Resolution to: Support the Regional EDA Application for Economic Development District

Resolution offered by the Economic Development Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Showing support for the Regional EDA Application for Economic Development District.

Sauk County is located within the six-county proposed Madison Region Economic Development District (EDD) in South Central Wisconsin. In 2019, the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) submitted by MadREP was approved by the Economic Development Administration (EDA). The approved CEDS includes the six Wisconsin counties of Columbia, Dane, Dodge, Jefferson, Rock, and Sauk, which together form the proposed Madison Region Economic Development District (EDD). Sauk County was an active participant in the completion of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) submitted to the Economic Development Administration (EDA). Forty-one census tracts in the proposed Madison Region Economic Development District (EDD) (one of which is in Sauk County) have felt the impact of adverse economic conditions and meet at least one applicable measure of economic distress for unemployment and per capita income as provided in 13 C.F.R. § 301.3 for the 24-month period ending December 2022.

Sauk County believes that the designation of the Madison Region as an Economic Development District (EDD) will help to ensure full cooperation among stakeholders in the Region, along with sustainable economic development actions. The designation of Economic Development District (EDD) includes the counties and area communities located within the district as part of a framework that complements the CEDS and creates a path for communities in the region to get projects funded from grant and aid assistance available through the Economic Development Administration (EDA).

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, as duly elected and authorized representatives of the people of Sauk County, do hereby support the designation of the six-county Madison Region, comprised of Columbia, Dane, Dodge, Jefferson, Rock and Sauk Counties, as a federally designated Economic Development District under 13 C.F.R. § 304.

RESOLUTION# 96-2022

Resolution to create the Committee on Consolidation of Committees.

Resolution offered by the Executive & Legislative Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The County Board changed the administrative structure of Sauk County by creating the County Administrator position. The change to an Administrator style of County government also means that the County Board can focus on its policy making role and rely on the Administrator to see that those policies are being followed/implemented which results in requiring less Committee oversight. Several committees are conducting very brief meetings as compared to 2019 and earlier. Additionally, there are several items that are routinely run through multiple committees because of the overlap in responsibilities. A number of counties across Wisconsin have reviewed their committee structures and found ways to merge committees reducing the number of required meetings and saving their county's expense in Supervisor per diem and mileage along with staff time, and other related expenses. This committee will see if there are similar opportunities in Sauk County and shall provide a report to the County Board no later than October 2023 for consideration as part of the 2024 budget and prior to the candidate filing period for the 2024 Supervisor elections that begins in December 2023.

The Committee on Consolidation of Committees shall consist of 10 County Board Supervisors appointed by the County Board Chair. The Committee may call upon Department Heads and other staff to complete their assigned duties.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the Committee on the Consolidation of Committees is hereby created; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Committee on the Consolidation of Committees shall consist of 10 County Board Supervisors appointed by the County Board Chair and may call upon Department Heads and staff for assistance in completing the duties of the Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Committee on Consolidation of Committees is charged with the duty to review the current Sauk County Committee structure and make recommendations to the full County Board regarding consolidation of standing committees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee on the Consolidation of Committees shall present their findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the full County Board no later than the October 2023 County Board meeting.

RESOLUTION # 97-2022

Resolution to deny a proposed rezone petition 25-2022

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Paul Lucht owns property in the SW ¼, NW ¼, Section 2, T13N, R3E, Town of La Valle, and has requested a map amendment (rezoning) of property legally described pursuant to petition 25-2022 from Agriculture Zoning District to Commercial Zoning District. The intent of the map amendment (rezoning) is to allow the property owner to apply for a permit for an outdoor retail establishment to advertise and sell garden sheds and trailers.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §59.69(5) Sauk County has the authority to develop, adopt, and amend a zoning ordinance. At a public hearing held by the Land Resources and Environment (LRE) Committee on September 27, 2022, and recommended denial of rezone petition 25-2022.

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §66.1001 Wisconsin Statutes, any program or action of a local governmental unit that affects land use shall be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The Town of La Valle does not support the proposed rezone from an Agriculture to a Commercial zoning district as it is a spot zone not supported by their comprehensive plan. The requested rezone application would take a small area of property and amend its zoning inconsistently with the surrounding property.

The Land Resources and Environment Committee, being fully informed of the facts and after full consideration of the matter, made the following findings and recommendation, which the Sauk County Board of Supervisors has determined are reasonable. The Town Board of the Town of La Valle is opposed to the rezone because rezoning of part of this lot from Agriculture Zoning District to Commercial Zoning District would not be consistent with the Town of La Valle's Comprehensive Plan. If approved, the rezone would create a small commercial development surrounded by agricultural land. The Land Resources and Environment Committee reviewed §7.150(9) of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance. The Committee concluded the following:

1. The proposed change is not consistent with the Town of La Valle's Comprehensive Plan.
2. The uses permitted by the proposed change are not appropriate for the area.
3. The Town of La Valle did not support the rezone request. (Copy attached)

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors accepts the foregoing as the Land Resources and Environment report recommending denial of rezone petition 25-2022, to rezone property from Agriculture Zoning District to Commercial Zoning District described as SW ¼, NW ¼, Section 2, T13N, R3E, Town of La Valle.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that rezone petition 25-2022, to rezone property from Agriculture Zoning District to Commercial Zoning District described as SW ¼, NW ¼, Section 2, T13N, R3E, Town of La Valle is hereby denied. Within seven (7) days of passage, the County Clerk shall send a certified copy along with the results of the County Board's decision to the petitioner and the La Valle Town Clerk.

RESOLUTION # 98-2022

Resolution Authorizing the Director of Land Resources and Environment to Submit Grant Application for Surface Water Grant Program

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND:

Being fortunate to have an abundance of water resources, Sauk County recognizes the negative impacts aquatic invasive species can have on rivers, lakes, and streams. Prevention measures as well as outreach and educational programming are critical components to protecting our water resources. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources administers the Surface Water Grant Program that supports efforts to protect water resources, including through watercraft inspection, monitoring, and early detection of aquatic invasive species, and other activities related to aquatic invasive species prevention.

Historically, counties and other organizations were required to apply for grant funding on an annual basis. Starting in 2020, a predetermined funding amount is allocated to each county annually. Counties have the option to receive the funds directly or designate an agent to accept those funds and implement these activities on the county's behalf. In 2021, the Upper Sugar River Watershed Association (USRWA) became the designated agent for Sauk County. A Cooperative Agreement is in place which outlines the responsibilities of the county and USRWA. In order for USRWA to receive and utilize these funds, Sauk County must submit a surface water grant application.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session and authorizes the Land Resources and Environment Director to submit the surface water grant application.







10 **BACKGROUND:**

11
12 Sauk County Code, Chapter 5 Section 5.06(3) sets the costs associated with housing
13 prisoners in both Huber and under home detention and bracelet monitoring, also referred
14 to as electronic monitoring (EM). The cost set by ordinance for EM has not changed
15 since 2006. Much has changed related to technological advancements, deputy wages,
16 and overall inflation in the following 17 years. The program can now implement home
17 breath alcohol monitoring at an additional expense. Neighboring and similarly sized
18 agencies currently charge an average of approximately \$25 per day for EM.
19

20 The exact daily fee for Huber inmates is no longer specified by ordinance. This allows
21 the sheriff the adjust the rate based on actual cost and can also consider the number of
22 hours the prisoner is employed. Having the same flexibility with the EM rate as the
23 Huber rate would be beneficial as it allows the rate to keep pace with program financial
24 and technological changes and be responsive to special circumstances. The ordinance
25 provides for Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee oversight in the form of an
26 annual report related to the current rates.
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30 **NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES**
31 **ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

32 Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in

- 43 (1) Responsibility of "Huber Law" prisoners. A "Huber Law" prisoner, Wis. Stats. §
44 303.08, who is gainfully employed or receives unemployment compensation or
45 employment training benefits while in the jail shall be liable for the cost of
46 maintenance and board as specified in subsection (3).
47 (2) Prisoners held for other agencies. Any other agency shall be liable for the costs of
48 maintenance and board, as specified in subsection (3), of all prisoners confined in
49 the Sauk County Jail at the other agency's request.
50 (3) Costs: The cost of maintenance and board for prisoners confined under the "Huber
51 Law" and home detention and bracelet monitoring shall be established by the

sheriff based upon the cost of maintenance and board per day for prisoners, and the number of hours the prisoner is working in remunerative employment. The sheriff shall provide an annual report to the Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee regarding rates established under this section. The cost of maintenance and board per day for prisoners held at the request of other agencies may be negotiated and set by the sheriff but shall not be set at an amount that is less than the actual costs of maintenance and board for a single prisoner for one day.

- (4) Special arrangements. The sheriff, with the approval of the Law Enforcement Committee, may arrange with other agencies for the maintenance and board of prisoners in the Sauk County Jail pursuant to terms other than those provided here, where such special arrangements are deemed necessary in the public interest. Report shall be made at the next County Board meeting of any such arrangements.

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9 **BACKGROUND:**

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11 Sauk County Code Chapter 11 incorporates several provisions of Wisconsin Criminal
12 Code into the Sauk County Code of Ordinances with the stated purpose of promoting
13 public peace and order. From a law enforcement and judicial prospective, regulating
14 certain prohibited conduct through both criminal law and county ordinance provides
15 greater latitude in the enforcement and prosecution of offenses. The ability to handle
16 some offenses as ordinance violations can alleviate strain on the Courts and provide a
17 better outcome for the violator while still achieving the desired punitive and corrective
18 results.

19
20 Two specific Wisconsin Statutes govern conduct prohibited based where the conduct
21 occurred to include county jails as an applicable location. Wis. §946.73 establishes a
22 Class C misdemeanor for violating any lawful rule of a penal institution. Wis. §302.095
23 establishes a Class I Felony for delivering articles to inmates or possessing prohibited
24 articles in a jail. The Sauk County Jail also has an inmate rulebook governing inmate
25 behavior and an internal disciplinary system with sanctions for violations. There is
26 currently not a county ordinance adopting the above-referenced state statutes, leaving a
27 broad gap between criminal offenses and jail rule violations. The creation of the
28 proposed ordinances would allow greater flexibility and options for both jail and judicial
29 staff when addressing these prohibited activities within the Sauk County Jail.

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34 **NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES**
35 **ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

36 Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in

- (d) A lockup facility, as defined in s. 302.30.
- (2)
- (a) Any officer or other person who does any of the following contrary to the rules or regulations and without the knowledge or permission of the sheriff or other keeper of the jail, may be penalized as provided in this chapter:
1. Delivers, procures to be delivered, or has in his or her possession with intent to deliver to any inmate confined in a jail, any article or thing whatever, with intent that any inmate confined in the jail shall obtain or receive the same.
 2. Deposits or conceals in or about a jail, or the precincts of a jail, or in any vehicle going into the premises belonging to a jail, any article or thing whatever, with intent that any inmate confined in the jail shall obtain or receive the same.
 3. Receives from any inmate any article or thing whatever with intent to convey the same out of a jail.
- (b) Any person who, contrary to the rules or regulations and without the knowledge or permission of the sheriff or other keeper of the jail, has in his or her possession with intent to retain for himself or herself any article or thing whatever.

Sec. 11.16 – Violation of County Jail Rules

(1). Whoever violates any lawful rule made pursuant to state law governing the Sauk County Jail or Huber Facility while within the same or the grounds thereof may be penalized as provided in this chapter.

Sec. 11.17 - Penalty.

The penalty for violating any section of this chapter shall be a forfeiture of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$1,000.00 together with court costs and fees prescribed by Wis. 


