MORE TIPS TO CONSIDER

- Online purchases may be cheaper.
- If you are over age 50, consider a membership in AARP. (www.aarp.org)
- If you are a member of a managed care health program, consider purchasing a 90 day supply of your medicine vs. a 30 day supply. You will only pay **one co-pay**, instead of three.
- Ask if your medication is cheaper in a higher milligram dose. Then, cut the tablet as needed for your proper dose.
- Always ask if a generic brand of your prescribed medicine is cheaper.
