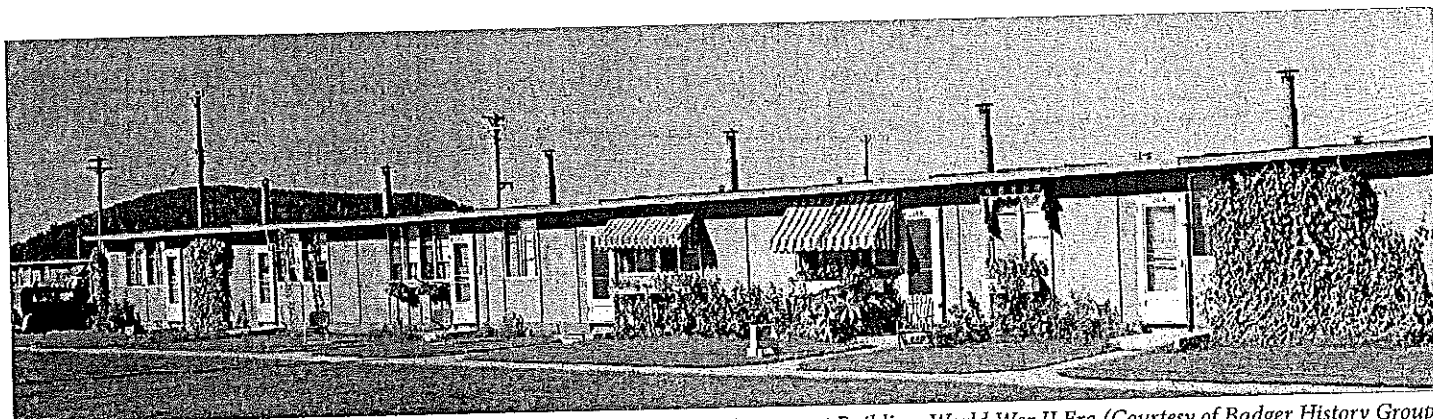
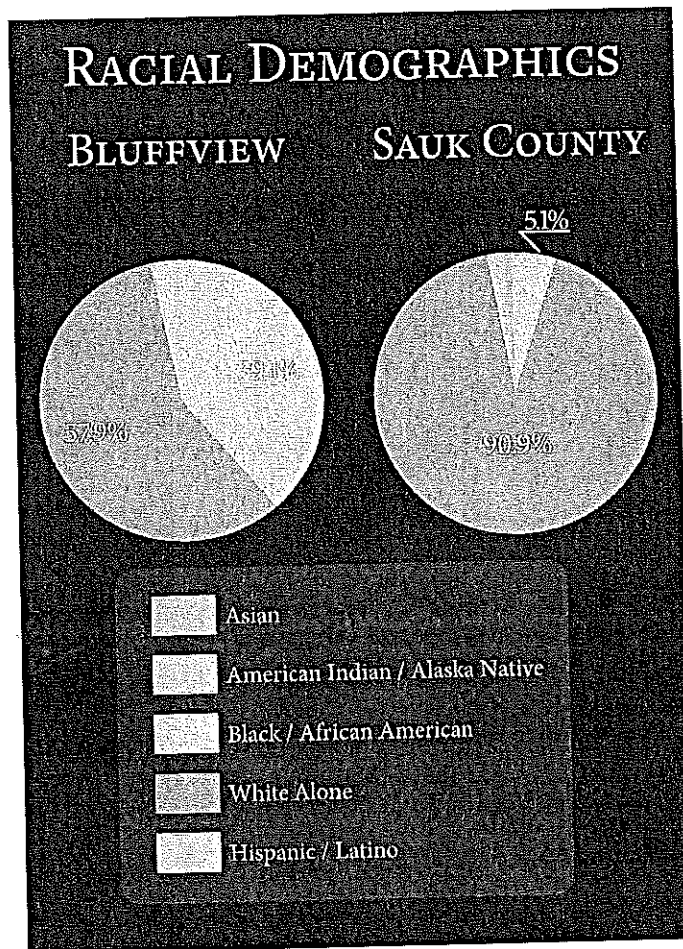

PROPERTY HISTORY

The Bluffview Community's history is rooted in the Badger Ordnance Works' legacy. Constructed in 1942, the BOW would become at the time the largest ammunition plant in the world. Requiring the clearing of hundreds of acres of farmland, the completed facility would contain over 1,400 buildings across more than 7,000 acres (US Army Joint Munitions Command, 2006, p. 5). Ammunition output would span World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War, with periods of reduced production between wars. After multiple decades of minimized activity, the plant would be fully shut down in 1997 (US Army Joint Munitions Command, 2006, p. 14).

As the Badger Ordnance Works began ammunition production in World War II, the need for close worker housing became evident. As a result, the federal government constructed the Badger Village development directly across the road from the Badger Ordnance Works. Encompassing hundreds of relatively dense prefabricated housing units, the first workers would move into the development in 1943 (Mueller, 1982, p. 3). This site would later become the Bluffview Community.

Badger Village would undergo a number of changes over the years before becoming the Bluffview Community. Nearly deserted at the end of World War II, the Badger Village would become student housing for many at the University of Wisconsin Madison due to a massive influx of veteran students following the War (University of Wisconsin Madison Campus Voices, n.d.). Students would board buses to the Campus every morning and return in the evening. Students staying at the Badger Village had access to a community center, primary school, post office, shopping center, barber



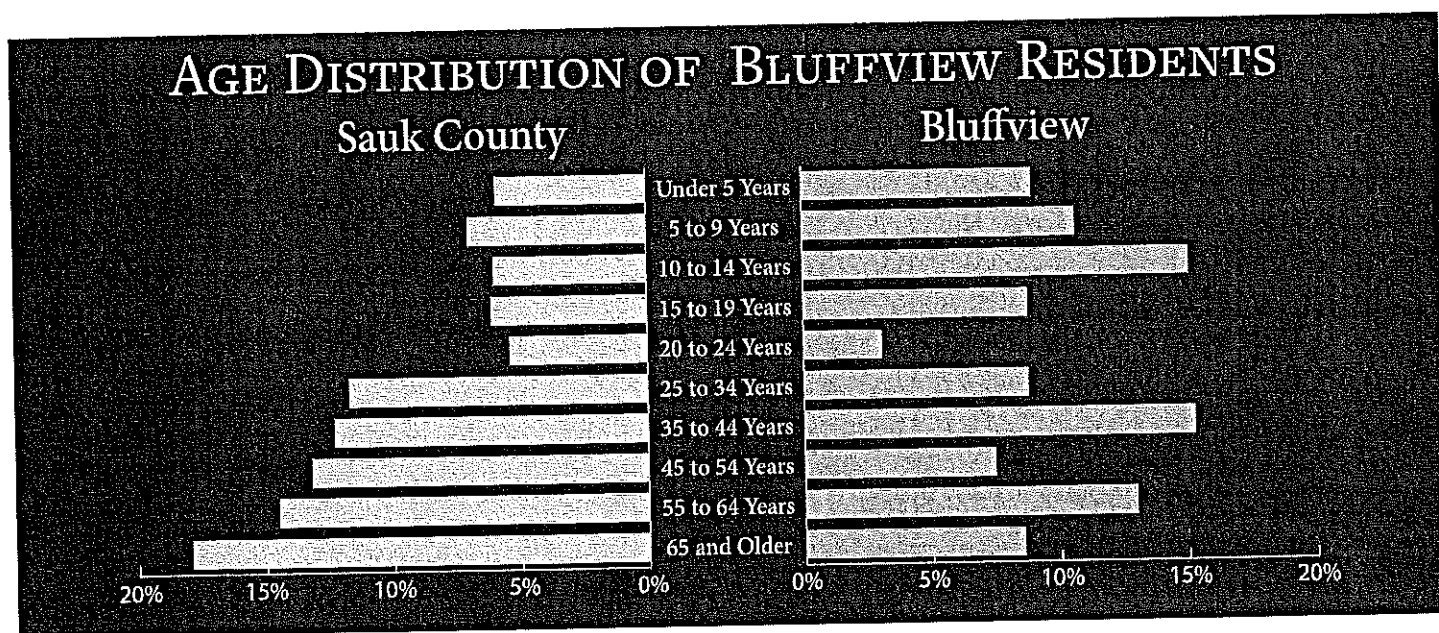
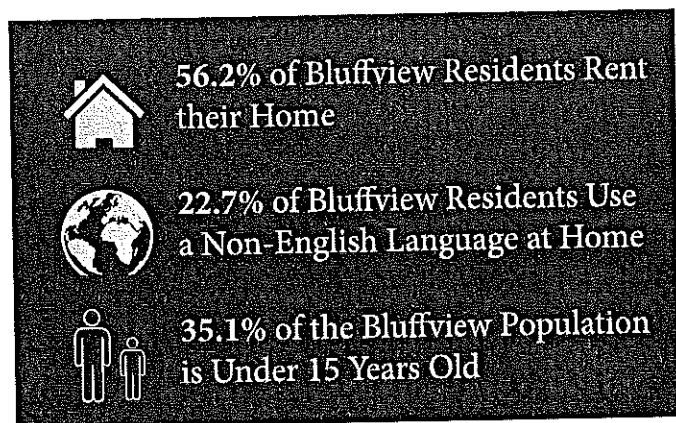
Six Unit Apartment Building, World War II Era (Courtesy of Badger History Group)

shop, drug store, town council, police force, and branch of the University of Wisconsin Madison Student Union (Verhoff, 1990, p. 10). Community events and celebrations were frequent among residents.

With the onset of the Korean War, the University of Wisconsin would cease all Badger Village student housing in 1952 (Verhoff, 1990, p.11). The federal government would reactivate military housing in 1953 after renovating the quarters for new Badger Ordnance Works employees (Mueller, 1982, p. 97). However, by the end of the Korean War, most of the housing in Badger Village would be abandoned. After being declared surplus property by the federal government in 1960, the property would soon be purchased by a private party (Verhoff, 1990, p. 11). Shortly after the purchase, the development's name was changed to Bluffview in an effort to both reflect the bluffs characteristic of the area and remove the development's association with the military (Mueller, 1982, p. 109). A man-made lake was constructed on the property in 1963, and a mobile home park replaced much of the development's original housing in 1966 (Mueller, 1982, p. 111).

Today, much of the housing available in Bluffview can still be traced back to the workers' quarters of the Badger Ordnance Works. Other housing units include newer multi-family and single-family units as well as a mobile home park. The area is surrounded by commercial and industrial space. Demographics of the area today are more diverse and of a lower average income than much of Sauk County. The

median household income of Bluffview residents is \$34,554 in contrast to the County-wide value of \$59,043. Educational attainment is on average lower in Bluffview compared to Sauk County as a whole. Approximately 56.2% of residents rent their housing in contrast to 31.1% of all residents of Sauk County. A total of 39.1% of the community is estimated to be Hispanic or Latino, compared to 4.9% of all of Sauk County. Approximately 22.7% of Bluffview residents speak a language other than English at home, with 20.6% speaking Spanish as a primary language. Likewise, the poverty rate of Sauk County is 10.4%, whereas the same value is 30.7% for Bluffview. When looking at age patterns, 35.1% of the community is under the age of 15 compared to 19% of Sauk County, highlighting a need for spaces that can be occupied by children and younger people.



INVENTORY

Location and Surrounding Landscape

The park is set to be located in the Bluffview Community within the Town of Sumpter. The acquired land spans 3.58 acres, with potential for expansion of park elements. The site is surrounded by the highly developed landscape of the Bluffview Community, with agricultural land to the west. The designated site is bordered by Lake Drive, South Road, East Road, and Center Road. The remains of the Badger Ordnance Works are located directly to the east of which is now home to the Sauk Prairie State Recreation Area, managed by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. When completed, the park will be located less than 250 feet away from US Highway 12, a primary thoroughfare for the County. As a result of the property's proximity to US Highway 12, noise levels can often be relatively high.

The current property does not contain a dedicated parking lot. Based on community input, parking lot acquisition and development is considered a high-priority issue for the park's future non-community visitors. A small parking area with handicap access is planned at the northeastern portion of the property for a future phase of development. The area would likely contain two to three stalls in either parallel or pull-in style. Possible roads for parking include South Road and Center Road. Further parking development will be considered based on park use patterns and land feasibility.

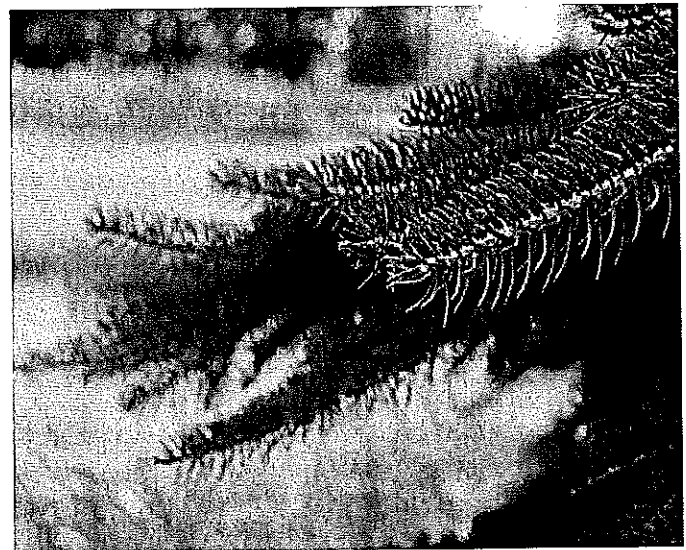
Outdoor Recreation and Natural Resources

Bluffview Community Park will be designed and constructed with outdoor recreation in mind. Upon completion, the park will contain spaces for walking, gathering, and play. Possible future improvements include a flexible lawn, learning spaces, and garden areas. Ample open space will allow for flexible recreational use.

Mature maples, spruces, and cedar can be found within the property boundaries. A few ash trees remain on this property; however, as a result of Emerald Ash Borer, removal will be necessary. Standard turf grass covers the majority of the property. Notably, the site has a prominent artificial pond present on the eastern end. The pond is best characterized as an artificial wetland designed for runoff accumulation. The majority of runoff drains from an impermeable parking lot located across Highway 12. During construction, it is the intention of the County to improve

the condition of the pond by installing native plantings along an eight-foot buffer surrounding the pond. This will enhance aesthetics of the pond, improve water quality and provide habitat for local wildlife. A small island is present on the pond containing an old light post and concrete letters spelling Bluffview. The letters and lamp post were removed during construction due to age and vandalism posing them as safety issues. Many community actors have expressed interest in potential recreation opportunities on this island. Due to safety problems, the bridge to the island was also removed in the initial stages of park development. Based on community input, future installation of a new bridge will be considered when funds are available.

Based on the CDBG-CLOSE Environmental Review prepared by Vierbicher, there are no natural resources at high risk from park development. The site is located within an area of minimal flood hazard and all wetlands and the pond on site are artificial. No man-made hazards are present from the previous Badger Ordnance Works or Bluffview Village. The majority of soil on-site consists of Richwood Silt Loam, a well-drained soil series. Slopes on site range from 1 to 6 percent. Surface runoff is relatively low with moderate erosion risk. This allows the site to be suitable for a large variety of vegetative species and stable for playground development or larger community structures in the future.

PLANNING PROCESS

Planning Overview

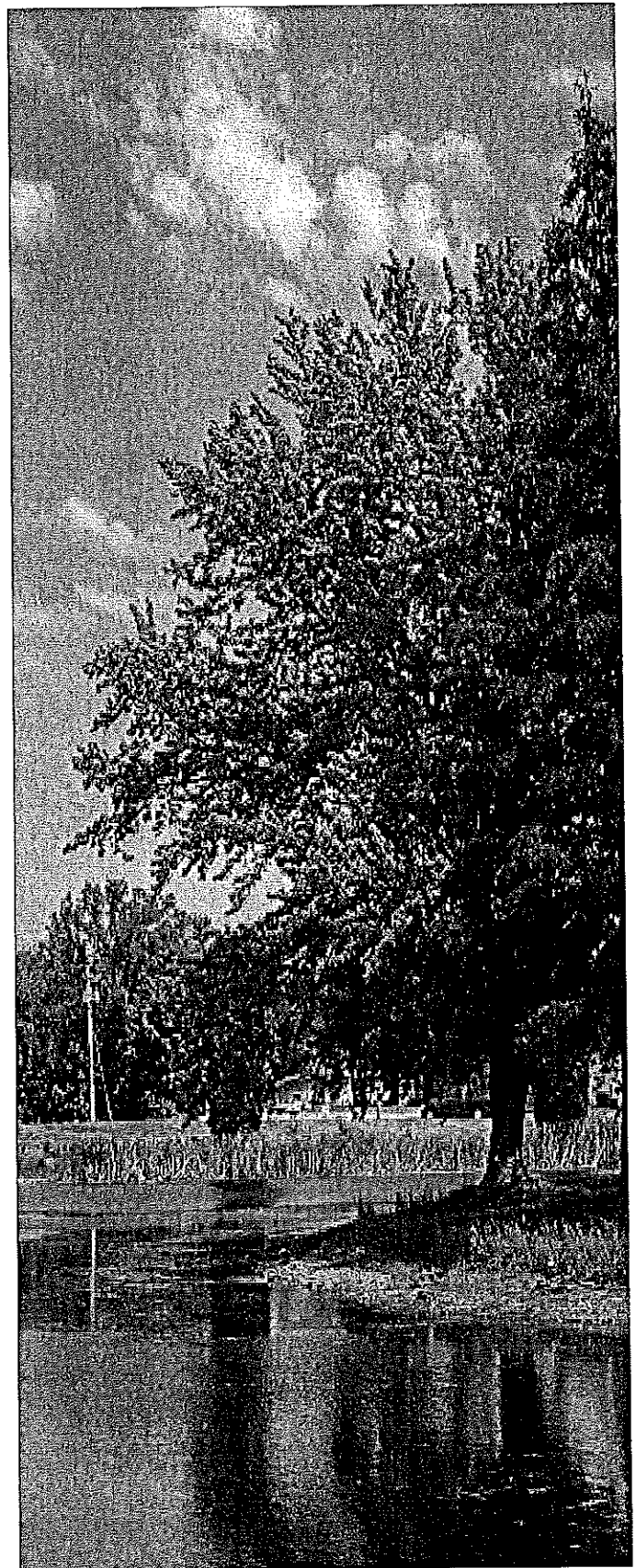
The planning process began in October of 2020. All three divisions of the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment (Land Conservation, Parks and Recreation, Planning and Zoning) Department and the Town of Sumpter collaborated across the planning process. After obtaining a grant from the CDBG-CLOSE program, Sauk County began focusing on property acquisition and site planning. Early efforts focused on property assessment and transferring the rights to Outlot 1, the future site of the park. The lot was chosen for its central location within the community as well and was originally planned as a green space area when the community was platted.

An organizational timeline was laid out for the planning process. Additional assistance was received from Planning and Engineering Firm Vierbicher in 2020 and Landscape Architecture Firm Damon-Farber starting in February 2021. Due to the complexities associated with CDBG funding, Vierbicher, was contracted to assist with the following CDBG requirements: historic preservation, environmental review, Davis Bacon / Section 3, and grant administration. Damon-Farber was hired for their expertise in park and engineering design, as well as for their assistance in gathering public input and drafting construction documents for the public bidding process.

Public Input

Based on the community-focused nature of the project, extensive attention to public input was given. Early interactions involved meeting with local leaders in the community, including the Bluffview Center of Hope pastors and the developer who created the Bluffview plat. During these interactions, focuses emerged on the need for play areas for children and spaces for general gathering. After this early outreach, Sauk County met with the Bluffview Homeowner's Association. Needs and desires for the project were discussed in addition to facilitating the transfer of Outlot 1 to the County. Property owners expressed concerns with having safe spaces for children to play, parking availability, and disturbing the geese that nest on the site.

While community-wide public input and all-ages design charrettes were planned to be held at the Outlot, the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and sudden temperature drops required the process to be completed at home. A "Design

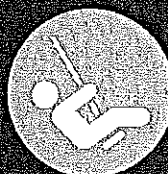
Your Own Bluffview Community Park" packet was created to allow households the opportunity to draw and attach park amenities to a map of the park. Particular emphasis was given to the existing pond area. The packet included an 11" x 17" overview map of the property with the Outlot boundaries marked, two cardstock sheets filled with park amenity cutouts, and activity instructions in both English and Spanish.

To carry out widespread community input, 320 packets were assembled for the 317 addresses recognized by the County. Of the 320 packets, 250 were handed out door-to-door throughout the community, including all apartments, trailers, duplexes, and single-family homes. Due to extensive construction occurring throughout the neighborhood, including interior and exterior work on apartment buildings and roadway reconstruction access to community members was limited. Many apartments appeared to be vacated due to construction. Staff were able to collect some input from individuals that gave direct input outdoors, while additional packets were given to the church for distribution. Of the 250 packets distributed, four were returned. Three of the four returned packets noted a preference for improving the pond by utilizing native plantings and reclaiming it to wetlands and a desire for making the park suitable for all ages.

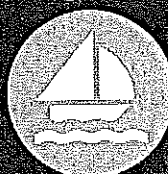
Community input was also conducted online with assistance from Damon Farber. These surveys were available to both Bluffview residents and the general public, receiving a much higher response with 87 participants. Nearly half (48.8%) of respondents reported living directly within the Bluffview Community. Survey questions focused on preferred types of recreation, preferred playground styles and themes, and general feedback. In general, the majority (55%) of respondents tended to gravitate towards the modern-style playground, with adventure-style (27%) and challenge-style (18%) following. The majority (58.3%) of those that selected the modern playground style stated that they appreciated most that it was good for all ages. The most popular park theme was whimsical and creative (49.4%), followed by nature-focused (32.2%) and Bluffview peoples through time (16.1%). Additional survey comments highlighted concerns with parking, handicap access, and safety.

PLANNING PRIORITIES

The Bluffview Community Park seeks to be a positive source of recreation and community-building for all Bluffview residents. To achieve this goal, the following priorities have been identified for the long-term maintenance and enhancement of the park: Community Safety, Equity and Accessibility, Land Acquisition, Natural Resource Management, and Outdoor Recreation.

Community Safety

Throughout the planning process, community safety frequently arose as an area of focus for Bluffview residents. There are a number of steps that can be taken to improve safety through the design of the park. Lighting will be installed near the playground as a preventative safety measure. Sufficient lighting helps promote higher visibility while dissuading illicit activity. Based on community input, additional lighting may be added with future improvements. Given that routine maintenance can work as a preventative measure towards crime, Sauk County will provide the area with regular maintenance and care.

It should be noted that the presence of parks with improved landscaping and community amenities can function as a robust source of crime deterrence. In a recent study, it was found that strong neighborhood parks with outdoor greenery led to greater neighborhood social ties and relationships, creating feelings of community and safety while encouraging desirable behavior (Shepley et al., 2019).

Likewise, the development of vibrant gathering spaces and parks has been shown in additional studies to put more “eyes on the street,” creating a natural and decentralized form of surveillance that discourages crime (Kuo & Sullivan, 2001). Given the centrality of Bluffview Community Park to the surrounding community and its potential for green spaces and dynamic gatherings, it is possible that the Bluffview Community may experience effects similar to those noted in the aforementioned studies.

Equity and Accessibility

Serving a relatively dense and diverse community, equity and accessibility will be key to the park's success. To ensure access by all community members, park access will be free. To ensure maximum accessibility, the Bluffview Community Park is to be fully compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). A newly paved trail will provide access into and through the park, and special playground surfacing allows safe access to all play features.

When determining future improvements and maintenance practices, equity and accessibility are to be assessed with all decisions. Future land acquisitions and improvements are to be fully ADA compliant. Continued maintenance will ensure that existing park infrastructure remains accessible.

Land Acquisition

To fulfill the intended goals of the Bluffview Community Park, acquisition of adjacent land may be considered. While current land allows for the creation of a robust community park, the addition of a parking lot and other improvements desired by the Community will likely require additional land. Land acquisition can help increase the range of available recreational opportunities and amenities, including: community gardens; increased designated recreational space; interpretive learning spaces; and a large shelter, or community building.

Natural Resource Management

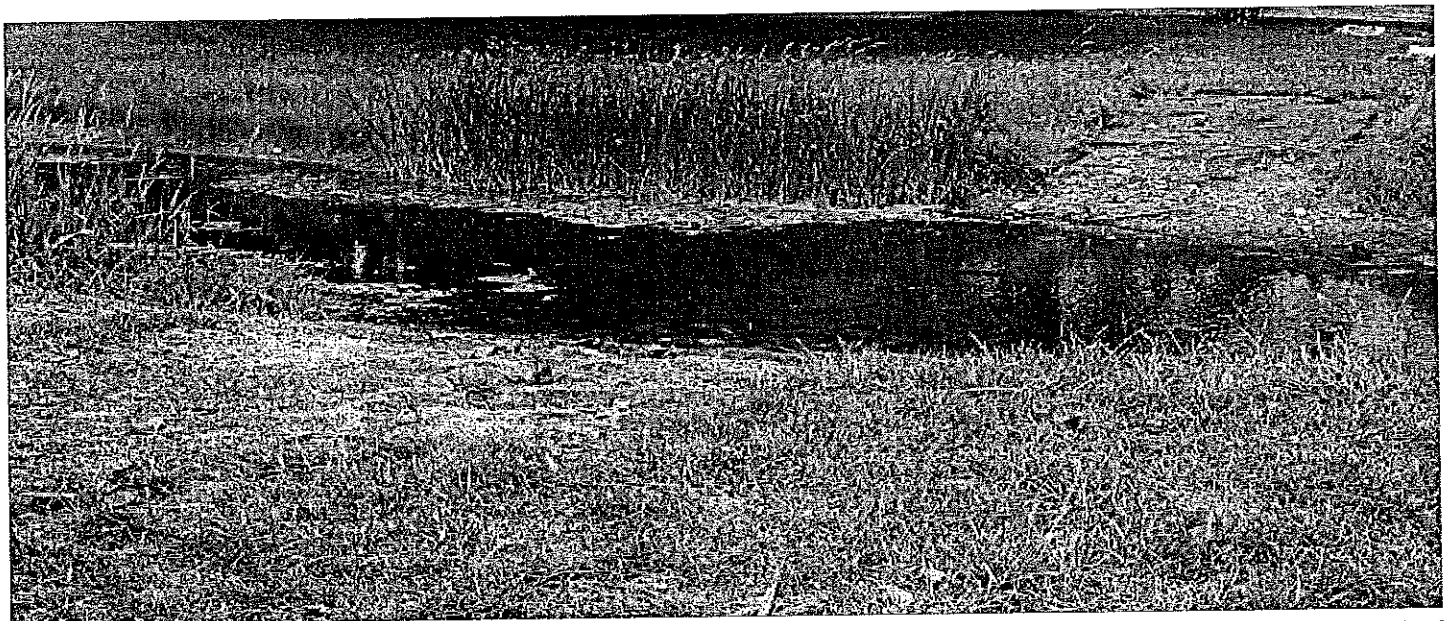
The Sauk County Department of Land Resources and Environment is committed to the sustainable management of natural resources within County-owned properties. Careful consideration has been enacted to ensure the maximum amount of green space is preserved with initial park installation and future improvements. All future maintenance and park improvements are to be done in accordance with the Sauk County Comprehensive Outdoor

Recreation Plan's value of stewardship of natural resources. Based on community input, special care will be given to the pond present on the site, with initial construction including a planting of native vegetation along the pond's shore. Future improvements will include replacement of the bridge to the island. Special attention will also be given to the protection of the site's geese population based on further community input.

Outdoor Recreation

As previously mentioned, there are currently few available outdoor recreation facilities within the Bluffview Community. Community demand among Bluffview residents for improved outdoor recreation opportunities is strong. Upon construction, Bluffview Community Park is to have multiple opportunities for recreation. A playground will be available for children, while various gathering spaces will be available for use among all ages. Open space will be maintained for various recreational activities.

Following construction, outdoor recreation will continue to be a preeminent priority for future park planning and management. Potential improvements include a flexible lawn, interpretive learning opportunities, and dedicated garden space. Maintenance will be enacted with regular care by Sauk County Parks and Recreation. Additional community input will help guide the future of outdoor recreation in Bluffview Community Park following construction.

IMPLEMENTATION

Implementation of strategic planning goals will take time and resources. Funding for the park's initial phase has been secured through the awarding of a CDBG-CLOSE award; however, more funds may be necessary for the general implementation and improvement of the park post-construction. Improvements and future land acquisitions will need supplemental funding.

The following tasks are outlined to implement and achieve the strategic planning initiatives outlined throughout the Master Plan. 'Immediate' tasks shall be implemented within 1 year utilizing CDBG funds. Tasks deemed 'future' should be implemented within 2-5 years as the opportunities become available and more information on park use develops.

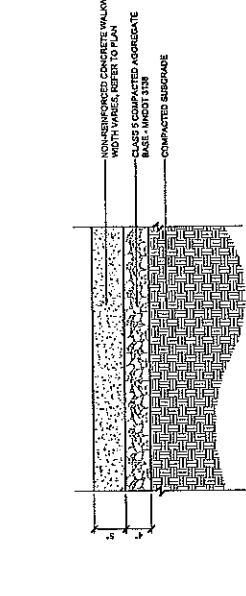
3 DETAIL - TYPICAL CONCRETE JOINTING

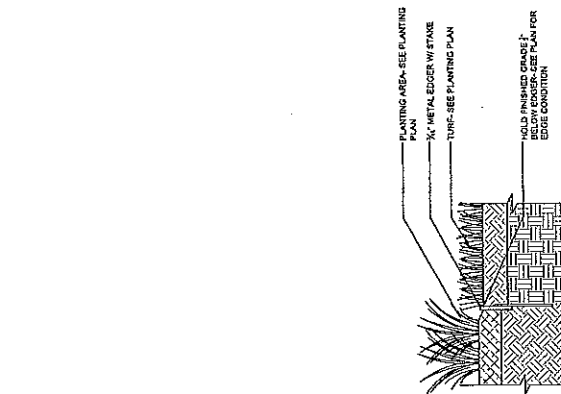

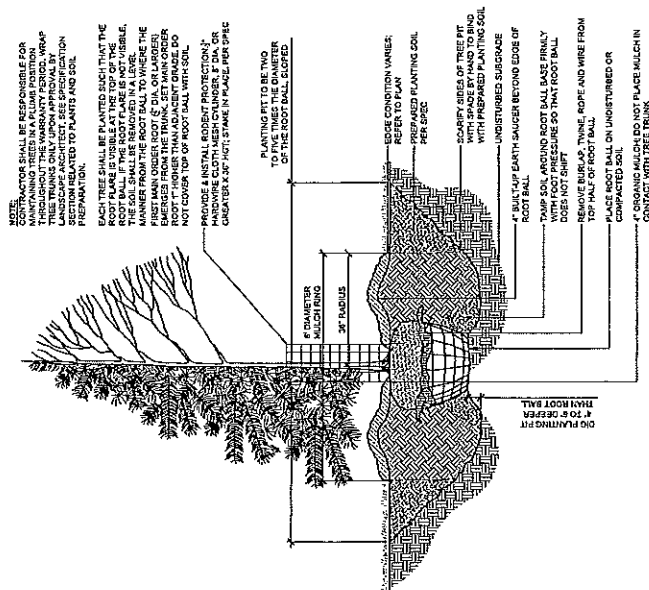
