RULES OF THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

As proposed for adoption by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors on April 15, 2014

RULE I. BOARD ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS.

- A. As provided by statute, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors ("Board") shall organize on the third Tuesday of April in even numbered years and adopt rules and regulations for the ensuing term. Regular and special meetings of the Board shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 59.11. The Board shall hold an annual meeting on the Tuesday after the second Monday of November in each year for the purpose of transacting business and the adoption of the budget. When the day of the meeting falls on November 11, the meeting shall be held on the next succeeding day.
- B. The Chairperson of the County Board ("Chair") and Vice-Chairperson ("Vice-Chair") shall be elected biennially by the Board at the April meeting in even-numbered years. Such officers shall take office upon election.
- C. The Board shall meet regularly in the County Board Room on the third Tuesday of each month except as provided in Rule I.A. above. Regular meetings of the full Board shall commence at 6:00 P.M. Any vote to adjourn to a different time or place for convening a regular meeting shall require approval by two-thirds of the members present.
- D. The Chair shall preserve order and decorum. The Chair may speak to points of order in preference to other members, and shall recite questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board by any two members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the Board. He or she shall vote on all roll calls, except upon appeals from his or her own decision. The Chair may participate in debate following the same rules as any other supervisor.
- E. The Board aspires to encourage appropriate dress by board members that reflects the professionalism of the Board. Business casual or more formal attire is encouraged.
- F. All comments, debates and discussions shall be appropriate and to the point of the topic under discussion, and conducted in a manner that is civil, and respectful of all concerned.

RULE II. AGENDA.

- A. The order of business of Board meetings shall be as stated on the agenda for each session. The agenda shall be the responsibility of the Chair with the assistance of the Administrative Coordinator and the County Clerk and be circulated to the Board not less than two days before each meeting.
- B. The format for the agenda at the April organizational meeting held in even-numbered years shall be as follows:
 - 1. Call to order.
 - 2. Invocation and pledge of allegiance.
 - 3. Verification of credentials and roll call.
 - 4. Administration of oath of office.
 - 5. Adoption of Rules of the Board.
 - 6. Adoption of agenda.
 - 7. Approval of the minutes of the previous meeting.

- 8. Designation of official newspaper.
- 9. Election of a Chair and Vice-Chair.
- 10. Election of at-large members of Executive & Legislative Committee. (Proceed in accordance with regular meeting agenda, see II.C. 6. through 15.)

C. Regular Meeting Agenda.

RULE III. RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES.

- A. In order to provide advance notice to the Board, all items to be included on the agenda shall be submitted to the Office of the Administrative Coordinator by the Tuesday preceding the meeting, and any item substantially affecting matters within the jurisdiction of a standing committee of the Board shall first be reviewed by the appropriate committee prior to its presentation to the Board, except under emergency conditions so declared and approved by a majority vote of the Board; any person seeking to have an item presented for possible action on an emergency basis shall be responsible to have the Chair authorize compliance with the Open Meetings Law in a timely fashion.
- B. Items may be included on the general consent portion of the agenda provided the matter was unanimously adopted by the sponsoring committee and the matter under consideration has no financial or public policy impact and is of a non-controversial nature. No ordinance shall be included in the general consent portion of the agenda. When the general consent portion of the agenda is placed before the Board for consideration, the Chair shall ask if any member of the Board objects to any item being considered by general consent. Any item placed on the general consent portion of the agenda may be placed under the new business portion of the agenda, and considered separately, upon the request of any supervisor, and without a motion and second, provided such request is made prior to a vote on the general consent portion of the agenda by the Board. If there is no objection to any item, the Chair will request a motion to approve the general consent portion of the agenda, and the regular procedures for adoption of a resolution shall apply to the general consent portion of the agenda. All the resolutions considered by general consent shall be adopted by the vote on that portion of the agenda.
- C. It shall be the responsibility of the sponsoring committee or supervisor to have the matter prepared in the form to be acted on and to have a fiscal note attached. All resolutions involving the expenditure or receipt of funds shall carry a fiscal note using a form approved by the Finance Committee which details the resolution's impact upon County finances. A resolution which does not have attached a fiscal note approved and initialed by the County Controller shall not be considered by the Board until

such a note is provided. All resolutions shall contain a Management Information Systems note. All resolutions shall be reviewed by the Corporation Counsel and approved as to form prior to inclusion in the agenda.

D. Any subject that comes before the Board without a committee recommendation or resolution may be referred to the appropriate committee by the Chair without motion. Resolutions brought forward by individual supervisors must be presented to all committees having jurisdiction over the proposed matter. Except under emergency conditions as provided in Rule III. A., only after at least one committee having jurisdiction over the matter has approved the resolution shall it be in order for the Board to consider the resolution.

RULE IV. ORGANIZATION.

- A. In addition to presiding at meetings, the supervisor elected Chair by the Board, pursuant to Rule I.B., shall upon election, assume all the responsibilities and perform all duties required of the Chair, until the Board elects a successor
- B. In case of the absence or inability of the Chair for any meeting, the Vice-Chair shall perform the duties of the Chair. In case of the absence or inability of both the Chair and Vice-Chair for any meeting, the members shall choose a temporary Chair by a majority vote of the members present. In the case of the permanent absence or inability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall become Chair, and a new Vice-Chair shall be elected by the Board.
- C. The Chair is authorized to attend meetings and conferences on matters related to county government and may direct the attendance of the Vice-Chair or some other members of the Board, either in place of the Chair, or along with the Chair, however per diem shall not be payable unless authorized in accordance with Rule V.A. The Chair shall serve as the County's voting delegate at the Annual Convention of the Wisconsin Counties Association. The Chair shall serve on the following: Madison Area Technical College Appointment Board, Western Wisconsin Technical College District Board, and WIRED Leadership Caucus.
- D. If a vacancy occurs on the Board, the Chair is authorized to appoint a qualified elector of the supervisory district wherein the vacancy occurs to fill the unexpired term. Such appointment shall be subject to approval of the Board at the next regular Board meeting following appointment by the Chair. A supervisor filling a vacancy shall automatically be assigned to the same committees as his or her predecessor in office with the exception of a member of the Executive & Legislative Committee which shall be elected by the Board.
- E. Supervisors appointed to special committees, boards, and commissions shall serve on those bodies only so long as they remain members of the Board unless a state statute or county ordinance provides otherwise. At the point in time that a supervisor is no longer a member of the Board, the position on the special committee, board, or commission shall be deemed vacant, and the Chair shall appoint a new individual, who must be a member of the Board, to fill the unexpired term on the body. A former supervisor may only fill a citizen member position on a special committee, board or commission if the former supervisor's continued service will result in no diminution of representation on the body by members of the Board.
 - F. The Administrative Coordinator shall attend Board meetings.

- G. The Corporation Counsel shall attend Board meetings and serve as parliamentarian and legal advisor to the Board.
- H. A minimum of one day of education for members of the Board shall be set by the Chair, said day of education to be held every two years. The Chair may set additional days of education for Board members.
- I. The Board may choose to have a special meeting of the Board prior to April of odd-numbered years for the purpose of planning, and the Board may adopt a two-year plan for the purpose of establishing goals and objectives for the Board through the ensuing two-year Board term. It is understood that the two-year plan is simply a planning document and has no power to bind the actions of the Board or individual supervisors.
- J. Supervisors are required by law to sign or indicate their vote on any question presented to the Board, except in an election when voting for the officers chairperson or vice-chairperson of the Board other or the officers of another governing body. When written ballots are used, supervisors shall indicate their vote by placing their district number on the reverse side of the ballot. In any election by the Board, the first ballot shall be the nominating ballot, to be followed by succeeding formal ballots until a majority vote of the members present elects. Only persons named on a nominating ballot shall be considered during a formal ballot, and any ballot cast in violation of this rule shall be considered void.
- K. The standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairperson, in consultation with the Executive & Legislative Committee, subject to the approval of the Board. Committee appointments shall be presented for approval at the next meeting of the Board following the date of organization. The Executive & Legislative Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairperson as soon as practical after the organizational meeting to consult on committee appointments. After consultation, the new, tentative committees appointed by the Chairperson shall serve prior to approval by the Board during the period between the organizational meeting and the regular meeting in May, where consideration by the Board shall take place.
- L. A chair, vice-chair and secretary for each committee shall be selected by each committee's membership.
- M. If the position of chair on a committee becomes vacant, the vice-chair becomes chair and an election shall be held to fill the position of vice-chair and any other subsequent vacancies.
- N. Removal of a supervisor from a committee. A supervisor may only be removed from a committee by the County Board Chairperson with the approval of the County Board by a two-thirds vote of the Board members present.
- O. Resignation by supervisor from a committee. If a supervisor wishes to resign from a committee, permission must be requested from the Board. Permission of the Board can be given through unanimous consent or a motion that is debatable and amendable. Once the request is granted, the vacancy is handled as any other vacancy.
 - P. Matters Pertaining to Standing Committees of the Board:
 - 1. A supervisor shall serve as a committee member until the first Board meeting following the spring election.

- 2. Whenever two or more committees meet jointly, a quorum of each committee participating in the joint meeting is required. A supervisor who serves on two or more of the committees may be counted toward a quorum of more than one of the committees meeting jointly. The joint committees shall vote to select one chair of one of the participating committees to serve as chair of the joint meeting.
- 3. Supervisors are expected to attend the committee meetings of the committees to which they are assigned. When a supervisor cannot attend a meeting, it is the responsibility of the supervisor to request excusal from the chair of the committee.
- 4. A County Board member attending a committee meeting of a committee on which they do not serve, shall be given the opportunity to address said committee at least once, for a period of time which is at least equal to the time allowed for individual speakers at public comment, provided the matter to be addressed is a matter that is on that committee's properly posted agenda. If enough supervisors who are not on that committee attend so as to constitute an unnoticed quorum of the County Board or any other committee, board, or commission of the County, the non-committee members attending are not permitted to address the committee at that meeting because to do so would violate the Open Meetings Law. The decision to allow the supervisor to speak more than once is within the discretion of the chair of the committee. The chair's decision may be overruled by a majority vote of the committee.
- 5. A County Board member may be excluded from a closed session of a committee of the Board by a majority vote of the committee if the closed session directly concerns the county board member, a relative of the county board member, or someone maintaining a confidential relationship with the county board member. For purposes of this rule, the term "relative" includes aunt, brother, child, daughter-in-law, father-in-law, first cousin, foster child, grandparent, mother-in-law, nephew, niece, parent, sister, son-in-law, spouse or person in a marriage-like relationship, stepbrother, stepchild, stepparent, stepsister, or uncle. The term "confidential relationship" includes professional relationships, such as those between attorney and client, medical provider and patient, or religious counselor and petitioner; personal relationships, such as those in which there is a long personal friendship and mutual trust between the parties; and legal relationships, such as those where the member is an employee, official, or officer of an adverse party in a legal matter. This rule is not meant to restrict any other power that the Board may have with respect to exclusion of members or personal decisions by individuals to excuse him or herself for ethical reasons.
- 6. Each committee shall, at its first meeting following the organizational meeting of the Board, select those officers required by Rule IV.M., and it shall thereafter be the responsibility of said officers to ensure that accurate, written minutes are made of each meeting of the committee and submitted to the County Clerk for filing. The presiding officer at any meeting shall ensure compliance with the Open Meetings Law.
- 7. No more than one supervisor may serve on both the Finance and the Personnel Committee.
- Q. Special committees, boards, special appointments and commissions shall be selected or appointed by the Chair with the approval of the Board. These committees, boards and commissions shall select their own chair. The Chair shall notify the supervisors of proposed appointments by United States Mail no later than the Thursday afternoon prior to the scheduled meeting of the Board at which the appointments will be voted upon. If an appointment is to be considered at a special meeting of the Board,

the Chair shall provide notice by United States Mail no later than five days prior to the date of the special meeting.

R. As far as practicable and with prior chair approval, standing and special committee members may participate in committee meetings via telephonic conferencing, however those members appearing by phone for meetings that take place within Sauk County will not count toward quorum, may not vote, and shall not receive per diem compensation. At no time shall more than one committee member be participating by telephone. Upon prior approval by the Executive and Legislative Committee, committee members may count toward quorum, may vote and are eligible to receive per diem compensation for telephonic meetings where the committee meeting is convened outside of Sauk County.

RULE V. COMPENSATION.

- A. Supervisors shall be authorized up to a maximum of 90 days' compensation (at a per diem rate of \$60.00 for each day of attendance when the Board is in session and meetings, and \$50.00 for other authorized service including committee meetings), plus mileage and reimbursement of authorized expenses, for committee work when attending committee meetings of which they are members, or as chair of a committee (or their designee) when attending a committee meeting of which they are not a member for the purpose of providing testimony on an issue. Authorized service includes service required by ordinance or resolution. The maximum limits established for committee work shall be in addition to the per diems and mileage supervisors are entitled to receive for attendance at meetings of the Board and exclusive of per diems paid by non-county boards or commissions where the payment of the per diem or mileage is not made from County funds.
- B. As provided by Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2), no supervisor shall be allowed pay for committee service while the Board is in session, but the Board may authorize payment of per diem, mileage and reimbursement for other expenses for attendance at any school, institute or meeting which the Board directs them to attend. Each standing committee is specifically authorized to send up to two (2) members to up to two (2) conventions (including conferences and other trainings) per County fiscal year. The convention cannot exceed three (3) days or be farther than three hundred (300) miles. All other requests require approval by a majority of the Board. Wis. Stat. § 59.13(2).
- C. Any increase in the number of days of committee work for which supervisors may be paid compensation and mileage in any year shall require approval by two-thirds vote of the members of the Board present, prior to payment. In addition to the above, the Chair shall receive compensation for performance of the duties of that office. The Chair is authorized to act as a member of all committees in an *ex officio* capacity, and per diem shall be paid under this rule for attendance at all committee meetings attended by the Chair.
- D. The supervisor elected Chair shall be entitled to receive the compensation provided for the part-time position of Chair consisting of a salary of \$400.00 per month in addition to any other per diem and mileage entitlement available to other supervisors in accordance with Rule V.A., as provided by Sauk Co. Code § 35.03.

RULE VI. PROCEDURE.

A. After the County Clerk has read a proposed resolution or ordinance, and the resolution or ordinance is properly on the floor, the Chair shall call upon the maker of the motion who may defer to the chair of the appropriate committee, or an appropriate County staff person, for any statement or

explanation. All resolutions and ordinances which have been made available to supervisors shall be read by title and resolve or ordained clause only, unless otherwise required. The Board may vote to dispense with the reading of a particular resolve or ordained clause if said clause is particularly voluminous and the resolution or ordinance has been included in written form within the agenda and provided to supervisors in advance. Legal descriptions need not be read, provided the resolution or ordinance has been provided within the agenda and provided to supervisors in advance.

- B. In presenting business or debate, members shall address the Chair, be recognized, and when in order, proceed without any interruption. Any person, not a Board member, may address the Board for a period of time not to exceed three minutes during the public comment period indicated on the agenda. A request to speak at any other time by any person, not a Board member, must be approved by two-thirds vote of supervisors present. The Chair may authorize the appearance of a person not a member of the Board if the appearance is included in the agenda. In all cases, personalities shall be avoided and propriety observed. In case more than one member shall seek recognition to address the Board, the Chair shall decide who has precedence.
- C. Any member wishing to speak to a question shall be permitted to do so at least once, and a motion for the previous question shall not be in order until every member has had such opportunity. No member may speak twice on any question until every member choosing to speak has spoken; nor shall any member, or other person, speak more than three minutes upon being recognized on a question.
- D. All members present in the assembly hall when the question is put shall be required to vote unless the Chair, for appropriate reasons, shall excuse any member. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the Board divides, or before a call of ayes or nays is commenced, and the question shall then be taken without further debate. A member of the Board who has a conflict of interest pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 19.59 or Sauk Co. Code Ch. 36, <u>Code of Ethics</u>, shall, prior to the commencement of discussion or consideration of the matter, declare same and request to be excused by the Chair from the Board Room during discussion, consideration and voting on said matter. The Chair shall be excused by the Vice-Chair, for appropriate reasons.
- E. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if called for by the Chair or any member of the Board. After motion is made and stated by the Chair, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Board, but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.
- F. In every instance, a motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, for previous question and for limited debate shall be decided without discussion.
- G. These rules may be suspended or amended by a two-thirds vote of all members present. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 2010 (11th) Edition, shall govern the proceedings of the Board in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Rules or the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- H. All votes on resolutions or ordinances shall be recorded roll call votes. If the electronic voting system is not operational, the Board may, by a two-thirds vote, approve voice voting on any resolution which does not otherwise require a roll call or supermajority vote by law.
- I. Any budget alterations shall require authorization by two-thirds of the membership of the Board, except that the Finance Committee may authorize transfers of funds between budgeted items of an individual office, department or activity which have been separately appropriated by the Board in its budget, in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 65.90(5).

J. When a motion has been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move for reconsideration thereof on the same or succeeding day, but in no case at a subsequent meeting of the Board. Such motion shall take precedence over all other questions except a motion to adjourn.

RULE VII. FINANCIAL POLICY.

- A. The Chair and the County Clerk shall issue County orders in favor of the several County offices for their respective salaries and for all bills allowed and appropriations made by this Board.
- B. All members of the Board who are to be reimbursed for committee work shall submit vouchers to the County Clerk on a monthly basis, to be placed on file with other current claims or accounts to be authorized for payment at regular Finance Committee meetings. Per diem and mileage paid Board members through any calendar year shall be compiled in the Accounting Department and approved by the Board prior to annual publication in March of the following year.
- C. No current claim or account to be paid from funds previously appropriated for any item by the Board in the Budget shall be allowed, nor order passed whereby any money is paid out or expended, until said claim or account has been referred to the appropriate department committee and report made thereof as directed by said committee. Individual expenditures exceeding \$10,000 shall be specifically approved by the Board except as otherwise provided by ordinance or statute.
- D. All claims or accounts for disbursements made by any County official must be itemized and contain sufficient information to identify proper budget authorization.
- E. The Administrative Coordinator, with the assistance of the County Controller, shall keep the Board informed of the financial condition of the County and shall submit complete quarterly financial statements to the Board.
- F. No claim by any County officer or employee for payment of costs or reimbursement of expenses shall be paid in connection with attendance at or travel to any convention, conference, seminar, training session, symposium, etc., which is held at a location greater than 300 miles from the county seat unless the particular department's oversight committee, and both the Personnel and Finance Committees, have first specifically authorized such attendance.

RULE VIII. OPEN MEETINGS.

- A. It is declared to be the policy of Sauk County that the public is entitled to the fullest and most complete information regarding the affairs of County government as is compatible with the conduct of County affairs and the transaction of County business. Wis. Stat. §§ 19.80 to 19.98 are to be complied with by all members at all meetings of public nature. The Board and its committees shall "sit with open doors," and timely notification of all public meetings, time, date, place and subject matter shall be given, including the specifics for any contemplated closed session.
- B. No public notice is required for a meeting of a sub-unit which may be held during a recess of, or immediately following, a meeting of the parent group, provided the Chair has publicly announced in advance at that meeting the time, place and subject matter of the sub-unit meeting.

RULE IX. STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

AGING & DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER COMMITTEE

Responsible for providing services to the general public with respect to matters related to aging and disability and to improve the life of those with aging and disability related issues. Responsible for providing services to veterans pursuant to Wis. Stat. Ch. 45. This committee will serve as the official statutory Commission on Aging pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4) and shall be advised by the Aging, and Disability Advisory Committee. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following departments: Veterans Service Officer and Aging and Disability Resource Center. Sauk Co. Code Ch. 16. Members: 5.

CONSERVATION, PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE

Responsible for policy direction for County planning, land use regulations, surveying, remonumentation, mapping and uniform rural building identification system, land records modernization activities. Serves as the County Zoning Agency pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.69. Responsible for natural resource management, resource conservation and environmental protection including soils, water, forestry and wildlife resources through participation in various federal, state and local programs. Responsible for developing sustainable practices within County operations and serving in an advisory capacity regarding "green technologies." Oversees operation of farmland located at the original Sauk County Health Care Center and environmental obligations associated with the closed Sauk County landfill. Serves as the Farmland Preservation Review Committee. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following department: Conservation, Planning & Zoning Department. Members: 7; 1 Citizen who meets the requirements of Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), 6 Supervisors. 2 members must also be members of the UW Extension, Arts & Culture Committee. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)(2), the chair of the Sauk County Farm Services Agency Committee or designee shall be a member of the Committee but shall refrain from discussion and voting on any matter where the Committee is acting as the County Zoning Agency. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 92.06(1)(b)1 two members of the committee shall also be members of the UW Extension, Arts & Culture Committee. Members of this committee shall serve on the lake protection districts. Provides policy direction and oversight to the following departments: Conservation, Planning & Zoning; County Surveyor; Land Information Officer; Register of Deeds; and Mapping.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Responsible for coordination of County economic development initiatives with County Planners and Sauk County Development Corporation. Involved in strategic resource planning initiatives. Reviews matters which affect growth and development of Sauk County, and economic development of communications network. Responsible for County coordinated transportation, including overseeing the Tri-County Airport Commission, municipal airports, Pink Lady Rail Transit Commission and Wisconsin River Rail Transit Commission. Responsible for the study, review and recommendation regarding freight, passenger and commuter rail development, intercity and commuter bus services and development, and the provision and coordination of rural and commuter transit services. Comprised of members from: Property and Insurance Committee; Conservation, Planning & Zoning Committee; UW Extension, Arts, & Culture Committee; and Highway Committee. Transit is governed by Wis. Stat. § 59.58 (2009).

Members: 7. The County Board Chairperson is the chair of the Economic Development Committee.

EXECUTIVE & LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Responsible for proposing amendments and monitoring the operation of Rules of the Board; responsible for the conduct of all intergovernmental relations and affairs; monitors State legislative and administrative activity affecting Sauk County; proposes legislation or action on pending legislation affecting Sauk County; considers matters not specifically assigned to other committees. Responsible for the overall information technology requirements for all departments and agencies of Sauk County. Provides overall planning and long range forecasting for the information systems needs of Sauk County. Responsible for policy direction and oversight to the following departments: Administrative Coordinator, Corporation Counsel, County Clerk, Management Information Systems, Emergency Management. The Executive & Legislative Committee shall be composed of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board, and three (3) additional members to be elected at large by the Board pursuant to Rule II.B.10., above. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board shall serve in the same roles on the Executive & Legislative Committee, and the County Clerk shall serve as secretary to this committee. The Administrative Coordinator, Corporation Counsel, and County Clerk shall serve as ex officio members of this committee without voting privileges. Members: 5.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Responsible for financial policy initiation and review of all County fiscal matters, including development of annual County operating budget. Reviews County investment and banking policies; reviews and approves for payment monthly reports of bills from the Accounting Department; manages County general fund and contingency fund; reviews per diem and mileage for all committees, commissions, boards or councils; recommends approval of County audit report; receives all special gifts and grants made in favor of the County. Meets jointly with Personnel Committee to address strategic resource personnel planning. Provides policy direction and oversight to following departments: Accounting and County Treasurer. Members: 5.

HEALTH CARE CENTER BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Responsible for policy direction and oversight of the Sauk County Health Care Center pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.18 and Sauk Co. Code Ch. 46. When a supervisor member shall no longer be a member of the Board of Supervisors, that member shall complete the term of office to which they were appointed. However, the next vacancy on the Board of Trustees shall be filled so as to maintain the balance of four supervisor and three citizen members. The chair and vice-chair of the Health Care Center Board of Trustees also serve as chair and vice-chair of the Board of Directors of the Health Care Center Foundation. Members: 7; 3 citizen, 4 supervisors.

HIGHWAY & PARKS COMMITTEE

Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 83.015(1) (c) (2009), this Committee is designated the County Highway Committee and each member is appointed and vacancies filled pursuant to the procedures contained in these Rules. The Committee shall have five (5) members composed of Sauk County Supervisors who shall serve for the same term as supervisors appointed to standing committees of the Board. Responsible for policy direction in design, construction and maintenance of all County roads; expenditure of highway maintenance funds received from the state or County. Provides policy direction and oversight to the Highway Department. Establishes policies relating to planning,

acquisition, development and maintenance of County owned park and recreation sites. Responsible for the development and implementation of the Sauk County Outdoor Recreation Plan. Responsible for policy direction and oversight for the following departments: Highway Department and Parks Department. Wis. Stat. § 83.015 (2009). Members: 5.

HUMAN SERVICES BOARD

Responsible for policy direction and oversight for Human Services Department pursuant to Wis. Stat. chs. 46 and 51 and Wis. Stat. § 59.53 to oversee social services and community programs. Further authority is found in Sauk Co. Code Ch. 2. <u>Members: 9:</u> 3 citizen, 6 supervisors.

LAW ENFORCEMENT & JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

Responsible for exploration of justice alternatives. Ordinance Amendment regarding Vacation Rentals

After a properly scheduled public hearing on February 19, 2014 and a regularly scheduled meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Merrimac held on March 5, 2014, the board approved Town ordinance #2014-14 amending the town's ordinance to allow for property owners to create vacation rentals when approve by the Town Board as a conditional use.

At issue is the town's room tax ordinance #01-78 adopted on February 7, 1978 requiring anyone who rents a room on a transient basis, as defined by Wis. Stat. 66.015. While attempting to collect delinquent room tax against a hotel establishment, the issue was raised about not collecting from vacation rentals — which are not allowed under the town's zoning ordinance.

Additionally, vacation rentals are defined under Wis. Stat. 254.61 (6) stating that a "Tourist rooming house" as "any lodging place or tourist cabin or cottage where sleeping accommodations are offered for pay to tourists or transients" and under Wis. Stat. 254.64 (1)(a) they are required to obtain a permit from the WI Dept. of Health Services.

The town board decided it would prefer not to close the 5 properties we have identified that are engaging in this practice. The ordinance assures not only compliance with state statutes requiring permits from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, but also collection of state and county sales taxes as required, along with the town's room tax. Four of the five property owners wrote letters indicating their intentions to bring their properties into compliance so they can continue to operate their businesses.

The ordinance also creates conditions that will protect neighboring properties should the vacation rental become a public nuisance. It provides conditions that require off-street parking, clearly identified property lines, and loud or unnecessary noises during certain hours.

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A DEFINITION OF "VACATION RENTAL ESTABLISHMENT" TO THE TOWN OF MERRIMAC ZONING ORDINANCE AND TO ALLOW VACATION RENTAL ESTABLISHMENT BY CONDITIONAL USE

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Merrimac has an ordinance requiring any person who furnishes, at retail, rooms or lodging to transients that are available to the public; and

WHEREAS, vacation rentals as defined under Wis. Stat. 254.61 (6) defines "Tourist rooming house" as "any lodging place or tourist cabin or cottage where sleeping accommodations are offered for pay to tourists or transients" requires the owner to remit the room tax; and

WHEREAS. Wis. Stat. 254.64 (1)(a) requires vacation rentals to also obtain a permit from the WI Dept. of Health Services and as a result is considered a commercial operation; and

WHEREAS, vacation rentals are not currently permitted by Town of Merrimac Zoning ordinance, but could be allowed in individual circumstances by conditional use if the Town Zoning Ordinance were property amended in this regard.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town Board of the Town of Merrimac, Sauk County, Wisconsin hereby ordains as follows:

- 1) Town of Merrimac Zoning Ordinance "Definitions" is hereby amended to include the definition of "vacation rental establishment" as follows:
 - a) Vacation Rental Establishment. Any property that is regulated by Wis. Stats. Chapter 254, subchapter VII as a tourist rooming house; and in addition; any real property that is subject to any contract, lease, sublease, rental agreement, easement, instrument or other device (the "Agreement"), if all of the following circumstances apply: a) the agreement or Agreements create a right to occupy said property during separate periods of time; b) such rights of occupancy have an actual duration of less than 29 days; c) the Agreement requires payment of other remuneration or barter, for the benefit of the property owner; and d) the separate rights to occupy the property occur two or more times per calendar year. Nothing herein shall be interpreted to include rental of property which does not qualify as a vacation rental pursuant to this definition.
- 2) Chapter 2 of the Town of Merrimac Zoning ordinance entitled "General Provisions", Section 2.30 entitled "Vacation Rental Establishments" is hereby created as follows:

2.30 Vacation Rental Establishments

- 1. Subject to the provisions of subsection 2.30 (2), vacation rental establishments may be permitted only by conditional use in the following districts:
 - a) Agricultural District
 - b) Agricultural Conservation District
 - c) Single Family Residential District
- Conditional use status shall not be granted to vacation rental establishments unless all of the following conditions are met:
 - a) The petitioner must provide to the Town Clerk a copy of the State Tourist Rooming House License for the subject property, prior to the conditional use order being granted; and evidence of each renewal of such license shall be filed by the Petitioner with the Town Clerk, such as

- evidence that a current license is always on file for the duration of the vacation rental establishment conditional use permit.
- b) Transfer of a conditional use permit issued in accordance with this section shall not be permitted. Should the subject property be sold or transferred, then the conditional use permit shall become void and a new conditional use permit must be issued for use as a vacation rental establishment to continue. The town is not obligated or required to issue a conditional use permit to the new property owner.
- c) All vacation rental establishments shall be subject to and comply with Wis. Stats. Chapter 254, subchapter VII as required by Wis. Stats. 254.69 (2), which sections are incorporated herein by reference.
- d) All vacation rental establishments shall be subject to and comply with Wisconsin Administrative Code HS 195 which is hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- e) A minimum of one off-street parking stall shall be provided for every guest bedroom. All off-street parking shall be established outside of the town highway (road) right-of-way.
- f) Sleeping quarters related to a vacation rental establishment use shall only be located within the principal residential structure on the property. Accessory buildings cannot be used for sleeping quarters.
- g) All refuse containers shall be screened from view and instructions for recycling shall be posted.
- h) Unless the property is connected to a municipal sewer system, the property owner must provide proof that the septic system is property sized for the proposed use and shall be properly maintained.
- i) Property that is used for a vacation rental establishment must have clearly delineated property lines, by approved fences, vegetation or other means to the satisfaction of the Town Planning & Zoning Commission. Such clear delineation must be maintained for the duration of the conditional use permit to ensure that all users of the property are clearly aware of the boundaries of the property and confine their use to the applicable parcel.
- j) The Planning and Zoning Commission and the Town Board shall consider the potential impact to the surrounding neighborhood and proximity to any existing lodging place as defined by Wis. Stat. 254.61 when reviewing a request for a vacation rental establishment conditional use permit.
- k) The Town Board may revoke the conditional use permit if the property has been declared a public nuisance affecting the peace and safety affecting the public. Public nuisances shall include, but are not limited to all loud and unnecessary noises, including those produced by animals and the unlawful use of fireworks, particularly before 6:00am and after 9:00pm; unlawful or unauthorized use of any town highway (road) which causes large crowds to gather or obstructs traffic; illegal or unlawful activity; and failure to remove all snow and ice from sidewalks, parking areas, and driveways.
- The Town Board shall not renew the conditional use permit if the property owner has failed to remit room tax. Upon remittance of the delinquent room tax, the conditional use permit may be reinstated by the Town Board.

- m) Room tax shall be collected by the property owner from the lessee to whom the Agreement has been made. The room tax shall be remitted to the Town Clerk on a quarterly basis. Should the property owner fail to remit the room tax, the property shall be subject to the forfeiture provisions of Town Ordinance 1-78 and the conditional use permit shall be automatically revoked. Upon remittance of delinquent room tax, the conditional use permit may be reinstated.
- n) Every conditional use permit for a vacation rental establishment expires on June 30 of each year and shall be eligible to apply for one (1) year renewal periods unless the conditional use permit is revoked by the town or voluntarily surrendered by the property owner. The Town Clerk shall prepare a renewal application for vacation rental establishments and collect a \$15.00 application fee plus costs for legal publications. All renewals shall be subject to the following:
 - 1. The clerk shall post and publish a Class I legal notice 15 days prior to the granting of the conditional use permit renewal.
 - 2. The Town Board may renew a conditional use permit if the property owner has demonstrated it has met all of the same conditions established when the conditional use permit was initially issued unless a condition has been specifically waived by the Planning and Zoning Commission.
 - 3. The Town Board may deny renewal of the conditional use permit if the property is deemed to be a nuisance or has failed to meet any of the conditions established.
 - 4. The Town Board shall not renew the conditional use permit if the property owner has failed to remit room tax. Upon remittance of the delinquent room tax, the conditional use permit may be reinstated by the Town Board.
- o) If the town finds that any statement made on the conditional use permit, or the renewal application, is incorrect, the Town Board may, at any time, immediately and summarily revoke the conditional use permit.
- p) The property owner shall provide a copy of this ordinance along with a current copy of the conditional use permit to any person using the property for vacation rental purposes prior to the commencement of each use.

Attached are some highlights related to the March, 2014 financial report.

Revenues

Revenues tend to be more cyclical in nature than expenses. Many of Sauk County's grants and aids, the largest revenue source after property tax levy, are paid on a reimbursement basis. The County incurs the expenses, submits the paperwork to primarily the State, and the reimbursement comes later. For this reason, many grant dollars received in January and February are for prior year services, and are allocated back to 2013. Grants and aids are the highest revenue source for the County other than property taxes, so having many receipts allocated back to 2013 makes the first quarter revenues look alarmingly low. Intergovernmental Charges are outpacing budget due to greater than average services provided by the Highway Department to other governments. Fines, forfeitures and penalties are typically highest in the summer months, as are licenses and permits. Miscellaneous revenues are high due to a revolving loan being unexpectedly repaid in full.

Overall, 18.53% of annual revenues have been recognized through March. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both property taxes which are recorded 1/12th every month, and transfers between Sauk County funds which have

an equal offsetting expense. Note that sales tax (discussed in more detail later) lags by one month.

Property taxes are due on January 31 and are collected by local treasurers through that date. After January 31, all collections become the responsibility of the County. By August 15, Sauk County must make full payment to all the other taxing jurisdictions without regard to what has been collected. Outstanding taxes as of April 30, 2014 follow. This means uncollected delinquent taxes due to Sauk County equal \$35,494,938, which is \$1.5 million less than a year ago at this time. Of this total, about 24.25% (about \$8,606,000) was originally levied to fund County operations. The remaining 75.75% was originally levied by schools and other local governments. The

second installment of the 2013 levy, collected 2014, is not due until July 31, 2014.

Sales tax receipts lag the month of sale by two months. For instance, for sales made at stores during January, vendors report and remit the sales tax to the State at the end of February, the State processes the information throughout March, and the County receives its payment at the end of March or possibly even the first part of April. Therefore, the County's financial reports as of the end of March only contain sales made through February. Further, sales tax is not at all received equally each month through the year. Summer receipts and the December holidays are higher. Sauk County increased its sales tax budget for 2014 to \$7,200,000. Adjusting the budget for historical seasonal receipts, 2014 sales tax collections are slightly ahead of budget at this point.

Expenditures

Expenditures for wages, salaries and benefits tend to be spread relatively evenly throughout the year, and it is generally reasonable to assume 1/12th should be recorded each month. Also, the Wages & Salaries category includes \$1,099,188 of budgeted but unspent dollars for implementation of the classification and compensation plan. Supplies and services in most areas also tend to be spent fairly evenly throughout the year. Debt service is paid in April (interest only) and October (principal and interest). Capital outlay is rarely spent evenly, and there are huge peaks and valleys by month or quarter.

Overall, 21.65% of annual expenditures have been recognized through March. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both debt service and transfers between Sauk County funds which have equal offsetting revenues. Labor benefits are outpacing wages and salaries because all payrolls happen to have fallen such that there are four months of health insurance charges posted through March, or about an additional \$571,600.

Current Sauk County 2014 Financial Position

The Finance Committee and Sauk County managers spend a great deal of effort monitoring the Sauk County budget, making plans when areas of concern develop, and taking action (often with Committee and County Board action) when trouble is certain.

The impact of the economy is also watched through a number of key areas, including property tax collections, key planning and zoning permits, register of deeds collections, and interest earned on invested funds.

Cash balances remain strong and steady, and the Treasurer is maintaining ample reserves for the County.

At this point, the Finance Committee has heard from no departments that they expect budget overages in 2014.

In Conclusion

In your role as oversight committee members, remain mindful of current and future indications that funding is changing, particularly from the State and Federal governments. Department managers provide you with monthly updates of budget position and statistics that can be leading indicators of changes to the status quo. Even with 2014 budget development complete, program review should *never* be complete to make sure Sauk County is providing those services most vital to those most in need. Changes to business as usual are often extremely difficult and take considerable time to implement.

WHEREAS, the County also frequently receives requests from various entities to relocate its fiber optic cable due to construction or other factors, and it would be desirable to delegate to the Communications Infrastructure Committee the authority to approve these relocations and work with various entities to contract for these relocations provided the costs do not exceed \$20,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in special session, that the Communications Infrastructure Committee is hereby authorized to approve easement and license agreements across County property utilized as part of the County's communications infrastructure system, and is also authorized to approve relocation of fiber optic lines where necessary, and enter into contracts to facilitate the relocation of these facilities within budgeted amounts, not to exceed \$20,000, without further approval of the Board of Supervisors.





Wild Rose Ranch LLC Summarized Business Plan for utilizing existing 20 Stall Stable building

Location: E12311 County rd W, Baraboo 53913.

Parcel #: 0193-1000,0202-00000

This plan describes the proposed uses for an existing 20 stall stable building built approximately 2009. The facility has 6 indoor horse stalls, 14 outdoor stalls, and 6 outdoor fenced paddocks. The 3800 sq ft indoor space includes a 600 sq ft lobby and 2200 sq ft common area, a bathroom, utility room and 2 other 180 sq ft rooms that can be used for a variety of purposes(storage, meetings, etc.) The facility has gas heat including in floor radiant heat and has 10 exit doors and 3 overhead doors. The facility has its own septic system, and separate electric and gas metering. There is an adjacent gravel parking area, as well as overflow parking on a 4 acre surrounding grassed area.

The plan to utilize this space has several components. Some are revenue bearing, some are not. These no revenue uses are an attempt to compliment the revenue bearing portion of this plan, and make this property accessible in a positive manner for the local community to share in a love and interest in animals.

This plan only uses existing facilities and there are **no plans for additional facilities** with any of these activities. The onsite private road from CTY Rd W to the stable facility was upgraded in the fall of 2013 and uses the driveway that enters to our home and then veers to the east and along the eastern most lot line. It follows a wooded area and a corn field and is not adjacent to any residential homes.

4 ideas are being planned and developed and are in various stages.

1. Horse Rescue

This part of the plan is still being developed. There seems to be a need to house horses that are in local humane shelters and/or which have been abandoned or mistreated. We don't intend to have more than 5-6 of our own horses on the property which leaves us the opportunity to utilize empty stalls and help local efforts with these animals. This plan, if developed, would not add any noticeable traffic, noise or disturbance to surrounding neighbors. It would not require any additional parking or facilities. The effort would blend in to what we are already doing day to day with our own animals and would not require any changes or additions to the facility/property. This would be a non revenue bearing effort and would take place year round.

2. <u>Children's equine training and education</u>

This part of the plan is also in development. This idea stems from our own 8 yr old daughters past summer experiences spending her days at a horse facility working and taking care of the horses. It's a wonderful way for kids to spend a summer day. Activities would include tending to daily horse needs in

and around the horse barn. This would be limited to 5-6 kids and be a 3-4 day a week activity. This plan, if developed, would not add any noticeable traffic, noise or disturbance to surrounding neighbors. It would not require any additional parking or facilities. It's planned to be non revenue bearing but could develop into a revenue bearing business in time. It would be a summer only activity, held during the day light hours.

3. Donated space for local 4H clubs

We are currently looking into meeting space needs for 4H events. At this time we haven't determined if there is a need. If there is we would like to make our indoor stable space available for 4H club meetings. We don't anticipate that this would involve large groups and wouldn't contribute to traffic or additional noise for neighbors. Current parking setup would be adequate and this activity would not require any changes to, or additional facilities.

4. Ranch Themed event Venue

OVERVIEW

Our plan to utilize this property for ranch themed weddings and other events is the most encompassing of the existing facilities out of the 4 plans that we are developing. Themed weddings, especially those that revolve around rural, barn based settings, have become extremely popular. Most are booked out over a year and the demand is strong. Our focus would be on these events due to their popularity, but this space would lend itself to other events also; showers, small corporate events, etc. Our focus for planning purposes is on weddings as we see this as the most demanding on the facilities, in terms of head counts and traffic.

Our intent is to utilize an existing hill top gazebo with expansive, panoramic views of the Baraboo river valley as a spot for small wedding ceremonies. The stable would then be used for an after ceremony gathering space and dance hall. Bands and tents would be set up outside during good weather for additional space. Talks are ongoing with local providers of horses that would be used for carriage rides on the property. We will also utilize other local vendors for food, drinks, tables/chairs, flowers. We won't be applying for a liquor license for this operation at this time.

BACKGROUND

Themed weddings, especially those that revolve around rural, barn based settings, have become extremely popular. Most are booked out over a year and the demand is strong. Wisconsin has over 20 places that now offer these types of events. They are taking place all over the country as well.

DETAILS

A typical weekend event may (or may not) include a Friday night event, centered on a fire-pit style dinner and a short horse ride/carriage ride around the property. It might be a simpler gathering in the stable in the lobby bar area. This would be for a smaller group(10-30), mostly family, and would be similar to a traditional rehearsal dinner. Saturday (and possible Sunday) events would entail the wedding ceremonies and attract larger groups (50-100 people, 125-150 max). These events would primarily take place in the afternoon and go into the evening.

We are anticipating that these events may have an appeal year round, but for planning purposes we are focused on the late spring season thru the early fall as the primary period of time that these events would take place. Events outside of this time period would be indoors, quieter, and smaller groups. Our plan includes up to 3 weekend events per month. (We would consider one event taking up one weekend). Smaller events(corporate, parties) could be scheduled during the week but would be atypical to what we would anticipate as being the primary focus.

Maximum attendance for the weddings would be somewhere in the 125-150 range. We expect, given the intimacy and size of the facility the average group would be much smaller. Temporary portable toilet facilities would be brought in for events as needed until extra restrooms can be added to the stable. There would be no parking allowed on local roads and event rules would indicate this.

All tasks related to the events would be contracted out. This includes food/liquor catering, Chair/table, decoration rentals, floral arrangements, cakes, etc. Our intent is to provide the space only and the event itself will be managed/setup by the group that has leased the space. We will not hire any employees for this purpose. We do intend to work with a large group of local merchants which provide these services.

The focus and intent of this effort is to create an attractive, casual, rural, ranch ambience to these events, especially the weddings. Its anticipated that horses will be included in these events, ranging from simply being a backdrop as they graze in a pasture, to bringing a bride into a ceremony in a horse drawn carriage. The effort is all about creating a ranch environment centered on horses and the natural beauty of the Baraboo Valley for these events to take place in.

Anticipated hours of operation: (will be determined in final discussions with the Town Board)
Friday 5-11
Saturday 11-11
Sunday 11-8

Music indoors after 9 pm.

Other days on occasion, but within normal working/waking hours, and never past 11pm.

It's important to note that these events are on an occasional basis only. They will not take place on a daily or regular basis. Anticipated number of larger events per could range from 10-15/year.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

It's worthwhile to note that we have the same incentives and concerns that local authorities may have in regards to this project. This property is in fact our home. We bought it intentionally for its location, its openness and its peacefulness. We relocated from Madison intentionally to be in this environment for all that it offers; its natural beauty and its unique character.

We recognize these events need to be managed and controlled in regards to traffic, noise, lightning, etc. We have a vested interest in doing so as these events will take place in our backyard. We are conscious of this, as well as being aware of any potential disruption to neighboring properties. These concerns are being factored into our plans such as where bands/DJ's would be set up, when doors would be closed to contain inside noise, and where traffic flow is handled.

In discussions so far, The Greenfield Town Board <u>unanimously</u> supports our plan, given we are open to a certain sized area to be rezoned and certain conditions are met with the CUP.

Between the town board and the planning commission, votes in total were 9-1 in favor of this plan. The one vote against happens to be a neighbor that's on the PC. Even though we asked all members at PC meetings to express concerns so they could be addressed, this member of the PC stated NONE thru the process. But then voted no anyway, without explanation. I think its important to note that this same member, during the same meeting, voted In FAVOR of a VERY similar proposal which is proposed farther down CTY Rd W. This appears to be case of "not in my back yard" as there is no consistency to his voting. This member lives almost ¼ mile from the proposed facility, thru a block of woods and at a different level of topography. Sound and any unreasonable level will NOT be an issue. He also lives at the corner of a busy Cty rd(W) and busier State hwy(113), both which create a significant amount of traffic noise day and night, based on our observations.

Most immediate neighbors have been contacted to date and the plan has been discussed with them. We've had very positive feedback from everyone we've talked to. If there are concerns from some, they have not been expressed to us so far, including the neighbor who is on the PC.








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


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




Rezoning Application Site / Plot Plan Parking Area Schematic

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING IMPLEMENTATION OF EMPLOYEE CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION ANALYSIS CONDUCTED BY FOX LAWSON AND ASSOCIATES

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 33-13, adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, authorized an operational analysis of the Sauk County Classification and Compensation Plan for employees (excluding represented members of the Wisconsin Professional Police Association); and,

WHEREAS, Fox Lawson and Associates, (a division of Gallagher Benefit Services, Inc.) has presented the attached job classification recommendations, as well as recommendations for commensurate wage/salary ranges; and,

WHEREAS, the operational analysis evaluated and analyzed approximately two hundred (200) job classifications, and performed a market sampling from approximately fifty (50) benchmark positions in the public and private sectors; and,

WHEREAS, the initial analysis identified a moderate number of positions that required adjustments, however also indicated that the County's compensation levels are not currently competitive with market rates; and,

WHEREAS, wages for the affected employees have been frozen for many of the last four years; and,

WHEREAS, the following phases of the Classification and Compensation Analysis have been completed:

Phase 1:

Classification Study - Consultant conducted informational meetings with employees regarding specific method used for position evaluation. Consultant review of all job descriptions and classifications; identification of related questions. Preparation of new or revised job descriptions and recommend any reclassifications of current classifications based upon redefining/restructuring of existing classifications.

Phase 2:

Job Evaluation Study - The consultant application of the Decision Band Method (DBM) to job classifications. Reviewed new classifications and determined classifications for internal and external equity. Consultant recommendation of appropriate pay levels and placement of positions.

Phase 3:

Compensation Study – Consultant selection of benchmark jobs, collection of market data, development of preliminary wage structure. Meetings conducted with Department Heads regarding initial wage structure and position placement.

Phase 4:

Final Report - Consultant review initial wage structure, findings and report for presentation to Sauk County Board of Supervisors.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>3</u> - 2014

REVISING SAUK CO. CODE § 6.06(1)(b) and § 20.07(2)(c) INCREASING THE FORFEITURE FOR PARKING IN A HANDICAPPED PARKING SPACE

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 346.505 has been amended to provide for an increased forfeiture amount from \$50 to \$150, and Sauk County should increase our ordinance to be in conformity with state statute; and,

WHEREAS, your undersigned committee has had this matter under advisement, and does agree that increasing the forfeiture for these violations is appropriate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that Sauk Co. Code § 6.06(1)(b) and § 20.07(2)(c) are hereby amended as follows:

6.06 Penalties. 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BY LAWS BYLAWS

for the

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UW Center- University of Wisconsin Baraboo/Sauk County Campus Commission

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ARTICLE I

Establishment of the Commission

Resolution of August 12, 1969, of the Common Council of the City of Baraboo as amended September 9, 1969, and identical resolution of July 22, 1969, of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, as amended September 16, provide the established framework under which the <a href="https://www.uperscity.org/linear-up-number

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ARTICLE II

Business of the Commission

Section 1 - Budget.

Until such time as the City of Baraboo and Sauk County shall be relieved of responsibility of sharing campus custodial and maintenance costs with the University of Wisconsin, the Commission, in consultation with the Campus Dean or his/her with the Dean's authorized representative, shall prepare annually by September 1 of each year a budget for the operation and maintenance of the Campus and such budget shall be presented to the Common Council of the City of Baraboo and the Sauk County Board of Supervisors for final approval. The Commission shall prepare its budget in the format required by the City Common Council and County Board of Supervisors. The Commission's account shall be audited annually by the certified public accounting firm that audits the municipal books and records of the City of Baraboo and the cost of such audit shall be charged to the Commission. The Commission shall conduct its accounting and bookkeeping procedures in accordance with the auditing standards utilized by the City of Baraboo and generally accepted accounting principles. Budgeted funds of the Commission shall be kept in a segregated account by the Treasurer. Only investments outlined in Section 66.04(2) Wisconsin Statutes shall be entered into by the Commission. The principal and earned interest of any investments outside the Local Government Investment Pool must be either insured or collateralized to their full value. The Commission will not leverage its investments nor will the Commission invest in derivatives.

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Section 2 - Campus Expansion.

Until such time as the City of Baraboo and Sauk County shall be relieved of providing construction costs for campus expansion or building modifications, the Commission in consultation with the Campus Dean or his/her the Dean's authorized representative shall, as circumstances require, develop campus building plans for joint City/County approval and funding. If approved in the Commission's budget, the Commission may designate an expansion/capital improvement non-lapsing account and add to and carry over fund balances in that account from year to year and the Commission may expend funds from this account as needed for capital improvement projects approved by the City of Baraboo and Sauk County.

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Section 3 - Campus Liaison.

In all matters pertaining to the operation, maintenance or expansion of the buildings and grounds of the campus, the Commission shall serve as the liaison between the campus administration and the respective governing units of the City of Baraboo and Sauk County.

Section 4 - Personnel.

The Campus Dean is recognized as the official custodian of the campus, responsible for this function to the Commission. Such problems relating to custodial personnel as the Dean may wish to present to the Commission for advice and counsel or for final decision shall be part of the continuing business of the Commission.

Section 5 - Insurance.

The Commission shall procure and maintain adequate liability, hazard and property insurance reasonably necessary to protect the interests of the City of Baraboo and Sauk County and for the acts and/or omissions of the Commission, and its agents, and from loss and damage to the property owned by the City of Baraboo and Sauk County. Policies of insurance shall be filed in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Baraboo. The Commission shall further cause all officers having fiscal responsibility to be bonded where appropriate.

Section 6 - Legal Counsel.

The Sauk County Corporation Counsel shall be appointed to act as legal counsel for the Commission to advise it on all matters concerning the Commission and its business. If authorized in the Commission's budget, the Commission may retain

special Counsel to advise and represent the Commission on matters where the Corporation Counsel cannot or will not act on the Commission's behalf.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1 - Voting Members.

The voting members of the Campus Commission shall consist of two members of the Common Council of the City of Baraboo named by the Mayor, two members of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors named by the Board Chairperson, the Clerk or City Administrator of the City of Baraboo at the discretion of the Common Council, the Clerk of Sauk County or the County Administrative Coordinator at the discretion of the County Board, and one public member resident in Sauk County outside the City of Baraboo named jointly by the Mayor and the Board Chairperson. The term of office of appointed members of the Commission shall be established by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors or by the Common Council of the City of Baraboo respectively for their appointed members to the Commission.

Section 2 - Ex-eOfficio Members.

The Mayor of the City of Baraboo, the Chairperson of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, the Dean of the Campus and the Campus Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds shall be ex-officio non-voting advisory members of the Commission. At all regular/special meetings, the Mayor or his/her the Mayor's representative may vote for an absent member of the City Council, and the Chairperson of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors or his/her the Chairperson's representative may vote for an absent member of the County Board.

Section 3 - Vacancies in Membership.

Vacancies in the regular voting membership shall be filled as soon as feasible by the Mayor of the City of Baraboo or the Chairperson of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, or both, as the case may require.

Section 4 - Sub-Ceommittees.

Membership on such sub-committees of the Commission as may be established is non-restricted to regular voting members of the Commission but may, at the discretion of the majority of the voting members of the Commission, include other Formatted: Strikethrough

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citizens of Sauk County, these to be appointed ad hoc by the Chairperson of the Commission. All committee memberships shall terminate at the time the regular April meeting is called to order unless such memberships are renewed.

ARTICLE IV

Meetings

Section 1 - Meeting Dates and Times.

Meetings of the Commission to conduct its normal business shall be called by the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson Vice Chairperson, or by the Mayor of the City or the Chairperson of the County Board of Supervisors. All meeting notices and agendas shall be prepared and published in accordance with the Wisconsin Open Meeting laws.

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Section 2 - Legal Holidays.

If the regular meeting time shall fall on a legal holiday, that meeting shall be re-scheduled by the Commission Chairperson on a day and at a time agreeable to a majority of the Commission members.

Section 3 - Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the Commission may be called by any one of the four officers on a day and at a time agreeable to a majority of the voting members.

Section 4 - Place of Meeting.

The administrative conference room of the campus is designated as the place for regular and special Commission meetings unless changed by vote of the Commission.

Section 5 - Quorum.

Four of the seven regular Commission members shall constitute a quorum. If a quorum is present, the majority vote of the regular members present shall be sufficient to transact business. Without a quorum present no meeting for the transaction of business may be called to order.

ARTICLE V

Officers

Section 1 - Principal Officers.

The principal officers shall be a Chairperson, one Vice Chairperson, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Such other officers and assistant officers as may be deemed necessary may be elected or appointed by the Commission.

Section 2 - Election of Officers.

The officers of the Commission shall be elected annually at the regular May meeting of the Commission or as soon thereafter as may be convenient, except that the Clerk or City Administrator of the City of Baraboo and the Clerk or Administrative Coordinator of Sauk County shall automatically assume the duties of Treasurer and Secretary respectively.

<u>Clerk</u> Section 3 - <u>Chairperson</u>.

The Chairperson shall be the principle executive officer and shall in general supervise and control all the business affairs of the Commission and appoint committees thereof subject to Commission approval. He/She The Chairperson shall, when present, preside at all meetings of the Commission, countersign checks and sign options, contracts, and other instruments which the Commission has authorized to be executed and in general shall perform all duties incident to the office of Chairperson and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Commission from time to time including the development of meeting agendas in consultation with the Campus Dean.

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Section 4 - Vice Chairperson.

In the absence of the Chairperson or in the event of his/her the Chairperson's death, inability or refusal to act, the Vice Chairperson shall perform the duties of the Chairperson and when so acting shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Chairperson; and shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him/her the Vice Chairperson by the Chairperson or the Commission.

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Section 5 - Secretary.

The <u>S</u>secretary shall be the record custodian for the Commission, keep the minutes of the Commission meetings, see that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws, be custodian of contracts and correspondence, sign documents as directed by the Commission, provide all Commission members and other designated individuals with notice of meetings and copies of the Commission minutes, maintain a file of the original minutes, and perform such other duties as may from time to time be assigned to <a href="https://pimelines.org/nimelines.org/lines.org/lines.org/nimelines.org/line

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Section 6 - Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall be responsible for maintaining books of accounts to reflect revenue and expenditure of the Commission, for depositing monies received by the Commission, for drawing checks to cover expenditures approved in advance by the Commission, for billing the University of Wisconsin for its share of approved campus expenditures, for billing Sauk County for its share of approved campus expenditures, and for billing the City of Baraboo for its share of approved campus expenditures.

All disbursements and receipts shall be substantiated by invoices, statements or accounting entries kept in the voucher file to be available for detailed audit.

Petty cash in the amount of \$100.00 shall be established in a voucher account by an initial deposit. The Campus Dean or his/her the Dean's authorized agent shall be authorized to write vouchers against this petty cash account and shall be charged with the responsibility of maintaining a voucher file to support such payments and to recap such vouchers monthly for Commission approval. The Treasurer is authorized to maintain a balance in this account of not more than \$100.00. The use of funds from this account for any single expenditure shall not exceed \$50.00.

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Section 7 - Resignation and Removal.

Any officer (Chair and Vice Chair) of the Commission except the Secretary or Treasurer, may be removed from office with or without cause, at any time, by a majority vote of the members of the Commission. The Secretary and Treasurer shall hold office permanently and may only be removed by the amendment of these bylaws and the approval thereof by the City Council and County Board of Supervisors. Any officer may resign at any time by giving notice to the Commission. Such resignation shall take effect no later than the first Commission meeting following receipt of such notice. Any vacancy in office may be filled by appointment or election by the Commission. The officer appointed or elected shall serve for the remainder of the term of the officer replaced.

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ARTICLE VI

Amendments

Section 1 - Procedure for Amendment.

The Commission may from time to time recommend amendment of these bylaws by majority vote of its voting members. The proposed amendment must then be approved by both the Common Council of the City of Baraboo and the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County.

Section 2 - Amendment of Article I.

Article I shall be amended or repealed only by joint resolution of the Common Council of the City of Baraboo and the County Board of Sauk County, Wisconsin.

ARTICLE VII

Miscellaneous Provisions

Section 1 - Naming and Dedication of Facilities.

From time to time, there may be a desire to name or dedicate facilities, portions of buildings, or portions of grounds after an individual or individuals based upon exemplary service, contribution, or other reason. Requests for the naming or dedication of facilities shall be processed as follows:

- (a) Any proposal for naming or dedicating facilities, portions of buildings, or portions of grounds shall be brought before the Campus Commission for consideration. Recommendations shall be considered at a meeting of the Campus Commission and may be considered in closed session if authorized by the Wisconsin Statutes.
- (b) If the request involves a living individual who has been formally associated with the University of Wisconsin Baraboo Sauk County College, or has held a paid public office, a waiting period after the period of association or departure from public office is required. Normally, at least five years must have elapsed from the time a person has terminated such association or office to the time of naming or dedication of a facility or portion of property. Exceptions to the waiting period can be made if a gift stipulates that it is contingent upon the naming or dedication of facilities, and the acceptance of the gift was properly approved.

- (c) A request to name or dedicate an entire building after an individual or individuals shall require the approval of the City of Baraboo Common Council and the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.
- (d) The Campus Commission is authorized to approve the naming of facilities when the naming or dedication involves less than an entire building, such as rooms, wings, athletic fields, or exterior amenities. This authority is subject to the same limitations regarding waiting periods as those pertaining to entire buildings.



Request

Robert E. Klipp et al. hereafter referred to as 'property owners', are requesting a rezone from an Exclusive Agriculture to an Agricultural zoning district. The purpose of the rezone request is to make consistent a 20-acre parcel with zoning regulations that was illegally divided from the original parcel. If the rezone is approved, the property owners will need to complete a Certified Survey Map pursuant to Sauk Co. Code ch 22 Land Division and Subdivision Regulations Ordinance.

Legal Description of Area

A parcel located in the S ½ of the SW ¼ of the NW ¼ , Section 1, T11N, R4E, Town of Westfield, Sauk County, Wisconsin.

Background

The Klipp property original consisted of 180 acres with 160 acres west of Loop Road and 20 acres east of Loop Road.

According to Doc. # 1084102, recorded on November 8, 2013, 80 acres of the original 180 acres were transferred to Bindl et al. According to Doc. # 1084100 on November 8, 2013, 80 acres of the original 180 acres were transferred to Clyde et al. The two 80's lie west of Loop Road. The remaining 20 acres currently remains under the Klipp et al ownership. Pursuant to 7.094 (7) of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance, the minimum parcel size is 35 net acres for lands zoned Exclusive Agriculture. The 20 acre remnant that remains under the Klipp et al ownership violates this provision.

There are a number of options available to the landowner to correct the violation. These options include (in no particular order of importance or likelihood):

- Apply for a 20-acre PRD lot;
- Transfer the 20 acres to an adjoining landowner;
- Other forms of transfer that would comply with minimum lot size requirements;
- Rezone out of Exclusive Agriculture;
- Petition for an area variance with the Sauk County Board of Adjustment;
- Appeal the interpretation of the zoning ordinance relative to lot size requirements;
- Rescind the sale of the property as an illegal transfer of land.

Town of Westfield Comprehensive Plan. The proposed rezone to Agriculture appears to be equivocal relative to being consistent with the Town of Westfield Comprehensive Plan. The rezone will not change the current use of the land, however the land could be subject to future division into rural residential building lots of not less than one acre, which may not be consistent with the Town's Plan.

Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan. The rezone appears to be inconsistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan which identifies this land as a preservation area. Preservation areas are defined as areas that are not part of a city, village or unincorporated development area and are planned for the continuation of agricultural uses. In towns that have adopted Exclusive agriculture zoning, preservation areas are predominantly zoned Exclusive Agriculture for the purpose of preventing uses that are not compatible with agriculture and to prevent lands from being subdivided above the specified density of one residential dwelling per 35-acres.

Zoning Map Amendment Standards pursuant to 7.141(8)

In its review and action on the application, the agency (CPZ Committee) shall make findings with respect to the following criteria:

Staff Note: If this property is rezoned out of Exclusive Agriculture, pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch 91 Farmland Preservation, Sauk County is required to report such rezone to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Staff recommends that the CPZ Committee review and respond to the following findings before making a recommendation on the rezoning petition.

- (a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of this chapter (Sauk County Zoning Ordinance).
- (b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.
- (c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering this chapter as currently depicted has been observed.

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The following item (d) is pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch 91 and the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance.

- (d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
- 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
- 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
- 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
- 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels or land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

Approve Petition 4-2014, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing, that the Town of Westfield Board recommends approval of the rezone, and that the proposed rezone appears to be consistent with respective plans and meets the standards and findings for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8) and Wis. Request

Wild Rose Ranch, LLC, c/o Daniel & Michelle Gillette and hereafter referred to as 'property owner,' is requesting a rezone from a Resource Conservancy to a Recreation Commercial zoning district. Rezoning this parcel would allow the property owner to establish an event venue and children's equine training and education facility as conditional uses under the Recreation Commercial zoning district. A conditional use permit application has also been submitted by the property owner.

Legal Description of Area

A 4.01 acre parcel located in the NE%-NW% and the NW%-NE% of Section 7, T11N, R7E, Town of Greenfield, Sauk County, Wisconsin (See Exhibit C, Rezoning Application Site/Plot Plan submitted by applicant).

Background

The current property owners wish to use the property's existing 20-stall stable and gazebo in part for horse-related activities, such as children's equine education and local 4H club meetings, and in part for a ranch-themed event venue. In order for these uses to comply with the county zoning ordinance, a portion of the property would need to be rezoned to Recreation Commercial and granted a conditional use permit pursuant to Sections 7.035 (3) and 7.031(2) of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance. The remaining portion of the property would also need to be granted a conditional use permit under 7.027 (12), Stable and equestrian facility. The proposed equine activities would primarily take place during the day, and would not be of large enough scale to cause any noticeable traffic, noise, or other disturbance. The proposed event venue would be targeted toward rural- or barn-themed weddings with a maximum capacity of 125-150 people. Wedding events would take place up to 3 weekends per month, totaling 10-15 per year, with operations ending at 11pm on Friday and Saturday evenings, and 8pm on Sunday evenings. After 9pm, music would only be allowed indoors. 37 parking spots would be provided on-site. The property owners plan to form relationships with local suppliers to provide catering, tables and chairs, entertainment, etc. for events.

History

June 10, 2014. The Town of Greenfield Board approved the rezoning.

Zoning Map Amendment Standards pursuant to 7.141(8)

In its review and action on the application, the agency (CPZ Committee) shall make findings with respect to the following criteria:

Staff Note: Staff recommends that the CPZ Committee review and respond to the following findings before making a recommendation on the rezoning petition.

(a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of this chapter (Sauk County Zoning Ordinance).

Staff comment: Pursuant to Section 7.003 of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance, the purpose of the ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of Sauk County residents and the public, to plan for the future development of communities, and to further the purposes contained in Wis. Stat. §59.69(1). Rezoning the parcel in question from Resource Conservancy to Recreation Commercial meets the aforementioned standard and purpose.

(b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.

Staff comment: The *Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan* is not applicable in this situation, as the parcel is not zoned as Exclusive Agriculture. The proposed rezoning does not conflict with the goals and objectives outlined in the 2009 *Sauk County Comprehensive Plan*.

(c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering this chapter as currently depicted has been observed.

Staff comment: No errors, inconsistencies, or administration problems have occurred since the initial ordinance adoption. Since the existing structures were built, the property has been conveyed to new owners. The current property owners have proposed plans for the adaptive reuse of these structures.

Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan

The proposed rezone to Recreation Commercial appears to be consistent with the protection of existing agricultural, natural, and cultural resources as outlined in the *Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan*. The new horse-related and event venue uses will not require new construction, and are unlikely to generate disruptive amounts of traffic or noise. According to the most recent Average Annual Daily Traffic Counts (2002) from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, this section of CTH W carries approximately 1100 vehicles each day, while Hwy 113 accommodates between 1400 and 1600; 37 additional vehicles (see Parking Area Schematic, Exhibit C) would thus represent about a 2-3% increase. The applicant's Summarized Business

Plan (Exhibit B) describes provisions for limiting the amount of noise generated by weekend events in the evening hours; similar provisions should also be considered to minimize light pollution, as discussed in Chapter IV of the *Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan* (Goal 12, Objective I). Given that the parcel is located in an Agricultural Preservation District as delineated by the plan, care should be taken to minimize conflict between the proposed uses and adjacent agricultural operations.

The proposed uses also further other goals of the *Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan*, such as providing agricultural education and outreach programs (Goal 6) through the creation of a children's equine training facility and a potential 4-H meeting space. A ranch-themed event venue also aligns with the plan's goals of encouraging economic development that supports low-impact tourism and preserves natural beauty, limiting new commercial developments to a modest size and scope, and capturing the economic value of Greenfield's rural and scenic character.

Finally, the *Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan* outlines specific criteria for the review developments requiring a change of existing zoning (Chapter III, Section E). This includes the submission of an impact statement, as well as requirements pertaining to agricultural uses, emergency vehicle access, and public service provision. The proposed rezoning will presumably need to meet these criteria in order to be fully compliant with the town comprehensive plan.

Committee Action Options

Approve Petition 8-2014, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing, the recommendation of the Town of Greenfield Board, and the proposed rezone's consistency with the goals and requirements of the *Town of Greenfield Comprehensive Plan* as well as the standards and findings for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8).

Disapprove Petition 8-2014, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing and that the rezone does not meet the standards and findings for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8).

Modify and Approve Petition 8-2014. Not recommended.

This plan describes the proposed uses for an existing 20 stall stable building built approximately 2009. The facility has 6 indoor horse stalls, 14 outdoor stalls, and 6 outdoor fenced paddocks. The 3800 sq ft indoor space includes a 600 sq ft lobby and 2200 sq ft common area, a bathroom, utility room and 2 other 180 sq ft rooms that can be used for a variety of purposes(storage, meetings, etc.) The facility has gas heat including in floor radiant heat and has 10 exit doors and 3 overhead doors. The facility has its own septic system, and separate electric and gas metering. There is an adjacent gravel parking area, as well as overflow parking on a 4 acre surrounding grassed area.

The plan to utilize this space has several components. Some are revenue bearing, some are not. These no revenue uses are an attempt to compliment the revenue bearing portion of this plan, and make this property accessible in a positive manner for the local community to share in a love and interest in animals.

This plan only uses existing facilities and there are **no plans for additional facilities** with any of these activities. The onsite private road from CTY Rd W to the stable facility was upgraded in the fall of 2013 and uses the driveway that enters to our home and then veers to the east and along the eastern most lot line. It follows a wooded area and a corn field and is not adjacent to any residential homes.

4 ideas are being planned and developed and are in various stages.

1. Horse Rescue

This part of the plan is still being developed. There seems to be a need to house horses that are in local humane shelters and/or which have been abandoned or mistreated. We don't intend to have more than 5-6 of our own horses on the property which leaves us the opportunity to utilize empty stalls and help local efforts with these animals. This plan, if developed, would not add any noticeable traffic, noise or disturbance to surrounding neighbors. It would not require any additional parking or facilities. The effort would blend in to what we are already doing day to day with our own animals and would not require any changes or additions to the facility/property. This would be a non revenue bearing effort and would take place year round.

2. Children's equine training and education

This part of the plan is also in development. This idea stems from our own 8 yr old daughters past summer experiences spending her days at a horse facility working and taking care of the horses. It's a wonderful way for kids to spend a summer day. Activities would include tending to daily horse needs in

and around the horse barn. This would be limited to 5-6 kids and be a 3-4 day a week activity. This plan, if developed, would not add any noticeable traffic, noise or disturbance to surrounding neighbors. It would not require any additional parking or facilities. It's planned to be non revenue bearing but could develop into a revenue bearing business in time. It would be a summer only activity, held during the day light hours.

3. Donated space for local 4H clubs

We are currently looking into meeting space needs for 4H events. At this time we haven't determined if there is a need. If there is we would like to make our indoor stable space available for 4H club meetings. We don't anticipate that this would involve large groups and wouldn't contribute to traffic or additional noise for neighbors. Current parking setup would be adequate and this activity would not require any changes to, or additional facilities.

4. Ranch Themed event Venue

OVERVIEW

Our plan to utilize this property for ranch themed weddings and other events is the most encompassing of the existing facilities out of the 4 plans that we are developing. Themed weddings, especially those that revolve around rural, barn based settings, have become extremely popular. Most are booked out over a year and the demand is strong. Our focus would be on these events due to their popularity, but this space would lend itself to other events also; showers, small corporate events, etc. Our focus for planning purposes is on weddings as we see this as the most demanding on the facilities, in terms of head counts and traffic.

Our intent is to utilize an existing hill top gazebo with expansive, panoramic views of the Baraboo river valley as a spot for small wedding ceremonies. The stable would then be used for an after ceremony gathering space and dance hall. Bands and tents would be set up outside during good weather for additional space. Talks are ongoing with local providers of horses that would be used for carriage rides on the property. We will also utilize other local vendors for food, drinks, tables/chairs, flowers. We won't be applying for a liquor license for this operation at this time.

BACKGROUND

Themed weddings, especially those that revolve around rural, barn based settings, have become extremely popular. Most are booked out over a year and the demand is strong. Wisconsin has over 20 places that now offer these types of events. They are taking place all over the country as well.

<u>DETAILS</u>

A typical weekend event may (or may not) include a Friday night event, centered on a fire-pit style dinner and a short horse ride/carriage ride around the property. It might be a simpler gathering in the stable in the lobby bar area. This would be for a smaller group(10-30), mostly family, and would be similar to a traditional rehearsal dinner. Saturday (and possible Sunday) events would entail the wedding ceremonies and attract larger groups (50-100 people, 125-150 max). These events would primarily take place in the afternoon and go into the evening.

We are anticipating that these events may have an appeal year round, but for planning purposes we are focused on the late spring season thru the early fall as the primary period of time that these events would take place. Events outside of this time period would be indoors, quieter, and smaller groups. Our plan includes up to 3 weekend events per month. (We would consider one event taking up one weekend). Smaller events(corporate, parties) could be scheduled during the week but would be atypical to what we would anticipate as being the primary focus.

Maximum attendance for the weddings would be somewhere in the 125-150 range. We expect, given the intimacy and size of the facility the average group would be much smaller. Temporary portable toilet facilities would be brought in for events as needed until extra restrooms can be added to the stable. There would be no parking allowed on local roads and event rules would indicate this.

All tasks related to the events would be contracted out. This includes food/liquor catering, Chair/table, decoration rentals, floral arrangements, cakes, etc. Our intent is to provide the space only and the event itself will be managed/setup by the group that has leased the space. We will not hire any employees for this purpose. We do intend to work with a large group of local merchants which provide these services.

The focus and intent of this effort is to create an attractive, casual, rural, ranch ambience to these events, especially the weddings. Its anticipated that horses will be included in these events, ranging from simply being a backdrop as they graze in a pasture, to bringing a bride into a ceremony in a horse drawn carriage. The effort is all about creating a ranch environment centered on horses and the natural beauty of the Baraboo Valley for these events to take place in.

Anticipated hours of operation: (will be determined in final discussions with the Town Board)
Friday 5-11
Saturday 11-11
Sunday 11-8

Music indoors after 9 pm.

Other days on occasion, but within normal working/waking hours, and never past 11pm.

It's important to note that these events are on an occasional basis only. They will not take place on a daily or regular basis. Anticipated number of larger events per could range from 10-15/year.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

It's worthwhile to note that we have the same incentives and concerns that local authorities may have in regards to this project. This property is in fact our home. We bought it intentionally for its location, its openness and its peacefulness. We relocated from Madison intentionally to be in this environment for all that it offers; its natural beauty and its unique character.

We recognize these events need to be managed and controlled in regards to traffic, noise, lightning, etc. We have a vested interest in doing so as these events will take place in our backyard. We are conscious of this, as well as being aware of any potential disruption to neighboring properties. These concerns are being factored into our plans such as where bands/DJ's would be set up, when doors would be closed to contain inside noise, and where traffic flow is handled.

In discussions so far, The Greenfield Town Board <u>unanimously</u> supports our plan, given we are open to a certain sized area to be rezoned and certain conditions are met with the CUP.

Between the town board and the planning commission, votes in total were 9-1 in favor of this plan. The one vote against happens to be a neighbor that's on the PC. Even though we asked all members at PC meetings to express concerns so they could be addressed, this member of the PC stated NONE thru the process. But then voted no anyway, without explanation. I think its important to note that this same member, during the same meeting, voted in FAVOR of a VERY similar proposal which is proposed farther down CTY Rd W. This appears to be case of "not in my back yard" as there is no consistency to his voting. This member lives almost ¼ mile from the proposed facility, thru a block of woods and at a different level of topography. Sound and any unreasonable level will NOT be an issue. He also lives at the corner of a busy Cty rd(W) and busier State hwy(113), both which create a significant amount of traffic noise day and night, based on our observations.

Most immediate neighbors have been contacted to date and the plan has been discussed with them. We've had very positive feedback from everyone we've talked to. If there are concerns from some, they have not been expressed to us so far, including the neighbor who is on the PC.



Rezoning Application Site / Plot Plan








Rezoning Application Site / Plot Plan Parking Area Schematic

According to the Town of Baraboo Farmland Preservation Map in the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan, the parcel is surrounded by parcels denoted as Unincorporated Development and Transition Areas (Exhibit B). Unincorporated Development Areas are parcels designated for rural, non-agriculture related development, such as rural neighborhoods. Transition Areas are parcels that have been identified as development areas that may be annexed and/or developed within the next fifteen years. Rezoning the parcel in question to allow residential use is consistent with these designations.

(c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering this chapter as currently depicted has been observed.

Staff comment: Since the property was last zoned as Commercial to reflect its use for a fencing and blade sharpening business, it has come under new ownership. An Agriculture zoning classification is more appropriate for the use proposed by the current applicant, which is to live on the property without engaging in commercial activities.

The property was originally zoned from Resource Conservation (RC-35) to Commercial in 2009 because a Commercial zoning classification complied with the Town Comprehensive Plan's Land Use Plan Map, which designated lands along USH 12 for future commercial development.

Currently, the adjacent parcels are zoned as either Commercial or Resource Conservancy and support primarily agricultural and residential uses, in addition to a car dealership located on the parcel directly to the north. Although the parcel will not be put into agricultural use, rezoning the parcel to Agriculture would align with both these uses and the Town Comprehensive Plan's Economic Development goal of respecting Baraboo's rural character. If commercial activity is desired on this parcel in the future, returning the parcel to a Commercial district would still be allowable under the Town's plan.





- 3. The County Clerk shall cause an Official Statement concerning this issue to be prepared by Robert W. Baird & Co. Incorporated. The appropriate County officials shall determine when the Official Statement is final for purposes of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12 and shall certify said Statement, such certification to constitute full authorization of such Statement under this resolution.

Attached are some highlights related to the June, 2014 financial report.

Revenues

Revenues tend to be more cyclical in nature than expenses. Many of Sauk County's grants and aids, the largest revenue source after property tax levy, are paid on a reimbursement basis. The County incurs the expenses, submits the paperwork to primarily the State, and the reimbursement comes later. For this reason, many grant dollars received in January and February are for prior year services, and are allocated back to 2013. Other grants not yet received include: state transportation aids (\$980,000), Human Services (\$1,370,000), state shared revenues (\$756,000), and various conservation grants (\$760,000). Miscellaneous revenues are high due to a revolving loan being unexpectedly repaid in full.

Overall, 39.89% of annual revenues have been recognized through June. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both property taxes which are recorded 1/12th every month, and transfers between Sauk County funds which have

an equal offsetting expense. Note that sales tax (discussed in more detail later) lags by one month.

Property taxes are due on January 31 and are collected by local treasurers through that date. After January 31, all collections become the responsibility of the County. By August 15, Sauk County must make full payment to all the other taxing jurisdictions without regard to what has been collected. Outstanding taxes as of July 31, 2014 follow. This means uncollected delinquent taxes due to Sauk County equal \$9,991,729, which is \$3.0 million less than a year ago at this time. Of this total, about 24.25% (about \$2,423,000) was originally levied to fund County operations. The remaining 75.75% was originally levied by schools and other local governments. The

second installment of the 2013 levv. collected 2014, was due July 31, 2014.

Sales tax receipts lag the month of sale by two months. For instance, for sales made at stores during January, vendors report and remit the sales tax to the State at the end of February, the State processes the information throughout March, and the County receives its payment at the end of March or possibly even the first part of April. Therefore, the County's financial reports as of the end of June only contain sales made through May. Further, sales tax is not at all received equally each month through the year. Summer receipts and the December holidays are higher. Sauk County increased its sales tax budget for 2014 to \$7,200,000. Adjusting the budget for historical seasonal receipts, 2014 sales tax collections are ahead of budget at this point.

Expenditures

Expenditures for wages, salaries and benefits tend to be spread relatively evenly throughout the year, and it is generally reasonable to assume 1/12th should be recorded each month. Also, the Wages & Salaries category includes \$1,099,188 of budgeted but unspent dollars for implementation of the classification and compensation plan. Supplies and services in most areas also tend to be spent fairly evenly throughout the year. Debt service is paid in April (interest only) and October (principal and interest). Capital outlay is rarely spent evenly, and there are huge peaks and valleys by month or quarter.

Overall, 39.39% of annual expenditures have been recognized through June. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both debt service and transfers between Sauk County funds which have equal offsetting revenues. Labor benefits are outpacing wages and salaries because some payrolls happen to have fallen such that there are seven months of health insurance charges posted through June, or about an additional \$123,000.

Current Sauk County 2014 Financial Position

The Finance Committee and Sauk County managers spend a great deal of effort monitoring the Sauk County budget, making plans when areas of concern develop, and taking action (often with Committee and County Board action) when trouble is certain.

The impact of the economy is also watched through a number of key areas, including property tax collections, key planning and zoning permits, register of deeds collections, and interest earned on invested funds.

Cash balances remain strong and steady, and the Treasurer is maintaining ample reserves for the County.

At this point, the Finance Committee has heard from no departments that they expect budget overages in 2014.

In Conclusion

Of special note, Sauk County earned a credit rating upgrade from Aa2 to Aa1 from Moody's in July. This speaks highly of the work of our department managers, oversight committees and County Board. Governments the size of Sauk County are generally too small to be considered for an upgrade to this very high rating category.

In your role as oversight committee members, remain mindful of current and future indications that funding is changing, particularly from the State and Federal governments. Department managers provide you with monthly updates of budget position and statistics that can be leading indicators of changes to the status quo. Even with 2014 budget development complete, program review should *never* be complete to make sure Sauk County is providing those services most vital to those most in need. Changes to business as usual are often extremely difficult and take considerable time to implement.

ORDINANCE NO. 2-2014

APPROVING AN AMENDMENT TO THE SAUK COUNTY FARMLAND PRESERVATION PLAN MAP FOR THE TOWN OF EXCELSIOR AND SUNDRY AMENDMENTS TO OTHER TOWN FARMLAND PRESERVATION PLAN MAPS.

WHEREAS, The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is an agency responsible for administering Wisconsin's farmland preservation law pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch. 91; and

WHEREAS, in order for a county and its residents to participate in the farmland preservation program, a county must have a state-certified farmland preservation plan pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 91.10 which clearly identifies farmland preservation goals, objectives and policies and areas that the county intends to preserve for agricultural use; and

WHEREAS, the development of the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan has had considerable input from persons representing various aspects of the agriculture community; and

WHEREAS, each town farmland preservation plan map represented in the plan has been formally approved by the respective town board as identifying areas the town wishes to preserve for agricultural uses and areas which may be considered for development within the next 15-years and;

WHEREAS, the Farmland Preservation Plan map for the Town of Excelsior must be amended to identify areas for agriculture preservation consistent with A proposed rezone of the Town of Excelsior to Exclusive Agriculture under the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance and;

WHEREAS, Farmland Preservation Plan maps for other towns are being amended to remove publically owned lands from the agricultural preservation area designation to be consistent with the text in the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan and;

WHEREAS, agriculture is a significant economic driver in Sauk County with over 1,900 working farms and 358,900 acres under production or reserved for future production and results in the sale of farm products and valued-added products of over \$450 million annually; and

WHEREAS, adoption of the amended maps for the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors and subsequent certification by DATCP will allow participating Sauk County farms and agricultural property owners in towns zoned Exclusive Agriculture or as part of the Fairfield Agriculture Enterprise Area, to continue to qualify for farmland preservation tax credits; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 91.10(2) the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan must be included, and be made part of the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that the *Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan* map for the Town of Excelsior, hereby attached as Appendix A, and other sundry amendments to town farmland preservation plan maps, and made part of the *Sauk County Comprehensive Plan*, is hereby formally and officially adopted as required by Wis. Stat. §§ 91.10 and 66.1001.

Staff Report Conservation, Planning, and Zoning Committee Amendment to the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan

Hearing Date: June 24, 2014

Request

A request to amend the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan is being made by the Sauk County Conservation, Planning, and Zoning Department on behalf of the Town of Excelsior to enable the town to adopt Exclusive Agriculture Zoning (see Petition 5-2014). The Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) requires that farmland preservation areas, noted as green areas on the Farmland Preservation Plan (FPP) Map for the Town of Excelsior, match areas that are zoned Exclusive Agriculture. As directed by DATCP, this request also includes an amendment to the FPP maps for the various towns to remove the preservation area designation from publicly owned lands.

Historical Analysis

Sauk County has a history of preserving farmland through the implementation of state programs, influencing the development of new state programs, as well the establishment of programs uniquely tailored to Sauk County. The following is a historical timeline of agriculture-related plans and programs which were proposed or adopted in Sauk County (a more complete timeline can be found in *the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan* (FPP Plan)).

1979: Sauk County adopted the "Sauk County Agricultural Preservation Plan." This plan promoted the preservation of agricultural lands through the use of techniques such as density-based zoning, the transfer of development rights, and identifying lands within each town to be preserved for agricultural land uses, transitioned from an agricultural land use to a developed state, or lands that were currently developed.

1981: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors considered the adoption of the Exclusive Agriculture Zoning District (EAZ) as part of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance.

1986: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors approved the addition of the Exclusive Agriculture Zoning District (EAZ) to the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance.

1986-2014: Following the adoption of the EAZ by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, the following towns adopted EAZ.

- Town of Troy, October 1986
- Town of Prairie du Sac, October 1986
- Town of Ironton, November 1986
- Town of Sumpter, April 1987
- Town of Westfield, June 1987
- Town of Franklin, July 1987
- Town of Honey Creek, July 1987
- Town of Reedsburg, November 1990
- Town of Excelsior, July 2014 (Pending)

2006: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors approved an addendum to the 1979 Agricultural Preservation Plan to implement a density-based zoning program for towns zoned Exclusive Agriculture and Resource Conservancy.

2006: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the addition of the Planned Unit Development Program (subsequently renamed Planned Rural Development) in the draft Sauk County Zoning Ordinance, which implemented the density-based zoning program.

2009: The Wisconsin Working Lands Initiative was passed as a part of the state's 2009-2011 biennial budget and coincided with an update to Chapter 91 of Wisconsin State Statutes. Chapter 91 requires counties that participate in the farmland preservation program to adopt an updated farmland preservation plan. Sauk County's deadline to adopt an updated plan was December 31, 2013.

December 2013: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors adopted the "Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan" which met the requirements of Chapter 91 of Wisconsin State Statutes and replaced the 1979 Farmland Preservation Plan.

June/July 2014: The CPZ Committee and Sauk County Board of Supervisors will consider the request as stated above.

Background/Original Planning Process

The Planning Process. The Sauk County Conservation, Planning and Zoning (CPZ) Committee provided oversight to the planning process. A discussion group consisting of persons representing various aspects of the Sauk County agriculture community met to contribute to goal, objective and policy formation. The Sauk County Conservation, Planning and Zoning Department staff gathered data, held information and listening sessions, provided assistance during the discussion group meetings, and worked with the towns to update the Farmland Preservation Plan Map.

<u>Farmland Preservation Plan Map.</u> During the summer of 2013, each town in Sauk County reviewed and, where appropriate, updated their Farmland Preservation Plan Map to designate farmland preservation, development and transition areas. Farmland preservation areas include lands not intended for development and which will remain in an agricultural use, transition areas are those areas designated for non-agricultural development within the next fifteen years and development areas are those areas currently developed or anticipated to be developed in the near term. Only those lands designated as a preservation area qualify for the farmland preservation tax credit and any current or future Agriculture Enterprise Areas. The towns of Washington and Winfield elected not to participate.

<u>Plan Implementation</u>, <u>Maintenance and Review</u>. The Conservation, Planning, and Zoning Department will review and monitor the *FPP Plan* with the CPZ Committee periodically to seek policy directives regarding implementation efforts and potential plan amendments. Without periodic review, this plan has the potential to lose its relevance as conditions change, specific projects are implemented, or as new priorities emerge.

Financial Analysis

Adopting the FPP Plan and any subsequent amendments constitutes one part of the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Program that will enable participating farmers to claim the farmland preservation tax credit. The FPP tax credit paid in 2013 for the 2012 tax year was \$550,300 and is approximately \$500,000-\$600,000 annually. Additionally, a certified FPP Plan may be required to maintain state funding for CPZ staff to implement the Land and Water Resources Management Plan in the amount of approximately \$128,000 annually, and cost-share funding in the amount of approximately \$87,000 annually. Finally, the FPP Plan has been prepared utilizing \$30,000 of grant funding provided by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP).

Legal Authority

Wis. Stat. ch. 91 specifies the requirements to be addressed by the farmland preservation plan and process for adoption. If adopted, the *FPP Plan* amendment will become part of the *Sauk County Comprehensive Plan*. The *FPP Plan* amendment must also be certified by DATCP as meeting the requirements specified under Wis. Stat ch 91.

Policy Alternatives

The County Board may disapprove the *FPP Plan* amendment. Disapproval of the *FPP Plan* amendment would result in the following outcome:

- Jeopardize the farmland preservation tax credit to Sauk County farmers (approx. \$500,000 to \$600,000 annually);
- May jeopardize CPZ Department staff and cost share funding. (approx. \$215,000 annually);
- Jeopardize the Fairfield Agriculture Enterprise Area and associated tax credits;
- Indicate to local towns that Sauk County does not support the Farmland Preservation Program, despite local policies that do support farmland preservation planning efforts;
- Prevent the Town of Excelsior from applying Exclusive Agriculture zoning.

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Sauk County Conservation, Planning and Zoning Committee recommend approval of the amendment to the *Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan Map* for the Town of Excelsior and various amendments to town FPP maps to remove the preservation area designation from publicly owned lands.

Request

A request was submitted by the Town of Excelsior to change the zoning of property from a Resource Conservancy to an Exclusive Agriculture Zoning District. The purpose or basis of the rezone request, as stated by the applicant, is to establish a land use zoning program that reflects the vision and objectives of the Town of Excelsior's Comprehensive Plan.

Legal Description of Area

See Exhibit A, Town of Excelsior, Sauk County, Wisconsin.

Background/Timeline

March 31, 2009. The Town of Excelsior Town Board adopted the Town of Excelsior Comprehensive Plan. The following Land Use Goal excerpted from this plan pertains to the Town's rezone request:

"Plan, control and manage development that will continue to foster a sense of community, and that will preserve the country flavor of the Township while maintaining a balance among agriculture, natural resources, quality of life and development."

Early 2011. The Town of Excelsior convened a committee composed of town residents to discuss and recommend to the Town Board a zoning program that best reflects the vision, goals and objectives in the Town's Comprehensive Plan. Utilizing a qualified consensus process, the Committee decided and recommended that the Town adopt Exclusive Agricultural zoning. Sauk County Planning & Zoning staff provided periodic technical assistance to the Committee regarding the differences between zoning options for consideration by the Committee.

July 12, 2011. The Town of Excelsior Town Board amended the Town of Excelsior Comprehensive Plan to correct errors and clarify programs. The Plan was also amended to include objectives and policies that relate to the rezone request. Also on July 12, 2011, the Town Board recommended approval of the Resource Conservancy-35 Zoning District. The policy and objective from the Town's Plan that support the current rezone request to Exclusive Agriculture are as follows:

LU-Objective-12. Manage the creation of new lots for residential development.

LU-Policy-12a. Replace the Resource Conservancy – 5 Zoning District with the Resource Conservancy – 35 Zoning District which will serve as a transitional zoning to the Exclusive Agricultural Zoning District. The transition to Exclusive Agriculture will occur after an updated Exclusive Agricultural Zoning District has been certified by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) to meet the requirements of Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 91 and which has been approved by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors. Following certification and approval, the town will file an application with Sauk County to apply Exclusive Agricultural Zoning to all areas zoned Resource Conservancy-35.

May 5, 2014. A complete rezone application was received by the Sauk County Conservation, Planning and Zoning Department.

Zoning Map Amendment Standards pursuant to 7.141(8)

In its review and action on the application, the agency (CPZ Committee) shall make findings with respect to the following criteria:

Staff Note: Staff recommends that the CPZ Committee review and respond to the following findings before making a recommendation on the rezoning petition.

(a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of this chapter (Sauk County Zoning Ordinance).

Staff comment: Pursuant to Section 7.003 of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance, the purpose of the ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of Sauk County residents and the public, to plan for future the future development of communities, and to further the purposes contained in Wis. Stat. §59.69(1). Rezoning the Town of Excelsior to Exclusive Agriculture meets the aforementioned standard and purpose.

(b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.

Staff comment: Over all, the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan suggests that Sauk County should continue to update and emphasize programs that will assure the viability of agriculture. Rezoning to Exclusive Agriculture will provide the appropriate level of protection for farmland that the Town seeks and will enable eligible farms to claim the farmland preservation tax credit under Wis. Stat. ch 91.

The Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan map identifies areas for agriculture preservation which are areas that are not intended for non-agriculture development. The rezone is consistent with a proposed Farmland Preservation Plan Map.

(c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering this chapter as currently depicted has been observed.

Staff comment: The Town of Excelsior had intended to adopt Exclusive Agriculture zoning in 2011, but was not able to do so until Sauk County completed a comprehensive zoning ordinance rewrite certifiable by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection DATCP) as meeting Wis. Stat. ch 91 for Farmland Preservation. The new county zoning ordinance was certified by DATCP and adopted by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors in early 2014. The Town now wishes to apply Exclusive Agriculture zoning, as previously intended.

Summary

In summary, the Town of Excelsior Town Board commissioned a committee of town residents to recommend updates to the Town of Excelsior Comprehensive Plan and to consider a zoning program that reflects the goals, objectives and policies of this Plan. The Committee recommended to the Town of Excelsior Board the adoption of Exclusive Agricultural Zoning with Resource Conservancy-35 zoning serving as an interim zoning district until such time that DATCP certified and the Sauk County Board approved a comprehensively revised county zoning ordinance. The Town of Excelsior Town Board has subsequently approved a rezone of the Town from the Resource Conservancy to Exclusive Agriculture.

Committee Action Options

Approve Petition 5-2014, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing, that the Town of Excelsior Board recommends approval of the rezone, and that the rezone is consistent with the Town of Excelsior Comprehensive Plan and the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan and that the rezone meets the finding for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8).



WHEREAS, by Resolution #124-2011, the Honorable Sauk County Board of Supervisors approved the Memorandum of Agreement implementing the Sauk County Fund component of the Highway 12 Growth Management Plan that provides the State of Wisconsin allocate funds in the amount of \$250,000 to fund among other things the purchase of lands or scenic/conservation/agricultural easements from willing sellers in Sauk County outside of the Baraboo Range National Natural Landmark (BRNNL); and,

WHEREAS, one of the express and stated purposes of the Implementation Agreement between the State of Wisconsin Department of Transportation and Sauk County for the Sauk County Fund is to procure streambank easements and to protect and enhance these environmentally sensitive areas and mitigate the environmental impact caused by the expansion of US Highway 12.

WHEREAS, the Conservation, Planning and Zoning Committee believes this offer to purchase a streambank easement is in the best interest of Sauk County and implements the MOA executed between Sauk County and the State of Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

RESOLUTION NO. 74

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF \$4,995,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION REFUNDING BONDS

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin (the "County") hereby finds and determines that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to raise funds for the purpose of refunding obligations of the County, including interest on them, specifically, the General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2004A, dated May 1, 2004, maturing in the years 2015 through 2017, and the General Obligation Promissory Notes, dated December 31, 2007, maturing in the years 2015 through 2017 (collectively, the "Refunded Obligations") (hereinafter the refinancing of the Refunded Obligations shall be referred to as the "Refunding");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to refund the Refunded Obligations for the purpose of achieving debt service cost savings;

WHEREAS, counties are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation refunding bonds to refinance their outstanding obligations; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the County Board of Supervisors that it is necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to authorize the issuance of and to sell its general obligation refunding bonds (the "Bonds") to Robert W. Baird & Co. Incorporated (the "Purchaser"), pursuant to the terms and conditions of its bond purchase proposal attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Proposal").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1. Authorization and Sale of the Bonds. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Refunding, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.04, Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of FOUR MILLION NINE HUNDRED NINETY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,995,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal is hereby accepted, and the Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. To evidence the obligation of the County, the Chairperson and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell to the Purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the County, the Bonds aggregating the principal amount of FOUR MILLION NINE HUNDRED NINETY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,995,000) for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery.

Section 2. Terms of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be designated "General Obligation Refunding Bonds"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$4,995,000; shall be dated September 10, 2014; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on October 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit B-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest is

payable semi-annually on April 1 and October 1 of each year commencing on April 1, 2015. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Bonds is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

<u>Section 3. Redemption Provisions</u>. The Bonds shall not be subject to optional redemption.

Section 4. Form of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

- (A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2014 through 2016 for the payments due in the years 2015 through 2017 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.
- (B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Bonds, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.
- (C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Bonds when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for \$4,995,000 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, dated September 10, 2014" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be

maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Bonds is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. The County Treasurer shall deposit in the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Bonds; (ii) any premium not used for the Refunding which may be received by the County above the par value of the Bonds and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Bonds canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Bonds may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Bonds as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Bonds have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Bonds; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Bonds (the "Bond Proceeds") (other than any premium not used for the Refunding and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Bonds into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose for which the Bonds have been issued has been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause 205

the Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the County, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Bonds to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Bonds are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The County represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Bonds and by the Refunded Obligations and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Bonds or the Refunded Obligations to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The County further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Bonds including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Bonds) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Bonds to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Bonds to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Bonds shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County certifying that the County can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b) The County also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Bonds provided that in meeting such requirements the County will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Bonds and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Designation as Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations. The Bonds are hereby designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265 of the Code, relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct from income for federal income tax purposes, interest expense that is allocable to carrying and acquiring tax-exempt obligations.

Section 11. Execution of the Bonds; Closing; Professional Services. The Bonds shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Bonds may be imprinted on the Bonds in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Bonds, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Bond shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Bonds shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Bonds and all such documents, certificates and

acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Bonds, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Bonds is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 12. Payment of the Bonds; Fiscal Agent. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 13. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Bonds. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Bonds to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Bond shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Bond shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Bond may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Bond at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Bond or Bonds of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Bond surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Bond or Bonds necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 14. Record Date. The fifteenth day of each calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Bonds (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Bonds on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Bonds as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 15. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Bonds eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations previously executed on behalf of the County and on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 16. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Bonds and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or Final Official Statement are hereby

ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or Final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or Final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 17. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Bonds, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Bonds or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Bonds).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 18. Redemption of the Refunded Obligations. The Refunded Obligations are hereby called for prior payment and redemption on October 1, 2014 at a price of par plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

The County hereby directs the County Clerk to work with the Purchaser to cause timely notice of redemption, in substantially the forms attached hereto as Exhibits D-1 and D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Notices"), to be provided at the times, to the parties and in the manner set forth on the Notices. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the County to effectuate the redemption of the Refunded Obligations are hereby ratified and approved.

Section 19. Record Book. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Bonds in the Record Book.

Section 20. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Bonds, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Bond proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Bonds by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Bond provided herein.

Section 21. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.





NEW YORK, July 29, 2014 -- Moody's Investors Service has upgraded Sauk County, WI's general obligation (GO) rating to Aa1 from Aa2. Concurrently, Moody's has assigned a Aa1 rating to the county's \$5.0 million General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The bonds are secured by the county's general obligation unlimited tax pledge and proceeds will refund the 2015 through 2017 maturities of the county's General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2004A and General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2007 for net present value savings of \$358,000 or 5.1%. Post-sale, the county will have \$21.9 million of outstanding GO debt.

SUMMARY RATING RATIONALE

The upgrade to Aa1 reflects the county's moderately sized tax base with a high full value per capita, and positive operating results that have led to the build-up of substantial operating reserves. The Aa1 rating also incorporates the county's strong local economy with some concentration in tourism, modest debt profile and with very low unfunded pension obligations.

STRENGTHS:

- -Strong financial position characterized by healthy operating reserves
- -Modest pension and debt liabilities
- -Some unused levy capacity provides financial flexibility

CHALLENGES:

- -Consecutive years of tax base decline
- -Economic concentration in tourism
- -Tax base is small for the rating category

DETAILED CREDIT DISCUSSION

MODERATELY SIZED TAX BASE WITH HIGH FULL VALUE PER CAPITA; REGIONAL ECONOMY RELIANT ON TOURISM INDUSTRY

We expect the county's moderately sized tax base will exhibit long term stability due to its strong regional economy rooted in tourism. The county covers 840 square miles, including the county seat, Baraboo (Aa3), as well as portions of the Wisconsin Dells region, including the state's most visited state park, Devil's Lake. The county's largest taxpayer and second largest employer is the Kalahari Development, a large resort facility which accounted for 1.8% of 2013 valuation and employs 1,300. At \$6.4 billion in full valuation, the tax base has declined at an average annual rate of 2.0% since 2008, with declines ranging from 1.4% to 3.0%. While some of the declines were related to depreciation, the drops were also due to a severe flood event in June 2008 that damaged property in the county and a reclassification of property owned by a non-profit organization to tax exempt status in 2009. Looking forward, management anticipates values to stabilize or to modestly increase.

In recent years, the county's tourism attraction have transitioned from summer only attractions to year-round destinations, with a variety of resorts, conference centers, and entertainment options. While the local economy remains vulnerable to economic fluctuations, officials report local tourism remained strong during recessionary times as vacationers from the regional area chose to stay closer to home. The county's unemployment rate, which stood at 5.1% in May of 2014, has steadily declined from a high of 8.2% in 2011 and was slightly below the state and national rates of 5.5% and 6.1%, respectively, during the same time period.

According to data from the American Community Survey (2008-2012), the county's median family income is 101.2% of the nation. Estimated 2013 full value per capita is a strong \$103,845, reflecting the significant portion of the county that is covered by forestry. The county's 2010 population was 61,976, which represents an increase of 12.2% from 2000.

STRONG FINANCIAL POSITION DESPITE PLANNE D USE OF RESERVES IN 2014; HISTORY OF ANNUAL OPERATING SURPLUSES

While county management has budgeted to use fund balance in fiscal 2014, we expect the county's financial position to remain very healthy due to management's conservative budgeting practices and a history of surplus operations. Over the last decade, the county has made a draw on General Fund reserves only once, in 2006, for capital projects. While the fiscal 2013 budget called for the use of \$2.5 million of reserves, actual results show the year closed with a healthy operating surplus of \$3.1 million, growing the General Fund balance to \$31.8 million, or a very healthy 90% of revenues. Higher than budgeted sales tax and interest earnings, as well as the lack of need to use \$1 million budgeted for contingency purposes, led to the positive operations. For fiscal 2014, the county increased the property tax levy by a modest 1.3% and budgeted to use \$6.8 million in fund balance. Management's policy is to refrain from using fund balance for operations and instead use available fund balance for capital projects and other one-time uses. The bulk of the budgeted use of fund balance is related to a \$2.4 million contribution to the construction of a new residential and science facility for the University of Wisconsin - Baraboo / Sauk County campus. The county is also making investments in its dispatch center, 911 equipment, and energy efficiency projects.

The county's other major operating fund, the Human Services Fund, is healthy with a fiscal 2013 fund balance of \$4.2 million, or 27.0% of revenues. Revenues for the Human Service Fund are close to equally split by property taxes and intergovernmental revenues. The county operates an 82-bed skilled nursing home which was opened in 2009. While the county's nursing home is not self-sufficient, the amount of property tax support required has declined slightly in recent years, from \$2.7 million in 2011 to \$2.2 million in 2013. Mitigating some of the county's enterprise risk is the high occupancy of the nursing home, which is typically at 95% with a waiting list.

The county is primarily funded by taxes, including property and sales taxes. Taxes comprised 63.3% of 2013 operating revenues compared to 23% of revenues provided by intergovernmental revenues. The county implemented a 0.5% sales tax in 1992 and uses most of the sales tax revenues to support debt service and capital project expenditures, though excess receipts can be transferred to the General Fund. In fiscal 2013, sales tax receipts totaled \$7.5 million, an increase of 2.7% over 2012. While sales tax was budgeted at \$7.2 million for fiscal 2014, three-months of collections totaled \$2.2 million, roughly 8.4% higher than the same time period in 2013.

MODEST DEBT PROFILE; RAPID PRINCIPAL AMORTIZATION

The county's debt profile is expected to remain manageable due to a lack of future borrowing plans and average payout of outstanding debt. The county is an infrequent issuer of debt. Currently outstanding debt levels for the county are average with its net direct debt and overall debt burden at 0.3% and 2.4% of full value, respectively. Payout is rapid with 86.9% of outstanding principal amortized within 10 years. All of the county's outstanding debt is fixed rate and it is not a party to any interest rate swap agreements.

AFFORDABLE PENSION LIABILITIES

The county's exposure to the state multi-employer pension plan, the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS), is expected to remain manageable. The county has no reported prior service unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) allocated to it by the system, and has historically made its required contributions to WRS. For fiscal 2012, employer contributions totaled \$1.7 million, or a low 3.6% of 2012 operating revenues. The three year (2010-2012) average of Moody's adjusted net pension liability (ANPL) for the county, under our methodology for adjusting reported pension data, was \$31.5 million, or a modest 0.65 times operating revenues and 0.47 times full value.

Moody's ANPL reflects certain adjustments we make to improve comparability of reported pension liabilities. The adjustments are not intended to replace the county's reported contribution information, but to improve comparability with other rated entities. We determined the county's share of liability for WRS in proportion to its contributions to the plan and covered payroll.

On April 9, 2014, the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provided your community with Preliminary copies of the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) and Flood Insurance Study (FIS) report for Sauk County, Wisconsin and Incorporated Areas. FEMA has posted digital copies of these FIRM and FIS report materials to the following Website: http://www.fema.gov/preliminaryfloodhazarddata. The Preliminary FIRM and FIS report include proposed flood hazard information for certain locations in the Unincorporated Areas of Sauk County, Wisconsin. The proposed flood hazard information may include addition or modification of Special Flood Hazard Areas, the areas that would be inundated by the base (1-percent-annual-chance) flood; base flood elevations or depths; zone designations; or regulatory floodways.

We have published a notice of the proposed flood hazard determinations in the *Federal Register* and will publish a public notification concerning the appeal process (explained below) in the *Reedsburg Independent* on or about September 11, 2014, and September 18, 2014. We will also publish a separate notice of the flood hazard determinations on the "Flood Hazard Determinations on the Web" portion of the FEMA Website (www.fema.gov/plan/prevent/fhm/bfe). We have enclosed copies of the notice published in the *Federal Register* and the newspaper notice for your information.

These proposed flood hazard determinations, if finalized, will become the basis for the floodplain management measures that your community must adopt or show evidence of having in effect to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). However, before any new or modified flood hazard information is effective for floodplain management purposes, FEMA will provide community officials and citizens an opportunity to appeal the proposed flood hazard information presented on the preliminary FIRM and FIS report posted to the above-referenced Website.

Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Public Law 93-234) is intended to ensure an equitable balancing of all interests involved in the setting of flood hazard determinations. The legislation provides for an explicit process of notification and appeals for your community and for private persons prior to this office making the flood hazard determinations final. The appeal procedure is outlined below

for your information and in the enclosed document titled Criteria for Appeals of Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

During the 90-day appeal period following the second publication of the public notification in the abovenamed newspaper, any owner or lessee of real property in your community who believes his or her
property rights will be adversely affected by the proposed flood hazard determinations may appeal to you,
or to an agency that you publicly designate. It is important to note, however, that the sole basis for such
appeals is the possession of knowledge or information indicating that the proposed flood hazard
determinations are scientifically or technically incorrect. The appeal data must be submitted to FEMA
during the 90-day appeal period. Only appeals of the proposed flood hazard determinations supported by
scientific or technical data can be considered before FEMA makes its final flood hazard determination at
the end of the 90-day appeal period. Note that the 90-day appeal period is statutory and cannot be
extended. However, FEMA also will consider comments and inquiries regarding data other than the
proposed flood hazard determinations (e.g., incorrect street names, typographical errors, omissions) that
are submitted during the appeal period, and will incorporate any appropriate changes to the FIRM and FIS
report before they become effective.

If your community cannot submit scientific or technical data before the end of the 90-day appeal period, you may nevertheless submit data at any time. If warranted, FEMA will revise the FIRM and FIS report after the effective date. This means that the FIRM would be issued with the flood hazard information presently indicated, and flood insurance purchase requirements would be enforced accordingly, until such time as a revision could be made.

Any interested party who wishes to appeal should present the data that tend to negate or contradict our findings to you, or to an agency that you publicly delegate, in such form as you may specify. We ask that you review and consolidate any appeal data you may receive and issue a written opinion stating whether the evidence provided is sufficient to justify an official appeal by your community in its own name or on behalf of the interested parties. Whether or not your community decides to appeal, you must send copies of individual appeals and supporting data, if any, to:

If we do not receive an appeal or other formal comment from your community in its own name within 90 days of the second date of public notification, we will consolidate and review on their own merits such appeal data and comments from individuals that you may forward to us, and we will make such modifications to the proposed flood hazard information presented on the FIRM and in the FIS report as may be appropriate. If your community decides to appeal in its own name, all individuals' appeal data must be consolidated into one appeal by you, because, in this event, we are required to deal only with the local government as representative of all local interests. We will send our final decision in writing to you, and we will send copies to the community floodplain administrator, each individual appellant, and the State NFIP Coordinator.

All appeal submittals will be resolved by consultation with officials of the local government involved, by an administrative hearing, or by submission of the conflicting data to an independent scientific body or appropriate Federal agency for advice. Use of a Scientific Resolution Panel (SRP) is also available to your community in support of the appeal resolution process when conflicting scientific or technical data are submitted during the appeal period. SRPs are independent panels of experts in hydrology, hydraulics, and other pertinent sciences established to review conflicting scientific and technical data and provide recommendations for resolution. An SRP is an option after FEMA and community officials have been engaged in a collaborative consultation process for at least 60 days without a mutually acceptable resolution of an appeal. Please refer to the enclosed "Scientific Resolution Panels" fact sheet for additional information on this resource available to your community.

FEMA will make the reports and other information used in making the final determination available for public inspection. Until the conflict of data is resolved and the FIRM becomes effective, flood insurance available within your community will continue to be available, and no person shall be denied the right to purchase the applicable level of insurance at chargeable rates.

The decision by your community to appeal, or a copy of its decision not to appeal, should be filed with this office no later than 90 days following the second publication of the flood hazard determination notice in the above-named newspaper. Your community may find it appropriate to call further attention to the proposed flood hazard determinations and to the appeal procedure by using a press release or other public notice.

If warranted by substantive changes, during the appeal period we will send you Revised Preliminary copies of the FIRM and FIS report. At the end of the 90-day appeal period and following the resolution of any appeals and comments, we will send you a Letter of Final Determination, which will finalize the flood hazard information presented on the FIRM and FIS report and will establish an effective date.

Technical information or comments are solicited on the proposed flood hazard determinations shown on the preliminary FIRM and/or FIS report for Sauk County, Wisconsin and Incorporated Areas. These flood hazard determinations are the basis for the floodplain management measures that your community is required to either adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program. However, before these determinations are effective for floodplain management purposes, you will be provided an opportunity to appeal the proposed information. WHEREAS, in 2014, Sauk County, the City of Baraboo, and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System approved an extension of the existing lease agreement for the Campus until June 30, 2092; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Baraboo and the County of Sauk jointly own and finance infrastructure improvements at the University of Wisconsin Baraboo Sauk County campus; and,

WHEREAS, both the City and the County have anticipated equal portions of \$4,860,000 for the design and construction of the science labs and classroom remodeling and expansion; and,

EASEMENT UNDERGROUND ELECTRIC

The undersigned Grantors City of Baraboo, Wisconsin, a municipal corporation a/k/a City of Baraboo, a municipal corporation and Sauk County, a Wisconsin Municipal Corporation, (hereinafter called the "Grantor"), in consideration of the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) and other good and valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, does hereby grant, convey and warrant unto Wisconsin Power and Light Company, a Wisconsin corporation, (hereinafter called the "Grantee"), the Grantee's successors and assigns, the perpetual right and easement to construct, install, maintain, operate, repair, inspect, replace, add, relocate and remove the Designated Facilities, as indicated below, upon, in, over, through and across lands owned by the Grantor in the City of Baraboo, County of Sauk, State of Wisconsin, the Easement Area to be thirty (30) and twenty (20) feet in widths and depicted on Exhibit "A", and described on Exhibit "B", attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Record this document with the Register of Deeds

This Easement is subject to the following conditions:

- Designated Facilities: This easement is for underground electric line facilities, including but not limited to conduit, cables, above ground electric pad-mount transformers, secondary pedestals, riser equipment and other appurtenant equipment associated with underground electric line facilities.
- 2. Access: The Grantee and its agents shall have the right of reasonable ingress and egress to, over and across the Grantor's land adjacent to the Easement Area.
- 3. **Buildings and Structures:** The Grantor agrees within the Easement Area not to construct or place buildings, structures, or other improvements, or place water, sewer or drainage facilities; all without the express written consent of the Grantee.
- 4. Landscaping and Vegetation: No plantings and landscaping are allowed within the Easement Area that will interfere with the easement rights herein granted. The Grantee has the right to trim or remove trees, bushes and brush within the Easement Area without replacement or compensation hereinafter. The Grantee may treat the stumps of any trees, bushes or brush to prevent re-growth and apply herbicides in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations, for tree and brush control.
- 5. **Elevation:** After the installation of the facilities and final grading of the Easement Area, the Grantor agrees not to alter the elevation of the existing ground surface by more than six (6) inches or place rocks or boulders more than eight (8) inches in diameter, within the Easement Area, without the express written consent of the Grantee.
- 6. **Restoration and Damages:** The Grantee shall restore, cause to have restored or pay a reasonable sum for all damages to property, crops, fences, livestock, lawns, roads, fields and field tile (other than trees trimmed or cut down and removed), caused by the construction, maintenance or removal of said facilities.
- 7. Rights not granted to the Grantee: The Grantee shall not have the right to construct or place fences, buildings or any other facilities other than the above Designated Facilities.
- 8. Reservation of use by the Grantor: The right is hereby expressly reserved to the Grantor, the heirs, successors and assigns, of every use and enjoyment of said land within the Easement Area consistent with rights herein granted.
- 9. Binding Effect: This agreement is binding upon the heirs, successors and assigns of the parties hereto, and shall run with the lands described herein.
- 10. **Easement Brochure:** As provided by PSC 113, the Grantor shall have a minimum period of five days to examine materials approved or provided by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin describing the Grantor's rights and options in the easement negotiating process. The Grantor hereby voluntarily waives the five day review period or acknowledges that they have had at least five days to review such materials.



AMENDMENT #1 9-16-2014

THIS DARK FIBER LEASE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is dated as of March 1st, 2013, by and between Sauk County, a political subdivision of the State of Wisconsin, ("County") and Wisconsin Independent Network, LLC, a Wisconsin Limited Liability Company ("Lessee" or "WIN") is hereby amended as follows:

- Two (2) fibers on Leg I from the Sauk City Tower to Vault #43 38.6 miles (19.3 miles per fiber);
- Total Distance as describe = 145.94 miles (72.97 miles per fiber).

5. Fees.

For the Term of this agreement the County shall receive from the Lessee the monthly lease fee as defined within Attachment D – Amendment #1 in addition to the fees in the original agreement Attachment D. This fee will automatically increase annually on January 1st of each calendar year regardless of the effective date of this agreement. Annual costs are noted within Attachment C of the original agreement. This additional Lease fee may be paid either monthly or annually. There will be a one-time Lease application fee, a one-time restoration fee and splicing costs as outlined within Attachment D – Amendment #1 attached hereto. The one-time cost will be invoiced upon completion of the work and signature of the agreement and must be paid within thirty (30) of the invoice.

All other portions, conditions and requirements of the original lease agreement will remain in full effect.

Attached are some highlights related to the September, 2014 financial report.

Revenues

Revenues tend to be more cyclical in nature than expenses. Many of Sauk County's grants and aids, the largest revenue source after property tax levy, are paid on a reimbursement basis. The County incurs the expenses, submits the paperwork to primarily the State, and the reimbursement comes later. Grants that are not evenly received throughout the year and are still outstanding include: state shared revenues (\$643,000), various conservation grants (\$490,000), and child support (\$355,000). User fees are slightly behind budget primarily due to the Health Care Center needing to limit admissions for a short period early in 2014 due to illnesses. Miscellaneous revenues are high due to a revolving loan being unexpectedly repaid in full.

Overall, 71.74% of annual revenues have been recognized through September. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both property taxes which are recorded 1/12th every month, and transfers between Sauk County funds which have an equal offsetting expense. Note that sales tax (discussed in more detail later) lags by one month.

Property taxes are due on January 31 and are collected by local treasurers through that date. After January 31, all collections become the responsibility of the County. By August 15, Sauk County must make full payment to all the other taxing jurisdictions without regard to what has been collected. Outstanding taxes as of October 31, 2014 follow. This means uncollected delinquent taxes due to Sauk County equal \$2,513,949, which is \$640,000 less than a year ago at this time. Of this total, about 24.25% (about \$610,000) was originally levied to fund County operations. The remaining 75.75% was originally levied by schools and other local governments. The second installment of the 2013 levy, collected 2014, was due July 31, 2014.

Sales tax receipts lag the month of sale by two months. For instance, for sales made at stores during January, vendors report and remit the sales tax to the State at the end of February, the State processes the information throughout March, and the County receives its payment at the end of March or possibly even the first part of April. Therefore, the County's financial reports as of the end of September only contain sales made through August. Further, sales tax is not at all received equally each month through the year. Summer receipts and the December holidays are higher. Sauk County increased its sales tax budget for 2014 to \$7,200,000. Adjusting the budget for historical seasonal receipts, 2014 sales tax collections are ahead of budget at this point.

Expenditures

Expenditures for wages, salaries and benefits tend to be spread relatively evenly throughout the year, and it is generally reasonable to assume 1/12th should be recorded each month. Also, the Wages & Salaries category includes \$1,099,188 of budgeted but largely unspent dollars for implementation of the classification and compensation plan. Supplies and services in most areas also tend to be spent fairly evenly throughout the year; however, Human Services volatile expenses for institutional care, foster care and juvenile corrections are underspent. Debt service is paid in April (interest only) and October (principal and interest). Capital outlay is rarely spent evenly, and there are huge peaks and valleys by month or quarter.

Overall, 62.07% of annual expenditures have been recognized through September. The following chart is in order of budgeted magnitude of dollars, and excludes both debt service and transfers between Sauk County funds which have equal offsetting revenues. Labor benefits are outpacing wages and salaries because some payrolls happen to have fallen such that there are ten months of health insurance charges posted through June, or about an additional \$575,000.

Current Sauk County 2014 Financial Position

The Finance Committee and Sauk County managers spend a great deal of effort monitoring the Sauk County budget, making plans when areas of concern develop, and taking action (often with Committee and County Board action) when trouble is certain.

The impact of the economy is also watched through a number of key areas, including property tax collections, key planning and zoning permits, register of deeds collections, and interest earned on invested funds.



Even with 2015 budget development nearly complete, program review should *never* be complete to make sure Sauk County is providing those services most vital to those most in need. Changes to business as usual are often extremely difficult and take considerable time to implement.

To amend the 2015 Proposed Budget, as recommended by the Finance Committee, I Hereby Propose: To decrease the tax levy in the 2015 Sheriff's department budget by \$222,435.

This can be done by increasing the budgeted rent income from rented beds in pod B from \$415,329 (22 ADP at \$51.72) to \$660,750 (35 ADP at \$51.72) and increasing the inmate meal expense from \$308,000 to \$330,986. The net impact on tax levy of these two steps is as follows. Increased revenue is \$245,421 (\$660,750 minus \$415,329). Increased meal expense is \$22,986 (\$308,000 to \$330,986).

Using official data and calendar years, the average daily population (ADP) of renters was 26 in 2012, 42 in 2013 and 38.8 from Jan to September 2014.

35 renters is less than in 2013 and likely less than in 2014. Budgeting for 35 renters is much more evidence based in contrast to the budgeting of 22 which is lower than any yearly ADP since 2003. Compared to the official actual rent numbers cited above, budgeting for only 22 renters grossly underestimates the rental population likely for 2015 and unnecessarily raises the property tax levy allocated to the Sheriff Department's budget.

to amend the proposed 2015 budget to reduce the levy dollars in the budget of three of the four largest county departments (listed below) by the amount of their share of the \$460,747 "vacancy factor reduction"

The \$460,747 is not levied in the 2015 Sauk County budget because it is not expected to be spent.

We know from experience that the large departments have some staff vacancies each year which means they don't spend 100% of the amount needed to compensate all employees in a year without vacancies. The expected amount for 2015 is \$460,747 and it is already omitted from the 2015 levy. Yet the 2015 budget authorizes the spending of the \$460,747 by these three departments.

The change proposed by the amendment for the three departments is tested and working because it was made to the county nursing home budget after 2005. If this change had not been made by someone else to the nursing home, the 2015 budget would allow the nursing home to spend another \$250,000 of levy dollars that are not levied.

Anticipated service changes (additions and/or reductions):

Adoption of this amendment doesn't change the total tax levy even if vacancies end up being zero. This amendment doesn't encourage or discourage vacancies. It doesn't punish a department if the vacancy rate is different from expected. The benefit of the amendment is that it makes a budget more accountable and realistic compared to expectations. When vacancies were less than expected in the past, money was usually taken from the contingency or general fund. That would remain the same with this amendment.

SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE CHANGES - DECEMBER 16, 2014 COUNTY BOARD

The following summarize the proposed changes to the Sauk Co. Code of Ordinances that have been recommended by various oversight committees for consideration by the county board:

CHAPTER 15 - ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE (UTV) CROSSINGS AND ROUTES ON HIHGWAYS IN SAUK COUNTY

The current version of Sauk Co. Code ch. 15 that regulates approval of ATV and UTV routes, does not include delegating approval of ATV and UTV routes on state highway bridges to the Highway and Parks Committee. In April 2014, the Wisconsin State Legislature enacted 2013 Act 313. This Act granted authority to counties and local governments to establish ATV routes on state trunk highway bridges. Pursuant to the Act, ch. 15 has been revised to include authority to the Highway and Parks Committee to designate ATV and UTV routes on state trunk highway bridges. Along with the delegation of this authority, ch. 15 has been revised to include rules and regulations pertaining to ATVs and UTVs operating on designated ATV and UTV routes on state trunk highways to cross a bridge. Additionally, the permit process section of ch. 15 has been revised to include state trunk highway bridges as well as county trunk highways. The speed that ATVs and UTVs can operate on a route has also been increased from 25 to 35 miles per hour, unless a reduced speed is otherwise required by law. Seasonal closure of routes has been removed to allow year around use of ATVs and UTVs. Other non-substantive changes have been made to ch. 15 that do not change its meaning.

CHAPTER 16 - AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER

The current version of Sauk Co. Code ch. 16 interchangeably refers to the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) Committee and Advisory Committee. The Wisconsin Statutes clarify the duties of these respective bodies and provide for an ADRC Committee of the county board and an Advisory Committee, two separate entities. The revised version of ch. 16 has been amended to reflect the proper usage of these names. Additionally, other non-substantive changes have been made to ch. 16 that improve the clarity of the ordinance.

CHAPTER 20 - UNIFORM CITATION

Sauk Co. Code ch. 20, Uniform Citation Ordinance, is amended to reflect changes made in ch. 28 and the repeal of chs. 29 and 44.

CHAPTER 28 - ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Sauk Co. Code ch. 28 Tattoo Ordinance, ch. 29 Public Health Nuisance Ordinance, and ch. 44 Food Protection Ordinance are each individual ordinances. These ordinances have been consolidated and amended to become ch. 28 Environmental Health Ordinance. It is believed that other members of the environmental health consortium will adopt a similar code. Nonsubstantive changes have also been made.

CHAPTER 30 - MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Sauk Co. Code ch. 30 Miscellaneous Provisions is amended to include "electronic smoking" and "electronic smoking device" in the definition of "smoking." The definition of "smoking" in ch. 30 has been revised to include the carrying or holding of a lighted or activated pipe, cigar, cigarette, electronic smoking device, or any other lighted or activated smoking product or equipment used to burn any tobacco products, weed, plant, or any other combustible substance. Smoking includes emitting or exhaling the fumes or vapor of any pipe, cigar, cigarette, electronic smoking device, or any other lighted smoking equipment used for burning any tobacco product, weed, plant, or any other combustible substance. As the definition of "smoking" includes the term "electronic smoking device," it is necessary to include the definition of "electronic smoking device" in ch. 30, as well. The definition of "electronic smoking device" has been included to mean an electronic or battery-operated device that delivers vapor for inhalation. The term includes every variation and type of such devices including electronic cigarettes, electronic cigars, electronic cigarillos, electronic pipes, electronic hookahs or any other similar product.

CHAPTER 37 - INFORMATION PRACTICES

Sauk Co. Code ch. 37 is currently the Records Retention ordinance. This ordinance is out of date and not in compliance with the Wisconsin Public Records Board's model retention schedule for counties. The current ordinance also does not address electronic data and differentiate what electronic data must be maintained as a public record and what does not. Currently, provisions related to the maintenance of public records and public records requests, are contained in Sauk Co. Code § 30.50 Miscellaneous Provisions. This proposed repeal and recreate creates a new ch. 37 Information Practices that places all code provisions dealing with records in one location. The two key new provisions are; first, the elimination of a detailed records retention schedule, and replacing it with a reference to the Public Records Board's schedule; and second, the provisions pertaining to electronic records. The other provisions of the ordinance relocate the current provisions pertaining county practices related to public records from Sauk Co. Code § 30.50 to the new ch. 37.

CHAPTER 42 - EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Sauk Co. Code ch. 42 is repealed and recreated to accurately reflect statutory authorities, organizational changes in the Emergency Management, Buildings & Safety Department and to ensure compliance with the National Incident Management Systems. The changes facilitate an effective and coordinated emergency management system in order to meet the needs of the community in a county-declared disaster in a timely manner. The changes also ensure that county guidelines for competitive purchasing, emergency bidding and hiring details are addressed.

WHEREAS, other non-substantive changes have been made to the attached ordinances, including the renumbering of sections, which do not substantially change their meaning; and,

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee has considered the repeal of chs. 28, 29 and 44, and the creation of ch. 28, and the amendments to ch. 20 and ch. 30, and believe that adoption of these amendments is in the best interest of the people of Sauk County.

(16) CHAPTER TWENTY-EIGHT: TATTOO ORDINANCE; pursuant to Section 28.13, which authorizes penalties of not less than \$ 500.00 nor more than \$ 2000.00 and which authorizes the suspension of licenses a period of up to three (3) years:

CHAPTER 30

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 30.20 Smoking prohibited in Sauk County buildings and within close proximity to building entrances. (1) DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this section, certain words and terms are defined as follows:
- (a) "Electronic smoking device" means an electronic or battery-operated device that delivers vapor for inhalation. The term includes every variation and type of such devices including electronic eigarettes, electronic eigars, electronic eigarillos, electronic pipes, electronic hookahs, or any other similar product.
- (b) "Smoking" means the carrying or holding of a lighted or activated pipe, cigar, cigarette, electronic smoking device, or any other lighted or activated smoking product or equipment used to burn any tobacco product, weed, plant, or any other combustible substance. Smoking includes emitting or exhaling the fumes or vapor of any pipe, cigar, cigarette, electronic smoking device, or any other lighted smoking equipment used for burning any tobacco product, weed, plant, or any other combustible substance.
- (2) There shall be no smoking allowed in any building owned or leased by Sauk County except that smoking policies for residents of the Sauk county Health Care Center shall be established by the Sauk County Health Care Center Board of Trustees.
- (3) Exposure by nonsmokers to secondhand smoke should be minimized, and therefore, smoking shall be discouraged adjacent to or within 15 feet to a public building entrance. Smokers should be directed to designated outdoor smoking areas.
- (4) The property & insurance committee shall designate an outdoor area at the Sauk County Courthouse and the Sauk County West Square Building as a smoking area, shall furnish it appropriately, and clear signage should direct smokers to their location. The sheriff, highway commissioner, and superintendent of the Health Care Center are authorized to establish employee smoking areas that are not closer than 15 feet to any building entrance at the facilities

under their supervision. While smoking in outdoor areas is not prohibited, employees and visitors to Sauk County grounds shall be encouraged to smoke in designated areas.

(5) The property & insurance committee is authorized to adopt policies consistent with this section.

SUBCHAPTER I

GENERAL PROVISIONS

- **28.001 Title.** This ordinance may be cited as the Sauk County Environmental Health Ordinance.
- **28.002** Effective date. This ordinance shall become effective upon its adoption by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.
- **28.003 Purpose.** The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, welfare, and environment for the people and communities of Sauk County, in cooperation with state and federal authorities and specifically the following:
- (1) Define words, terms, and phrases contained in this ordinance which are essential to the understanding, administration, and enforcement of this ordinance.

- (2) Authorize the Sauk County Health Department to become the designated agent of the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection for the purpose of establishing permit fees, issuing permits, collecting samples, making investigations of retail food establishments, and enacting local regulations governing these establishments.
- (3) Protect the public health by preventing the spread and transmission of disease through the processes of tattoo application, body piercing, or both.
- (4) Provide for the administration and enforcement of this ordinance and establish penalties for its violation.
- (5) Prevent the spread of communicable diseases.
- (6) Prevent the continuance of public nuisances.
- (7) Assure compliance with state and county air quality standards.

- (8) Assure that insects and rodents do not create a public nuisance or health hazard.
- (9) Assure that surface and ground water meet state and county regulatory standards.
- (10) Assure that solid waste is handled, stored, and disposed of according to state and county regulatory standards.
- (11) Assure that citizens are protected from hazardous, unhealthy, or unsafe substances.
- (12) Assure protection against food borne illness.
- (13) Assure that all public facilities that require a license or permit under this ordinance or Wisconsin Administrative Code, adopted by reference in this ordinance, comply with state and county regulations.
- (14) Provide guidance to the health officer for enforcement of public facilities not in compliance with this ordinance and state regulations.
- 28.004 Administration. This ordinance shall be administered by the health department under the guidance of the board of health, in cooperation with state agencies. The Sauk County Health Officer shall have the power to ensure compliance with the intent and purpose of this ordinance by any means authorized by the law. The health officer may designate in writing other employees of the health department as designees to carry out the responsibilities of this ordinance. designees shall have those powers designated by the health officer and may include any power or duty of the health officer.
- 28.005 Interpretation. In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of Sauk County, and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by the Wisconsin Statutes or other county ordinance.
- **28.006 Authority.** This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted by law including Wis. Stat. §\$59.70, 59.54, 66.0119, 66.0417, 66.115, 95.50(3), 97.41, 125.68(5), and 68, 75, 173, 250, 251, 252, 254, 66.122, 141.01(10), 143.03 146.14 Wis. Admin Code ch.

- SPS 361 to SPS 365, 526, and 823, and as further updated or modified by law.
- **28.007** Severability. Each section, paragraph, sentence, clause, word, and provision of this ordinance is servable, and if any provisions shall be held unconstitutional or invalid by a decision of any court or other tribunal having jurisdiction for an reason, such decisions shall not affect the remainder of this ordinance nor any part, other than that clearly intended to be affected by such decision.
- **28.008 Jurisdiction.** The jurisdiction of this ordinance shall include all air, land, and water; both surface and ground; within Sauk County.

SUBCHAPTER II

DEFINITIONS

- **28.009** Word usage. For the purposes of this ordinance, certain words and terms are used as follows:
- (1) Words used in the present tense include the future.
- (2) Words in the singular include the plural.
- (3) Words in the plural include the singular.
- (4) The word "shall" is mandatory and not permissive.
- (5) Words and phrases not defined in this subchapter shall be construed according to common and approved usage, but technical words and phrases and others that have a peculiar meaning shall be construed according to the peculiar meaning unless such construction would produce a result inconsistent with the manifest intent of this ordinance.
- (6) All definitions as set forth in Wis. Stat. chs. 68, 97, 125, and 251, Wis. Stat. § 66.0417, Wis. Admin Code ch. ATCP 75, DHS 140, and SPS 361 to SPS 365 are incorporated in this ordinance by reference and shall be construed, read, and interpreted as if fully set forth in this subchapter until amended, and then shall apply as amended.

- **28.010 Definitions.** For the purposes of this ordinance, certain words and terms are defined as follows:
- (1) "Annual food sales" means the total gross retail food sales at a retail food establishment for the previous 12 months.
- (2) "Annual permit fee" means a fee for on-site inspection of the entire facility and one follow-up inspection to determine that establishments identified in subch. III are compliant with the statutes and administrative codes that govern their operation.
- (3) "Antiseptic" means a chemical that kills or inhibits the growth of organisms on skin or living tissue.
- (4) "Autoclave" means an apparatus that is registered and listed with the federal food and drug administration for sterilizing articles by using superheated steam under pressure.
- (5) "Board of health" means the Sauk County Board of Health.
- (6) "Body pierce" as a verb, means to perforate any human body part or tissue, except an ear, and to place a foreign object in the perforation to prevent the perforation from closing.
- (7) "Body piercer" means a person who performs body piercing on another person at that person's request.
- (8) "Body piercing" means perforating any human body part or tissue, except an ear, and placing a foreign object in the perforation to prevent the perforation from closing.
- (9) "Body piercing establishment" means the premises where a body piercer performs body piercing.
- (10) "Building or structure" means a building or structure having walls and a roof erected or set upon an individual foundation or slab constructed base designed or used for the housing, shelter, enclosure, or support of persons, animals or property of any kind. This definition includes mobile homes.
- (11) "Combined tattoo and body piercing establishment" means the premises where a tattooist or body piercer performs a tattoo or body piercing.
- (12) "Combined temporary tattoo and body piercing establishment" means the premises where a tattooist or body piercer

- performs a tattoo or body piercing for a maximum of 7 days.
- (13) "County" means Sauk County, Wisconsin.
- (14) "Cleaning" means the removal of foreign material from objects, normally accomplished with detergent, water, and mechanical action.
- (15) "Disinfectant" means a chemical that is capable of destroying disease-causing organisms on inanimate objects, with the exception of bacterial spores.
- (16) "Duplicate permit fee" means a fee for the replacement of an original permit.
- (17) "Health department" means the Sauk County Health Department.
- (18) "Health director" means the director of the health department.
- (19) "Health officer" means a public official charged with the administration, enforcement, and interpretation of the Sauk County Environmental Health Ordinance.
- (20) "Food" means a raw, cooked, or processed edible substance, ice, beverage, or ingredient used or intended for use or for sale in whole or in part for human consumption, or chewing gum.
- (21) "Food processing" means the manufacture or preparation of food sale through the process of canning, extracting, fermenting, distilling, pickling, freezing, baking, drying, smoking, grinding, cutting, mixing, coating, stuffing, slicing cheese and lunch meat, popping popcorn, scooping ice cream, packing, bottling or packaging, or through any other treatment or preservation process.
- (22) "Hot water" means water at a temperature of 110°F or higher.
- (23) "Health hazard" means a substance, activity, or condition that is known to have the potential to cause acute or chronic illness or death if exposure to the substance, activity, or condition is not abated or removed.
- (24) "Immediate health hazard" means a health hazard which should, in the opinion of the health officer, be abated or corrected immediately, or not later than within a 24-hour period, to prevent possible serve damage to human health or the environment.

- (25) "Inspection fee" means the fee to conduct an inspection without the intent of licensing an establishment.
- (26) "Late fee" means a fee that is charged for failure to comply with the time frame specified in the applicable statute and administrative code for completion and submission of the required application, renewal, or inspection of a permit to the health department.
- (27) "Large processing, non-potentially hazardous establishment" means a retail food establishment where there is food processing of non-potentially hazardous (time/temperature control for food safety) food only present. Annual food sales for this establishment are greater than \$25,000.00.
- (28) "Large processing, potentially hazardous establishment" means a retail food establishment where there is processing of food that is potentially hazardous because of time and temperature controls required for safe processing, and where the annual sales for the establishment are in excess of \$1,000,000.
- (29) "Licensing year" means the 12-month period from July 1 through the next following June 30.
- (30) "Limited food service," means the serving of only individually wrapped, hermetically sealed, single-food servings by a licensed processor with preparation on the premises limited to heating and serving with single-service articles.
- (31) "Mobile retail food establishment vehicle" means a retail food establishment operating from a moveable vehicle, push cart, trailer or boat which periodically or continuously changes location and wherein retail food is sold to the consumer for consumption, excepting those vehicles used in delivery of preordered food prepared in a licensed food establishment.
- (32) "Mobile retail food establishment, not engaged in food processing" means a mobile retail food establishment that meets the requirements of a not-engaged-in-food-processing establishment.
- (33) "Mobile retail food service base" means a service base for mobile retail food establishments to clean, store, and service.

- (34) "Not engaged in food processing" means a retail food establishment where there is no food processing, and there is the sale of prepackaged potentially hazardous (time/temperature control for food safety) food to consumers.
- (35) "Operator" means the owner, person responsible to the owner, or other person engaged in the management of a public facility.
- (36) "Outdoor grilling" means the cooking of food on an outdoor grill on the premises of a retail food establishment. The purpose of outdoor cooking shall not increase the production capability of the restaurant kitchen by circumventing codes applicable to indoor cooking facilities. Hot holding shall be limited to what can be held on the cooking unit.
- (37) "Patron" means a person receiving a tattoo or body piercing.
- (38) "Permit" refers to a document issued by the environmental health division of the Sauk County Health Department to allow the operation of a public facility. Permit is synonymous with the term license.
- (39) "Person" means any individual, firm, institution, corporation, society, or other entity.
- (40) "Pollution" means the contaminating or rendering unclean or impure of the air, land, or waters of the county, or the introduction of any substance that causes injury to public health, is harmful to the commercial or recreational use of the air, land, or waters of the county, or is deleterious to fish, bird, animal, or plant life.
- (41) "Potentially hazardous food (time/temperature control for food safety)" means:
- (a) A food that requires time/temperature control for safety to limit pathogenic microorganism growth or toxin formation.
- (b) "Potentially hazardous food (time/temperature control for food safety)" includes the following:
- 1. An animal food that is raw or heat-treated.
- 2. A plant food that is heat-treated or consists of raw seed sprouts.
 - 3. Cut melons.
 - 4. Cut leafy greens.
- 5. Cut tomatoes or mixtures of cut tomatoes that are not modified in a way so that

they are unable to support pathogenic microorganism growth or toxin formation.

- 6. Garlic in oil mixtures that are not acidified or otherwise modified at a food processing plant in a way so that they are unable to support pathogenic microorganism growth or toxin formations.
- 7. Except as specified in subd. (c) 4. of this definition, food that, because of the interaction of its A_w and pH values, is designated as product assessment required in Tables A and B of this definition:

- (c) "Potentially hazardous food (time/temperature control for safety food)" does not include the following:
- 1. An air-cooled, hard-boiled egg with shell intact, or an egg with shell intact that is not hard-boiled but has been pasteurized to destroy all viable salmonellae.
- 2. A food in an unopened, hermetically sealed container that is commercially processed to achieve and maintain commercial sterility under conditions of non-refrigerated storage and distribution.
- 3. A food that because of its pH or A_w value, or interaction of A_w and pH values, is designated as a non -PHF/non-TCS food in Table A or B of this definition.
- 4. A food that is designated as product assessment required in Table A or B of this definition and has undergone a product assessment showing that the growth or toxin formation of pathogenic microorganisms that are reasonably likely to occur in that food is precluded due to the following:
- a. Intrinsic factors including added or natural characteristics of the food such as preservatives, antimicrobials, humectants, acidulants, or nutrients.
- b. Extrinsic factor including environmental or operational factor that affect the food such as packaging, modified atmosphere such as reduced oxygen packaging, shelf life and use, or temperature range of storage and use.
- c. A combination of intrinsic and extrinsic factors.
- 5. A food that doesn't support the growth pathogenicformation toxin of microorganisms in accordance with any of the subds. (c)1. to 4. of this definition even though contain pathogenic the food may a microorganism, or chemical, or physical contaminant at a level sufficient to cause illness or injury.
- (42) "Public" means affecting or having the potential to affect the people or environment outside the limits of an individual's personally occupied structure or all persons outside of an individual's personally owned or occupied structure.
- (43) "Public building" means any structure used in whole or in part as a place of resort, assemblage, lodging, trade, traffic,

occupancy, or use by the public. In most cases, anything other than a 1 or 2 family residence.

- (44) "Public facility" means any facility used by the public that requires a license or permit under this ordinance or a state code adopted by reference in this ordinance.
- (45) "Public health nuisance" or similar or related words used within this ordinance means:
- (a) Whoever by their act or failure to perform a legal duty, intentionally maintains or permits a condition that unreasonably injures or endangers the safety or health of the public, and whoever causes or maintains any source of filth or sickness, has committed a public health nuisance.
- (b) The following, except to the extent as incorporated into approved agricultural practices, it not being the intent of this ordinance to regulate approved agricultural practices, are hereby expressly declared to be public health nuisances without limitation by reason of such enumeration:
- 1. Failure to keep waste, refuse, or garbage in an enclosed building or properly contained in a closed container designed or reasonably adapted for such purpose.
- 2. Allowing any discharge into the environment of toxic or hazardous substances in any form in such concentrations or for such length of time as to endanger the public health.
- 3. Causing or allowing the pollution of any well, cistern, spring, ground water, lake, canal, or body of water by sewage or industrial wastes, fertilizers, toxic pesticides, or other substances harmful to human beings.
- 4. Causing or allowing any accumulation of carcasses of animals, birds, fish, or fowl not intended for human consumption which are not buried or otherwise disposed of in a sanitary manner within 24 hours after death, in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 95.
- 5. Causing or allowing unreasonable accumulation of decayed animal or vegetable matter, trash, rubbish, garbage, rotting lumber, packing material, scrap metal, tires, or any other substances in which flies, mosquitoes, disease, carrying insects, rats, or other vermin can breed, live, nest, or seek shelter.
- 6. Maintaining a building or structure which is dilapidated, neglected, or out-of-repair so as to be dangerous, unsafe, unsanitary, or

- otherwise unfit for use, and for which no appropriate precautions to prevent entry by persons, such as posting fencing or closure of entrance ways, have been taken.
- 7. Failing to comply with any law or regulation regarding sanitation and health including:
- a. Water supplies, including wells and surface waters.
 - b. Waste disposal.
- c. Storage of chemical pesticides or herbicides.
 - d. Public buildings.
- 8. Causing or allowing improper sewage disposal facilities to be operated, or causing or allowing the effluent from any cesspool, septic tank, drain field, or sewage disposal system to discharge upon the surface of the ground or into any body of water.
- 9. Maintaining a hole or opening caused by an improperly abandoned cistern, septic system, dug well, driven well, drilled well, foundation, mine shaft, or tunnel, including an improperly abandoned, sealed, barricaded, or backfilled excavation for which no proper precautions to prevent entry such as posting or fencing have been taken. In addition to direct hazard to human welfare, this subsection is intended to prevent contamination of ground water supplies.
- (46) "Practitioner" means a tattooist or body piercer.
- (47) "Pre-inspection fee" means the fee associated with the required inspection necessary to determine compliance at the time of starting a new business, change-in-operator, or major alterations of establishment or its processes.
- (48) "Premises" means a building, structure, area, or location where tattooing or body piercing are performed or where a retail food establishment, either mobile or fixed, conducts its sale to its consumers.
- (49) "Re-inspection fee" means a fee structure for the subsequent inspections needed to address compliance issues with the statutes and administrative codes that govern a respective establishment. The fee for a re-inspection shall be a set fee, determined by the board of health. Re-inspections are conducted due to one or more of the following:
 - (a) Uncorrected critical violations.

- (b) More than 10 total violations.
- (c) Repeat violations from previous inspections.
- (d) A complaint investigation identifying unsatisfactory conditions that require later re-inspection.
- (50) "Retail food establishment" means any of the following, but does not include a restaurant or the establishment holding a permit to the extent that the activities of the establishment are covered by that permit:
- (a) A permanent or mobile food processing facility where food is processed primarily for direct retail sale to consumers at the facility.
- (b) A mobile facility from which potentially hazardous food is sold to customers at retail.
- (c) A permanent facility from which food is sold to consumers at retail, whether or not that facility sells potentially hazardous food or is engaged in food processing.
- (51) "Sharps container" means rigid puncture-resistant labeled containers made of materials including metal or rigid plastic, designed to prevent the loss of the contents, labeled with visible bio-hazard emblem or with the visible words "bio-hazard", "sharps", or "infectious waste".
- (52) "Sharps waste" means waste consisting of medical equipment or clinical laboratory articles that may cause punctures or cuts, including hypodermic needles, syringes with attached needles, and lancets, whether contaminated, unused, or disinfected.
- (53) "Small processing, potentially hazardous establishment" means a retail food establishment where there is processing of food that is potentially hazardous because of time and temperature controls required for safe processing, and where the annual sales for the establishment are between \$25,000 and \$1,000,000.
- (54) "Sterilization" means the killing of all organisms and spores through use of an autoclave operated at a minimum of 250°F (121°C) at pressure of at least 15 pounds per square inch for not less the 30 minutes or through the use of an autoclave approved by the health department that is operated at different temperature and pressure levels but is equally effective in killing all organisms and spores.

- (55) "Tattoo" as a verb, means to insert pigment under the surface of the skin of a person by pricking with a needle or otherwise, so as to produce an indelible mark or figure through the skin.
- (56) "Tattoo establishment" means the premises where a tattooist performs a tattoo.
- (57) "Tattooist" means a person who performs tattoos on another person at that person's request.
- (58) "Temporary tattoo establishment" means a single building structure, special event, area or location where a tattooist performs tattooing for a maximum of 7 days.
- (59) "Temporary body piercing establishment" means a single building structure, special event, area or location where a body piercer performs body piercing for a maximum of 7 days.
- (60) "Temporary retail food establishment" means a retail food establishment that operates at a fixed location in conjunction with a single event such as a fair, carnival, circus, public exhibition, anniversary sale, or occasional sales promotion for a period of no more than 14 consecutive days or less.
- (61) "Toxic or hazardous substance" means any chemical or biological material that is, or has the potential to create, a public health hazard.
- (62) "Very small processing, non-potentially hazardous establishment" means a retail food establishment where there is processing of food that is potentially hazardous because of time and temperature controls required for safe processing, and where the annual sales for the establishment are less than \$25,000.
- (63) "Very small processing, potentially hazardous establishment" means a retail food establishment where there is processing of food that is potentially hazardous because of time and temperature controls required for safe processing, and where the annual sales for the establishment are less than \$25,000.

SUBCHAPTER III

PROCEDURES AND ADMINISTRATION

- **28.011 Responsibilities and powers.** (1) GENERAL PROVISIONS. (a) If any city or village becomes an agent under Wis. Stat. § 254.69, then the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply in that jurisdiction.
- (2) RESPONSIBILITIES OF HEALTH OFFICERS OR DESIGNEES. (a) To insure compliance with the purpose, requirements, and intent of this ordinance and of Wis. Stat. ch. 251.06.
- (b) To issue and deny permits as provided by this ordinance.
- (c) To maintain records of permits issued, inspections made, work approved, and other official actions.
- (d) To enforce the provisions of this ordinance.
- (3) POWERS. The health officer or designee shall have all the powers necessary to enforce the provisions of this ordinance without limitation by reason of enumeration including the following:
- (a) To enter any structure or premises at a reasonable time for the purpose of performing necessary duties and to secure a court order to accomplish the purpose, if necessary.
- (b) To order abatement or correction of any public nuisance or health hazard in compliance with this ordinance or state statutes.
- (c) To issue a permit for any public facility as provided for in this ordinance.
- (d) To withhold issuances of a permit pursuant to this ordinance where the applicant, owner, or licensed contractor is in violation of this ordinance and to prohibit the use of any public facility requiring a permit under this ordinance, until it has been inspected and approved.
- (e) To revoke the permit of or prohibit the use of a public facility that has been determined to present a potential health hazard or is in non-compliance with this ordinance.
- (f) To delegate the responsibilities of administration and enforcement of this ordinance to a registered environmental health sanitarian or another person qualified in the field of public health.

- (g) Any other action authorized by law to ensure compliance with the purpose and intent of this ordinance.
- **28.012 Administrative** regulation. The authority to implement policies consistent with this ordinance is vested with the board of health. Policies will be promulgated as follows:
- (1) The health director shall prepare draft policies and present those policies at least 20 days prior to adoption at a meeting of the board of health. Public comment on the draft policies shall be accepted.
- (2) The health director shall consider the comments submitted, report to the board of health regarding any comments received, report whether the comments were incorporated into the draft policy, and provide an explanation why they were or were not incorporated. The board of health may consider the policy for adoption at their next meeting following the expiration of the 20-day period.
- 28.013 Application. Application for permits shall be filed with the health department on forms developed and provided by the health department, stating the name and the address of the proposed applicant and operator, and the address and location of the proposed establishment, together with any such other information as may be required. The health department shall issue the permit only after an investigation or inspection of the premises is completed and certifies that the condition of the premises comply with the provision of this ordinance and the licensee demonstrates competence in the maintenance of sanitary conditions. The premises and equipment must be in compliance with the adopted state regulation and this ordinance before a permit will be issued. In accordance with s. 28.019 of this ordinance, the health department shall either approve or deny the application within 30 days after receipt of a complete application.
- **28.014 Fees.** (1) Fees for permits required by this ordinance shall be authorized through a fee schedule approved and periodically reviewed by the board of health.
- (2) The following permit fees are established by the board of health and shall be

paid before any permit is issued. The required annual permit fees are as follows:

- (a) Retail food establishments addressed in subch. V:
- 1. Not engaged in food processing establishment.
- 2. Very small processing, non-potentially hazardous establishment.
- 3. Large processing, non-potentially hazardous establishment.
- 4. Very small processing, potentially hazardous establishment.
- 5. Small processing, potentially hazardous establishment.
- 6. Large processing, potentially hazardous establishment.
 - 7. Mobile retail food establishment.
- 8. Mobile retail food establishment, not engaged in food processing.
- 9. Mobile retail food establishment service base.
 - 10. Temporary retail establishment, 7 day.
- (b) Tattoo and body piercing establishments addressed in subch. VI.
 - 1. Tattoo establishment.
 - 2. Body piercing establishment.
- 3. Combined tattoo and body piercing establishment.
 - 4. Temporary tattoo establishment.
 - 5. Temporary body piercing establishment.
- 6. Temporary tattoo and body piercing establishment.
- (c) There shall be a fee assessed for any duplicate permit applied for under the subchapter.
- (3) The following fees are established by the board of health and must be paid before any permit is issued. The required fees are as follows:
- (a) Retail food establishments addressed in subch. V:
- 1. The health department shall not issue a permit to a person intending to operate a new public facility or to a person intending to be the new permit holder of an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(a) 1. to 9. without a pre inspection fee. Pre inspection fees are not applicable to temporary retail food establishments.
- 2. Temporary retail establishments which conduct business in Sauk County that are

- licensed outside of Sauk County are subject to the provision of this subsection, and will be inspected and charged an inspection fee to cover the cost of inspection. The fee charged shall not exceed the actual, direct costs incurred by the health department in conducting the inspection.
- 3. The health department shall issue a late fee to an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(b) 1. to 9. when the annual permit renewal payment is received after the end of the licensing year. Late fees are not applicable to temporary retail food establishments.
- 4. The health department shall issue a re-inspection fee to an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(a) 1. to 9. when necessary to determine compliance with repeating, excessive, or immediate health hazard violations. Re-inspection fees are not applicable to temporary retail food establishments.
- (b) Tattoo and body piercing establishments addressed in subch. VI:
- 1. The health department shall not issue a permit to a person intending to operate a new public facility or to a person intending to be the new permit holder of an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(b) 1. to 3. without a pre inspection fee. Pre inspection fees are not applicable to temporary tattoo and body piercing establishments.
- 2. The health department shall issue a late fee to an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(b) 1. to 3. when the annual permit renewal payment is received after the end of the licensing year. Late fees are not applicable to temporary tattoo and body piercing establishments.
- 3. The health department shall issue a re-inspection fee to an existing public facility covered in s. 28.014(2)(b) 1. to 3. when necessary to determine compliance with repeating, excessive, or immediate health hazard violations. Re-inspection fees are not applicable to temporary tattoo and body piercing establishments.
- (3) No annual permit will be renewed after the last day of the licensing year unless payment of the annual permit renewal and the late fee is received by the health department on or before September 1. No person may conduct, manage, maintain, or operate any of the public facilities requiring annual permits if the person

has not been issued a current permit; or, in the case of renewal of an annual permit, if the person has not renewed the permit on or before September 1.

- 28.015 Licensing and permits. (1) PERMITS. (a) No permit shall be issued without compliance with this ordinance and applicable state regulations as adopted by reference. The person issued an annual health department permit for a public facility shall be responsible for compliance with this ordinance and subject to enforcement action for noncompliance with this ordinance.
- (b) The issuance of a permit may be conditional upon the permit licensee correcting a violation of this ordinance within a specified period of time. If the condition is not met within the specified period of time, the permit shall be voided. Before a person may legally operate a public facility where the permit has been voided, the person must reapply for a permit and accompany the application with the appropriate permit and pre inspection fee, where applicable in accordance with this subchapter, and have the facility re-inspected and approved by the health department.
- (c) Permits are not transferable and shall only apply to the named person and premises listed on the license.
- (d) A permit may be issued or renewed upon payment of the required fees and a satisfactory inspection of the premises.
- (e) A permit may not be issued until all annual permit fees and pre inspection fees have been paid, where applicable.
- (f) Such permits issued for the licensing year shall expire as follows:
- 1. On June 30 of each year following their issuance, except that an initial permit may be issued beginning on April 1 for a maximum length of 15 months, expiring on the second June 30 following issuance.
- 2. Except for tattoo and body piercing permits, which shall be valid from a period of one year, from July 1 to June 30.
- (g) The permit shall not be transferable to a location other than the one for which it was issued, nor shall a permit be transferred from one operator to another unless expressly authorized by this ordinance, state statute, or

- administrative code. As to location, temporary permits may be transferred.
- (2) RETAIL FOOD ESTABLISHMENT. (a) A person may not operate a retail food establishment without first obtaining a permit from the health department.
- (b) Operators or permit licensees of temporary retail food establishment whom the health department has found to be uncooperative by evidence of failing to allow inspections, failure to remedy violations or other specific and documented violations, or operator or permit licensees who are habitual violators of this ordinance, may be denied a permit to operate.
- (c) Temporary permits may be transferred to a premises other than that for which it was issued. The permit licensee must notify the health department prior to the transfer, and the transfer is subject to the approval of the new premises by the health department prior to operating at the new premises.
- (d) With the exception of those establishments defined under this section as "temporary", no permits shall be granted to any person under this ordinance without a pre-inspection by the health department of the premises for which the permit shall be granted.
- TATTOO AND BODY PIERCING (3) (a) No person may tattoo ESTABLISHMENT. or body pierce another person, use or assume the title of tattooist or body piercer, or designate or represent themselves as a tattooist or body piercer unless the person has obtained a practitioner license from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. Application for the license shall be made pursuant to Wisconsin Department of Health Services regulation, and the applicable fee shall be paid when submitting the application.
- (b) A person may not engage in the practice of tattooing or own or operate a tattoo establishment in Sauk County without first applying for and receiving a permit from the Sauk County Health Department.
- **28.016 Public display of permits.** Every establishment required to obtain a permit pursuant to this ordinance shall prominently display the permit at all times in a conspicuous, public place.

28.017 Temporary orders. Whenever, as the result of an investigation or inspection, the health officer has reasonable cause to believe that an immediate health hazard exists on a premises covered by this ordinance, the health officer may issue a Temporary Order in accordance with Wis. Stat. §66.0417 (2).

- 28.018 Enforcement. (1) The provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by employees of the Sauk County Sheriff's Department, the Sauk County Health Department, the designees of these departments, or other persons authorized by the board of supervisors. Non-compliance with the ordinance or with a temporary order from the health officer or designee shall be cause for enforcement action under this section of this ordinance.
- (2) This ordinance may be enforced by citation or civil forfeiture and the Sauk County Corporation Counsel is authorized to prosecute violations of this ordinance. Any person, business, corporation, property owner, or other entity violating this ordinance may be issued a citation in which case punishment shall occur for forfeiture provided in Sauk Co. Code ch. 20. Failure to pay penalties in accordance with this ordinance may result in imprisonment in the Sauk County Jail.
- (3) ACCESS. An authorized agent of the health department shall be permitted to enter the public facility at any time in order to ensure that the provisions of this ordinance are being met. If violations are found, an order to correct shall be given to the owner or operator, in writing, noting specific changes that must be made in order to bring the facility into compliance. The order shall set forth the time period by which corrections must take place. In accordance with s. 28.019 of this ordinance, failure to correct may result in suspension of the establishments permit to operate, and may invoke the penalty provisions of this ordinance.

28.019 Denial, suspension, or revocation of license. The health officer may deny any license application or suspend or revoke any license issued under this ordinance for noncompliance with this ordinance and regulations, rules, and laws adopted by reference under this ordinance. The following procedure

shall be followed in the denial, suspension, or revocation of any permit issued under this subchapter.

- (1) A decision by the health officer or designee, to deny, suspend, or revoke a license shall be in writing and shall state, with specificity, the reasons for the health officer's decision and shall state any applicable statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, or orders which may have been violated. The health officer shall send a copy of the written decision to the licensee or applicant by mail or by personal service within 30 days of receiving the initial application. The notice shall inform the licensee or applicant of the right to have this decision reviewed and the procedure for such review.
- Any licensee or applicant aggrieved by a decision of the health officer to deny, suspend, or revoke a license may have the decision reviewed and reconsidered by a written request mailed or delivered to the health officer within 30 working days of receipt of the notice of the health officer's or designee's decision. The written request for review and reconsideration shall state the grounds upon which the person aggrieved contends that the decision should be reversed or modified.
- (3) Within 15 working days of receipt of the request for review and reconsideration, the health officer shall review the initial determination. The health officer may affirm, reverse, or modify the initial determination. The health officer shall mail or deliver to the licensee or applicant a copy of the officer's decision on review, and shall state the reasons for such decision. The decision shall advise the licensee or applicant of the right to an administrative appeal, the time within which appeal shall be taken, and the office or person with whom the appeal shall be filed.
- (4) A licensee or applicant who wishes to appeal a decision made by the health officer on review must file a notice of appeal within 30 days of delivery of the notice of the health officer's decision on review. The administrative appeal shall be filed or mailed to the health officer. The health officer shall immediately file the notice of appeal with the board of health.
- (5) A licensee or applicant shall be provided a hearing on appeal within 15 days of receipt of the request for an administrative

appeal. The health officer shall serve the licensee or applicant with notice of hearing by mail or personal service at least 10 days before the hearing.

- (6) The hearing shall be conducted before the board of health and shall be conducted in accordance with the procedures outline in Wis. Stat. §68.11(2) and (3).
- (7) Within 20 days of the hearing, the board of health shall mail or deliver to the licensee or applicant its written determination stating the reasons for the determination.
- (8) A decision by the health officer upon a request for review and reconsideration which is not appealed to the board of health, or a decision by the board of health on an appeal of a decision by the health officer of a request for review and reconsideration, shall be a final determination under Wis. Stat. §68.12(2).
- (9) Any party to a proceeding resulting in a final determination may seek review of the final determination by certiorari within 30 days of receipt of the final determination per Wis. Stat. § 68.13.
- 28.020 Violation and penalties. (1) Any person who violates and refuses to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a citation and respective forfeiture as established in Sauk Co. Code ch. 20 for each offense. The health officer or authorized representative may issue citations using the standard citation form used by Sauk County. Citations may be served in person or sent by certified mail. The health officer may also, or alternatively, revoke or amend any applicable permit. Each day a violation exists or continues shall be considered a new and separate offense.
- (2) The Sauk County Corporation Counsel may seek enforcement of violations of this ordinance in Sauk County Circuit Court or any other court of competent jurisdiction. A court may enforce this ordinance through injunctive relief.
- (3) Any person or entity violating this ordinance, or any rule promulgated in this subchapter or incorporated by reference, shall forfeit according to sub. (4) described as follows:

- (5) Forfeitures are exclusive of any fees or costs imposed pursuant to the Wisconsin Statutes.
- of this ordinance (6) Violations pertaining to a tattoo establishment, or a bodypiercing establishment, are considered an immediate and present danger to the public health and welfare. Unpermitted or unsanitary operation of a tattoo or body piercing business shall be deemed to cause irreparable harm. Violations of this ordinance may be enjoined without prejudice to seek forfeiture for the violations involved. Upon conviction of a second or subsequent violation, the license of an establishment and practitioner may be suspended for up to a period of 3 years.

SUBCHAPTER IV

PUBLIC HEALTH NUISANCE

28.021 Applicability. This subsection shall apply to all unincorporated areas of Sauk County.

28.022 Enforcement of public nuisances. (1) Whenever, in the judgment of the director, it is determined upon investigation that a public health nuisance in violation of this ordinance is being maintained or exists within Sauk County, the director may issue a written order of abatement ordering the person committing or maintaining the nuisance to terminate and to abate it and to remove the conditions or remedy the defects creating the nuisance. The order of abatement shall be served upon the person committing or maintaining the nuisance in the manner set forth for service of a summons in Wis. Stat. ch. 801, or by certified mail if that person resides outside of Sauk County. If the premises are not occupied and the address of the

owner is unknown and cannot be determined with due diligence, service on the owner may be accomplished by positing a copy of the order of abatement in a prominent place on the premises. The order of abatement shall require the owner or occupant of such premises, or both, to take reasonable steps within a reasonable period of time, as specified by the director in the order, to abate and remove the nuisance. Except in cases of emergency, special inspection warrants shall be obtained from the Sauk County Circuit Court in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 66.0119, for inspection of personal or real properties which are not public buildings or for inspection of portions of public buildings which are not open to the public where consent to entry for inspection purposes is refused.

- When the order for abatement has not been complied with, the noncompliance shall be reported to the Sauk County Corporation Counsel, who is herby delegated the duty of prosecuting violations of this ordinance referred in this subchapter. The Sauk County Corporation Counsel shall take steps as that officer deems appropriate, to enforce this ordinance and the order for abatement and to abate the nuisance and to enjoin the future continuation of the nuisance. All violations of the the ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$50 and not more than \$200 per offense, together with applicable penalty assessments and the taxable costs of prosecution, and the court may also grant injunctive relief. Failure to comply with an order of abatement issued under this ordinance shall constitute a violation of this ordinance, and each day of continued violation shall constitute a separate offense. Failure to pay any penalties imposed by the court in accordance with this ordinance, may result in imprisonment in the Sauk County Jail.
- (3) In the case of a violation of this ordinance caused by improper sewage disposal facilities, Sauk County by its officers, agents, or employees may enter upon the property and abate or remove the nuisance or may contract to have the work performed in a manner approved by the Wisconsin Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations, and the cost thereof may be recovered from the person causing or permitting the violation of this ordinance, or the cost may be paid by the Sauk County Treasurer

and the amount, after being paid by the treasurer, shall be filed with the municipal clerk, who shall enter the amount on the tax roll as special tax on the lands upon which such nuisance was abated and this tax shall be collected as are other taxes. As to any other violation of this ordinance, Sauk County may act to abate the nuisance and the county may recover the cost thereof in a suit of law.

SUBCHAPTER V

FOOD PROTECTION

28.023 Applicability. The provision of this subchapter shall apply to the owner and operator of any retail food establishment in both the incorporated or unincorporated areas of Sauk County, unless a city or village enters into a separate agreement pursuant to Wis. Stat. §97.41 with the State of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to become a designated agent for the purposes designated in subch. III.

- **28.024 Regulations, rules, and laws adopted** by reference. (1) The applicable laws, rules, and regulations as set forth in Wis. Stat. chs. 68, 97, 125, 251, Wis. Stat. § 66.0417, Wis. Admin. Code ch. ATCP 75, ATCP 97, and SPS 361 to 365 are incorporated in this regulation by reference and they shall be construed, read, and interpreted as fully set forth in this ordinance until amended, and then shall apply as amended. The expressed provisions of this ordinance shall control where more restrictive.
- (2) Parts of some of the State Administrative Code enumerated in sub. (1) of this section may not be incorporated in this ordinance. These exceptions may be specified in the beginning of the section of this ordinance that deals with the subject matter of the code in question.
- **28.025** Non-compliance. Non-compliance with the provision of this ordinance and Wis. Admin. code ATCP 75 and ATCP 97 will be cause for enforcement under subch. III of this ordinance.

SUBCHAPTER VI

REGUALTION OF TATTO ARTISTS, TATTOO ESTABLISHMENTS, BODY PIERCERS, AND BODY PIERCING ESTABLISHMENTS

28.026 Applicability. The provisions of this subchapter shall apply to all tattooist, body piercers, tattoo establishments and body piercing establishments within the boundaries of Sauk County.

- **28.027 Regulations, rules, and laws adopted** by reference. (1) The applicable laws, rules, and regulations as set forth in Wis. Stat. chs. 68 and 251, Wis. Stat. § 66.0417, and Wis. Admin. Code ch. DHS 173 and SPS 361 to 365 are incorporated in this regulation by reference and they shall be construed, read, and interpreted as fully set forth in this ordinance until amended, and then shall apply as amended. The expressed provisions of this ordinance shall control where more restrictive.
- (2) Parts of some of the State Administrative Code enumerated in sub. (1) of this section may not be incorporated in this ordinance. These exceptions may be specified in the beginning of each section of this ordinance that deals with the subject matter of the code in question.

28.028 Health and sanitary requirements.

- (1) ESTABLISHMENT. (a) Tattooing and body piercing shall be performed by a practitioner in a business establishment that is completely separated from any living quarters by a solid, permanent partition. A solid door leading to the living quarters shall be permitted, provided it remains closed during business hours.
- (b) The entire premises of the establishment, and all facilities used in connection with the establishment, shall be maintained in a clean, sanitary, vermin free condition and in good repair. Antiseptic procedures shall be followed to insure physical cleanliness and sanitation.
- (c) The establishment shall have potable hot and cold water under pressure.
- (d) The establishment shall be equipped with toilet and hand washing facilities which are

- connected to water and sewage disposal systems. Hand washing lavatories shall be supplied with cleansing compound and single service towels. At least one additional hand washing facility shall be located within the immediate area of the procedure area.
- (e) The establishment, including the immediate area where the procedure is to be performed, shall be adequately lighted and ventilated.
- (f) Floors in the immediate area where the procedure is to be performed shall have nonporous, smooth, washable surfaces, and shall be maintained in a clean condition. Carpeting is prohibited.
- (g) Approved waste containers with nonabsorbent, durable plastic liners shall be used for all tissues, towels, gauze pads, and other similar items used on the patron. Bio-hazardous waste shall be disposed of in an acceptable manner. Needles and razors shall be disposed of in a Sharps container. Other contaminated wastes should be incarcerated or autoclaved prior to disposal.
- (h) No person other than the patron shall be present in the immediate vicinity of the area in which tattoos or body piercings are administered unless authorized by the practitioner to be there.
- (i) Smoking or consumption of food or drink shall not be allowed in the immediate area where the procedure is being performed. The patron may consume a soft drink.
- (j) No animals, except guide dogs for visually or hearing impaired persons, shall be permitted in an establishment.
- (k) The health officer shall have the authority under the Sauk Co. Code, to inspect any establishment under the provision of this ordinance for the purpose of determining compliance with any of the terms of this ordinance.
- (2) EQUIPMENT. (a) General. 1. All establishments shall be equipped with an autoclave approved for use in sterilizing instruments to be used on humans, and which is in good working order and which is manufactured with temperature and pressure gauges marked as visible on the outside of the unit. Sterilization tape, or similar indicator, shall be used with each batch autoclaved or dry

sterilized to monitor functioning of the sterilization unit.

- 2. All pigments, dyes, and instruments used in the practice of tattooing, if not sterilized by the manufacturer and maintained in a condition to prevent contamination, shall be sterilized before use by the establishment.
- 3. Any dye or ink in which needles were dipped shall not be used on another person. Ink cups shall be for single patron use.
- 4. Needles shall be used on only one customer and then properly discarded.
- 5. Needles may be reused during the same session on the same person by rinsing them under running tap water followed by rinsing them in 70% isopropyl alcohol or other method approved by the health officer.
- 6. All instruments shall be thoroughly cleaned before being sterilized. This may be done with an ultrasonic cleaner or with a probe, needle, or brush able to enter the smallest opening of the instrument. The cleaning of instruments shall be done with detergent and hot water or other methods approved by the health officer.
- 7. After sterilization, all needles and other instruments not individually wrapped shall be stored in a sterilized and covered glass container or in a stainless steel tray and submerged in an approved sterilizing and disinfection solution. The health officer shall supply all licensed establishments with a list of approved sterilizing and disinfection solutions.
- 8. Equipment or instruments requiring sterilization may be wrapped with an approved paper or plastic or placed in glass or plastic tubes. All packages of containers shall be marked with temperature recording tape or labels, and dated with the date of sterilization.
- 9. Engineering and work practice controls shall be utilized to eliminate or minimize exposure to blood and body fluids. Extraordinary care must be taken to avoid accidental wounds from sharp instruments contaminated with blood or body fluids and to avoid contact with open skin lesions. Used sharps shall be disposed of in a sharps container designed for this purposes. Needles shall not be broken, bent, or recapped.
- (b) *Stencils*. 1. No stencil may be used unless it is sterile.

- 2. Plastic stencils shall be thoroughly cleaned after each used and sanitized by immersion for 10 minutes in a chlorine disinfectant solution prepared by mixing one tablespoon of household bleach containing 5% chlorine with one pint of water. A fresh solution of chlorine must be prepared for each stencil. After sanitizing, the stencils shall be rinsed in running tap water and air dried or blotted dry with a clean single service towel. Prior to use, each pre-cleaned stencil shall be rinsed in a 70% isopropyl alcohol solution.
- 3. Paper stencils shall only be used once. New paper stencils shall be used for every individual.
- (c) Ink and Pigments. 1. All inks and pigments shall be obtained from sources recognized as safe. Information indicating the sources of all inks and pigments shall be available to the health department upon request.
- 2. Only sterile inks or pigments shall be used, and they shall be dispensed from sterile bottles and containers.
- 3. Immediately before applying a tattoo, the dye to be used for the tattoo shall be squeezed from the sterile dye bottles into sterile disposable cups. Upon the completion of the tattoo, the cups and unused dye shall be discarded. Any dye in which the needles were dipped shall not be used on another person.
- (3) SKIN PREPARATION. (a) The following aseptic techniques shall be utilized in the practice of tattooing and body piercing:
- 1. Practitioners shall wash their hands thoroughly with hot water and soap before gloving prior to each patron. Hands shall be dried with individual paper towel. Practitioners shall wear single-use sterile gloves during the procedure and shall discard the gloves at the end of the procedure.
- 2. If the patron's skin is to be shaved, the skin shall be washed with a cleansing, medicated soap before shaving. A safety razor shall be used. A new blade shall be used for each customer. The blade shall be discarded in a sharps container after each use. If reusable blade holders are used, they may be used on only one customer and then must be discarded. Disposal of all regulated waste shall be in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local regulation.

- 3. The skin area to be tattooed or pierced shall be prepared by thoroughly washing the area with 70% isopropyl alcohol or other method approved by the health officer. The solutions shall be applied with sterile cotton or sterile gauze or sprayed on.
- 4. Single-use gauze pads, cloths, and towels shall be used in the skin cleaning and preparation process. Such materials shall be discarded after use.
- 5. Petroleum jelly used for applying stencils shall be dispensed from a single-use disposable container, or dispensed with a sterile tongue blade or sterile applicator stick which shall be discarded after each use.
- 6. After completing work on any patron, the tattooed area shall be washed with 70% isopropyl alcohol. A dry, sterile gauze dressing shall be used to cover the tattooed area. Pierced areas shall be treated to ensure the prevention of infection.
- (b) Tattooed or pierced patrons shall be provided with printed instructions regarding care during the healing process.
- (4) GENERAL SUPPLIES. (a) All establishments shall have clean laundered towels, washcloths, and disposable paper towels in sufficient quantity.
- (b) A clean towel and washcloth shall be used for each customer.
- (c) Clean towels and washcloths shall be stored in a closed, dust-proof container.
- (d) Soiled towels and washcloths shall be stored in an approved covered container.
- (e) All practitioners shall wear clean, washable outer clothing.
- (f) The procedure table or chair and supply tables shall be constructed of materials capable of being easily and thoroughly cleaned.
- (g) Any materials or supplies having made contact with the blood or body fluid of any person, or with an instrument which has had such contact, shall be deemed contaminated and must be disposed of unless it may be sterilized and reused under the specific provision of this ordinance.
- (5) PRACTITIONER REQUIREMENTS. (a) Practitioners with open sores, rashes, lesions, boils, or skin infections shall not be permitted to engage in the practice of tattooing or body piercing.

- (b) No tattooist or body piercer may work while under the influence of alcohol or any mind-altering drug. Tobacco products may not be used while performing an actual procedure.
- (c) Practitioners shall wash their hands thoroughly with soap and water before any skin preparation or procedure; the hands shall be dried with individual single-service towels. Single-service disposable rubber gloves and a disposable single-service face mask shall be worn throughout the entire procedure.
 - (d) Physical Examinations of Practitioners.
- 1. The health officer shall have the power to require any practitioner to submit to a physician for a physical examination whenever the practitioner is suspected of having any infections or contagious disease. The expenses of the physical examination shall be paid by the practitioner.
- 2. Any practitioner notified to appear for a physical examination as may be required by the preceding subsection, shall immediately cease working as a tattooist or body piercer and shall not be allowed to work in that capacity until the practitioner has first received a certificate in writing from a practicing physician that states the practitioner is not inflicted with any infectious or contagious condition or disease that may be transmitted by the practice of tattooing or body piercing.
- (6) PATRONS. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to tattoo an individual under the age of 18 years.
- (b) No person under 16 years of age may be body pierced.
- (c) No person 16 or 17 years of age may be body pierced unless an informed consent form has been signed by their parent or legal guardian in the presence of the operator.
- (d) Inquiry shall be made, and no tattooing shall be performed, on an individual who is suspected of having jaundice or hepatitis or who has recovered from jaundice or hepatitis within the preceding 6 months.
- (e) Tattooing or body piercing shall not be performed on an individual in an area with an evident skin infection or other skin disease or condition, including rashes, pimples, boils or infections.
- (f) Tattooing or body piercing shall not be performed on any patron who appears to be

under the influence of alcohol or any mind-altering drug.

28.029 Records maintained. Records shall be kept of all tattoos and piercings administered, including the name of customer, date, time, identification of tattoo if applicable, and practitioner's name. Records shall be kept on the premises of the establishment where administered. These records shall be available for inspection for a period of 5 years after the date of the procedure.

28.030 Non-compliance. Non-compliance with the provisions of this ordinance and Wis. Admin. code DHS 173 or NR 526 will be cause for enforcement under subch. III of this ordinance.

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ORDINANCE NO. 10 -2014

APPROVING AN AMENDMENT PACKAGE FOLLOWING THE RECENT REPEAL AND RECREATION OF CHAPTER 7 SAUK COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE. (Petition 16-2014)

Stat. § 50.69 allows the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, by ordinance, to establish districts of such number, shape, and area, and adopt such regulations for each such district as the Sauk County Board of Supervisors considers best suited to carry out the purposes of this section, including the purposes of promoting the public health, safety, and general welfare; and,

WHEREAS, the ordinance now in effect was originally passed on February 18, 2014, however because of the scale and complexity of drafting a new zoning ordinance, certain omissions, oversights, and incorrect references have been discovered; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment has the effect of correcting certain omissions, oversights, and incorrect references by changing allowable uses on certain property, correcting ambiguous language, establishing clear Americans with Disabilities Act requirements, zoning government owned property, and other sundry amendments; and

WHEREAS, your Committee has considered these amendments to Sauk Co. Code, Chapter 7 and believes that adoption of these amendments is in the best interest of the people of Sauk County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that Sauk Co. Code, Chapter 7, is hereby amended to read as attached hereto as Appendix A, and shall be effective upon passage.

- (31) "Comprehensive plan" means a guide to physical, social, and economic development of a local unit of government as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.1001(1)(a).
- (32) "Conditional use" means a use approved by the agency pursuant to the provisions of this chapter.
- (33) "Contractor's storage yard" means an area outside of a building utilized for the storage and maintenance of contractor's supplies, materials, and operational equipment.
- (34) "Department" means Sauk County Department of Conservation, Planning and Zoning.
- (35) "Dependency living arrangement" means a living situation which allows for a dependent person to live in an accessory dwelling while the owner and owner's family live in the principal dwelling or a dependent person lives in a principal dwelling while a caretaker lives in the accessory dwelling.
- (36) "Dependent" as it pertains to dependency living arrangements, means an individual who requires assistance in the activities of daily living such as eating, dressing, bathing, and ambulation.
- (37) "Dwelling" means a single-family dwelling or a multiple family dwelling:
- (a) "Single family dwelling" means a building designed for and occupied exclusively as a residence for one family.
- (b) "Multiple family dwelling" means a building designed or intended to be used by 2 or more families living independently of each other.
- (38) "Dwelling unit" means a single unit providing complete, independent living facilities for one or more persons, including permanent provisions for living sleeping, eating, cooking, and sanitation.
- (39) "Family" means any number of individuals related by blood, adoption, foster care, or marriage, or not to exceed 5 persons not so related, living together on the premises as a single housekeeping unit.

- (40) "Farm" means all land under common ownership that is primarily devoted to agricultural use. For purposes of this definition, land is primarily devoted to agricultural use if a majority of the land is in agricultural use.
- (41) "Farm operator" means the owner or other persons engaged in the management of a farm.
- (42) "Floor area" means the area, measured in square feet, within the outer lines of the exterior walls of a building at the top of the foundation or basement wall; provided that the floor area of a dwelling shall not include space not usable for living quarters, such as attics, utility or unfinished basement rooms, garages, breezeways or unheated porches, or terraces. Floor area includes all area regardless of ability to stand upon; or whether the surface is covered or contains a floor.
- (43) "Floor space" means the floor area inside an establishment that is accessible to patrons.
- (44) "Full-time equivalent" means a unit equal to 40 hours in any given 7-day week.
- (44m) "Hazardous substance" means any material defined and regulated as a hazardous substance by the U.S. environmental protection agency, the U.S. occupational safety and health administration, the U.S. department of transportation, and the U.S. nuclear regulatory commission.
- (45) "Home-based business" means any nonagricultural occupation or use which is conducted within a dwelling or an accessory structure. A home-based business must meet the definition of an accessory use.
- (46) "Hotel" means a place where sleeping accommodations are offered for pay to transients, in 5 or more rooms, and all places used in connection therewith, and is not a bed and breakfast establishment or lodging house.
- (47) "Human habitation" means the act of occupying a structure as a dwelling, living, or sleeping place; whether infrequently, intermittently, or as a principal residence.
- (48) "Junk" means garbage, waste, refuse, trash, any used motor vehicle upon which no current license plate is displayed, any inoperable motor vehicle, any used tire or used motor vehicle part, any inoperable machinery, and any scrap material, such as metal, paper, rags, cans

shall be completed in a manner so as to maintain the shape or appearance of trees within the buffer area.

- 7.044 Agricultural tourism: secondary standards. (1) SALES. The sale of goods may only consist of those goods produced, raised, assembled, or provided on the premises. Sales of goods not produced on the premises are limited to 25% of floor space. Services must be directly related to the principal use of the property.
- (2) OVERNIGHT ACCOMMODATIONS. Overnight and extended stay accommodations may be permitted as part of a conditional use provided that the accommodations are directly related to the principal use of the property.
- 7.045 Aquaculture facility: secondary standards. (1) WASTE MANAGEMENT. All wastewater and sludge shall follow a disposal plan approved by the department.
- (2) ESCAPE. Aquaculture operations shall be designed and operated as closed systems that permit no escape of plant and animal organisms outside of the closed system.
- 7.046 Agriculture: secondary standards. Land uses associated with general agricultural use including crop or livestock production, grazing, and forest management shall not require the issuance of a land use permit by the zoning administrator. Structures may require a land use permit.
- 7.047 Poultry and egg production, beekeeping residential: secondary standards. These standards apply to poultry and egg production in single family residential, multiple family residential, and rural community zoning districts only and do not affect poultry and egg production as an agricultural use. (1) NUMBER. If less than 2 acres, the number of poultry kept shall not exceed 6 per lot on the same lot as the dwelling. If 2 acres or more, the number of poultry kept shall not exceed 12 per lot on the same lot as the dwelling.
- (2) DESCRIPTION. A description of the poultry coop shall be provided with the land use permit application. Coops may be part of an accessory structure, but may not be a part of a dwelling.

- (3) NOISE. Roosters and crowing cockerels shall not be kept.
- (4) TRESPASS. Poultry shall be kept in fenced areas to prevent poultry from trespassing onto neighboring properties.
- (5) SETBACKS. (a) Poultry related structures shall be located no less than 25 feet from any side or rear yard. The setback from the road right-of-way shall be as specified in s. 7.098.
- (b) Beekeeping related structures shall be located no less than 100 feet from any side or rear yard. The setback from the road right-of-way shall be as specified in s. 7.098.
- (6) Land uses associated with poultry and egg production in the SFR, MFR, and RUC and which are less than or equal to 120 square feet shall not require the issuance of a land use permit by the zoning administrator provided the standards of this chapter are met.
- **7.048** Sawmill: secondary standards. (1) TIMEFRAME. This standard applies to sawmills when located on the premises for more than 10 days in a 365-day period.
- (2) ON-SITE SALES. There shall be no retail sales other than products produced on the premises.
- (3) WASTE DISPOSAL. Deleterious materials such as accumulated slabs, decayed wood, sawdust, sawmill refuse, planing mill shavings, or waste material of any kind shall be handled according to a management plan submitted to the zoning administrator and approved by the agency. Operators must demonstrate that the material will be used or disposed of in a manner that does not endanger human health or environmental resources.
- (4) EMISSIONS. No sawmill operation shall burn substances by open burning.
- (5) MATERIAL STORAGE. No storage of logs, lumber, deleterious substances, or equipment of any kind shall be permitted within any building setback area, as specified by the applicable zoning district.
- (6) OPERATIONAL HOURS. Hours of operation and days shall be limited to between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Hours or days of operation may be further limited specified as a condition of the conditional use by the agency.

- 7.049 Livestock harvest facility: secondary standards. (1) ANIMAL CONTROL. Harvest of animals shall take place in a confined area. Fencing shall be adequate to contain animals securely on the owner's property at all times.
- (2) WASTE DISPOSAL. Deleterious materials such as sewage, processed and unprocessed animal parts, manure, entrails, blood, hides, bones, and waste material of any kind shall be handled according to a management plan submitted to the zoning administrator and approved by the agency as part of the permitting process. Operators must demonstrate that the material will be used, or disposed of, in a manner that does not endanger human health or environmental resources.
- (3) LOCATION. Livestock harvest facilities may not be located less than 1,500 feet from any residential building and 300 feet from any lot line other than that of the owner of the premises or employees.
- (4) SCALE. Livestock harvest facilities gross annual income may not exceed \$100,000 except those facilities located in the industrial zoning district.
- **7.050** Art gallery and art studio: secondary standards. Sales of products and goods shall be of products and goods produced on the premises. The sale of products and goods not produced on the premises are permitted provided these sales are incidental to, or part of, the art gallery or art studio use.
- **7.051 Child care center: secondary standards. (1)** OUTDOOR PLAY AREAS. Play area boundaries shall be defined by the placement of a fence.
- (2) INCIDENTAL TO RESIDENTIAL USE. Daycare centers, 8 or fewer people, shall be incidental to a residential use.
- 7.052 Home-based business: secondary standards. A land use permit for a home-based business may be issued by the zoning administrator where the standards of this chapter are satisfied, and where the applicant has received a conditional use in those instances where a conditional use is required by this chapter. If the home-based business does not

- meet the standards for a land use permit in (1), then the home-based business must apply for a conditional use permit under (2) or (3). Any use that meets the standards of a home-based business does not need to meet the primary standards under that stated use, but does need to meet the secondary comply with the zoning requirement specific to that use but shall meet the primary and secondary standards of that use.

 (1) LAND USE PERMIT. The zoning administrator may issue a land use permit for a home-based business that meets and does not exceed the, following standards:
- (a) There shall be no more than one fulltime equivalent employee that is not an occupant of the residential dwelling on the same lot or parcel of the home-based business.
- (b) No more than 1,200 square feet of all accessory structures shall be used for the purpose of conducting a home-based business. There is no limit to the amount of square footage that may be used within the residential dwelling, provided the home-based business remains incidental to the residential use.
- (c) Any structural addition to the home for the purposes of operating a home-based business shall be designed, and appear residential in character, so that the addition can readily be repurposed for residential uses at such time that the home-based business is no longer operating.
- (d) Retail sales or services shall be of goods grown, produced, assembled, or for services rendered on the premises. Sales of products not produced on the premises are permitted only when these sales are incidental to, and part of, the principal function of the home-based business.
- (e) There shall be no outdoor storage of equipment, materials, or stock.
- (f) The home-based business shall not cause any odor, dust, smoke, vibration, or noise that can be detected beyond the property line.
- (g) All mechanical equipment used in conjunction with the home-based business shall be operated within a structure.
- (h) The home based business does not involve delivery services, other than those delivered by passenger motor vehicle or by parcel or letter carrier mail service using vehicles typically employed in residential deliveries.

- (i) Clients or customers visiting the homebased business shall not exceed 5 persons per day, or a maximum of 25 persons per week, whichever is greater.
- (j) No hazardous materials such as explosives, highly flammable, or extremely hazardous materials as defined by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, shall be stored on premises in relation to the function of the home based business. No hazardous substances shall be used or stored as part of a home-based business except normal use for household purposes.
- (2) CONDITIONAL USE STANDARDS FOR SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (SFR), MULTIPLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL (MFR), AND RURAL COMMUNITY (RUC) ZONING DISTRICTS. A home-based business within a SFR, MFR or RUC zoning district shall be referred to the agency for consideration of a conditional use provided the home-based business first meets standards pursuant to s. 7.052(1), and does not exceed the following additional standards, when applicable.
- (a) There shall be no more than 2 full-time equivalent employees that are not occupants of the residential dwelling, on the same lot or parcel of the home-based business.
- (b) Clients or customers visiting the home-based business shall not exceed 10 persons per day, or a maximum of 50 persons per week, whichever is greater.
- (3) CONDITIONAL USE STANDARDS FOR EXCLUSIVE AGRICULTURE (EA), RESOURCE CONSERVANCY (RC), AGRICULTURE (AG) ZONING DISTRICTS. A home-based business within an EA, RC or AG zoning district shall be referred to the agency for consideration of a conditional use provided the home-based business first meets standards pursuant to s. 7.052(1), and does not exceed the following additional standards, when applicable.
- (a) No more than 2,400 square feet of all accessory structure shall be used for the purpose of conducting a home-based business.
- (b) There shall be no more than 3 full-time equivalent employees that are not occupants of the residential dwelling on the same lot or parcel of the home-based business.
- (c) The home-based business may utilize delivery services, including cartage, drayage, or

- other services, that are not customarily utilized for residential delivery.
- (d) Clients or customers visiting the homebased business shall not exceed 10 persons per day, or a maximum of 50 per week, whichever is greater
- 7.053 Recreation facility, outdoor: secondary standards. (1) LIGHTING. Proposed lighting installations shall integrate every reasonable effort to mitigate the effects of light on surrounding properties.
- (2) OPERATION. Hours of operation, including hours of night lighting, shall be specified as a condition of the conditional use.
- **7.054** Sport shooting range: secondary standards. (1) FENCING AND SIGNAGE. All premises used for sport shooting ranges shall be completely fenced except for one point of entrance not more than 12 feet wide. Each such range shall be posted with warning signs, facing outward away from the range, not more than 100 feet apart, fastened level to the top of such fence, and not more than 6 feet above the ground. Such warning signs shall be at least 2 square feet in area and shall contain the words, "Danger Shooting Range" in red on a white background. The letters of such words shall be not less than 4 inches high and maintained in a legible condition at all times.
- (2) VEGETATIVE BUFFER All sport shooting ranges shall meet the vegetative buffer requirements of s. 7.042.
- BARRIER. where solid Ranges projectile ammunition is used shall be arranged in a manner that provides for a sod-faced barrier of earth or sand, impenetrable by any solid projectile fired on such ranges. For sport shooting ranges where all targets are 100 yards or less in distance, such barrier shall be at least 20 feet in height, measured from the base of the targets, and shall not be less than 50 feet in width. For those sport-shooting ranges where targets are greater than 100 yards, such barrier shall not be less than 30 feet in height, measured from the base of the targets, and shall not be less than 100 feet in width. If an eyebrow ricochet catcher or similar device is used, the aforementioned height and width standards may be decreased by 10%. The target area shall be

- (3) CAMPING WITHOUT A LAND USE CAMPING PERMIT. Camping on a lot with an existing residential dwelling shall not require a land use camping permit. All of the provisions in s. 7.055 (1) shall be met.
- 7.056 Community living arrangements: secondary standards. (1) All community living arrangements shall meet the following standards:
- (a) No community living arrangement may be placed within 2,500 feet of any other community living arrangement.
- (b) The community living arrangement must be licensed, operated, or permitted under the authority of the Wisconsin Department of Human Services or the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families.
- (2) Community living arrangements with 8 or fewer persons being served by the program shall be permitted in single family residential, multiple family residential, rural community, and recreation commercial, resource conservancy, and agriculture zoning districts.
- (3) Community living arrangements with 9 to 15 persons being served by the program shall be permitted in multiple family residential, rural community, and recreation commercial zoning districts. A conditional use shall be required prior to locating in the single family residential, resource conservancy, and agriculture zoning districts.
- (4) Community living arrangements with 16 or more persons being served by the program shall require a conditional use prior to locating in single family residential, multiple family residential, rural community, and recreation commercial, resource conservancy, and agriculture zoning districts.
- 7.057 Dwelling used temporarily during construction: secondary standards. (1) LAND USE PERMIT. Occupancy of a temporary dwelling during the construction of a new dwelling on the same lot or parcel requires the issuance of a land use permit as a principal residence during the construction of a permanent residential dwelling. The land use permit shall be filed with the zoning administrator. The land use permit shall expire within 365 days. The temporary home shall be removed within 30

- days of taking occupancy of the permanent residential dwelling.
- (2) PLACEMENT DURING HOME CONSTRUCTION. A temporary dwelling may be located on the same lot during the construction of a single family or multiple family dwelling provided that the dwelling is only occupied for residential uses, and by the same family who will occupy the permanent residential dwelling.
- 7.058 Mobile home park and mobile homes: secondary standards. (1) MOBILE HOME SPACE PARKING. Mobile home spaces parking shall be provided at a rate of one parking space for each mobile home. Parking Spaces shall consist of an all-weather surface. The space shall be provided with 6 tie-down anchors. Each mobile home parking space shall be not less than 10 feet wide, nor of less length than the length of the mobile home to be parked placed therein plus 5 feet.
- (2) DRIVEWAYS. There shall be a system of driveways providing access to each mobile home, and to off-road parking areas within the mobile home park. This system of driveways shall connect to a road.
- (3) COMMON OPEN SPACE. Each mobile home park shall set aside 5% of the total area for a contiguous, common open space. The common, open space area shall be in addition to yard open spaces. The area may be provided with children's playgrounds, picnic areas, game courts, and gardens, furnished and maintained by the mobile home park owner, or the plots shall be available to park inhabitants for personal garden plots.
- (4) CONSTRUCTION STANDARDS. All mobile homes shall meet the construction standards of the Mobile Home Manufacturers Association and all federal, state, and local codes.
- (5) Mobile homes shall only be permitted in mobile home parks except as provided under s. 7.059.
- 7.059 Temporary secondary dwelling for dependency living arrangement or agricultural use: secondary standards. (1) CONDITIONAL USE, LAND USE PERMIT, AND NOTICE OF TEMPORARY PERMIT. The arrangement shall require the issuance of a land

to expire, a new conditional use shall be applied for and approved by the agency provided that the junkyard is in compliance with the conditions set forth in the original conditional use.

- (8) Annual Inspection Fee. An annual inspection fee shall be established by the agency and shall be payable to the zoning administrator by June 1 of each year.
- 7.071 Landfill, clean: secondary standards. (1) RECORDS. The landowner shall maintain written records regarding the type, amount, and dates that materials are deposited into the landfill, and shall include written documentation of the source of the material claimed to be deposited into the landfill. Such records shall be made available to the zoning administrator on request.
- (2) CONDITIONAL USE TERM LIMIT. A conditional use shall be in effect for a period not to exceed 5 years. At the time the conditional use is set to expire it may be renewed for a period of not more than 5 years by the zoning administrator provided that the landfill is in compliance with the conditions set forth in the original conditional use.
- ANNUAL INSPECTION AND FEE. The zoning administrator shall inspect the landfill annually and review the conditional use to assure continued compliance. An annual inspection fee will be charged and review shall be good for a period of one calendar year, or portion of a year, beginning on January 1 through December 31. The fee is due on January 1. and becomes delinquent If the annual inspection fee February 1. becomes delinquent, the conditional use shall become null and void.
- 7.072 Landfill, sanitary: secondary standards. (1) RECORDS. The landowner shall maintain written records regarding type, amount and dates materials are deposited into the landfill and shall include a written documentation of the source of the material claimed to be deposited into the landfill. Such records shall be made available to the zoning administrator on request

- (2) VEGETATIVE BUFFER. All sanitary landfills shall meet the vegetative buffer requirements of s. 7.042.
- 7.073 Rendering plant facility: secondary standards. (1) REDUCTION ACTIVITIES. Reduction activities shall take place in a confined area.
- (2) WASTE DISPOSAL. Deleterious materials such as sewage, processed and unprocessed animal parts, manure, entrails, blood, hides, bones or waste material of any kind, shall be handled according to a management plan submitted to the zoning administrator and approved by the agency as part of the permitting process. Operators must demonstrate that the material will be used, or disposed of, in a manner that does not endanger human health or environmental resources.
- (3) SETBACKS. (a) All rendering plant facilities shall be no closer than 1,000 feet from any residential dwelling, other than the owner, agent or employee of such facility.
- (b) It shall be in violation of this chapter for a person, corporation or other legal entity to operate, or cause to be operated, any rendering plant within 1,500 feet of:
- 1. A duly organized and recognized place of worship.
- 2. A public or private elementary or secondary school.
- 3. A public or private day care facility or kindergarten.
- 4. A residential dwelling other than a dwelling for the owner, proprietor, commercial tenant, employee or caretaker.
- 5. Boundary of a platted area for residential development.
 - 6. A public park.
- 7.074 Exclusive agriculture zoning district, secondary standards. These standards apply to uses in the exclusive agriculture district.
 (1) These standards apply to the uses stated in ss. 7.029, 7.030, and 7.038(7). The uses may be located in the exclusive agriculture zone if it is determined that all of the following apply:
- (a) The use and its location in the exclusive agriculture zoning district are consistent with the purposes of the district.

- (b) The use and its location in the exclusive agriculture zoning district are reasonable and appropriate, considering alternative locations, or are specifically approved under state or federal law.
- (c) The use is reasonably designed to minimize conversion of land, at and around the site of the use, from agricultural use or open space use.
- (d) The use does not substantially impair or limit the current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.
- (e) Construction damage to land remaining in agricultural use is minimized and repaired, to the extent feasible.
- (2) These standards apply to the uses stated in s. 7.038 (5) and (6). The uses may be located in the exclusive agriculture zone if it is determined that all of the following apply:
- (a) The operation complies with subch. I of ch. 295 and rules promulgated under that subchapter, with applicable provisions of the local ordinance under Wis. Stats. 295.13 or 295.14, and with any applicable requirements of the department of transportation concerning the restoration of nonmetallic mining sites.
- (b) The operation and its location in the exclusive agriculture zoning district are consistent with the purposes of the exclusive agriculture zoning district.
- (c) The operation and its location in the exclusive agriculture zoning district are reasonable and appropriate, considering alternative locations outside the exclusive agriculture zoning district, or are specifically approved under state or federal law.
- (d) The operation is reasonably designed to minimize the conversion of land around the extraction site from agricultural use or open space use.
- (e) The operation does not substantially impair or limit the current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels of land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.
- (f) The owner shall restore the land to agricultural use, consistent with any required approved reclamation plan, when extraction is completed.
- (3) The construction of a dwelling in areas zoned exclusive agriculture shall require

the issuance of a conditional use permit pursuant to the standards in Wis. Stat. § 91.46(2)(c). except that dwellings may be established on a PRD development area established pursuant to Subchapter IX. Conditional use permits are not required for the following:

- (a) A dwelling may be established pursuant to subch. IX; or
- (b) Single family dwellings shall be a permitted use on a lot of record as that term is defined in s. 7.011(61).

7.075 Single family dwelling and accessory structures: secondary standards. (1) ACCESSORY STRUCTURE NUMBER AND FLOOR AREA. Accessory structures in the Single Family Residential District shall comply with all building setback requirements and be limited to one principal accessory structure and one secondary accessory structure per lot. The dimensional standards for the principal accessory structure shall be as follows:

Lot Area (sq. feet)	1. Maximum Floor Area (sq. feet)
(a) 0-19,999 sq. ft.	600 sq. ft.
(b) 20,000-43,559 sq. ft.	900 sq. ft.
(c) 43,560 sq. ft. and greater	1,200 sq. ft.

- (2) ACCESSORY STRUCTURE FLOOR AREA FOR THE SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL ZONING DISTRICT. The secondary accessory structure shall have a maximum floor area of 120 square feet.
- (3) SINGLE FAMILY DWELLINGS IN COMMERCIAL AND RECREATION COMMERCIAL. Residential quarters for the owner, proprietor, commercial tenant, employee or caretaker may be located on the same lot as the business, not to exceed one single family dwelling. Residential quarters in excess of one single family dwelling may be approved by the agency as a conditional use.

7.076 Roadside stand and farmer's market: secondary standards. (1) LOCATION. All

goods shall be of products and goods produced on the premises.

7.080 Government facilities, buildings and uses: secondary standards. Government uses shall be those uses conducted by a governmental entity on government owned property.

7.081 Accessible element: secondary standards. The addition of an accessible element to any structure may project into the road setback, front, or rear yard setback by up to 10 feet and into the side yard setback by up to 5 feet. There shall be only one accessible element per building. Prior to any accessible element projecting into a setback, the applicant must show that the element cannot be built outside of the setback.

7.082 Seasonal storage of recreational equipment and motor vehicles: secondary standards. Recreational equipment and motor vehicles may be stored on the premises provided the equipment is owned by private individuals other than those residing on the premises and the storage is located within an existing farm building and completely enclosed therein. The storage of a dealer's inventory or construction of any new buildings for storage shall be a commercial use. In the exclusive agricultural district, the storage must meet the definition of an accessory use.

7.083 Bed and breakfast establishment, lodging houses: secondary standards. (1) A septic verification and/or a sanitary permit shall be required from Sauk County for any building that results in any change in use of the structure from the original use that results in an increased volume of wastewater above that for which the system was originally designed. Where cases of doubt exist as to the need of a sanitary permit, Sauk County shall be contacted before the change in use is made and the zoning administrator shall determine the need for a sanitary permit.

(2)—The property must obtain all federal, state, and local permits. Property meets all applicable State of Wisconsin regulations and all applicable licenses have been issued to said

property, prior to application for said special exception permit.

- (3) The permit shall be issued to the owner(s) of the residence and would not be transferable.
- (4) An annual inspection fee shall be established by the agency and be payable to Sauk County by June 1st of each year.

7.084 Food processing facility and grocery store, confectionary, bakery, deli, and meat secondary market: standards. Food facilities processing and grocery stores. confectionaries, bakeries, delis, and meat markets shall only be permitted in the exclusive agriculture, rural community, or agriculture zoning districts if they have an annual gross income of less than \$100,000. Food processing facilities and grocery stores, confectionaries, bakeries, delis, and meat markets must meet the definition of an accessory use to be permitted in the exclusive agricultural zoning district. If a food processing facility's annual gross income is greater than said number, it shall only be permitted in the industrial zoning district. If a grocery store, confectionary, bakery, deli, or meat market's gross annual income is greater than said number, it shall only be permitted in rural community, commercial, or recreation commercial districts.

7.085 Animal grooming, veterinary clinic: secondary standards. In the exclusive agricultural district, this use is only allowed to care primarily for livestock.

7.086 Campground. (1) A camping unit may not be used for more than 8 months in any 12 month period occupied for more than 240 days in a calendar year. The stay does not need to be continuous, and all separate stays shall be combined in determining the 240-day period.

- (2) The camping units shall be 10 feet from the camping line as shown on the survey. All camping units shall comply with applicable setbacks that apply to structures.
- (3) Only permanent non-habitable structures will shall be allowed ion the campground. The only allowed structures allowed shall be sheds, gazebos, picnic shelters, porches, decks, or garages.

- (4) The campground must obtain all federal, state and local permits.—and be in compliance with Chapter HSS 178 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.
- (5) Occupancy of a camping unit on a continuous, year-round basis or utilization of a camping unit as a permanent abode or legal place of residence is prohibited.
- 7.087 Resort. (1) A septic verification and/or a sanitary permit shall be required from Sauk County for any building that results in any change in use of the structure from the original use that results in an increased volume of wastewater above that for which the system was originally designed. Where cases of doubt exist as to the need of a sanitary permit, Sauk County shall be contacted before the change in use is made and the zoning administrator shall determine the need for a sanitary permit.
- (2) Property meets all applicable State of Wisconsin regulations and all applicable licenses have been issued to said property, prior to application for said special exception permit.
- (3) (2) The permit shall be issued to the owner(s) of the residence and would not be transferable.
- (4) (3) In areas zoned, agriculture and resource conservancy only two dwelling units shall be allowed in any resort. If more than two dwellings units are desired, the area must be rezoned.

SUBCHAPTER VI

PARKING AND LOADING

- **7.088 Purpose.** The purpose of this subchapter is to provide vehicle parking, loading, and circulation standards sufficient to prevent congestion of public rights-of-way and provide safe, efficient public access to properties while minimizing the impact of parking areas on nearby properties.
- **7.089** Applicability. This subchapter applies to all zoning districts and uses. The requirements of this subchapter apply when any new structure is erected, any use of a structure or land is enlarged or increased in intensity, or any other

use or change of use is established that requires a land use permit.

- **7.090** Permit requirements. (1) SITE PLAN. A site plan drawn to a scale, showing the location of the parking spaces relative to structures, roads, setbacks, other parking spaces, vision clearance areas, and any other dominate land features located within and adjacent to the proposed parking area.
- (2) PARKING AND LOADING. When multiple uses are located on one property, or parking areas are shared between different lots to meet the requirements of this section, adequate parking and loading areas shall be identified on a land use permit application.
- (3) ASSURANCE. The zoning administrator may require additional information to assure compliance with this subchapter and all other applicable provisions of this chapter.
- 7.091 General standards. (1) ACCESS. Adequate ingress and egress to parking and loading areas by clearly limited and defined driveways shall be provided. Driveways shall be perpendicular to the public right-of-way wherever possible. Driveways shall be spaced a safe distance from road intersections, and each other, shall not be located within any vision clearance triangle, and may be limited in number and location according to federal, state, and local standards.
- (2) SURFACING. All driveways and parking, loading, and circulation areas shall be paved with an all-weather surface. Grass surfacing may be used for special events only.
- (3) DIMENSIONS OF LANES AND PARKING AREAS. Dimensions of parking lanes and spaces shall be in accordance with the following table. Parking for people with disabilities shall be provided as specified by federal and state regulations.
- (4) CIRCULATION. Minimum width of internal aisles providing traffic access to parking spaces shall be 12 feet for each direction of travel. Directional marking or signage, or both, shall be provided where required to facilitate safe, efficient circulation. Uses with drive-through facilities shall provide sufficient space on-site for all vehicles being served. Vehicles queuing to be served shall not utilize any road.

the district in which such building is to be located.

- (13) Structures for agricultural uses may be erected to a height exceeding 75 feet provided the front, side, and rear yards in the district in which the structure is to be located are increased at least 1.5 feet from the minimum setback requirement for each additional one foot of height greater than 75 feet in height of any agriculture structure that exceeds 75 feet in height.

A land use permit is required prior to starting any construction.
- (5) CHANGE IN USE. A nonconforming use of land or of a structure shall not be changed to any use other than a use permitted by this zoning ordinance. When such nonconforming use has been changed to a permitted use, it shall only be used thereafter for a use permitted by this chapter. For purposes of the section, a use

- shall be deemed to have been changed when an existing nonconforming use has been terminated and a new use has been permitted.
- (6) ABANDONMENT OR DISCONTINUANCE. When a nonconforming use of land, or a nonconforming use of part or all of a structure is discontinued or abandoned for a period of 365 days, such use shall not be reestablished or resumed. If applicable, prior to commencing the authorized activity on the site and obtaining any necessary land use permits, the zoning administrator may require the property owner to record notice against the property of the approved use, applicable plans, and conditions of approval with the county register of deeds.
- TIME LIMITS ASSOCIATED SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS. If the special exception is not initiated by securing a land use permit within 365 days of the decision letter, the special exception approval shall be considered void. The applicant may apply without fee, and the board of adjustment may grant, a one-time, 365-day extension provided that a written request for extension is submitted before the original expiration date. If a use or activity associated with a previously approved special exception ceases for 365 days or more after first being established on the property, the use will be deemed to have been terminated and the property owner or authorizing agent must reapply and obtain approval of another special exception before recommencing the use or activity.
- (9) EFFECT OF DENIAL. No application that has been denied under this section may be resubmitted for a period of 365 days from the

- date of the decision letter, except on grounds of new evidence or proof of changes of factors found valid by the board of adjustment.
- (10) MONITORING AND POTENTIAL REVOCATION OF A SPECIAL EXCEPTION. The board of adjustment or zoning administrator may require evidence and guarantees as either may deem necessary as proof that approved plans are being followed, required conditions are being met, and review criteria are being satisfied for special exceptions at all times. If the board of adjustment finds that the review criteria of this subsection or the conditions attached to the use are not complied with, the board of adjustment, after a public hearing, may revoke or alter the special exception.
- (11) EXPANSION OF SPECIAL EXCEPTION USE. The expansion of any use approved by a special exception shall require an application and review by the board of adjustment. Expansion of use shall be determined by the zoning administrator.
- 7.144 Land use permits: review procedure and standards. (1) PURPOSE. The purpose of this section is to specify the requirements and procedures for the issuance of land use permits. Land use permits are issued by the zoning administrator for structures and uses specified in this chapter in order to verify compliance with the provisions of this chapter. A land use permit is not a substitute for a building permit, which is instead issued by the affected town. In certain cases, other land use approvals including but not limited to rezoning, conditional use, special exception, or variance approval, are required before a land use permit may be issued.
- (2) APPLICABILITY. Except as exempted under this subsection, a land use permit is required from the zoning administrator in the following instances:
- (a) Before a structure is erected, affixed, moved, or structurally altered.
- (b) Before the construction of any foundation.
- (c) Before any substantial alteration in the heating plant, sanitary facilities, or mechanical equipment which would affect or change the use of an existing site or structure.

- (3) Any building or structure erected, moved or structurally altered or any use established in violation of the provisions of this chapter by any person, firm, association, corporation, including building contractors or their agents, shall be an unlawful structure or use.
- (4) The corporation counsel may bring an action to enforce this chapter and seek any remedy, legal or equitable, subject to prosecutorial discretion. The corporation counsel may seek an order to enjoin, remove, or vacate any violation of this chapter; or any use, erection, moving or structural alteration of any building, or use in violation of this chapter and seek fines as provided herein.
- The provisions of this chapter shall be enforced under the direction of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, through the zoning administrator, the enforcement officers, and the corporation counsel. Any person, firm, company, or corporation who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with; or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this chapter; shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 or more than \$200 per day as long as the violation exists; together with the costs of action. This chapter may be enforced by any remedy, legal or equitable. Actions may be brought by the corporation counsel or by the owner of land within the zoning district affected by the regulations of this chapter.

Request

A request by the Sauk County Conservation, Planning and Zoning Department to approve a zoning ordinance amendment package following the recent repeal and recreation of Chapter 7 Sauk County Zoning Ordinance.

Areas Affected by the New Ordinance

As determined by towns that have previously adopted or intend to adopt the new Ordinance.

Background

The County Board of Supervisors approved the repeal and recreation of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance on February 18, 2014. The newly adopted zoning ordinance accounts for policy direction provided in each town comprehensive plans, the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan, the joint comprehensive plan for the Sauk Prairie area and the recently adopted Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan. The ordinance has been certified by DATCP for a period of 10-years, the maximum allowed, as meeting Chapter 91 Farmland Preservation of state statutes.

Because of the project scale and complexity of drafting a new zoning ordinance, and despite best intentions otherwise, it is difficult to develop an ordinance that does not include some omissions, oversights, and incorrect references. Going into the rewrite process, the CPZ Department made it clear to the towns and County Board that an amendment package would be introduced in late 2014 to address any oversights.

The amendment package, as show in Exhibit A, does not make any substantive changes to the ordinance that would otherwise need to be vetted with the towns affected by the ordinance, however every affected town was given an opportunity to provide comments and suggestions. In addition to the changes noted in Exhibit A, the amendment package will reinstate zoning on public lands which were inadvertently unzoned on February 18, 2014.

As with any zoning ordinance, this zoning ordinance is a dynamic document that can and will likely be amended from time to time to address changing conditions. This amendment package, in part, also accounts for changing conditions since the date of adoption by the County Board.

AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF A TRUCK FOR CONSERVATION, PLANNING, AND ZONING DEPARTMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that an Ad Hoc Committee on Supervisor Compensation is hereby created to consist of three county board supervisors, to be appointed by the chairperson as provided in Rule IV Q of the Rules of the Board to prepare a recommendation to the Executive & Legislative Committee regarding the appropriate compensation to be provided to board supervisors elected in 2016, with said Ad Hoc Committee to consider the factors identified above, and other appropriate factors deemed relevant; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Ad Hoc Committee is authorized per diem and mileage for not more than four meetings, and shall make its recommendation to the Executive & Legislative Committee not later than the regular meeting of that committee in July of 2015 after which time the work of the Ad Hoc Committee is completed, and the committee shall be dissolved.

- **42.01 Purpose and intent.** (1) The purpose of this ordinance is to prescribe, in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 323.14(3), the operations and authority of the department and to establish the procedure for the declaration of an emergency in Sauk County to ensure that the county will be prepared to address emergencies resulting from enemy action, natural disaster, or technological emergency.
- (2) It is the intent of the county board that all sections and provisions of this ordinance have an independent existence, and, should any section or provision be declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is the intent of the county board that any section or provision so declared shall be severable from, and shall not affect the validity of, the remainder of this ordinance.
- (3) This ordinance shall be effective in all unincorporated areas of Sauk County and any incorporated municipality that has not passed an emergency management ordinance in accordance with Wis. Stat. ch. 323.
- (4) Nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit or discourage the cities, towns, and villages, or the department from entering into any intergovernmental agreement regarding emergency management pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0301.
- 42.02 Definitions. Unless specifically defined under this section, words and phrases used in this ordinance shall have the same meaning as they have at common law and to give this ordinance it's most reasonable application. Words used in the present tense include the future, the singular number includes the plural, and the plural number includes the singular. The word "may" is permissive; "shall" is mandatory and not discretionary. The terms "emergency

- management," "emergency government," and "emergency operations" shall be interchangeable and given the same meaning throughout this ordinance.
- (1) "Civil defense" means all measures taken by or on behalf of the State of Wisconsin and its subdivisions to prepare for and minimize the effect of enemy action upon the civilian population.
- (2) "County board" means the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.
- (3) "Department" means the Sauk County Department of Emergency Management.
- (4) "Emergency" means any event that inflicts damage or threatens to inflict damage to property or people.
- (5) "Emergency management" means all measures undertaken by, or on behalf of, the county and includes "civil defense" as follows:
- (a) To prepare for, and minimize, the effect of enemy action and natural or human-induced disasters upon persons and property;
- (b) To effectuate emergency repairs to, or the emergency restoration of, vital public utilities and facilities destroyed or damaged by action or disaster.
- (6) "Emergency operations plan" means the Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan that identifies the various county functions to be performed during an emergency.
- (7) "Enemy action" means any hostile action taken by a foreign power or a foreign or domestic terrorist organization, or both, which threatens the security of Sauk County or a portion of Sauk County.
- (8) "Governor" means the Governor of the State of Wisconsin.

(9) "Natural disaster" means all other extraordinary misfortunes affecting the county whether natural, technological, or human induced and that are not included in the term "enemy action."

42.03 Emergency management staffing. (1) DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.

- (a) The director of emergency management shall control, supervise, organize, and direct all operations of the emergency management program and department.
- (b) The director of emergency management shall have all powers and duties necessary to effectuate the *Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan* and any future powers delegated by the county board.
- (2) DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT. The safety and risk manager, in addition to duties assigned within the safety risk management program, shall assist the emergency management director in effectuating the Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan and emergency management program as directed, and assume any future powers delegated by the county board.
- (3) PROGRAM SPECIALIST. The program specialist shall assist the emergency management director and deputy director in all aspects of the emergency management program and department.
- 42.04 Emergency management committee. (1) The executive and legislative committee is designated as the emergency management committee, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 323.14. The chairperson of the county board is the chairperson of the committee.
- (2)The emergency management committee is delegated policy-making and rule-making authority for the implementation of Wis. Stat. ch. 323. The emergency management committee shall plan and execute activities in accordance with applicable legal authority. The emergency management committee shall be subject to the powers of the county board and shall comply with the personnel, purchasing, and budgeting rules established by the county board. The emergency management committee shall utilize the services of the administrative coordinator who shall exercise general supervision and control over the director and deputy director of emergency management.

- **42.05** Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan. The department shall prepare and maintain an emergency management plan entitled the "Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan" that is consistent with the principals stated in Wis. Stat. ch. 323 and approved by the county board.
- **42.06 Utilization of existing services and facilities.** In preparing and executing the emergency management program, the services, equipment, supplies and facilities of the existing departments and agencies of the county shall be utilized to the maximum extent practicable, and the officers and personnel of all departments and agencies are directed to cooperate with the emergency management director and to provide services and facilities as needed.
- **42.07 Issuing authorities who may declare an emergency.** (1) Who May Declare An Emergency.
- (a) An emergency may be declared in Sauk County by the Governor in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 323.10, the governing bodies of the cities, towns, and villages in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 323.11, or by a majority of the county board.
- (b) In the event an emergency occurs within Sauk County at a time when the county board is unable to meet for the purpose of making a declaration of an emergency, in order to access state emergency resources, fix liability for emergency response costs, or authorize emergency repairs to county facilities, the following persons may declare a state of emergency:
- 1. In the event the county board is unavailable, the chairperson of the county board may declare a state of emergency.
- 2. In the event the chairperson of the county board is unavailable, the director of emergency management may declare a state of emergency.
- (2) A declaration of an emergency shall be confirmed by resolution of the county board at its next regularly scheduled or special meeting.
- (3) The issuing authority shall issue all necessary proclamations regarding the existence of a state of emergency and shall issue disaster warnings or alerts as shall be required in the Sauk County Emergency Operations Plan.
- (4) If any city, town, or village in Sauk County declares an emergency and Sauk County does not, the department may, upon request, assist

the requesting city, town, or village as necessary. Any expenditures for services rendered in response to an assist request shall be paid by the requesting municipalities unless other mutual aid agreements, contracts, or other binding documents dictate differently.

- (5) A state of emergency shall continue until terminated by the issuing authority, except that any declaration not issued by the Governor may be terminated at the discretion of the county board by a majority vote.
- (6) In the event that the Governor, the county board, the chairperson of the county board, or the director of emergency management determines that an emergency exists growing out of natural or human-induced disasters, expenditures for services rendered in participating municipalities shall be paid by participating municipalities unless other mutual aid agreements, contracts, or other binding documents dictate differently.

42.08 Emergency ordinances. Whenever necessary to meet an emergency for which insufficient ordinances are in place, the chairperson of the county board and, in the chairperson's absence, the director of emergency management may proclaim, promulgate, and enforce orders, rules, and ordinances relating to the conduct of persons and the use of property which are necessary and expedient for the safety, welfare, and good order of the county and to protect public peace, health, and safety, and preserve lives and property, and to ensure cooperation in emergency management activities. The proclamation shall be posted in 3 public places, and it may be rescinded by resolution of the county board.

42.09 National incident management system and incident command systems. Sauk County comply with the National Incident Management System requirements in all phases of its emergency management program as detailed by the federal and state government. This compliance is in order to facilitate an effective and coordinated emergency management system and in order to remain eligible for funding. As part of becoming compliant with the national incident management system, Sauk County, in this section, adopts the approved incident command system for use in all emergency operations. The Sauk County Emergency Management Office will provide

county and municipal agencies with the information necessary to aid each entity with complying with the national incident management system requirements.

42.10 Emergency bidding and hiring. In order to meet the needs of the community in a countydeclared disaster in a timely manner while still meeting the county guidelines for competitive purchasing, requests for contractors may be released in the most expeditious form of legal notice and the open period may close no less than 3 days after the request is publically released. The county will review the submissions for both price and quality to select a bidder. In order to achieve economies of scale or to simplify the bidding process, municipalities may, at the time of disaster, submit a written letter requesting that the county hire contractors on the municipality's behalf. The municipality will remain responsible for the costs of their portion of the contract unless other arrangements are detailed in writing beforehand. The county may also implement an expedited hiring process. The intent of this process is to bring into county service temporary employees that may be needed on a limited-term basis specifically to aid in the recovery from a county declared disaster. In a formally declared county disaster, this provision of the ordinance would supersede existing county policy, resolution, or ordinance in order to expedite the hiring and bidding process only during this specifically declared event. If the county board is not available for approval, the chairperson of the county board, administrative coordinator, the county or emergency management director may approve the implementation of this process.

REPEALING SAUK CO. CODE CH. 37, RECORDS RETENTION AND CREATING SAUK CO. CODE CH. 37, INFORMATION PRACTICES AND REPEALING SAUK CO. CODE § 30.50

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Sauk does ordain as follows:

WHEREAS, Sauk Co. Code ch. 37 Records Retention is out of date and in need of revision, the existing provisions related to public records in the ordinances do not address electronic records, and other provisions of the ordinances addressing records are contained in miscellaneous provisions making them difficult to locate; and,

WHEREAS, the corporation counsel has done considerable research regarding the lawful handling of requests for electronic records and has drafted changes pertaining to these records as well as updating the ordinance to refer to the State of Wisconsin Public Records Board schedule for records retention, and relocated existing provisions related to public records from Sauk Co. Code § 30.50 to the new chapter; and,

WHEREAS, the attached appendix containing the proposed Sauk Co. Code ch. 37 entitled Information Practices is intended to be the single chapter dealing with records to provide both officials, employees and the public a single point of reference for all provisions of the ordinances pertaining to the general records of the county; and,

WHEREAS, other non-substantive changes have been made to improve the clarity of the ordinance, and your undersigned Committee has considered the changes and does recommend their adoption.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that ch. 37 of the Sauk Co. Code of Ordinances is hereby repealed and recreated to read as contained in the attached Appendix and shall be effective upon passage; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that in the event that the State of Wisconsin Public Records Board amends the General Schedules for County Governments, Sauk Co. Code ch. 37.12 will encompass the amended schedule as if set forth therein.

37.01 Purpose. (1) This ordinance is intended to provide access to public records and to establish a retention schedule that authorizes the destruction of county records. This ordinance establishes procedures required to access public records and establishes minimum retention periods. This ordinance shall be construed with a presumption of public access, consistent with the conduct of governmental business. Denying access to records is contrary to the public interest unless exceptional reasons support denial. Sauk County adopts and incorporates the provisions of Wisconsin's Public Records Laws, Wis. Stats. §§ 19.21 to 19.39, inclusive of all future amendments and revisions.

Records custodians may destroy a record prior to the time set forth in the schedule only if such a record has been reproduced as an original record in accordance with Wis. Stats. §§ 16.61(7) and 16.612. Storage of public records in electronic format shall comply with the requirements, standards, and guidelines set forth in Wis. Adm. Code § Adm 12.05. Any record not covered by this ordinance or any other regulation of law shall be maintained 7 years in accordance with Wis. § 19.21(5)(c). Records custodians are instructed to destroy non-records when they are no longer needed or useful. The following is intended to supplement, not to replace or supplant, the Wisconsin Public Records Law.

37.02 Historical records. The State Historical Society of Wisconsin has waived the required statutory 60-day notice under Wis. Stat. § 19.21(5)(d), for any record marked "Waived," waived notice, on the State of Wisconsin Public

Records Board's General Schedules for County Governments. The State Historical Society of Wisconsin must be notified prior to destruction of a record marked "Notify," non-waived. Notice is also required for any record not listed in this ordinance. "N/A" or "P" indicates not applicable and applies to any county record designated for permanent retention.

37.03 Definitions. For the purposes of this ordinance, certain words and terms are defined as follows:

- (1) "Authority" means any of the following entities having custody of a record and constituting a part of Sauk County government, or being attached for administrative purposes to Sauk County government: an office, elected official, agency, department of a public body corporate and politic created by constitutional law, ordinance, rule, or order; or a formally constituted subunit of the foregoing.
- "Record" means any material on which written, drawn, printed, spoken, visual or electromagnetic information is recorded or preserved, regardless of physical form or characteristics, which has been created or is being kept by an authority. "Record" includes all items identified in Wis. Stat. § 19.32(2). "Record" does not include drafts, notes, preliminary computations and like materials prepared for the originator's personal use or prepared by the originator in the name of a person for whom the originator is working; materials which are purely the personal property of the custodian and have no relation to the custodian's office: materials to which access is limited by copyright, patent, or bequests; and

published materials in the possession of an authority other than a public library which are available for sale, or which are available for inspection at a public library.

- (3) "Legal Custodian" means:
- (a) An elected official who is elected to a county office that oversees a department of the county. The official may designate an employee of the office to act as the legal custodian for records pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 19.33(1).
- (b) Unless otherwise specifically provided, the county clerk or the clerk's designee shall act as legal custodian for the county board and for any committees, commission, boards, or authorities created by ordinance or resolution of the county board. In general, the county clerk will act as legal custodian with respect to notices and minutes of the county board, its committees and commissions, boards, or authorities; other records concerning the departments or activities the jurisdiction of committees, commissions, or authorities, shall generally be maintained by the elected official, department head, or chief administrative officer of the departments or activities.
- (c) For every authority not specified in pars.

 (a) or (b), supra, the authority's chief administrative officer is the legal custodian for the authority; the administrative officer may designate an employee of the officer's staff to act as the legal custodian.
- (d) The legal custodian shall be vested by the authority with full legal power to render decisions and carry out the duties of the authority under this ordinance. Each authority shall provide the name of the legal custodian and a description of the nature of the legal custodian's duties under this subchapter to all employees of the authority entrusted with records subject to the legal custodian's supervision. Each legal custodian shall name a person to act as legal custodian in the legal custodian's absence or the absence of the legal custodian's designee. This subsection does not apply to members of the county board.
- 37.04 Procedural information and notice to public. (1) Each authority, in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 19.34; shall adopt, prominently display, and make available for inspection and copying at its offices for the guidance of the

- public; a notice containing a description of its organization and the established times and places at which, the legal custodian from whom, and the methods whereby, the public may obtain information and access to records in its custody, make requests for records, or obtain copies of records and the costs thereof. This subsection does not apply to members of the county board.
- (2) Each authority, as defined in sub. 37.03(1), supra, shall promulgate the notice required under this subsection, file a copy of its notice with the county clerk, and display a copy of the notice at its own offices. This subsection does not apply to members of the county board.
- 37.05 Treatment of certain data as records. The Wisconsin Public Records Law provides limited guidance as to whether the raw and perishable data of the following technologies qualify as records that must be maintained. This ordinance provides the following status of these technologies:
- (1) E-MAIL. The data in an e-mail message may constitute a public record and is subject to maintenance as a public record. The data in an e-mail is subject to the same analysis under the public records statutes as an equivalent paper or hard copy record. Management information systems is responsible for ensuring that all e-mails are properly preserved for analysis.
- (2) VOICE-MAIL. A voice-mail message is not a public record and voice-mail messages do not have to be maintained as public records. These messages are the functional equivalent of phone conversations. Phone conversations are not public records. Additionally, voice-mail messages share many of the attributes of "personal notes" which are not public records. Voice-mail messages cannot be indexed or maintained in any manner that would allow for their easy classification, searching, or retrieval making retention impractical.
- (3) INSTANT MESSAGING AND TEXT MESSAGING. Except as set forth in this paragraph and in sub. 37.05(10), infra, the data involved in instant messaging and text messaging communications is not subject to maintenance as a public record. Instant messaging and text messaging have all of the attributes of instantaneous exchange of ideas as does a

regular telephone conversation. The data exchange has the same technological issues regarding capturing and storage of data that is present with voice-mail. An additional concern is that the raw data is often briefly stored or not stored at all by third party vendors or hosts that provide these services. This technology is closer to a true telephone conversation than are voicemails. County employees and officials shall refrain from using instant messaging and text messaging for official communication purposes, or for matters that would result in a public record if another format such as e-mail or written communication were employed, unless the employee or official preserves a copy of the messaging or text messaging communication by any of the following means:

- (a) Copying the communication to their email account.
- (b) Downloading the communication to a county computer.
- (c) Making a computer file of the communication.
- (d) Printing and retaining a copy of the communication.
- VOICE OVER THE INTERNET PROTOCOL. The county does not monitor nor record the data associated with the conversations that occur over voice over the internet protocol. These conversations are the same real time voice communications as standard telephone conversations that are not public records. The only difference between these communications is the medium employed in transmitting the voice communications from one participant in the conversation to all others involved in the conversation.
- (5) AUDIO, VIDEO, DATA TRANSMISSIONS, AND COMMUNICATIONS. The county does not routinely copy the data, nor maintain records of audio, video, data and radio transmissions and communications that may be processed through county computer. When the county copies, records, or maintains copies or recordings of such communications or transmissions, those copies may constitute public records that are subject to records requests and must be maintained according to the appropriate records retention schedule. The Sauk County 9-1-1 center is the custodian for police and fire radio communications.

- (6) AUDIO AND VIDEO RECORDINGS. Unless otherwise provided in this ordinance, public records are subject to requests and must be maintained according to the retention schedules published in this ordinance.
- (a) Rewritable Recording Systems. Those systems where the recordings are routinely overwritten by newer recordings, such as in continuous loop videotape or digital video written to a camera's hard drive or memory, do not constitute a record unless the recordings are further downloaded, printed, or separately preserved to memorialize some event or proceeding. Until such time as these recordings separately downloaded, printed, or preserved, these recordings do not have to be preserved and, as the recording equipment programs or protocols may dictate, can be overwritten, erased, or otherwise destroyed. If such data is downloaded, printed, or separately preserved, it shall be treated as a record and shall be retained in accordance with the retention schedules.
- (b) Recordings Made for Preparing Minutes of Meetings. In accordance with Wis. Stat. § 19.21(7), any tape recording of a meeting, as defined in Wis. Stat. § 19.82(2), by any government body as defined by Wis. Stat. § 19.82(1), may be destroyed, overwritten, or recorded over no sooner than 90 days after the minutes have been approved and published if the purpose of the recording was to take minutes of the meeting.
- (7)ELECTRONIC DOCUMENT FILES. Where records, as that term is defined in Wis. Stat. § 19.32(2), exist only in an electronic format, the electronic records shall be maintained according to the appropriate retention schedule. Where both hard copy and electronic copies of a record exist, they shall each be subject to public records requests. When the custodian has designated electronic records as the official records, only an electronic copy shall be retained and made available for inspection under the public records laws. Where the custodian has not made such a designation, only the hard copy shall be subject to inspection as a public record and the electronic copies shall be treated and disposed of as draft documents that do not need to be maintained beyond creation of the final hard copy.

- 4
- (8) ELECTRONIC LOGS AND TEMPORARY DATA FILES. Electronic logs and temporary data files provide detailed information about the design and functionality of the county's computer network. These logs are routinely overwritten on a daily basis due to the high volume of traffic that is being logged. Unrestricted access to these logs and files would constitute a breach of system security and leave the system vulnerable to exploitation and hacking. In order to ensure network security, these logs are available to the MIS coordinator's authorized staff only. These determinations apply to the following types of logs and data files:
- (a) Syslogs for Network Electronic Devices. All logs created by network devices such as firewalls, routers, and switches, which are used for monitoring and trending computer network traffic patterns or detecting unauthorized network traffic, or both.
- (b) Network Server Security, Application, and Event Logs. These logs are used to monitor activity on county network servers including successful and unsuccessful login attempts, file system access, and hardware performance. These logs provide detailed information about county network account ID's, file system structure, and hardware profiles.
- (c) Network Security Appliance Logs. All logs created by network security devices such as the anti-virus appliance, anti-SPAM appliance, and content filtering appliance, which are used to monitor specific types of unauthorized or malicious traffic on the county network. These logs identify specific network traffic patterns and protocols that are allowed or disallowed on the county network.
- (d) Application Logs. These logs are used to monitor activity on various database applications; they do not contain specific audits of database transactions. These logs may contain version information, program variables, and programming logic.
- (9)**EMERGING TECHNOLOGIES** AND RECORDS RETENTION. (a) As new information technologies emerge, management the information systems coordinator (MIS coordinator) shall evaluate these technologies and their benefit to county operations. The MIS coordinator shall consider whether any of these

- technologies provide the capacity to archive public records created by these technologies. Whenever it is economically and practically feasible to archive records created by emerging technologies, archiving shall be incorporated into any deployment of the technologies.
- (b) Whenever the technologies do not provide for such archiving capabilities, the MIS coordinator shall consider whether the benefits of employing such technologies outweigh the risks that some public records may not be retained by deployment of the technologies. Where benefits outweigh the risks, county employees shall refrain from using new technologies official communication for purposes or for matters that would result in a public record if another format such as e-mail or written communication were employed. In the event that newly emerging technologies are used for communication purposes, the employee shall preserve a copies of these communications by any of the following means:
- 1. Copying communications to their email account.
- 2. Downloading communications to a county computer.
- 3. Making a computer file of the communications.
- 4. Printing and retaining copies of the communications.

The MIS coordinator shall also ensure that, as soon as practical and economically feasible, archiving systems are obtained for any information technology that is deployed without an archiving system.

- (10) USE OF TECHNOLOGIES TO AVOID THE DUTY TO PRESERVE PUBLIC RECORDS IS PROHIBITED. No employee shall use or employ any form of communication or information technology with the intent or design to circumvent the records retention requirements of this ordinance. Text Messaging shall not be used in lieu of e-mail to share or create a public record unless the employee complies with the provisions of sub. 37.05(3), supra.
- **37.06** Access to public records. (1) The rights of any person who requests inspection or copies of a record are governed by the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 19.35(1).

- **(2)** Each authority shall provide any person who lawfully requests to inspect or copy a record which appears in written form, or who requests to photograph a record that is only available in a form that does not permit copying, with facilities comparable to those used by its employees in order for the requesting person to inspect, copy, abstract, or photograph the record during established office hours. An authority is not required by this subsection to purchase or lease photocopying, duplicating, photographic, or other equipment or to provide a separate room for the inspection, copying, abstracting, or photographing of records.
- (3) Each authority, upon request for any record, shall as soon as practicable and without delay, either fill the request or notify the requestor of the authority's determination to deny the request in whole or in part and the reason for denial of the request. An oral request may be denied orally unless a demand for a written statement of the reasons denying the request is made by the requestor within 5 business days of the oral denial. authority denies a written request in whole or in part, the requestor shall receive from the authority a written statement of the reasons for denying the written request. Every written denial of a request by an authority shall inform the requestor that if the request for the record was made in writing, then the determination is subject to review upon petition for a writ of mandamus under Wis. Stat. § 19.37(1), or upon application to the attorney general or a district attorney.
- FORMAT FOR DELIVERY OF RECORDS. (a) Except as otherwise provided by law, any requestor may receive or inspect a record in the same format in which the county maintains the record. Whenever it is necessary to redact or excise portions of a record in order to comply with the Wisconsin Public Records Law, the redactions shall be made with the assistance of the MIS department. Whenever electronic redaction or excisions cannot be done in a secure manner that preserves such redactions and the viewing of the redacted information, such redactions should be made by hand, not electronically, and the requestor shall only receive a hard copy, not an electronic copy, of the redacted record. A requestor may not be

- charged for the time necessary to review a record or to redact or excise non-releasable materials.
- (b) When practicable, records may be e-mailed to the requestor or provided by a media storage device. In order to ensure the integrity of county records, any e-mailed document shall be converted to a secure format prior to sending the document to anyone outside of the county government. There shall not be any reproduction charge for e-mailing records, however, such records may still be subject to payment of a location fee as established in Wis. Stat. § 19.35(3)(c).
- (5)SPECIAL RULES REGARDING REPRODUCTION OF E-MAIL RECORDS. (a) E-mails dated January 1, 2011, or before were not stored in an archive. The restoration and location of these e-mails is difficult and labor intensive. Such requests often take more than 30 days to comply with due to labor and technical issues. Custodians who receive requests for these records should inform the requestor of these issues. Such requests must be immediately forwarded to the MIS coordinator who may prepare an estimate of the actual, necessary, and direct cost of locating such records and the MIS coordinator shall provide technical assistance to the custodian.
- (b) All Sauk County e-mail transactions dated January 1, 2011, or later have been preserved in a searchable data archive, subject to retention as provided in this ordinance. When requests are made for such records, custodians shall clarify with the requestor, the various search terms and e-mail boxes that the requestor would have the county search. Once the requestor has specified search terms, the custodian shall contact the MIS coordinator for technical assistance in fulfilling the request.
- (c) E-mails are often sent to multiple recipients creating a chain. A requestor will be provided with one copy of an e-mail and all responses to that e-mail. Unless a requestor specifically requests otherwise, the requestor will not be provided with multiple copies of an e-mail showing receipt by each of the designated e-mail recipients.
- **(6)** TIME FOR COMPLIANCE PROCEDURES. (a) The fulfillment of public records requests is a high priority for the county.

Each custodian, upon request for any record, shall, as soon as practicable and without delay, either fill the request or notify the requestor of the custodian's determination to deny the request in whole or in part and the reason for the denial. If a request may take more than 10 business days to process, then the custodian must respond to the requestor within those 10 days with an estimate of when the processing will be completed and with an explanation of the reason supporting that estimate.

- (b) Before any custodian may deny access to any records or portion of a record, the custodian must consult with the corporation counsel. The consultation shall occur as soon as practicable after the custodian has assembled and reviewed the requested records. In any response to a requestor, the custodian shall include a statement that the corporation counsel was consulted regarding the denial of access to the requested records. Any denial of access made by a custodian without such consultation and statement is not considered a response from Sauk County.
- (c) The county shall maintain a procedure whereby individuals may inform the county that their safety may be endangered by the release of otherwise available public records and whereby individuals may request that records be maintained as confidential records. The office of the corporation counsel and MIS shall work cooperatively to maintain the necessary procedures and policies to facilitate and respond appropriately to such communications.
- (7) No custodian may destroy a record at any time after the receipt of a request for inspection or copying of a record until after the request is granted or until at least 60 days after the date that the request is denied. If any legal action is pending regarding or related to the record, the record may not be destroyed without the express authorization of the corporation counsel. No record that is the object of, or that has been produced in accordance with, a discovery order or a subpoena may be destroyed without the express consent of the corporation counsel.
- **37.07 Form of request.** The Wisconsin Public Records Law dictates that certain actions must be taken regarding oral requests for records

- and that certain more formal actions are taken in response to written requests for records. State law does not expressly explain how to respond to the following methods of communication. Therefore, requests made by the following means shall be responded to as follows:
- (1) E-MAIL. A request made by e-mail may be responded to via e-mail or in writing and shall comply with all of the formalities as though the request was made in writing.
- (2) VOICE-MAIL. A request made by voice-mail shall be responded to as though it were made orally.
- (3) INSTANT MESSAGING AND TEXT MESSAGING. A request made in either such manner shall be treated as an oral request.
- **37.08 Fees.** (1) Each authority shall impose a fee upon the requestor of a copy of a record. The imposed fee may not exceed the actual, necessary, and direct cost of reproduction and transcription of the record unless a fee is otherwise specifically established, or authorized to be established, by the law.
- (2) Each authority shall impose a fee upon the requestor of a copy of a record for the actual, necessary, and direct cost of photographing and photographic processing if the authority provides a photograph of a record, the form of which does not permit copying.
- (3) Except as otherwise provided by law or as authorized to be prescribed by law, an authority shall impose a fee upon a requestor for locating a record, not exceeding the actual, necessary, and direct cost of location, if the cost is \$50 or more.
- (4) Each authority shall impose a fee upon a requestor for the actual, necessary, and direct cost of mailing or shipping of any copy or photograph of a record that is mailed or shipped to a requestor.
- (5) Each authority shall require prepayment by a requestor of any fee or fees imposed under this subsection if the total amount exceeds \$5. An authority may provide copies of a record without charge or at a reduced charge where the authority determines that waiver or reduction of the fee is in the public interest.

- 37.09 Separation of information. If a record contains information that may be made public and information that may not be made public, the authority having custody of the record shall provide the information that may be made public and delete the information that may not be made public from the record before release. Each authority shall consult with the corporation counsel before releasing any information requiring separation under this subsection.
- **37.10 Disposition.** (1) Each custodian may dispose of records when the minimum retention period expires.
- (2) Sixty days prior to the destruction of records, written notice of destruction must be given to the Wisconsin Historical Society in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 19.21(5)(d). This does not apply to any record listed in the schedule and designated "waived".
- (3) Prior to the destruction of records, the custodian must determine if there is litigation, an audit, or a public records request pending. If so, place a "hold" on records and cease all disposition activity until:
- (a) After a public records request is granted, or 60 days after a request is denied pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 19.35(5); or,
- (b) Until any litigation or audit is fully and finally resolved.
- 37.11 Microfilming of optical disk storage of department records. (1) Departments may keep and preserve public records through the use of microfilm or optical disk storage providing that the applicable standards established in Wis. Stats. §§ 16.61(7) and 16.612 are met.
- (2) Departments should consider factors such as retention periods and estimated costs and benefits of converting records between different media in deciding which records to microfilm or store on optical disk. Paper records converted to either microfilm or optical disk storage should be destroyed. The retention periods identified in this ordinance apply to records in any media.
- 37.12 Retention schedule. Sauk County hereby adopts the State of Wisconsin Public Records Board's General Schedules for County Governments. The retention schedule can be

found at the Wisconsin Public Record Board's website.

ORDINANCE NO. 13 - 2014

AMENDING CHAPTER 15, ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE (UTV) CROSSINGS AND ROUTES ON COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAYS

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Sauk does ordain as follows:

WHEREAS, Sauk Co. Code ch. 15 regulates approval of ATV routes, and in April 2014, the Wisconsin State Legislature enacted 2013 Act 313, which granted authority to counties and local governments to establish ATV routes on state trunk highway bridges, and your undersigned committee does believe Sauk County should have the discretion to so designate such routes; and,

WHEREAS, the attached amendments to Sauk Co. Code ch. 15 provide authority to the Highway and Parks Committee to designate ATV and UTV routes on state trunk highway bridges and provide for rules and regulations pertaining to ATVs and UTVs; and,

WHEREAS, your committee has been advised that the speed that ATVs and UTVs can operate on a route should be increased from a maximum of 25 to 35 miles per hour unless a reduced speed is otherwise required by law, and that it is unnecessary to provide for the seasonal closure of routes; and,

WHEREAS, other non-substantive changes have been made to the attached ordinance which do not substantially change its meaning; and,

WHEREAS, your undersigned Committee has considered these amendments to ch. 15 and believes that adoption of these amendments is in the best interest of the people of Sauk County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that ch. 15 of the Sauk Co. Code is hereby amended to read as provided on the attached Appendix.

CHAPTER 15

ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE (UTV) CROSSINGS AND ROUTES ON -COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAYS IN SAUK COUNTY

- 15.03 Designating ATV/UTV routes. (1) The county board has delegated its authority to designate ATV/UTV routes on county trunk highways and state trunk highway bridges to the highway and parks committee. Any modification to a designated ATV/UTV route must be approved by the highway and parks committee. A copy of designated ATV/UTV routes, along with a map showing their location, shall be kept on file at the highway department, provided to the sheriff's department, and posted on the Sauk County website. The highway commissioner shall have the authority to close or terminate any ATV/UTV route on a county trunk highway system or state trunk highway bridge and shall advise the highway and parks committee at its next regular meeting of any closure or termination. The highway and parks committee may reverse the decision of the highway commissioner, but the decision of the highway and parks committee on closure or termination shall be final.
- (2) ATVs and UTVs operated on designated routes on county trunk highways shall operate on the roadway and not on the shoulder, ditch, or other parts of the highway right-of-way. ATVs and UTVs operated on designated ATV/UTV routes on a state trunk highway bridge shall:
- (a) Cross the bridge in the most direct manner practicable and at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing.
 - (b) Stay as far to the right of the roadway or shoulder as practicable.
 - (c) Stop the vehicle prior to the crossing.
- (d) Yield the right-of-way to other vehicles, pedestrians, and electric personal assistive mobility devices using the roadway or shoulder.
 - (e) Exit the highway as quickly and safely as practicable after crossing the bridge.
- 15.04 Permit process. (1) Any municipality or organization that desires a route along, or a crossing over, a county trunk highway or on a state trunk highway bridge may request a route or crossing permit. Anyone requesting a permit shall complete an application in compliance with this policy ordinance and the Wisconsin Statutes and file the application with the highway department. The highway department and highway and parks committee will review the application using the process in this ordinance. No person shall commence or continue using a county trunk highway or state trunk highway bridge, or request or allow others to commence or continue using a county trunk highway or state trunk highway bridge, unless a permit has been issued and remains in effect pursuant to this ordinance.
- 15.05 Regulations on operation and maintenance of crossings and routes. (1) The following restrictions shall apply to operation of ATVs and UTVs on designated routes:
- (a) ATVs and UTVs shall not be operated on an approved route other than between one-half hour before sunrise and one-half hour after sunset. from April 15 through November 15 only.
- (b) ATVs and UTVs shall be operated on a route at a safe speed not to exceed 25 35 miles per hour unless a reduced speed is otherwise required by law.

WHEREAS, the Sauk County Highway Department Mission is the development, maintenance, and safe operations of the Sauk County Transportation System; and

WHEREAS, the Sauk County Highway and Parks Committee unanimously approved a motion on October 15, 2014 to fund one third of the estimated cost of \$165,000.00, not to exceed \$55,000.00 for the construction and engineering of a traffic control signal.

RESOLUTION NO. 131 -14

RESOLUTION RESTRUCTURING THE FEE SCHEDULE OF PROCESS FEES IN THE SAUK COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2015

WHEREAS, Section 814.705 (1) (a), Wisconsin Statutes, authorizes the Sauk County Board of Supervisors to establish fees higher than the level set by state statute for various services performed by the Sauk County Sheriff's Office; and

WHEREAS, Section 814.70, Wisconsin Statutes, authorizes the Sauk County Sheriff's Office to collect necessary expenses incurred with respect to civil process; and

WHEREAS, the Sauk County Sheriff's Office currently charges \$30 per attempt for paper service, writs and executions, \$15 for the second paper served at the same address plus 55 cents per mile calculated from the County Seat; and

2014 Annual van Inspection

Pursuant to Wisconsin Statute §301.37(3), an inspection of the Sauk County Jail was conducted on September 30th, 2014. The inspection compared the facility to the Department of Corrections Administrative Codes Chapters DOC 348 & 350, applicable State Statutes, and best correctional practices. The process included a review of records, dialogue with staff and inmates, and a walkthrough of the building to assess the safety, sanitation, adequacy, and fitness of the facility. This correspondence will summarize the findings of the inspection.

SUMMARY OF FACILITY

The Sauk County Jail was originally constructed in 2003 and consists of one podular-remote housing unit (B) and two Huber pods (E&F). The facility has a maximum rated capacity of 369 adult detainees and is not approved to hold juvenile offenders. On the date of the inspection, there were 185 inmates at the jail and 20 individuals on electronic monitoring.

INMATE RESOURCES

The Sauk County Jail provides extensive programming services/opportunities to inmates. The following summarizes what is typically available (as this can change throughout the calendar year):

- EDUCATION GED/HSED instruction is provided by the Madison Area Tech College on a weekly basis.
- > <u>SUPPORT GROUPS</u> AA meetings are conducted twice a week.

RECEIVED

- ➤ <u>LIFE SKILLS PROGRAMMING</u> Employee Readiness, Child First Program, AODA, Cognitive Thinking, Fatherhood, Anger Management, Inmate Art Program, Money Smarts, Community Service Projects, and the Inmate Sentence Reduction Program.
- ➤ <u>RELIGIOUS SERVICES</u> Non-denominational services are held every Sunday (as well as individual consultations). Specific denominational services can also be facilitated upon request. Bible studies are conducted throughout the week.
- ➤ <u>VISITATION</u> Depending on their classification, inmates are generally allowed to visit six days/week, at least once a day, up to 20 minutes per visit. Visits are conducted electronically through televisiting.
- > <u>COMMISSARY</u> Canteen is provided by Stellar Services and inmates are allowed to order weekly.
- > <u>RECREATION</u> Due to the closing of A-Pod, inmates no longer have access to the indoor/outdoor recreation area. As a result, inmate recreation is limited to the housing unit dayrooms.
- > <u>READING MATERIALS</u> Inmates are generally afforded access to reading materials on a daily basis (although it should be noted the practice of using the library (room A146) was discontinued due to the closing of A-Pod).



The following is a list of operational/physical plant changes made since last year's inspection:

- All doors in the secure corridor are now locked (including the break room door).
- > Updated the Huber Search policy.
- > Brought in guest speakers with previous addiction issues to address inmates (RISE TOGETHER).
- > Implemented a new FTO program.



The following is a list of goals for the upcoming year:

- > Update the jail's policy and procedure manual utilizing Lexipol.
- > Explore utilization of electronic medical records.
- > Continuation/expansion of emergency preparedness training with the local fire department and EMS.
- Expansion of inmate educational programming with assistance from the Sauk County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC).
- > Expansion of the Vivitrol program for opiate addicts with assistance from the CARE Committee of Sauk Prairie.
- > Provide an opportunity for inmates to sign-up for Badger Care/medical assistance (prior to release).
- > Implement mentorship program.
- > Continue to resurface showers as needed (with epoxy coating).
- > Continue to paint inmate housing areas as needed.
- > Work with the local fire department to inspect the jail twice a year.

STEADE TRAVENING

Sauk County provides extensive in-service and online training to staff (in addition to external opportunities). Multiple standard operating procedures are reviewed each month and staff are often required to complete a post test. Additionally, practical exercises are conducted throughout the year.

SUMMARY OF INSPECTION

I met with Sauk County administrative, security, healthcare, and food service personnel to conduct the annual inspection. The process included a review of records, dialogue with staff and inmates, and a walkthrough of the building to assess the safety, sanitation, adequacy, and fitness of the facility. The attached checklist details my findings as they relate to the Department of Corrections Administrative Code Chapter DOC 350 and applicable State Statutes.

In summary, the overall appearance of the jail was in satisfactory condition. There were no apparent signs of graffiti or property defacing. A spot check of housing unit conditions and mechanical devices revealed no deficiencies. It is apparent that both inmates and staff are held accountable for the cleanliness of the facility.

Inmate feedback on conditions of confinement and staff supervision was generally positive (there were no repetitive complaints and I received multiple compliments regarding the staff). Consistent with previous inspections, my observations during the walkthrough revealed cordial and professional interactions between staff and inmates. Lt. Lange and his staff are to be commended for the positive climate.

VIOLATIONS

There were no violations documented in last year's inspection. One (1) violation was noted during this year's inspection:

Administrative Code DOC 350.07(9) states if a jail uses cells for double occupancy in a housing unit, the dayrooms in that housing unit may not be used for sleeping purposes. There was a short time during this inspection period where the female housing unit was overcrowded (resulting in temporary dayroom placements). It should be noted with the recent updates to Administrative Code DOC 350, no dayroom (regardless of the type of housing unit) may be used for sleeping purposes.

MISCELLANEOUS

The following concerns were also noted during this inspection process:

- ☑ <u>Jail Policies</u> There are a significant number of jail policies that necessitate updating to reflect the new requirements of DOC 350 (see attached inspection document for further detail). When completed, please submit the updated policy manual to my office for formal approval.
- ☑ Intake Holding Rooms As was discussed during the inspection closeout, the three holding rooms in the intake area should not be used for sleeping purposes (as a receiving cell could be). Short-term placement of detainees in these previously labeled "transfer cells" should only be for admission, release, and investigative purposes.

APPROVAL

The Sauk County Jail is approved to hold adult detainees with a rated capacity of 369. This approval is contingent upon the continued compliance with Administrative Codes Chapters DOC 348 & 350, as well as applicable State Statutes. I would like to thank your staff for their assistance and cooperation during the inspection. All of the documents I requested were well prepared and organized.

Request

Yahara Materials, hereafter referred to as 'applicant', is requesting a rezone from an Exclusive Agriculture to an Agriculture zoning district on behalf of two different property owners, Richard Belfanz and Timothy Evert. The purpose of the rezone request is to reopen and expand an inactive quarry to provide material for transportation projects and local needs.

Legal Description of Area

A parcel located in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, SE $\frac{1}{4}$ and NE $\frac{1}{4}$, SW $\frac{1}{2}$, Section 14, T10N, R5E, Town of Honey Creek, Sauk County, Wisconsin.

Background

Yahara Materials has entered into an agreement with Richard Belfanz and with the adjoining landowner, Timothy Evert to reactivate an existing quarry that was last worked in the 1980's.

If the rezone is approved, the applicant will need approval of a Special Exception Permit from the Sauk County Board of Adjustment pursuant to Sauk Co. Code ch. 7 and will be required to meet non-metallic mining reclamation standards pursuant to Sauk Co. Code ch. 24 and Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 135.

Pending the approval of the rezone and special exception permit and all permits being issued, the applicant suggests that the site will be reopened in June, 2015 and will remain operational based upon market demands for materials. The site will include active areas of extraction, stockpiling, and a crushing operation. The site has one ingress/egress point connecting to County Road C.

Conceptually, the Town of Honey Creek Town Board supports the quarry proposal as evidenced by their recommendation to the CPZ Committee that the rezone be approved. The Town Board will review and consider the special exception permit at a future meeting.

The Town did express concern about the amount of land being rezoned out of Exclusive Agriculture to Agriculture and the potential for increased housing density. Based on required setbacks of structures from mineral extraction operations (600 feet from an existing building) and that the Board of Adjustment can place a condition on the special exception that no houses be built in the Agriculture zoned area, this concern should be adequately addressed.

Town of Honey Creek Comprehensive Plan. The proposed rezone to Agriculture appears to be consistent with the Town of Honey Creek Comprehensive Plan. The plan includes the following objectives:

NRP-20 Mineral extraction operations will not be permitted within in the BRNNL as defined on Map 9-1 Environmentally Sensitive Areas.

The proposed mineral extraction operation is located outside of the Baraboo Range National Natural Landmark (BRNNL).

LUP-34 Limit mining in Honey Creek to one active non-metallic rock quarry, sufficient to meet the public needs of the Town. No metallic mining will be permitted. Reclamation of mining sites to their original pre-mining contours is required.

Currently, there are no other mineral extraction operations in the Town, it is non-metallic, and will meet the reclamation standards of Sauk Co. Code ch. 24 and Wis. Admin. Code ch. NR 135.

Zoning Map Amendment Standards pursuant to 7.141(8)

In its review and action on the application, the agency (CPZ Committee) shall make findings with respect to the following criteria:

Staff Note: If this property is rezoned out of Exclusive Agriculture, pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch 91 Farmland Preservation, Sauk County is required to report such rezone to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Staff recommends that the CPZ Committee review and respond to the following findings before making a recommendation on the rezoning petition.

(a) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of this chapter (Sauk County Zoning Ordinance).

Staff comment: The rezone as proposed is consistent with the overall purpose and intent of the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance which is to protect public health, safety and welfare of Sauk County residents and the public, to plan for future development of communities, and to further the purposes contained in Wis. Stat. § 59.69(1).

This rezone will provide needed material for the construction and maintenance of transportation options, physical development of communities and other identified needs that benefit Sauk County.

(b) The proposed map amendment is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan and the Farmland Preservation Plan, if applicable.

Staff comment: Both the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan and Sauk Comprehensive Plan do not provide direct guidance to decision makers regarding a rezone out of Exclusive Agriculture zoning to accommodate a non-metallic mining operation. However, a quarry in this location will provide needed material to maintain and develop our communities according to these two plans. Additionally, the area to be rezoned is not predominately utilized for agriculture.

(c) Factors have changed from the time of initial ordinance adoption that warrant the map change, or an error, inconsistency, or technical problem administering this chapter as currently depicted has been observed.

Staff comment: The existing quarry was abandoned in the 1980's prior to the adoption of Exclusive Agriculture by the Town of Honey Creek in 1987. Had the quarry been active in 1987, the property would have remained zoned Agriculture. This action reinstates Agriculture zoning.

The following item (d) is pursuant to Wis. Stat. ch 91 and the Sauk County Zoning Ordinance.

- (d) In rezoning land out of any exclusive agriculture district, the agency shall find all of the following, after a public hearing:
- 1. The land is better suited for a use not allowed in the exclusive agriculture district.
- 2. The rezoning is consistent with the Sauk County Comprehensive Plan.
- 3. The rezoning is substantially consistent with the Sauk County Farmland Preservation Plan.
- 4. The rezoning will not substantially impair or limit current or future agricultural use of surrounding parcels or land that are zoned for or legally restricted to agricultural use.

Committee Action Options

Approve Petition 1-2015, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing, that the Town of Honey Creek Board recommends approval of the rezone, and that the proposed rezone appears to be consistent with respective plans and meets the standards and findings for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8) and Wis. Stat. ch 91.

Disapprove Petition 1-2015, based on the facts of the request presented at the public hearing and that the rezone does not meet the standards and findings for rezoning pursuant to 7.141(8) and Wis. Stat. ch 91.

Modify and Approve Petition 1-2015. Not Recommended.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends that the CPZ Committee base their decision upon the findings on whether the standards and findings pursuant to 7.141(8) and Wis. Stat. ch 91 are met. If the Committee believes these standards are met, staff recommends approval of petition 1-2015.

WHEREAS, your undersigned committees believe that it is necessary to designate the MIS Coordinator as Sauk County's Information Security Officer and vest in that position the authority to appoint an Information Security Team and that Team be delegated the authority to make administrative policies related to the security of information systems as required by law.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that the MIS Coordinator be designated as Sauk County's Information Security Officer in accordance with 45 CFR § 164.308(a)(2); and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, the Sauk County Information Security Officer is delegated the authority to appoint the Sauk County Information Security Team to be comprised of not less than one staff from each of the following departments: Corporation Counsel, Human Services, Health, ADRC, Health Care Center; and Veteran's, with other staff as deemed necessary; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Sauk County Information Security Team, under the guidance of the Information Security Officer, is delegated the authority to create, maintain and implement policies, procedures and standards applicable to Sauk County's information systems, for the purpose of safeguarding Sauk County's electronic information, and other forms of protected information, in a manner consistent with all applicable laws and regulations.

WHEREAS, the Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee believes it is in the best interest of Sauk County to accept the proposal of Consolidated Correctional Food Service to extend the contract for the provision of inmate meals until June 30, 2021, with an additional option to extend the contract with review from the Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee and Sauk County Corporation Counsel; and,

WHEREAS, the existing collective bargaining agreement between Sauk County and WPPA L241 (Sheriff's Department Sworn Unit) hereinafter referred to as Union, expired on December 31, 2013; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with Wisconsin Act 10, certain sworn law enforcement officers maintained collective bargaining rights pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 111.70/111.77 and are exempted from the mandatory employee required contributions to the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS); and,

WHEREAS, the provisions of the tentative agreements reflect a commitment of Sauk County to remain competitive with the wage rates of neighboring counties, and the dedication of both parties to recruit and retain the highest quality employees for Sauk County; and,

WHEREAS, the Personnel Committee, after careful consideration and review, believes the provisions of the tentative agreement as being in the best interest of Sauk County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors met in regular session, that the Sauk County Personnel Committee be and hereby is authorized and directed to sign on behalf of Sauk County a collective bargaining agreement incorporating the provisions of the tentative agreement, set forth in more detail in the attached summary.

TENTATIVE AGREEMENTS BETWEEN SAUK COUNTY AND WISCONSIN PROFESSIONAL POLICE ASSOCIATION (SWORN UNIT)

The 2012-2013 Collective Bargaining Agreement shall remain unchanged for a two (2) year period commencing January 1, 2014, except as follows:

Deletions are indicated by:

Strikethrough.

Additions and new language are indicated by:

Shadow

Any language not included in this offer is intended to remain unchanged.

ARTICLE 9 - SENIORITY

9.04 - SENIORITY RIGHTS. Seniority shall prevail in the bidding for openings which occur on a shift within the appropriate classifications. In the event of a layoff, temporary or limited term full-time and part-time employees and probationary employees shall be laid off first. If further reductions are necessary, regular full-time employees of the affected divisions and classifications shall be laid-off in the reverse order of their seniority, providing there are qualified personnel to fill the existing position. In the event that an employee is laid-off due to the reduction or elimination of a particular classification and there are less senior employees in other bargaining unit classifications at the same or lower ranges than the employee laid-off, the laid-off employee shall be entitled to bump the employee within the bargaining unit with the least seniority in a division, less senior than the laid-off employee, holding a position for which the laid-off employee is qualified.

ARTICLE 10 - WAGES AND HOURS OF WORK

10.03 - COMPENSATORY TIME.

a. Compensatory Time in Lieu of Overtime: Employees shall have the choice of overtime pay or compensatory time off in accordance with the provisions herein. Employees shall be able to accrue a maximum of forty (40.0) sixty four (64.0) for 5/2 schedules and fifty one (51.0) sixty eight (68.0) for 4/2 schedules hours of compensatory time (i.e. 262/3 hours at time-and-a-half (1½) = 40 hours of "comp" time). Compensatory time will accrue to the employee's "bank" at the end of the employee's established work period. Compensatory time off shall be taken by mutual agreement between the employee and the Sheriff or his/her designee. The scheduling of compensatory time shall be on a first come, first served basis.

ARTICLE 11 - HOLIDAYS AND VACATIONS

11.08 - PAID HOLIDAYS.

Employees who work on holidays shall, at their option, be paid either time and one-half (1 ½) times plus straight time for all hours worked during regularly scheduled shift, or receive a floating holiday compensatory time for (hours worked not to exceed 8.0 or 8.5) in lieu of being paid. Employees who do not work on holidays are entitled to the normal pay for the shift currently assigned as of that holiday. Employees who work shifts other than the five day schedule shall have the following holidays:

- New Year's Day
- Four (4) hours on Good Friday
- Easter
- Memorial Day
- Fourth of July

- Labor Day
- Veteran's Day
- Thanksgiving
- Four (4) hours on Christmas Eve
- Christmas

All employees are eligible for holiday pay. Holiday pay will not be granted for holidays occurring during a vacation. Such employees will be entitled to another vacation day. If a holiday falls during a time an employee is scheduled to work but is on sick leave, he/she shall receive holiday pay and not be charged sick leave for that day.

Employees who work a five-day schedule shall have the following holidays in lieu of those enumerated above for other employees:

- New Year's Day
- Thanksgiving Day
- Good Friday
- Friday following Thanksgiving
- Memorial Day
- Christmas Eve
- Fourth of July
- Christmas
- Labor Day
- 12.03 SICK LEAVE EXTENSION BY OVERTIME AND VACATION. Accumulated overtime Compensatory time may be used by an employee who has at that time accumulated insufficient sick leave to cover the period of illness or disability. In such cases an employee may also elect to use accumulated vacation leave eredits. Any employee claiming a sick leave may be required at the request of the Sheriff or his/her designee, to provide a physician's release doctor's report to the Personnel Department in order to receive compensation. The Employer also has the authority to require any employee claiming sick leave compensation to submit to a doctor's examination, said examination shall be paid for by the Employer.
- 12.05 FUNERAL LEAVE. The Employer will grant a leave of absence with pay to attend the funeral for up to three (3) days in the case of a death in the immediate family of a full-time employee; two (2) days in the case of a grandchild, and one (1) day in the case of an employee's aunt or uncle. Immediate family is defined as parent, step-parent, spouse, children, step-children, brother, sister, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, grandparent of employee and spouse's parents.

ARTICLE 13 - HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

13.01 - HEALTH INSURANCE CONTRIBUTIONS. The Employer shall pay up to eighty nine percent (89%) effective January 1, 2012, eighty eight percent (88%). effective January 1, 2013, for full-time employees, of the premiums for group health insurance coverage. The Employer's financial responsibility shall be limited to eighty nine percent (89%) effective January 1, 2012, eighty eight percent (88%). effective January 1, 2013. Employer contributions for health insurance for part-time employees shall be governed by § 13.07 of this Agreement. Effective August 1, 2009, the emergency room and pharmaceutical plan design changes will be implemented.

13.02 - CHANGE IN PLANS. The Employer may, from time to time, change health-insurance carriers, or self fund coverage, provided that such coverage is not reduced. In the event that the Employer is contemplating a change in coverage, the Bargaining Group will be notified of the proposed change and given the opportunity for input prior to the decision of the County Board.

13.05 - WISCONSIN RETTREMENT. Effective July 1, 2011, new employees shall contribute an amount equal to one-half of all actuarially required contributions or as otherwise required by law.

Effective January 1, 2012, the Employer agrees to contribute to the Wisconsin Retirement System as required by law.

The employee shall contribute an amount equal to the following:

July 1, 2012 – Additional 2.0%

July 1, 2013 – Additional 2.0% (4.0% total employee contribution)

January 1, 2015 - Additional 1.5%

July 2015 (first paycheck date in July 2015) - Total portion of employee contribution as determined by WRS.

13.07 - CATEGORIES. - Employees hired on or after January 1, 2000: All positions filled on or after January 1, 2000, shall be placed within one of the following categories for health insurance benefits. Employees hired shall receive benefits according to the provisions of the categories their position has been assigned. The categories are assigned to positions by the Employer based upon the number of hours a position is normally expected to work in a two (2) week pay period illustrated by the following table:

ARTICLE 14 - MISCELLANEOUS ISSUES

14.07 - CLOTHING ALLOWANCE. The Employer agrees all employees classified as Deputies assigned to Patrol or Detective shall receive five four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450.00) (\$500) per year for a clothing allowance and clothing maintenance allowance. The Employer further agrees that

employees classified as Deputy-Security (Jailer) shall receive three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350); the clothing allowance (hereinafter "allowance") shall be available throughout the year on a voucher basis through vendors selected by the County. The allowance is not subject to carryover after December 31 in the calendar year in which said allowance was made available. The allowance will not be taxed unless required by State or Federal law. Employees may also submit receipts for reimbursement of qualified purchases not available through the chosen vendors. Clothing shall be in good condition and maintained properly at all times. The County shall bear the full cost of any uniform requirement changes. If, while on duty, damage to a Deputy's uniform is great enough to warrant discarding of the article of clothing, the County will pay for the purchase of such new article.

Employees participating in either the Emergency Response Team (ERT) or Dive Team (special appointments) will receive an additional one hundred dollars (\$100) for required uniform items as approved by the Chief Deputy or designee.

- 2. All rates 1.25% ATB increase effective January 1, 2014;



- 16.01 Purpose and authority. The purpose of the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) is to provide services to the public with respect to matters related to aging and disability and to improve the life of those with aging and disability related issues pursuant to the authority contained in Wis. Stat. ch. 46 and other applicable state and federal laws.
- 16.02 ADRC Committee. The ADRC committee shall serve as the statutory commission on aging pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4), and shall be advised by the ADRC advisory committee.
- 16.03 Powers and duties of ADRC committee. The ADRC committee shall exercise the powers and duties contained in Wis. Stat. § 46.82(4)(d) and plan and develop program policies in accordance with state law and regulations established by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.
- 16.04 Membership of ADRC committee and officers. The ADRC committee shall consist of 5 Sauk County Board Supervisors. The committee shall, at its first meeting, proceed to elect a chairperson, a vice chairperson, and a secretary.
- 16.05 Aging and Disability Resource Center of Sauk County Advisory Committee. The Aging and Disability Resource Center of Sauk County Advisory Committee (advisory committee) shall act as the mechanism through which the interests of the adults with disabilities and older adults can be presented on issues relating to their well-being.

16.06 Powers and duties of advisory committee. The advisory committee shall make recommendations to the ADRC committee regarding programs for adults with disabilities and older adults consistent with the delineated areas of need.

- 16.07 Membership of advisory committee.
- (1) The advisory committee shall consist of 9 members. At least 51% of the members shall be senior citizens 60 years of age or over. At least 2 members shall be members of the disabled population or their advocates. No more than 2 members shall be elected public officials.
- (2) The citizen members shall serve for a term of 3 years, so arranged that staggering of terms will result in 1/3 of all members' terms expiring each year. The Sauk County supervisor members shall serve a 2-year term concurrent with their supervisory elected term. Commencing with the date of adoption of this ordinance amendment, the full advisory board membership shall be reappointed to staggered terms as follows:
 - (a) 1/3 to a 3-year term.
 - (b) 1/3 to a 2-year term.
 - (c) 1/3 to a one-year term.
- (3) The advisory committee shall meet quarterly.
- (4) Advisory committee members shall receive the same per diem and mileage as standing committees of the county board, but shall be limited to one per diem per quarter.
